PERRIN

In 1635 there sailed from England to Virginia a young man listed as John Perryn. He was 21 years old, and the son of a London resident of fair means. We are not sure what the father's first name was, but the family name was really Perrin; his wife was Susanna. Later John was joined by his brother, Thomas Perrin, who brought with him a letter from Susanna, a "boy", some blankets and warm clothing and the information that the elder Perrin had died and left John a house in London.

Later in Varina Parish, Henrice County, Va., we find records of Thomas Perrin and his wife, Anne Forrest, living there in 1679. After the death of Thomas, Anne deeded land to their son, John Perrin, said land in Charles City County, having been granted to Thomas in 1688. Though it has not been proven to our satisfaction that these were the descendants of the immigrants John and Thomas Perrin, there is much evidence that they were the grandparents and father of Joseph Perrin who was living in Lunenburg County, Va. in 1748. Later the name of this county was changed to Charlotte, and we find Joseph Perrin living on Twitty's Creek in Charlotte County at the time of his death in 1773.

Joseph Perrin and his wife, Rebecca, were the parents of four sons and four daughters. Three of these sons married three sisters named Clopton, and these marriages are noted by Lucy Lane Erwin in her book "The Ancestors of Wm. Clopton of York County, Va.", and by John S. Wurts in his "Magna Charta".

Most genealogists are more interested in the Cloptons for their English ancestry was amazing. The Wurts outline stops with the three Clopton sisters who married three Perrin brothers and if one wants to find out something about those Perrin brothers one must consult court records and old Virginia periodicals.

Of the eight children of Joseph and Rebecca Perrin we have the following information:

1. Samuel Perrin, moved to Halifax Co., Va., where he married, Dec. 24, 1764, Jane Wade, a widow, and had two sons: Joseph Perrin, who married (1790) Christine Daniel; and George Perrin, who married (1798) Sally Nash.
2. William Perrin, born c. 1730; died c. 1783; married Mary Clopton (born Nov. 3, 1737) and moved to Edgefield District (96), South Carolina about 1774. He is said to have fought in the Revolution, and he had two sons (some say four) who were Revolutionary soldiers.
3. Josephus Perrin, born 1740; died 1797; married Cassandra Clopton, 1764. Moved to Lincoln Co., Ky., in 1784. Was a Revolutionary soldier.
4. George Perrin, born c. 1744; died 1797; married Catherine Clopton; moved to South Carolina, Edgefield District, in 1784. Census of 1800 showed his widow with one son and two daughters.
5. Elizabeth Perrin m. _____ Jones.
6. Sarah Perrin m. _____ Sullivant.
7. Nanny Perrin m. _____ Burton.
8. Leanah Perrin m. _____ Sullivant.

(The first two sons were not mentioned in Joseph Perrin's will because he had deeded land to them.)

One of the greatest authorities on the descendants of George (No. 4) is Mr. Paul Anderson, postmaster at Anniston, Ala. Some residents of Texarkana may be interested to know that the late Mr. Hugh Anderson of that city, whose wife was a niece of Judge Will Kirby, was his brother.

The will of William Perrin was the first to be filed in the 96th District of South Carolina. We have an account of Mary, his wife, and their younger children being forced to flee during the Revolution and take refuge at "Star Fort" (probably the old fort near there whose redoubt was shaped like a star) when British soldiers invaded their home. Mr. Timmons of near Edgefield, S.C., a descendant of William Perrin (No. 2) still lives on a part of "Winterseat", the land William acquired on Hard Labor Creek, and several years ago he gave Mr. Anderson the original grant. Though Mr. Anderson is not a direct descendant of William (it is George who is his direct ancestor), no one seems to object because this did not go to one of William's descendants, for Mr. Anderson has served all faithfully and well in the searching of records.

Perhaps it would be well to tell something of his place in the family tree here, for many of the families in South Carolina connected with him are outstanding. He is descended from George Perrin and his wife Catherine Clopton, through their son William. This William Perrin married, 2nd, in Nov., 1803, Susannah Kellum, and by her had Margaret Caroline, b. 1809, who married Dr. William Williamson of Alabama. Mr. Anderson's S.A.R. records are through the Wilsons of South Carolina and he is related to the Eddins' of Tuscaloosa, Ala. He tells me that about three years ago he published a history of the Andersons of South Carolina.

