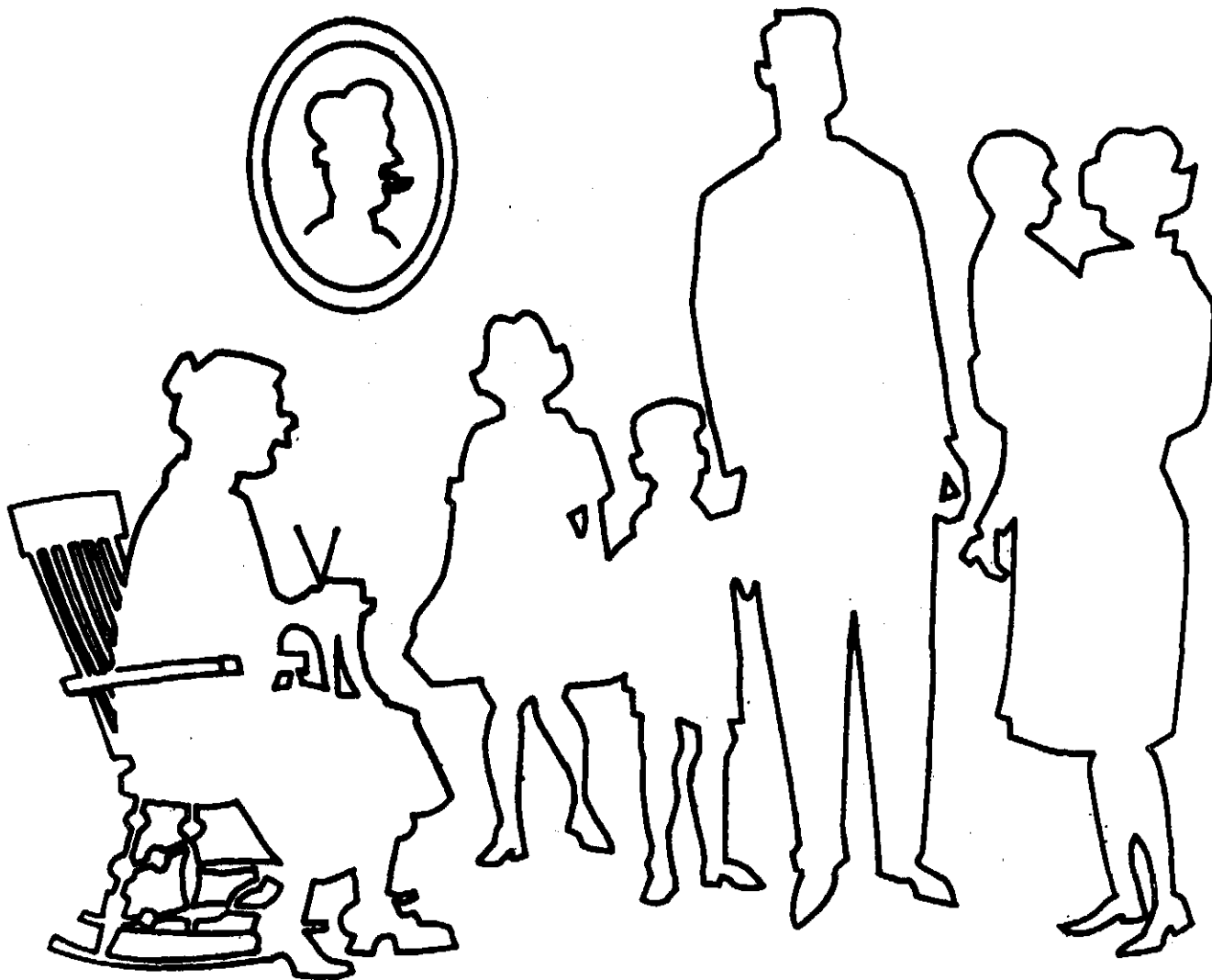

Mrs. Willma H. Newton - Former President

Willma Humphreys Newton passed away suddenly on January 10, 1979 in Hampton, Arkansas.

Willma had a deep abiding love for the field of genealogy for many, many years and had instilled that love into many people who came her way. She had no time for the superficial dabbler, but was dedicated to the truth as reflected in the source records.

She was tireless in her efforts to research Calhoun County families even though she had no bloodlines in the State of Arkansas. She had canvassed all the cemeteries of her adopted County and many of those in the neighboring counties. Her memory regarding the kin and connections of the old Calhoun County families was fantastic. Her ability to "flesh out" the dry records of these people into interesting stories was amazing, as borne out in the articles she wrote for the Calhoun Herald and the Dallas County paper several years ago.

Her research on her own family lines had taken her several times back to Virginia, West Virginia and adjoining states. She was a member of the DAR and was eligible for other earlier societies.

She has been known nationally for her expertise in searching the available records in South Arkansas professionally. Her many clients will attest to her dependableness and capability.

