REPORT OF THE FIRST ANNUAL MEETING of the ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY

History was made at Conway on May 19, 1963 as the first annual meeting of the Arkansas Genealogical Society was held on the campus of Hendrix College. In only one year, this new society was sponsored by the Washington County Historical Society; four issues of the Arkansas Family Historian were published, in a size and quality that would rank it high among such publications in the Southwest; the membership grew from an initial group of 154 to 363 and the Society had a cash balance at the end of the year of \$277.

Of course, no such record could have been made except for the sponsorship of an established group, and the time of many volunteers. And, of course, the support of a loyal group of people interested in recording and preserving the genealogical records of Arkansas families. Recognizing this, the assembly expressed its appreciation of the work done so far, and recommended that the dues be raised to \$5 a year in order to better cover the cost of service. The attendance of 42 persons during a busy spring week-end, and the great interest shown indicated a genuine concern for the Society. The hosts -- the Faulkner County Historical Society, Hendrix College, and the Conway Chamber of Commerce under the chairmanship of Guy Murphy did an excellent job of preparation for the meeting.

In discussing the future of the Society, Dr. W. J. Lenke pointed out that it was not appropriate for a county organization to sponsor a state-wide society. He urged that a committee study the problem of a sponsor and suggested the Little Rock Public Library, or some other group having the resources of personnel and space and facilities to see that the Society was continued as a strong active organization.

Mr. G. R. Turrentine, Russellville, president of the Society, was chairman of this meeting. In addition to appointing the committees, calling for reports, and presiding, Turrentine recalled incidents from his own experience in seeking his ancestors. The several brief discussions, questions about families, and comments from members kept the meeting active.

The speaking program was given over to Dr. John L. Ferguson, executive secretary of the Arkansas History Commission. He discussed the increasing demand for genealogical materials and listed the resources of the Commission. The facilities include the following principal aids to research: a fair genealogical library; quite a number of issues of the US Census reports; very good files of the Confederate service records, with details of those serving from Arkansas; and some records of the Mexican War, the Spanish-American War, and the Revolutionary War. Other source material available in the Old State House, Little Rock, includes certain tax books from Arkansas counties; land records; and numerous US documents. The principal endeavor at present is to complete the microfilming of the newspaper files of the state. Some 1,700 rolls of film have already been completed. Three film readers are in use now, and two more are on order. Dr. Ferguson told the group that the Commission was anxious to be of maximum help to those in search of historical or genealogical materials.

Upon recommendation of the nominating committee, the following officers were elected to serve for the 1963-64 year: President, Robert Worley, El Dorado; vice-president, Mrs. Frank Cline, Hot Springs; secretary-treasurer, Miss Bernice Karnes, Fayetteville; and editor, W.J. Lemke, Fayetteville. Directors elected were Louise M. Griffin, Helena; Mrs. Lawrence Newton, Hampton; G.R. Turrentine, Russellville; and Deane G. Carter, Fayetteville.

EARLY RUTHERFORDS of WASHINGTON COUNTY, ARKANSAS

Old letters can often contribute much valuable information to a person who is seeking to learn more about a family. Therefore, it was quite a stroke of fortune to establish contact with a correspondent in Indiana who had access to some letters written 50 years ago by a young man named Rutherford, of Truckee, California, to another man in Tennessee, in an effort to learn more about the history of his family. This young man was making a diligent effort to learn all he could, and had even traveled to Scotland and written to many Rutherfords in Scotland and the US in his quest. He was grandson of an early settler of Washington Co., Ark., who had later moved to California. It is a pity this young man, George E. Rutherford, who was a school principal in Truckee, Cal., died (at the age of 30) the year after these letters were written. With his persistence, he would surely have learned and proved the whole story of his family, if he could have had more time!

Among his letters was one from his uncle, William B. Rutherford, who was living at 312 Lafayette St., Fayetteville, Ark., when he wrote on Sept. 9, 1909. I quote some parts of his letter: "Your kind letter of the 5th at hand. The chart or genealogy of the Rutherford family is a puzzle to me, and is as hard for me to solve here in Ark. as it is for you in Cal. Yet I may be able to throw some light on some dark places. The Rutherford race of people are of Scotch descent and the way you have traced them in this continent is correct I guess, but I have always understood that my grandfather and grandmother were from Virginia to Tennessee....They raised a large family in Greene Co., East Tenn.-- eight boys, four girls. Benjamin, Elliot, Joseph, Samuel, James, Robert, Willia, Archibald. Girls: Polly, who married Moses Stout, Ruth who married Dick Neuger, Sarah who married William Dodd on Cane Hill, and Louisa who never married. My father (Robert), Samuel, James and Stout left Tenn. some time in May 1830 with their families, came by water to Van Buren, Ark. and from there to Cane Hill the third day of June the same year and were there the year stars fell in 1832 or 33. As to Uncle Jack Rutherford, he came to Ark. in 1827 or 28; had a large family one of whom was Big John of White River, also Noel Rutherford was a son of Uncle Jack, so was Calvin. The older members believed in the royal command, 'Multiply and replenish the earth', but I don't know what the younger ones are doing.....Uncle Jim had four daughters, one of whom, Hily Jane, married H.J.Daniels....Uncle Jo Rutherford married Mariah Hays but had no family."

The family of "Uncle Jack", referred to in this letter, who came to Washington Co., Ark. in 1827 or 28, is the one with which we are most concerned in this report. He was John Rutherford (III), born ca. 1780 in Virginia, said to be son of John Rutherford (II), whose brother Elliott Rutherford, of Greene Co., Tenn. was grandfather of William B. Rutherford, author of the above letter. John ("Jack") Rutherford (III) married Winnie Grigsby, daughter of John and Winnie Grigsby of Hawkins Co., Tenn. about 1805. At the time he came into Washington Co., John was almost 50 years old, and had a large family, some of whom were grown or practically grown.