His wife, who died in February, 1963, was related to Mobly, Feaster, and Manning of South Carolina. There is a Mrs. Evelyn Feaster of Birmingham who, like me, is descended from the first William Perrin, but she is married to a Feaster, and like Mrs. Anderson, was always invited to the Coleman-Feaster reunion in South Carolina, much to the envy of some of us standing on the outside looking in. It seems that this has become a noted annual event to genealogists in southeastern United States.

But getting back to the descendants of the first William Perrin --and most of the Arkansas and southeastern Oklahoma Perrins are--the children of William Perrin (No. 2) and his wife, Mary Clopton, were:

1. Abner, d. 1799, a Revolutionary soldier; m Sarah Foster, dau. of John Foster. Their children: John, Thomas, Mary C., Abner, and Katherine.
2. Samuel, b. Nov. 19, 1770; m. Eunice Chiles, a descendant of Elizabeth Lee of Virginia.
3. William.
4. George.
5. Cassandra, m. _____ Dunlap.
6. Betty, twin.
7. Mary (Mollie), twin, m. _____ Harris.
8. Rebecca, m. _____ Anderson.
9. Margaret (Peggy), m. _____ Foster. (Ancestor of McKissicks')
10. Sally, m. Geo. Sullivan.
11. Edna, m. _____ Heard.
12. Martha, m. Livingston Mims. (It is their descendants who now live at "Winterseat", the ancestral home near Edgefield, S.C.)

In family records we refer to the eldest son of the first William Perrin as "Abner 1st" (No. 1). His son, whom we call "Abner 2nd", married Mary Carson Patterson, daughter of Josiah Patterson, a Revolutionary soldier, and his wife Margaret Carson, daughter of Wm. Carson, also a Revolutionary soldier. Their children were:

1. Josiah Perrin.
2. Abner Mason Perrin, a Brig. General in the Civil War, who was killed at Spottsylvania Court House; m. Emily Butler, dau. of Gov. Pierce Butler of South Carolina. Their children were: Pierce Perrin and Robert Perrin.
3. Col. Robt. O. Perrin, m. 1st, Elizabeth Spencer; m. 2nd, Mary Collier. Was in Civil War and later lived in Alabama.
4. Wm. Alexander Perrin, m. Mary Florida Lacy Jones, a descendant of Peter Jones of Virginia. He was in Confederate Cavalry and later lived in Alabama.
5. Napoleon Patterson Perrin, born March 16, 1837, in South Carolina; died 1908 in Arkansas; m. in 1860 in Kemper Co., Miss. to Isabella Montague Moseley (born 1839, died 1914). He was in Confederate Cavalry under Jeb Stuart and Wade Hampton during the Civil War. (See pictures above)
6. Telemachus Ulyses (Sock) Perrin, m. Harriet Powe and founded the Perrin Stock Yards in New Orleans.
7. James Henry Perrin, m. Fanny Calloway. He was a Captain in Confederate Cavalry; killed at Battle of Chancellorsville.
8. Arthur Lewis Perrin.
9. Margaret Perrin, m. 1st, George Blocher; m. 2nd, Dr. Richard G. Dillon from Dublin, Ireland.

Napoleon Patterson (Polie) Perrin (No. 5) moved with his parents to Alabama about 1848. The Moseleys lived just across the state line in Mississippi, and it was there that he met and married Isabella (Belle) Moseley. They lived there on the Ala.-Miss. line during the Civil War and for several years after. In the late 1870's they moved to southwest Arkansas. Their children were:

1. William Moseley Perrin, b. March 6, 1861; d. Jan. 20, 1863.
2. James Henry Perrin, b. Nov. 16, 1863; d. Nov. 1946; m. Lily Baker, 1876. Eight children, of whom two died in infancy. The others:
 - a. Abner Raymond Perrin, b. Nov. 28, 1897; d. Nov. 26, 1958. Unmarried.
 - b. James Lanehart Perrin, b. Oct. 24, 1899. Unmarried; has been in U. S. Navy for many years.
 - c. Margaret Isabella (Margie) Perrin, m. 1st, Louis Harold Snow. Their children: Louis Harold, Jr., Lillie Faye and Bobbie Jean. This marriage ended in divorce about 1932. She married 2nd, Fred Hartman.
 - d. Lillie Baker Perrin, m. 1st, Harry Newman Wheeler. Their children: Mary Lois and Harry James. This marriage ended in divorce in 1941. She m. 2nd, Philip Scott, and they have twin sons, Philip and Terry.
 - e. Mary Foster Perrin, m. Julius Jockusch, officer in the U. S. Navy; no children. They live in San Francisco where her mother, the widow of James H. Perrin, lives with them.
 - f. Robbie Lois Perrin, b. 1914; m. John Lawrence Tryon, Jr., Jan. 1933. Their only child, John Lawrence Tryon, 3rd., b. Feb. 6, 1935, was killed in an automobile accident in 1958.
3. Napoleon Patterson Perrin, Jr., b. Jan. 2, 1865; d. Aug. 3, 1924; m. on Jan. 23, 1898, to Dessa Viola Junell, b. Dec. 14, 1873; d. Jan. 29, 1952. Their children:
 - a. William, b. Oct. 19, 1898; m. Myrtle V. Hines; no children.
 - b. Belle, b. Nov. 8, 1900; m. 1st, John McPherson, who died in 1941. They had one child, Shirley Ruth, b. 1924, d. 1944, while a student at the University of Oklahoma. M. 2nd, Mike O'Matta; they live in Idabel, Okla.
 - c. Rex, b. Jan. 29, 1903; d. June 19, 1910.
 - d. Mary Frances, b. March 25, 1905; d. June 30, 1912.
 - e. Joseph, b. Sept. 25, 1907; at last report unmarried.
 - f. Eleanor, b. Oct. 13, 1909; m. Arthur Stephen Drake. Children: Nadya Jean, b. Feb. 11, 1930; m. Len F. Greene, a news reporter; they have two children, Kevin Lin and Janine Elaine; they live in Idabel, Okla.
 - g. Nina, b. Sept. 25, 1910; m. 1st, Bill Weathered; this marriage ended in divorce; three children were born of this marriage, two of whom died in infancy. One son, Cecil Norris Weathered, survives. M. 2nd, Sid Hedgecok; they have two daughters, Carroll Jean and Nina Kay.
4. Christina Roberta (Chrissie) Perrin, b. Apr. 16, 1867; d. 1957; m. Sion Sherrill Smith, son of Eli Smith of Georgia and his wife _____ Sherrill of North Carolina. He died in 1951. Three children:
 - a. Perrin, died when nine years old.
 - b. Sion Sherrill, Jr., b. about 1896; d. 1936; unmarried.
 - c. Henry Perrin (Hal), m. Elizabeth Smith of Benton, Ark. Three children:
 - (1) Margaret Louise, m. John Calloway; they live at Holly Grove, Ark. They have a son, John, twin boys, and a daughter.
 - (2) Hal Perrin, Jr., married and has several children.
 - (3) Don Cameron; married, has at least one child.

5. Robert O. Perrin, b. Jan. 17, 1870, d. about 1922; m. Geraldine Poole, who died about 1956. Four children:
 - a. Sue Belle, born c.1906, m. I. A. Vicknair and they live in Detroit, Mich. One child, a daughter who is married and has several children.
 - b. Malcolm Patterson. Was married, and has one son living, Charles; they live in Los Angeles.
 - c. Roberta (Robbie), m. C. J. Young; lives in St. Louis, Mo.
 - d. Gerald. At last report he was living in Kansas City, Mo. Unm.

6. Thomas W. Perrin, b. Dec. 15, 1871; murdered about 1930; m. Clara Bennett of Arkansas. Both were lawyers living in Jena, La. Two children:
 - a. Bennett, unmarried.
 - b. Archie Belle, who married 1st, ____ Tyson, and 2nd, ____ Oates. She had twin boys by Mr. Oates, and another son and a daughter. One of the twins was killed when his plane crashed during World War II. The other twin, Thomas Oates, lives in Houston, Tex., where he is a customs officer at the National Airport. The other son, Randy Oates, lives in Monroe, La. The daughter, Jeanine, lives in Alexandria, La., is married and has children. Archie uses the name of her first husband and lives near her daughter in Alexandria when not attending to plantation interests. Her brother, Bennett, who is an invalid, lives with her.