Willma Humphreys Newton was a charter member of Arkansas Genealogical Society, serving as a district Vice-president the first year of 1962. She was a member of the Board of AGS from that time until the latter 1970's. She served in several capacities during this time, including the office of President for the year 1973. She has furnished many valuable source records for publication in the ARKANSAS FAMILY HISTORIAN.

She will be missed for a long, long time by those who have relied upon her deep knowledge of genealogy to help uncover their "roots".

Willma H. Newton was buried on January 12 in her home town of Jennings, Louisiana. She is survived by a son, William "Bill" Humphreys, of Hampton, Arkansas, and a sister Mrs. Meredith Necessary of Jennings, Louisiana.

DEAR MEMBERS AND READERS OF THE ARKANSAS FAMILY HISTORIAN:

Again our year has started with many new members and many many of our long-time (old stand-by) members renewing early.

Since our membership continues to increase - your EDITOR has many additional problems. Not problems that cannot be worked out, but with only a few hands and limited time for all, sure takes some working-out!

FIRST, with paper prices, and postage prices, and space problems always always large, only 1000 (one thousand) copies have been printed for the first Quarter. That means, the first 1000 who have paid their membership for 1979 will receive their Quarterlies first, and then as time will allow, then a reprint will be made.

We do not have secrets, but if you have not been to our ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY, INC. HEADQUARTERS you might be shocked to find it is only where the Editor lives! We have not in the past, had money for an office building, (even a small room) and then we would have to have a staff and office equipment, etc. and we would rather spend our money on our publication and all try to share some of the work-load (which is increasing all the time).

Only your Editor is staff most of the time! Various members, and various Board Members drop in from time to time, but many of them live in other parts of Arkansas, and everyone seems to be busy, as most of us have full time jobs.

Can you with a very wild imagination, try to imagine trying to answer the large amount of mail, trying to keep Quarterlies, Ancestor Chart, Family Group Sheet Volumes and many other things printed, collated and prepared (so the postal service will deliver) 1200 plus Quarterlies, every three months???? It is not easy, and does take time.

Our volunteer list of hours was over 950 for 1978, and that did not show any hours for the Membership Chairman, our busy busy Treasurer nor your Editor, or Book Review Chairman, or Exchange Chairman. (At present we exchange with over 52 different Genealogical Societies all over the United States and Canada.

Our record for Returned Mail (or destroyed in the postal service) is also remarkable. That is another little chore, your Editor gets to do!! Correspond with the Dead Letter Office (how many of you have done that???) Just recently a member in LaMesa, CA wrote "where is my other Ancestor Chart Volumes?" And a good thing she did - as in a few days, from the Dead Letter Office in San Diego, CA a letter arrived with: our return information, our stamps, and this members name and address - and a form letter telling "the parcel was loose in the mail, and try to let them know what to search - in their office for!" Good thing, we had a clue! But terrible thing, the last three Ancestor Chart Volumes, was in that package! The last VI, VII, & VIII had been sent! But by the time the Dead Letter Staff has a chance to recover our Lost Ancestor Charts, we will try to reprint and be back in business one way or the other! Those of you who are trying to keep up with the Ancestor Chart Volumes for you Library, might like to know Ancestor Chart Volumes I thru XIII will be in print, again soon, but if we expect to ever print volume XIV, we will have to forget all this reprinting and move on to new things. Reprinting takes as much time and effort as beginning and printing for the first time.

TO BOTH OUR NEW AND LONG-TIME MEMBERS - REMEMBER your Editor needs to be notified as soon as you know you are going to MOVE!

When a Quarterly is sent along with the others, and we do send 200 at a time, and should the Quarterly not reach the correct address, and is returned to Headquarter-office, postage due at the door is 68 or more cents. (That is when the Quarterly is 60 pages, and when our Quarterly is 73 or more pages, of course the postage due is 78 cents or more). Then that is not the end, as the Quarterly is still to be sent to the member and this time, it has to be sent in an envelope (which costs additional money) and new postage (for one peice) needs to be paid, so the total postage on that one Quarterly is sometimes over \$1.50! This is a Non-profit organization, but that makes us go into a deep hole, so it is very necessary for us to know the correct address long before our Bulk mail is sent in the beginning. Our record is very good at present, but for the benefit of our many new members (and some few of the long-time members, who might forget---please try to remember, as that takes time, you Editor really needs for other things!!!!

A LARGE MANY MANY THANKS TO those members who have paid, before January 1, 1979, and to this date, February 4 over 700 members have paid, and their metal plates are all corrected (those who had to move) and in the correct Zip Code order, all ready to be stamped for our first issue of 1979. If you enjoyed receiving your ARKANSAS FAMILY HISTORIAN early in 1978, we hope you will again enjoy the same service in 1979, but it takes a heap of doing for many of us.

We closed out our 1978 year very early (in November, as we couldn't send a full number of Quarterlies to the late members). There may be a little time to re-print a little later (as only the March 1978 issues is out of print, to complete the 1978 year) so watch the EDITOR'S NOTES for notice of a re-print in possibly the June 1979 issue.