In three places, Goodspeed: "History of Northwest Arkansas" refers to the fact that these people were very early settlers. Page 145: "Other pioneers in the latter vicinity.....John Rutherford." Page 147: "One of the first settlers of the county was Eli Bloyed, who located on West Fork, several miles south of Fayetteville.....Among others of the pioneers in this portion of the county were..Alexander Rutherford". (John Alexander Rutherford was a son of John Rutherford, mentioned above.) Page 922: (biography of William H. Campbell) "The mother (Julia Rutherford) was but four years old when she was brought to this county, and here she was reared, married and spent the remainder of her days..." Knowing that my great-grandmother, Julia Rutherford Campbell, was born Jan. 19, 1823, I reason that the family came to the state in about 1827, if she was four years old when they came.

The following is a compilation of information from census records, Washington County records, Civil War records, cemeteries, and private correspondence with other descendants, as well as the research of Mr. George Rutherford of Truckee, Cal., ca. 1909. Approximate birthdates are based on census.

In a duel in 1716 George Rutherford of Fairnington, Scotland, slew his brother-in-law, Thomas Halliburton. George and his brother, DAVID RUTHERFORD, soon left for Jamaica. The Rutherford lineage of these brothers can be traced by a family chart back into the 12th century A.D., in Scotland.

JOHN RUTHERFORD (I), son of David Rutherford, married Elizabeth Elliot, daughter of Henry Elliot. On Aug. 18, 1751, this John and wife Elizabeth landed at Wilmington, N.C. with their little son, JOHN RUTHERFORD (II) and two brothers of the wife (Elliot). Another son, Elliot Rutherford, was born at Wilmington, 1753. In 1793, the family moved to Tennessee, Greene Co. (after having lived for some time in Virginia.).

JOHN RUTHERFORD (II), son of John (I) and Elizabeth Elliot Rutherford, was born in Jamaica, probably about 1750. He sailed to North Carolina with his parents in 1751. It is not known whom he married. Among his children were: Elliot Rutherford; Noel Rutherford; Calvin Rutherford; William Rutherford; and JOHN RUTHERFORD (III), born ca. 1780 in Va., who came to Ark. ca. 1827-28, about whom more is written.

Elliot Rutherford, son of John (I) and Elizabeth Elliot Rutherford, was born ca. 1753. He married Ruth Hays and had following children:

1. Samuel Rutherford, came to Ark. 1830. In Washington Co., Ark. census 1840, but not in 1850 census.
2. Joseph Rutherford, b. ca. 1790 in Va., d. Jan. 2, 1866 in Washington Co., Ark. According to a pension application, he volunteered at Greenville, Tenn. in 1813, and was a private in Major White's Regiment. He was discharged in the spring of 1814. He married Mariah Hayes in Jefferson Co., Tenn. on Feb. 26, 1834. (Mariah's sister, Sarah Hayes, married Nicholas Yates, and also came to Washington Co., Ark., settled at Cane Hill.) We do not know when they came to Arkansas but they were in the county at the time of the 1840 census. Joseph and Mariah had no children, and after the death of Joseph, Mariah lived in the home of a nephew, Nicholas Yates. She is buried in Cane Hill Cemetery.

3. Elliot Rutherford, b. Aug. 30, 1792, remained in Tenn.
4. Benjamin Rutherford moved to Arkansas, later to California.
5. James Rutherford came to Ark., 1830. His wife Elizabeth is listed in the 1850 census of Washington Co. Apparently James was dead or had moved away. The 1850 census shows three of their daughters:
 - a. Mahila Jane Rutherford (1830-1899) married H.J. Daniels
 - b. Rebecca Rutherford (b.ca.1832) married Hiram R. Miller Oct.21, 1860, Washington Co.,Ark. by Jones Peerson JP
 - c. Winna Rutherford (b.ca. 1834) married N. H. Carney on Dec. 25, 1859, Washington Co., Ark.
6. Robert R. Rutherford (b.ca. 1798 in Greene Co., Tenn.; d. 1864 in California); married Ann Tipton on Jan.27, 1824 in Carter Co., Tenn. They lived in Washington Co., Ark. from 1830 to 1850. In the 1850 census, he was listed as a house carpenter. In 1850, he crossed the plains with horse teams, and located at Sacramento, Cali.
 - a. William B. Rutherford (b.ca. 1824), his oldest son, returned to Washington Co., Ark. in 1852, where he married Nancy M. Ferguson on Sept.29, 1853. Among the children of William B. and Nancy Ferguson Rutherford were:
 - (1) Harriett Rutherford, b.ca. 1856
 - (2) John Rutherford, b.ca. 1860. (Was this the John Ferguson Rutherford who was the well-known Lumber King in Ark.?)
 - (3) Robert Rutherford, married A rdeen Hoshell, Ark.
 - (4) Julia Rutherford, married H. H. Warren, Ark.
 - (5) Mary E. Rutherford, married Felix Clapenback
 - b. John T. Rutherford (b. Oct.10, 1831, Washington Co.,Ark.) attended school in Washington Co. until 1850. He moved to California with his family, but in 1852 he returned to Fayetteville, where he attended college for two years. In 1859 he visited Fayetteville again and married Margaret Jane Mitchell on April 28, 1859. They moved to California to live. They had eight children, including George E. Rutherford of Truckee, Cal., mentioned previously.
7. Archibald Rutherford, Ark. Eldest daughter, Sophronia.
8. Sarah Rutherford (b.ca. 1820) married William Dodd in CaneHill, Ark.
9. Mary ("Polly") Rutherford married Moses Stout in Tennessee. They moved to Washington Co., Ark. in 1830. She was apparently dead by 1850 census, but we find a Matilda Stout (b.ca.1826) in the John Rutherford household in that census. Also, there was a Mary Stout (b.ca. 1832) in the household of Archible Rutherford in 1850. Moses Stout (b. ca. 1797 in Tenn.), Isabella (b. ca. 1825), Lucy (b.ca. 1829) and Richard (b.ca. 1836) were in the household of a Joseph M. Young in 1850. There was a man named M.C.Stout who went to Sacramento, Cal., with other Washington Co. citizens in 1853, and it is possible he was Moses, widower of Mary Rutherford Stout.
10. Ruth Rutherford, married Dick Neuger
11. Louisa Rutherford, never married.