7. Abner Perrin, b. Dec. 6, 1873, d. about 1958; m. 1st, Effie Henderson; one child, Harold, who at last report was living at DeQueen, Ark. He m. 2nd, Georgia ____, who lives at Texarkana; two children: Norman, who is married, lives in Texarkana, and has children; Evelyn, who married a Mr. Porter and who also lives in Texarkana.

8. Eliza Mitchell (Ellie) Perrin, b. Feb. 18, 1877; d. Nov. 20, 1947; m. James Branch Isbell. (For a list of their descendants, as well as information on his ancestors, see "Southside Virginia Families" by Boddie. A copy of this book is in the genealogy room of the Little Rock Public Library.

9. Belle Perrin, b. about 1879 in Miss., d. about 1881 in Ark. She is buried beside her parents in Clear Creek cemetery near Horatio, Ark.

10. Mary Katherine Perrin, b. Mar. 14, 1882; d. Feb. 28, 1863; m. in 1904, to John Lenthould Eck, b. Apr. 16, 1878, d. Mar. 19, 1952. (For a list of their descendants, as well as information on his ancestors, see "The Arkansas Family Historian", Vol. 2, No. 5, May, 1964, "The Eck Family")

AUTHOR'S NOTE: This is only a small part of the information I have on this family, but I believe I have put in the most important facts. Lack of space does not permit me to include many things that are interesting. For instance, Eli Smith, who married Chrissie Perrin, helped to found the town of Mt. Ida, and his parents, Eli Smith and his wife, founded what was called "Smith House", one of the earliest inns of western Arkansas.

On the day that Gen. Abner Perrin was killed at Spottsylvania Court House Gen. Lee mentioned only three men in his report at the end of the day: "... the brave General Perrin was killed..." N. P. Perrin had cousins in South Carolina who were cousins of John C. Calhoun. A part of Richmond, Va. still is called Clopton. The bullet which killed Capt. Jim Perrin at Chancellorsville passed first under the arm of his brother, N. P. Perrin, who was later to witness the mortal wounding of Jeb Stuart at Yellow Tavern.

SHUMATE - SHOEMAKER

I am a gr-granddaughter of Bayless Shumate and his second wife, Elizabeth Cole. I have done much research on this line, but there are still some questions about which I am most eager to learn the answers.

The origin of the name Shumate is in the family which immigrated from France ca. 1720 (or earlier) and settled in Fauquier Co., Va. The name at that time was spelled "de la Shumate" and is thought to have derived from the French name "de la Chaumette". After the Revolution different descendants began to fan out into S.C., N.C., western Va., Tenn., and some to Ky. By this time the "de la" had been dropped and the name was shortened to Shumate and various corruptions of same. The line which goes back from Bayless (son of William Shumate and Sarah Ball) was from Harlan Co., Ky.; before that Claiborne Co., Tenn.; before that Fauquier Co., Va. There is more about that family in my article of Jan., 1961, in the FLASHBACK (Washington Co., Ark. Hist. Soc.)

I cannot trace the lineage of the 'Shumakes' who intermarried with Oxendine in Vineyard Twp., Washington Co., but would suspect perhaps there may be some relationship to the Shumates who migrated to S.C.

Mrs. (Alice Fletcher) Hicks and I have exchanged information to our mutual benefit. The Hardin Shumate who married her Lydia Fletcher was a cousin of my William Shumate (father of the aforementioned Bayless). Hardin was a son of William and Clarissa Shumate, who were in Dade Co., Mo. in 1850 census; most of that family moved to Wash. Co., Ark. before 1860 (at which time the father William was deceased.

As for the Shoemaker name, it is unfortunate that the Shumates have been confused with that family. Benjamin H. Shoemaker, III of Philadelphia did an extensive survey in an effort to separate the two families. I have a copy of his "Shumate Notes" (Jan. 1959), in which he states:

"There were approximately ninety different Shoemaker immigrants prior to the Revolution, but apparently only one Shumate root. Although in early days the name "Shumate" was spelled many ways (Shoemake, Shoemate, Somachs, Sumach, etc.) only the spelling "Shumate" is employed herein. There is no connection whatever between the names Shumate and Shoemaker."

He explains the various spellings of "Shumate" thus: "This was not through the doing of the individuals themselves, but, rather a product of those outlying areas where the rugged qualities of the pioneer made education only of secondary importance and adherence to rigid English pronunciation lapsed noticeably. ...Therefore, whether they went down to posterity as "Shumates" or "Shumakes" frequently depended on the degree of deafness of the lawyer or clerk who transcribed and recorded their various deeds, wills and other instruments."

THE HARE FAMILY

For a long while I have been trying to find out who were the parents of Edward, Moses, Jesse, Bryan, and Sarah Hare, who came into N. C. in the early 1730's or perhaps earlier from Nansemond Co., Va. Perhaps some of the family remained. I believe Elizabeth Hare Maule of Nansemond Co. was a sister. I am hoping the publication of the following history may bring further information so that I can connect this and find the parents of the above mentioned.

Original list of persons embarking from Great Britain to America, Aug. 21, 1635: Hare, Bryan, age 27 (b. 1608); Hare, Susan, age 24 (b. 1611).

1635 - Taylors came to Va. - Relatives of Earl of Hare.

"Ire Lois Davis Book" - Original ancestor in Va. - William Hare born 1638 in England; Sept. 25, 1663 - John and Robert Lawrence received land grant for William Hare.

1668 - William Hare - Surry Co. deposition said he was 30 years old.

1668-1688 - William Hare on Va. tax lists, Nansemond Co., Va.

1700 (April) - John Hare - Proved writs three persons - Transportation of self, wife Sarah, and Sarah Shaddock. (Col. Record of N. C. 'Sanders' Vol. 1, p. 533.)

1704 - John Hare - 190 acres; Anne Hare - 600 acres; Moses Hare - 95 acres; Nansemond Co., Va. Rent Roll by Henry Jenkins. (Shaping of Col. Va., p. 200.)

1720 (May 24) - John Hare born (Ref. Tenn. Bible Records, p. 22-23, Tillotson, Acklen). John Hare m. 1st, Pricilla Benton in 1740 (b. Dec. 14, 1723, died May 16, 1765). Issue: Mary, b. Sept. 6, 1742; Luke, b. June 20, 1745; Sarah, b. Dec. 17, 1748, d. Feb. 27, 1778; Elizabeth, b. Oct. 24, 1750; John Lawrence, b. Mar. 18, 1754; Benjamin, b. Oct. 3, 1760; Penelope, b. Feb. 11, 1764. John Hare m. 2nd, Grace _____. Issue: Lucresey, b. Sept. 5, 1766; Jesse, b. May 14, 1769; Bryan, b. Dec. 17, 1783. Grace died April 30, 1787.

1730's - In the early 1730's, Edward Hare, Sr., Moses Hare, Sr., and Jesse Hare came into Chowan Co., N. C. from Nansemond Co., Va. where the Hare family lived at this time.

Circa 1740 - Henry Winborne, Bryan Hare and his sister Sarah came to Chowan Co. from Nansemond Co., Va.

3. Jesse Hare m. Betty Renn of Va. Issue: Elizabeth; Mary Ann; King; Annas; Anna.
4. Bryan Hare m. _____. Issue: Edward; Bryan; Mary.

I am descended from Edward Hare, Sr., my gr-gr-grandfather (No. 1).

Thomas Hare (my gr-gr-grandfather) was the third son of Edward Hare, Sr. He married Penelope Moore. Issue: Thomas Edward (my gr-grandfather) and the following daughters, Elizabeth (Lewis); Penelope (Speight); Jamima (Wood); Janett.

Thomas Edward Hare (my gr-grandfather) m. 1st, Sarah Sharp. Issue:

In the early 1830's the five sons of Thomas Edward Hare moved to Fayette Co., Tenn. (Macon). All of the brothers except my grandfather, Starkey Sharp Hare, Sr. (who was deceased) moved to eastern Arkansas in the 1850's to Poinsett Co., later Cross Co.

My father, Judge Starkey Sharp Hare, Jr. was county judge in 1884. He was also representative for Cross Co. in 1891.

Old Mt. Zion, about 1½ miles southeast of Vanndale, was the first place of Methodist service in the then White River Conference. An old cemetery surrounds the place where the frame church stood. At that time there were four Methodist ministers in the Hare family: Rev. John A. Hare, his brother Jacob Hare, and two of Jacob Hare's sons, Thomas Pipkin Hare and David J. Hare.

Martineau is a descendant of Elisha Hare through his daughter, Rebecca.