JOHN RUTHERFORD (III), also known as "Jack", was born about 1780 in Virginia. He is said to be son of the John Rutherford (II) who came from Jamaica to North Carolina as a young child. John (III) was married to Winnie (perhaps Winifred) Grigsby, who was born about 1784 in Rockingham Co., Va. She is mentioned in the will of her father (John Grigsby of Hawkins Co., Tenn.) which was written Sept. 28, 1826. Oddly

enough, she had a sister, Elizabeth Grigsby, b. ca. 1786, who also married a John Rutherford and lived in Hawkins Co., Tenn.). We can suppose that John and Winnie Rutherford were married ca. 1805, as their oldest son, Noel, was born in 1806. They lived in East Tenn. until they came to Washington Co., Ark. before 1830. They settled and lived in the vicinity of Westfork, near Hogeys, about 5 miles southeast of Prairie Grove, Ark. There is recorded in Washington Co. Deed Book A, on June 7, 1836, a deed for John and Winifred Rutherford.

We do not know when John Rutherford died. In Washington Co. Deed Book T (p. 467), there is a deed of Jan. 30, 1857 by John and Winifred Rutherford, to their son Noel G. Rutherford, which deeds to Noel the tract of land in SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of SW $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 31, Twp 15, Range 31W, 40 acres. Then, in the 1860 census, old John is not listed, but Winnie was living in the household of Noel G. Rutherford. On that information, we can assume that John died between 1857-1860. Winnie died some time after 1860.

Children of John and Winnie Grigsby Rutherford included:

1. Noel Graves Rutherford (b. 1806, Tenn.; d. Dec. 1875 Washington Co., Ark.); never married. Noel and his sister, Elizabeth Rutherford, who also never married, lived on the family farm near Westfork, and we have heard it told that they raised several children. We know that they raised John Elliot Campbell, oldest son of William Hugh and Julia Rutherford Campbell. Also, I was told that they kept a nephew, Ewing Dye Barnes. In the 1860 census, we find Harriett Tinnon in Noel's household.

The will of Noel Graves Rutherford can be found in Washington Co. Will Book A&B, dated April 21, 1869, probated April 27, 1876. In it he lists his brothers and sisters. He left some land to his nephew, John Campbell. The old Rutherford cemetery is located on that land, and the graves of Noel and Elizabeth, and many other Rutherfords and descendants are in this cemetery.
2. Fannie Rutherford married _____ Tennin. We have no information on this sister, except that she was mentioned in the will of Noel Graves Rutherford. She apparently had a daughter, Harriett Tennin (b. ca. 1840).
3. John Alexander Rutherford (b. April 6, 1810, Tenn.; d. Aug. 7, 1877; Ark.) married (1) Malinda E. Martin (b. 1817 Tenn.; d. Jan. 25, 1863). This may be the John Rutherford referred to as "Big John of White River" by cousins in 1909. He had a U.S. land grant dated March 10, 1843 (SW $\frac{1}{4}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. 28, Tp 15N Range 30W -- 40 acres). John and his first wife, Malinda, are buried among several Martins in a small cemetery 1 mile north of West Fork, Ark. He married (2) Susannah Linebarger (b. ca. 1823) on March 25, 1866, in Washington Co., Ark., W.C. Graham, J.P.

Children of John A. and Malinda Rutherford included:

- a. Thomas Rutherford (b. ca. 1833)
- b. William M. Rutherford (b. 1838-39), married Nancy C. _____ (b. ca. 1838). This may be the William Rutherford who married Nancy M. Miller on Jan. 1, 1860, by Thos. McKnight, J.P., in Washington Co. William M. Rutherford was a private in Co. D, 1st Regt. Ark. Cavalry Vols. He enlisted at Fayetteville on June 24, 1862, and was discharged for disability July 23, 1865.

Children of William and Nancy Rutherford included:

c. Noel G. Rutherford (b.ca. 1840). This is probably the Noel Graves Rutherford who enlisted in 1st Ark. Cavalry Volunteers on June 24, 1862, and was killed in action at Vine Prairie Lake, Ark. on Feb. 21, 1863. It is noted that in the July 17, 1885 edition of the West Fork Republican, a weekly newspaper, there were four fraternal orders in the Lodge Directory, one being G.A.R., Noel G. Rutherford Post No. 14.

d. John W. Rutherford (b. May 28, 1842; d. Nov. 30, 1926) served as private in Co. B, 1st Regt. Ark. Cav. Vols. He enlisted at Springfield, Mo., June 23, 1862, served under Col. M. LaRue Harrison, and was discharged Aug. 23, 1865. According to pension application, first claim made 1875, allowed 1886, he was shot in the left shoulder and had his collar bone broken in Aug. 1863. He married Mary Jane Carney (b. Mar. 28, 1846) on March 5, 1864, by Rev. Kiley Jones. They are buried on the farm formerly owned by John W. Rutherford, owned in 1962 by J. E. Wyett, in NE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec. 28, Tp 15, Range 30.

Children of John W. Rutherford and Mary Jane Carney included:

According to reports, Noah Rutherford was killed by a northbound St. Louis-San Francisco train, known as the "Cannonball", when he and some other boys attempted to run across the tracks. Noah failed to make it to the other side.
- (12) Maud Rutherford (b. Mar. 3, 1885; date of death unreadable).

e. Elizabeth C. Rutherford (b.ca. 1845); married Andrew J. Miller

f. Martha J. Rutherford (b.ca. 1848); married Meredith Lofton on Dec. 5, 1863; by Rev. Kiley Jones.

g. Joseph M. Rutherford (b.ca. 1851); d.ca. 1931) married Rebecca C. _____ (b.ca. 1855; d.ca. 1935). They are buried in the West Fork Cemetery. Their children included:

- (2) Mary Bell Rutherford (b.ca. 1874)
- (3) James C. Rutherford (b.ca. 1878)
- (4) John C. Rutherford (b. Nov. 1879)

h. Mary Rutherford (b.ca. 1853)

4. Winnie Rutherford (b. Jan. 19, 1812, Tenn.; d. Dec. 29, 1892; married Richard (Dick) Dye (b. 1807, Ky.; d. Aug. 23, 1881). They lived near Westfork, Ark. and we find that they were among the first members of the first Christian Church in the state, established at Dye's school house in 1844, at what is now the town of West Fork. They are buried in the Rutherford Cemetery near Hogeye.