They were related by marriage to Scotts, Renns, Sharps, Starkeys, Winbornes, Dickinsons, Wests, Speights, Burgesses, Bentons, Moores, Askews, Wheelers, Ramseys, Kings, Hunters, and Wares. Many of these names are still listed in the Suffolk, Nansemond Co., Va. telephone directory.

I would like to find someone who has a family Bible, or can help me find who is who on the Larremores.

REV. JAMES LARREMORE: Born ca. 1775, N. C.(?) Children by first wife: Wm. T. (1802), in Green Co. Ky.; Jackson, (c.1805); John, (c.1807). Second wife was Patsy Benningfield, m. Feb. 28, 1811, Green Co. Ky. Daniel Benningfield was a surety witness to her marriage. Children were: George Washington, b. 1813, Janes J., b. 1816; Mary, b. 1814; all born in Green Co. Ky. Mary m. Joseph Scott in Washington Co. Ark. I find next where the Rev. performed a wedding in Lawrence Co. Ark. in 1818; then in 1830 he was on the Crawford Co. Ark. tax rolls. Don't find him anymore, so think he probably died there.

GEORGE WASHINGTON LARREMORE (my great grandfather): Born 1813, Green Co., Ky. Wife, Elizabeth, born 1820, Ark. Were both living in 1880 in Washington Co. Children: Mary Ann, b. 1834, m. Calvin Chambers 1857, Washington Co.; James Jackson, b. 1838, d. 1925 at Evansville, Ark., m. Eliza Jane Reese in Washington Co.; Margaret; Martha, b. 1845; Joseph, b. 1847, m. a girl named Tennessee.

JAMES J. LARREMORE: Born 1816, Green Co., Ky.; bro. to Geo. W.; wife Mary A., b. 1818, Tenn. They married in Ark. and all of their children were born there. He moved to Burnet Co., Tex., 1850-60. Most of the children married in Texas. Children: Martha (1835), Louisia (1836), James (1837), Christina (1840), Mary (1843), Mariah (1845), William (1847), and John (1849).

JAMES JACKSON LARREMORE: Born 1838, Washington Co., Ark. (son of Geo. W.), died 1925, Evansville, Ark. M. Eliza Jane Reese (b. 1845), Washington Co., Ark., d. Apr. 10, 1909, Evansville, Ark. Her father was Wm. W. Reese, mother's name Francis. Children: Annie, Dollie, Earl, Bell, J. W., and Oscar, b. 1885, and still living at Evansville. I received a letter from Oscar last Jan. He probably could help more if he could be interviewed. He said Geo. W. was his grandfather. He also went to the grave yard and got his parents' death dates and gave me the names of his brothers, but no addresses of them or children.

OBADIAH LARREMORE: Born 1800, Green Co., Ky. Moved from Green Co. when eight years old with his folks to Illinois. He grew up there and m. Emily Esteys in Sangon Co., Ill. John, first child, was born Dec. 5, 1828 in Morgan Co., Mo. Other children Elton L., Obadiah, Samuel, were born in Mo. The other children were born in Crawford Co., Ark. as follows: Elizabeth (1835), Elijah, Rebecca, Martha, and Wiley.

REV. WM. T. LARREMORE: Born 1802, Green Co., Ky. I find him next in Crawford Co., Ark. on 1821 tax rolls, then again on the 1830 tax roll. Shortly thereafter he moved to Fayetteville, Ark. He was a prosperous merchant; was a minister of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, and helped organize first church in Cane Hill, Ark. He dealt in real estate considerably. He moved to Texas in 1849, and died in Caldwell Co., Sept. 27, 1853. He married about 1830, and had the following children: David J., William, Martha, Mary Jane, Archibald, James B., all born in Ark. His wife Susan was born 1818 in Ky. and died 1869, in Caldwell Co., Texas.

QUERIES

COLONEL LARREMORE: Born 1826, Crawford Co., Ark., married Rebecca Ann Delaney, July 1, 1849, Washington Co., Ark. Moved from Ark. about 1859 to Johnson Co., Texas, where he was killed in a cotton gin accident, 1879. He said his mother came to Alvarado, Johnson Co., about 1855. I have not been able to locate her by the name Larremore (it could be Ann Depriest, b. 1795, Ky.) Children were: Wm. L., Martha Jane, Anne M., Alice, Fannie, Christopher, Roda, Samuel, Frank, Fannie, John, and Texana.