5. Bayless Earl Rutherford (b. Nov. 21, 1815; d. July 2, 1900). On Sept. 22, 1852, Bayless Earl married Mary Catherine Curtis (b. Dec. 20, 1835; d. Oct. 2, 1912), daughter of Benjamin Curtis and Elizabeth Short. The will of Bayless Earl Rutherford is found in Book C, p. 405, Washington Co., Ark., dated Aug. 19, 1896. It names his wife and children. He lived and died near Prairie Grove, Ark. He and many of his family are buried in the Rutherford Cemetery near Hogeye. One of his daughters was living in Los Angeles, Cal., as recently as 1960, and kindly furnished us with some information from the family Bible on this family.

He graduated from the U of Arkansas medical school and came to Indian Territory in 1901. He married a cousin, Florence Alice Curtis, daughter of F.F. Curtis and Narcissa Jane Karnes. Two sons live in Tulsa.

 - l. Louisa Dye Rutherford (b. March 30, 1872; d. April 18, 1960 in Los Angeles); married M. Stratton.
 - m. Dudley Graham Rutherford (b. Feb. 1, 1875; d. Aug. 20, 1908)
 - n. Hattie White Rutherford (b. May 30, 1878) married a Mr. Craig. She was living in Los Angeles in 1960.
 - o. Monroe Rutherford (b. April 1, 1880) lived in Redlands, Calif.
6. Harriett Rutherford (b. ca. 1820). One informant said she married a Barnes. Noel Rutherford's will (1869) shows her as Harriett Whitsett. We find marriage record in Washington Co., Ark. for John Whitsett and Harriett Rutherford, Nov. 14, 1850 by Rev. R.M. Morgan. In the Rutherford Cemetery is a grave for a man (probably her son) and his wife:
- a. John Elliott Whitsett (b. Mar. 23, 1855; d. Feb. 24, 1921) married Sarah C. Hannah (b. Nov. 6, 1852; d. Feb. 28, 1925).
7. Calvin M. Rutherford (b. Jan. 23, 1819; d. 1884) is probably the Calvin R. Rutherford who was a Private in Co. E, 1st Ark. Inf. Vols., enlisted March 1, 1863 and served to Aug. 10, 1865 under Col. James M. Johnson. Calvin married Sarah Miller Love (b. Sept. 21, 1822; d. July 30, 1888). Apparently, Sarah had been married before, as her maiden name was Miller. This couple moved to Texas after 1870. They are buried at Scranton, Texas

8. Julia Rutherford (b. Jan. 19, 1823; d. Dec. 31, 1885) married William Hugh Campbell (b. July 6, 1813; d. Dec. 18, 1861) on March 21, 1843. He had served in the U.S. Army between 1837-1840, and was stationed at Fort Gibson, Indian Territory (now Oklahoma). When the Civil War began, he enlisted under Gen. McCulloch, on the side of the Confederacy, on Nov. 18, 1861, but returned to his home less than a month after his enlistment, and died of mastoiditis on Dec. 18, 1861. He left Julia with a family of 9 young children, and another to be born within a month. Many family stories have been told of the terrible hardships which Julia and her children underwent during the remainder of the war, as did most of the people in that section of Arkansas. Julia and William Hugh Campbell are buried at the White House Cemetery in Washington Co., Ark.

- a. John Elliott Campbell (b. Jan. 5, 1844; d. Dec. 14, 1887) was named for his two grandfathers (John Rutherford and Elliott Campbell of Va.). He was brought up by his bachelor uncle, Noel Rutherford, who gave him land across the road from the Rutherford family home near Hogeye. John E. Campbell married Mellissie Shannon (b. 1847; d. Jan. 25, 1903) on Oct. 20, 1864. She was daughter of John Shannon and Mary Billingsley.
 - b. James Bayless Campbell (b. April 18, 1845; d. Dec. 5, 1940); married Ellen Ramsey.
 - c. William Hugh Campbell (b. Oct. 1, 1846; d. July 9, 1931) married Mary A. Hannah.
 - d. Joseph Wilson Campbell (b. 21 March 1848; d. 26 Aug. 1939); married Anne Macey White.
 - e. Winnie Elizabeth Campbell (b. 15 March 1852; d. March 26, 1929) married Dr. George Washington Carter on Sept. 16, 1880 by Robert A. Rutherford J.P.
 - f. Julia Campbell (b. Oct. 28, 1853; d. Oct. 20, 1940) married Zachariah Van Hoose.
 - g. Thomas Harrison Campbell (b. Feb. 23, 1855) married _____ O'Brien from Missouri, and they moved to Bristow, Okla.
 - h. Mary Henderson Campbell (b. Sept. 23, 1857; d. Feb. 5, 1954) married Francis Ray.
 - i. Noel Graves Campbell (b. Aug. 23, 1859; d. Apr. 29, 1909) married Mary Ballard.
 - j. Richard Dye Campbell (b. Jan. 9, 1862; d. June 18, 1904) married Mary Perry.
9. Elizabeth Chelley Rutherford (b. ca. 1826; d. May 30, 1889) never married. She lived in the old Rutherford homeplace with her brother Noel, and they raised the nephews and nieces.

10. Emiline Rutherford (b. Feb. 15, 1825; d. Mar. 8, 1877 * married Thomas J. Blakemore (b. Mar. 20, 1824; d. Oct. 25, 1908) son of Lee C. Blakemore, on Mar. 7, 1850, by Rev. R. M. Morgan. They are buried in the Rutherford Cemetery near Hogeye.

There was another Rutherford who was an early settler in Washington Co., but we do not know if he was a son of John and Winnie Rutherford. He was of the correct age to be one of their children, and we do know that he was closely related. However, since Noel did not list him among his brothers in his will, we hesitate to place him among the sons of John Rutherford until we have further proof. He was Archible Rutherford (b.ca. 1811). There was an Archibal Rutherford listed in the 1840 Census of Washington Co., Ark., with 1 male under 5 himself 20-30 years of age, a female 30-40, and a female 60-70. We are not sure if this is the same Archible. We know that Archible Rutherford married Sarah Holcombe (b.ca. 1828) probably about 1848, and according to census records and a descendant, their children included:

When you write relatives or others for family data, a form as simple as possible should be used. Many forms are not understood and more correspondence becomes necessary. I have simplified my forms many times and even yet I find many do not fill them in correctly. The following is the most satisfactory form I have devised.

I use a 3 x 5 card and file them according to the Lincoln System which I will describe later.

The earliest known ancestor has the prefix "a". His children will be aa, ab, ac, ad, ae, etc. His grandchildren will be aaa, aab, aac, aad, etc. Each generation adds a letter to the prefix. For example:

Some of our readers get both publications, so we will tell them that Mrs. Ledgerwood's article on "The Rutherfords" and Miss Cox's article on "The Morrows" appear in both publications -- the June issue of The Arkansas Family Historian and the July issue of Flashback. These Rutherfords and Morrows are Washington County families and properly belong in Flashback. But it occurred to us that genealogists will enjoy these two well-done family histories.

THE MORROW FAMILY

by Mary Cox, Box 696, Sanderson, Texas

George Morrow and his wife, Mary Morrow, came from Pennsylvania to North Carolina ca. 1764 and lived for some time not far from Cape Fear. From there they moved to Georgia and then to Abbeville District in South Carolina, where they remained except for a short time during the Revolution when they lived near Tiger River in the same state. George Morrow died 1790 in Abbeville District and left a will.

His will was dated March 10, 1790 and proved April 6, 1790. The executors were wife Marry Morrow, Wm. Hutton, Ebenezer Pettigrew. Witnesses: Wm. Deall and Jane Foster. The will names his children: Hugh Morrow, John Morrow, Jane Morrow, Margaret Morrow, Mary Ann Morrow, James Morrow, George Mecklin Morrow.

Mary Morrow made her will Jan. 12, 1819 in Abbeville District, South Carolina, where her will was proved Aug. 12, 1822. Executors were her sons, George M. Morrow and James Morrow. Witnesses: Jos. Hutton, Patrick Calhoun and Enos Crawford. The will names children: George Mecklin Morrow, James Morrow, daughter Margaret Morrow Brown and granddaughter Elizabeth Brown. Inventory of her estate was made Nov. 21, 1822 by Samuel McGaw, John Deall and James Calhoun.

Hugh Morrow, Revolutionary soldier, was born ca. 1764 in Pennsylvania and received his pension (# S-7254) in 1832, of which I have a copy. He stated that he returned to Abbeville District, S.C. after the war, then went to Rutherford Co., N.C., from there to Knox Co., East Tenn., on to Logan Co., Ky. and in about 1822 to Jefferson Co., Ala. In 1843 he moved to Pontotoc Co., Miss., to be near his son George Morrow who had moved there some months previously.

A marker has been placed on Kings Mountain in South Carolina in honor of three country boys who saved the day at the battle of Cowpens on Jan. 17, 1781. The three were James, John and Hugh Morrow. This information is in a letter from Mrs. Eloise Morrow Watters of Birmingham, Ala., who is a granddaughter of Hugh Morrow, son of John and Mary Calhoun Morrow who was a brother to John and George of Arkansas.

As for John Morrow, it is not known when or where he was born. He married Mary Calhoun probably in S.C. He removed with his family about 1808 to Warren Co., Ky. His children were all born in S.C. In a letter from Mrs. Watters dated Jan. 10, 1963, she says:

"John Morrow and Mary Calhoun Morrow were living in Abbeville District, S.C. in 1805. Sometime between 1805 and 1808 John and Mary and their children joined a wagon train for Kentucky. On the way they encountered bands of Indians. When a peace pipe was to be smoked, Mary F daughter of John and Mary Morrow, was pushed forward to smoke the pipe. She was a victim of asthma and had learned to smoke a pipe; she seemed to be the only one in the party who did.

"Entry Book - Surveyor - July 4, 1796 - Dec. 11, 1825", shows that John Morrow entered 200 acres of second-rate land Aug. 28, 1799 by virtue of Certificate 1421, on Bays Fork..to include his improvements..

In the fall of 1813 John Morrow lost his life trying to rescue cattle from an island in the river near his home. The weather was so cold, he froze to death and his body was brought home in a canoe over the ice."

In Order Book D, page 154, Dec. 6, 1813: "On the motion of Mary Morrow, who having taken the oath required by law, the administration of the estate of John Morrow dec'd is granted unto her, she having executed bond in the penalty of \$1,000 with Hugh Morrow and Hugh Simpson her security, conditioned as the law directs. Ordered that Hugh Morrow Thos. Shannon, George Frazer and Robert Herrald, or any three of them, being first duly sworn before a magistrate of this county, appraise the slaves if any and personal estate of John Morrow dec'd and return the appraisement to court.

"April 4, 1814, page 173 -- An inventory and appraisement of the estate of John Morrow dec'd was returned, examined and ordered to record. Page 177 -- A list of sale of the estate of John Morrow dec'd was returned, examined and ordered to record."

The children of John Morrow and Mary (Calhoun) Morrow, as given by Mrs. Eloise Morrow Watters who has a photo copy of the original consents for the marriages of the daughters, recorded in Bowling Green, Warren County, Ky., are as follows:

1. Jane Morrow b 1795 m 4 Jan. 1818 to Hugh Simpson
2. Mary F. Morrow b 1796 m 17 June 1817 to Jeremiah A. Robinson
3. Catherine A. b 1798 m 19 Feb. 1824 to Wm. R. Truitt
4. George Morrow b 1800 m 28 Dec. 1820 to Elizabeth Buchanan
5. Margaret Morrow b 1803 m 23 Dec. 1823 to Jeremiah A. Robinson
6. Hugh Morrow b 1805 m 31 Jan. 1833 to Margaret Holmes (Ala.)
7. John Morrow b 1808 m 11 Dec. 1834 to Mariah (Cox) Conditt

The two Robinson families remained in Warren Co., Ky. Hugh Morrow went to Jefferson Co., Ala., where his uncle, Hugh Morrow, the Revolutionary soldier, lived. George Morrow came to Arkansas in 1820; Hugh Simpson and his family soon followed. Sometime after 1830 John Morrow came to Washington Co., Ark., and before 1835 the William R. Truitts had joined the others.