SAMUEL LARREMORE: On the tax rolls in 1830, Crawford Co. Ark. (\$50. dwelling, five slaves over 10 years, three horses, ten head cattle, one slave 16/45.) He was also found in the Federal census in Gallatin Co., Ky. in 1818.

ANN LARREMORE: On the tax rolls in 1831 with the same assessment as the year before to Samuel. In 1833 the same property was made an estate to a Samuel Larremore, probably the youngest son, for in 1832, he was on the tax roll and charged 25¢ poll tax on one horse.

Rev. James and Rev. William T. were on the Crawford Co. tax rolls in 1830. A Lewis Larremore was in the 1818 Census of St. Clair Co., Ill. Lewis is probably the father of Obadiah who came to Crawford Co., Ark. about 1835.

I will appreciate any help on the Larremores from any of the descendants or others concerned. All letters will be answered.

Thompson; Nancy, m. H. H. Fox; Missaniere, m. B. B. Davis; John Gibson; Druscilla, m. E. Dodson; Pleasant M. Gibson; Telitha, m. Capt. W. R. Lawson; Lydia, m. Thomas Long; Green B. Gibson, m. Mary Moore; Hosea Gibson; and Ezekiel Gibson.

I would like to know more about the John Gibson who m. Martha Harper. Their daughter Sarah J. m. (1851) a Norman and lived in Benton Co., Ark. Would like to know parents and other children of this John Gibson. Was he son of Green?

If any readers are interested I have some Gibson families and marriages in southwest Missouri, including that of Eli Gibson who m. Louisa A. Wasson, and Joseph E. Wasson who m. Margaret Gibson, both in Barry Co., Mo.

I am searching for anything about William Sutherland (Southerland), b. 1804 in Tenn. who died in the 1880's somewhere in the vicinity of Bentonville, Ark. I am the youngest of five children born to Isaac Qualls (1847-1885) and Rhody Ann Elizabeth Sheid (1846-1893). They were married at LaCrosse, Ark. in 1866 and moved to Franklin Co. where their children were born. Isaac was the son of John Qualls; he had one brother, Dave. Need information on parentage. Rhody was the only child of Haden L. Sheid (1810-1852), born in S.C. I do not know anything about her mother except that Rhody was living with her grandparents, George (1788-1870) and Rhody Sheid (d. 1852) in IZARD Co. as early as 1852.

According to census records George Sheid was born in N. C. and his wife in S.C. Their children were Haden, William T. (m. Sarah Criswell), Noah (m. Elvy Jane Criswell), Sybel "Sibbie" (m. ___ Clay), Mary (m. _ Lacefield), Elizabeth (m. Ellis), Martha (m. R. D. Harris), and Anny (m. John Phillips). All of the Sheid children were born in Tenn. except Haden. Haden and brother William T. left Manchester, Tenn. and moved to IZARD Co., Ark. in 1848, and the entire family was there in the census of 1850, except Haden who had returned to Tenn. As far as I know the marriages of the Sheid children above occurred in Arkansas with the exception of Haden and possibly Anny. According to an old Bible record he died in 1852. I would like to know the name of his wife and her parentage and where they are buried. Also, I need the maiden name of Haden's mother Rhody and her parentage.

My father Isaac Qualls died when I was three; my mother Rhody Sheid Qualls died when I was eleven. I was reared by my older sister, Mary Ann (Molly) Qualls Warren. I never saw any of my grandparents or aunts and uncles but can give some information on all of them. I have a fairly good record of another branch of the Sheid family, Col. H. S. Sheid family of Manchester, Tenn. who are descended from John Sheid of the Revolutionary War, but don't know exactly where we are joined. I believe my gr-gr-grandfather was Wm. Sheid, Sr. of S.C.

I was married in 1903 at Morrilton, Ark. to James Kirby Pennington, the son of John R. Pennington and Amanda Casey. I need the parentage of each of them. There was a double marriage between the Penningtons and Caseys. Amanda's brother, Tom, m. Emily Pennington, sister of John R. Amanda died in Ark. John R. m. second wife; they are buried at Coweta, Okla.

I would like to hear from anyone who has any record of any of these or anyone doing research on these families, especially any descendants of George and Rhody Sheid (Shed, Sheed, Shead, Shield).