(Editor's note: The genealogical tables of the Morrow family, on the following pages, were compiled by Miss Mary Cox of Sanderson, Texas. She has made several trips to Arkansas, as well as Kentucky and Tennessee, in search of information. She is a member of both the Arkansas Genealogical Society and the Washington County Historical Society and has sent us memberships for several other persons.

The Cox cemetery, 3 or 4 miles southeast of Clyde, Washington County, Ark. -- it contains more Reed graves than Cox -- was the scene of the battle of Reed's Mountain when General Marmaduke withdrew from Cane Hill in the last week of November 1862. A week later Marmaduke was back, as a part of General T.C.Hindman's Confederate army that fought at Prairie Grove. It was on the night of Dec. 6-7 that the Confederate high command occupied the John Morrow farm and home, at Cove Creek.

We thank Miss Mary Cox for her continued interest in the history of our county, and for the excellent copy she has sent us for publication. She promises to visit Arkansas this summer. --- WJL)

She married 4 Jan. 1818 Hugh Simpson; recorded in Bowling Green, Warren Co., Ky. They went to Washington Co., Ark. shortly after their marriage. Hugh Simpson is shown in the Sheriff's Census of Washington Co., 1829; and in the 1830 Census for Washington Co.

GEORGE MORROW

George Morrow, son of John and Mary (Calhoun) Morrow; b 1800 in Abbeville District, South Carolina; d 1892 in Washington County, Arkansas; m. 28 Dec. 1820 at Fort Smith, Ark. to Elizabeth Buchanan.

They lived in Sugar Loaf Valley, then on Evansville Creek, then moved to the site of Morrow in Washington Co., Ark. In 1832 he became candidate for the ministry in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, but could neither read or write. He studied under the Rev. John Buchanan. George Morrow came to Arkansas from Kentucky.

1. John Morrow, b 21 Sept 1821; said to have gone to California on the Gold Rush, perhaps died in the way or out there.

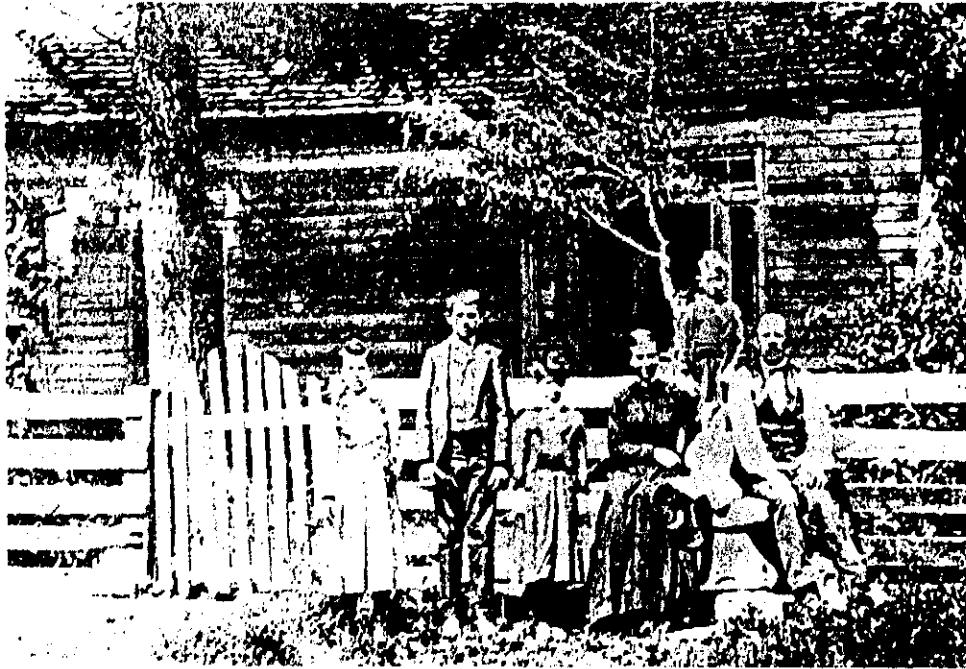

JOHN MORROW

John Morrow, son of John and Mary (Calhoun) Morrow, b 1808 S.C.; d. 6 Oct. 1885 and is buried in the Morrow cemetery on Cove Creek in Washington Co., Ark. He m. 11 Dec. 1834 Mariah (Cox) Conditt (1815-1900).

John Morrow came to Washington Co., Ark. from near Bowling Green, Warren Co., Ky. about 1832, having been preceded by his brother George and his sister Jane (Mrs. Hugh Simpson). John settled on Cove Creek where he built his home and raised his family. The Morrow house has been moved to Battlefield Park in Prairie Grove where it was dedicated Sept. 1, 1957 as the Battle Museum. The Morrow house on Cove Creek was Confederate Headquarters on the night before the battle of Prairie Grove. General Hindman spent the night there.

There is a nice sketch of the Morrow family in "Early Settlers of Cane Hill" by Ellen Earle Richardson and published by the Washington County Historical Society in 1955. Miss Emma Hodges of Durant, Okla., a granddaughter of the Morrrows, wrote a story of life on Cove Creek that was published in the Tulsa Daily World by Mrs. Lucile Ellingwood Morrow that was very interesting.

SOME HODGES FAMILY NOTES

(family data supplied by Mrs. Edward Herring, Little Rock)

Martha Jane Morrow, b 3 Nov 1835 Cove Creek, Washington Co., Ark.; d 26 Oct 1915 and is buried in Cane Hill cemetery. She m 17 Nov 1857 Howell Hodges (b 19 Mar 1830; d 25 Apr 1924) by Samuel Cox, uncle of the bride. (Recorded Fayetteville, Ark.) The Hodges lived on Cove Creek, just across from the Morrow family. Miss Emma Hodges, the youngest daughter, now living in Durant, Okla., says they had beautiful maple trees on their place and walnut trees on the Morrow place. Emma was 11 years old when they moved to Cane Hill. The home there was sold in 1915 when her mother died. The Hodges had 5 children:

Thomas E. Hodges married 8th May 1887 Altonia Smith in Little Rock, Ark. He was a doctor in the Cane Hill neighborhood and later moved to Rogers, Ark. He and his wife died there and are buried there. In the Session Minutes of the Salem Congregation of the C.P.Church, Boonsboro, Ark 1865-1905, we see that Dr. T.E.Hodges transferred from the Cove Creek congregation to the Salem Congregation without letter, as the Cove Creek congregation had no Session to give letters of dismissal. Altonia Hodges was received as a member on the same date, from the Baptist Church, March 12, 1893, dropped from the roll 1905. Dr.Hodge's father, Howell Hodges, lived with him for the last years of his life.

Some notes on the Conways and Stuarts

Dear Mr. Lemke:

Last year I wrote to you for help on the CONWAY and STUART lines. Now I'm asking again, but I do know a little more about them, although not nearly enough. I still believe we are related to the Governor's line and hope to be able to prove it one of these days.

Just recently I received a letter from John Trimble Conway, the son of George who was a brother to my Gr-grandmother Virginia. He is the last of his family but says he can remember his father talking about his grandfather going up to Walnut Hills to go bear hunting with the Governor and he thinks that possibly grandfather George's father was a brother to the Governor's father Thomas. Perhaps the answer is back in Tennessee.

Also I've come to the conclusion that my Gr-grandmother Sarah Francis Stuart was the daughter of Elijah Stuart, who according to "The Old Town Speaks" was one of the first settlers of Hempstead County, coming there in 1818 via keel boats from Wheeling, Va., down the Ohio, the Mississippi, thence to the mouth of Red River to the landing that later became Fulton, Ark. The Mosses and Fontaines were also in the party and they all settled among the Indian mounds in the western part of Hempstead County.

Thanks for all your help. The people in Arkansas are just wonderful in helping with Genealogy.

THOMAS et al

Dear Mr. Lemke:

By tracing the HUMPHREYS name with those named THOMAS (a name I am intensely interested in) I followed them right on down from Pennsylvania into Virginia and lastly Duplin Co., North Carolina! I notice in your Humphreys material, that they didn't consult QUAKER material and that is where I first found them.

1771 Darby MM, Pa. -- Susannah, dau. of John & Hannah THOMAS, both dead; of Blockley (or Buckley) MM in Philadelphia, md. John Humphreys, son of Solomon & Mary Humphreys of Darby, also both dead. I believe the Hannah, wife of John Thomas, was nee Rhodes.

The Thomas HUMPHREYS listed, son of John & Catherine, is probably the one whose will Owen Thomas witnessed in Loudon Co., Va. 1796. In 1781 the will of William Thomas, Duplin Co., N.C., was witnessed by Humphrey, Benjamin Smith & Wm. Houston. Wm. Thomas names one dau. Margaret Rhodes & Benjamin Rhodes was one of the execrs. Thomas bought his land here in Duplin Co. in 1771 from Joseph Howard.

In 1682 John Thomas & Edward Jones, with a group of Welsh people, 17 families in all, purchased 5,000 acres of land from Wm. Penn near Philadelphia. They were all Quakers, of course, but those hunting for the beginning of their Welsh Humphreys might find them right there.

Evan & Nathaniel Thomas were with Ross into Va. to buy up all of the land for their Meeting House there but by 1756 several sons of these men had joined the Linville Creek Baptist Church (Rockingham Co., Va.) There were many Thomases, and those who had inter-married with them -- Evans, Bennett, Lewis, Clark, Rhodes, Davis, etc. living in Rockingham Co., Va. 1788. Also, there in that county 1790 John Humphreys and Jane Ward and 1795 James Foster and Elizabeth Humphreys. As for the LEWIS & DAVIS names in the Humphreys article, both families are constantly around & intermarrying with Thomases. 1768 Chester MM, Pa. Isaac Davis son of Wm. of Darby Twnshp, md. Rachel, dau of David Lewis. In 1654-85 both William Thomas & Wm. Davis arrive in Va. from County Mornmouth.

I feel certain that the Quaker records of Chester MM, Pa. would show the marriage of Joshua Humphreys & Ann Katherine JONES. The JONES, along with THOMAS, is a name I followed right along from Pa. into Duplin Co., NC, where, lastly, Lewis Jones helps exec will of Isaac Thomas in 1803, emanuel Jones md. Mary Thomas, Marinda Thomas md. James Davis, etc.

My more recent search is for Mary Ann Thomas, b 1828-29 Tenn.; who md ca 1848 NW Ark or SW Mo to George W. HASTINGS; lived in Benton Co., Ark. In 1868 Hastings was murdered and Mary Ann md 2nd Wm. Blankenship. I have no idea who the parents were of my Mary Ann. However, one aged Henry Thomas now living in Niangua, Mo. descends from Thomas T. Thomas b. 1807 who md Elizabeth TAYLOR, and I have reason to believe this Thos. T. Thomas was an uncle of my Mary Ann. One son of this man, John M. Thomas b. 1847 md. Fynnettie CATES, dau of John Sikes Cates and Elizabeth Himes from Tenn. (I am also searching for the children of Henry Hastings Jr. & Martha Cates, md in N.C. before 1800.)

Two sons of Thomas T. THOMAS -- Robert b. 1844 & Creed W. b. 1837, lived in Arkansas but I know nothing of their families.

Living around my HASTINGS in Bedford Co., Tenn. 1830 were A. Thomas & D. Thomas and near them were Wm. Evans & David Lewis. William Thomas was on the 1812 Tax list of Bedford Co., Tenn.

William CATES, b. 1801 md. Nancy THOMAS b. 1804 and was still living in Bedford Co., Tenn. 1850. Early as 1802 Davidson Co., Tenn. Thomas Cates md. Anna Thomas.

In 1840 one L.E. (or S.E.) THOMAS 30-40 yrs old, wife 20-30, with six children, lived in Benton Co., Ark. -- side by side with J.P. Millen & O.J. White. In 1860 Allen THOMAS b. 1831 Tenn, wife Mary b. 1834, Tenn., ch JOHN age 5 & Lafayette age 1 (both born in Ark.) lived in Benton Co., Ark., Pea Ridge P.O. He might have been a brother to my Mary Ann b 1829 Tenn. History of SW Mo. records that one J.Y. THOMAS from Barry Co. while sick was seeking refuge in Ark and was taken prisoner by the Federals. Major Moore left a boy to guard the prisoners with instructions to shoot the OLD man if he tried to escape. These instructions were faithfully carried out. The boy who shot Mr. Thomas said afterward that he (Thomas) told him to be sure and kill him with the first shot. This was in 1862.

My Mary Ann Hastings, nee THOMAS, named one of her sons (my grandfather) Robert James Yell Hastings. Could the man above have been named James Yell Thomas?

I enjoy your magazine, The Arkansas Family Historian, more than the SIX I take. It's wonderful.

A LETTER FROM OUR NEW AGS PRESIDENT

Dear Members:

Upon attending the first annual meeting of the Arkansas Genealogical Society last month I was surprised to find myself elected president. I accept this honor, and hope that during the coming year the Society will continue to grow and further its threefold purpose of gathering Arkansas history, publishing the state-wide genealogical magazine and cooperating with genealogical organizations in other states.

I have been interested in the history of branches of my family for over 20 years and have considerable information on Worley descendants from Anson County, North Carolina and the bordering county of Chesterfield, South Carolina. A great many of these people settled in the state of Louisiana. My father, Harry Worley (son of Elijah Dixon Worley born 6/5/1856 in Anson County) moved to Little Rock, Arkansas as a young man in the Fall of 1910. He created my interest in the history of the family many years ago and continues to provide me help today.

From the study of the Worley side, I became interested in my Mothers people. Before her marriage she was Alice St. Claire Wait, the daughter of Robert Easton and Isabelle Evans Smart Wait. An uncle of mine, William Smart Wait, compiled a history of the Waits and the Smarts. William Boynton Wait, Father of Robert E. Wait, came from Massachusetts and settled in Arkansas 12/28/1830. He is credited with being one of the first bankers of Arkansas. My grandmother Wait, Isabelle Evans Smart, was the daughter of Richard Davis Smart of Charleston, S.C. He was a minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church South and it was while he was assigned to Little Rock in 1894 that his daughter married Robert E. Wait.

I also have information on my wife's people. She is the daughter of Charles Picton Coulter, the son of Charles Picton Coulter Sr., of Lockesburg, Arkansas. His father was James Madison Coulter who moved with his father, John M. Coulter, to Arkansas in 1836 from Lounds Co., Mississippi. Prior to that, John came from North Carolina and Georgia. I have a copy of a book entitled "Genealogy of John M. Coulter" written in 1951 by Mrs. Maude Graves Coulter that gives all of the family data known at that time.

My wife's Mother, Fannie Brown, is the daughter of Milous Brown, son of Elijah Brown. Elijah came to Arkansas at the close of the Civil War with his Uncle Joe Brown and settled in Sevier County. They were originally from Virginia. Elijah married Artie Burke after coming to Arkansas and settled around Lockesburg. Their son Milous married Celestian Julia Wright daughter of Dr. James Cook Wright who settled in the same community and was from North Carolina.

You can see from the above, I am involved in a great deal of Arkansas history. I am still seeking information on these lines and will be happy to share any information I have.

I know you will agree that W. J. Lenke and Miss Bernice Karnes have done an outstanding job of coordinating, assembling, and publishing our magazine for the first year, as well as forming the nucleus for the organization. The annual meeting was well attended and I was pleased to meet our officers and members who have been responsible for the success of the Society.

If I can be of service to any of the officers or members, please feel free to call on me.

Seven children were born to them in S.C.: Lucinda, abt 1805; Sidney Houston, abt 1806; Melinda, abt 1808; John Wesley 1812; James Pinkney 1814; Samuel Bazil abt 1817, and William Harvey abt 1818. In 1819 this family moved to Madison Co., Ala. The father, John H. Millwee, d. there Jan. 1819.

On Oct. 3, 1820 Elizabeth (Houston) Millwee m. Burton Pride. They moved to Morgan Co., Ala. Three children were b. to them: Nancy, Elizabeth and Henry Carter. Burton Pride d. about 1835 in Morgan Co., Ala. About 1834 Elizabeth Millwee's children started moving to Ark Terr, to Sevier Co. (today). By 1842 Elizabeth and all her family have moved to Sevier Co., Ark. Elizabeth is living there as late as 1860, as proved by the Census of that year. Who were her parents and how was she related to General Sam Houston, if indeed she was?

I have been studying your April issue; I am delighted with it and the No. 2 lesson in Genealogy by Allan S. Humphreys. If readers have as many unsolved problems as I, I fear that Mr. Humphreys may be swamped.

Humphreys is a name closely connected with my family, the McCutchens. My gr-grandmother Mary was a dau. of John Nevins, "Irish by birth, a sailor by occupation." He deserted when his ship reached Boston and joined the Continental Army. He served throughout the Revolution, settling down thereafter and becoming active in the affairs of his community. Mary Nevins m. John Humphreys who enlisted in War of 1812 and was killed in battle. He left a widow and 3 children: James, Wm. and Jane.

I haven't proven the parentage of James Coursey McCutchen who m. Mary Nevins Humphreys, but from his middle name I assume that his mother was a Coursey. James & Mary were m. in Va. and had 9 children: John N. Allen (d. at 6 mos.), Preston Smith (b 1820 in St. Charles; later to Cal-laway Co., Mo.; then developed a plantation in Iowa, Bentonsport; Robert Sloan; Nancy; Martha; Mary Margery; Elizabeth; Perry.

James & Mary & their family settled down on their Bentonsport plantation. Mary died there some years before the death of her husband, Coursey. He m. a 2nd time but no record of his wife's name. Coursey d. 1854, after which his son, Preston Smith McCutchen (my grandfather) moved his wife and family to the California gold fields. His wife was Jane Willse, native of N.Y. The Willses had marriage connections with the Provoost and Storey families.

James Coursey McCutchen was b. in Ala. or Ga. A meeting of the McCutchen Clan will be held in Texas this coming November. Mrs. Alma L. Chambers, Drawer 98, Sanger, Texas, writes that she had 25 new members whose names she will present. The Independence County Historical Society, Batesville, Ark., has published "Arkansas in the War Years 1861-1865", written by Gen. Marcus J. Wright (1831-1922).