By the time you receive your March 1979 issue, we hope to have a complete set of the Ancestor Chart Volumes, one more time! Those of you who have not already sent in your Ancestor Charts for publication, it is still not to late. Send a request for Ancestor Chart Forms (and A.S.A.S.E.) Self addressed stamped envelope, and we will send you blank forms. A good many are waiting to be published (many are waiting to be typed) if you can possibly get your Chart typed, please do, before it is sent to us. We would much rather you would see that your Chart is correctly typed, as there is much less chance of error. We photo-copy so there is no way an error can be made, if your Chart is correct. Remember this is also a FREE service So no promises can be made, as to when your chart will be published (but soon as possible).

AGAIN - Please do not destroy your ARKANSAS FAMILY HISTORIAN. Many are trying to complete their sets. Several Libraries have reported- they do have complete sets. Some only need one or more issues, to complete their sets - and are trying to complete them, so they might be bound. Genealogical information does not go out of date! Our Arkansas History Commission Office has complete file. Also the Little Rock Public Library, 8th and Louisiana (2nd Floor) Little Rock. And the Alexandria, Louisiana Genealogical & Historical Society, 503 Washington St., Alexandria, LA., only needs one issue: Volume IV Number 4 to complete their complete set. If you or your Library has a complete file, let us know - it is easy to refer interested people to a Library in their area, and much valuable information is to be found in back issues.

Several out of state members have volunteered to research, either for a small fee or free of charge (be sure to send S.A.S.E. - self addressed stamped envelope). The following is a good example:

A VALUABLE HISTORICAL RECORD bought by Arkansas Genealogical Society for its Library (now housed at the Little Rock Public Library, 2nd Floor). "FRONTIER CLAIMS IN THE LOWER SOUTH", compiled by Richard S. Lackey of Forest, Mississippi, a Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists, with Introduction by John D. W. Guice, Dept. History, University of Southern Mississippi, 1977.

This is a record of claims filed by citizens of the Alabama and Tombigbee River Settlements in the Mississippi Territory for depredations by the Creek Indians during the War of 1812.

British agents, assisted by the Spanish, who hoped to discourage westward migration in the river valleys, north of Mobile, succeeded in arousing a part of the Creek Nation. In the summer of 1813, settlers in the eastern half of Mississippi Territory lived in constant fear of attack by hostile Indians.

On the afternoon of Aug. 30, 1813, some 750 hostile Creek Indians overran the fort on Samuel Mims' plantation near the Tensaw River, reduced it to ruins, and slaughtered most of its occupants.

After the "Fort Mims Massacre" and peace returned to the Tensaw settlement, the victims or their heirs sought reparation from the United States government. In obtaining permission to search these restricted records of the House of Representatives found in the National Archives, and finally publishing them, he has done a valuable service to the interested public for research purposes. BOOKS DONATED BY THE AUTHORS TO THE ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY LIBRARY - "THE KERSHNER FAMILIES OF MARYLAND - 1731-1977" Volume I, History Genealogy and Western Migrations, by Mary Kershner Maxwell, 1622 W. Street, Vrain, Colorado Springs, Colorado 80904.

This is a very large compilation (522 pages with index) of valuable family information which would defy any attempt to condense or review in full form. It is written in 4 sections with each section having its own index. This was done to facilitate finding many persons by the same name.

The purpose of the book is to establish the many lines of Kershners in the United States today in order to help researchers find their place in the family.

Sections deal with the following: I, the first 100 years in America; II, Families of Johan Gerge Kirschner and his wife Ann. This is about their 6 children and descendants; III, David Kershner, born 1814/15, and 5 sons in Civil War of 11 children; and IV, Pennsylvania and other Kershner connections. Many descendants have written sketches of their ancestors. Other families coming from the Rhenish Palatinate to Pennsylvania in 1731 with this family were: Seiberts, Ankeney, Kreighs, Troups, etc.

A mountain of genealogical material for the many families included. One unique feature is two pages of the signatures of 39 Kershner ancestors taken from various documents. We appreciate this donation very much to broaden our Library.

JORDAN MILAM (MILUM) AND THE DESCENDANTS OF HIS SON JOHN MILAM, 1978 - by Eunice Chandler Hockey, 1615 E. 8th St., Springfield, Missouri 65802

The author started accumulating family records in 1956 to learn about her parent's ancestry. They were Chester Arthur Chandler and Mary Edith Brimhall.

This published record of 189 pages, documents the records back 228 years - from 1750 to 1978. The maternal line of her father went back to Jordan Milam (1750-1851). This book traces the descendants of his children. The trail followed goes from South Carolina thru Tennessee to Arkansas, Missouri, etc.

There is much good genealogical information in this record for the families involved. Names of those most often mentioned other than Milam are: Allen, Baughman, Chandler, Ewing, Jackson, Rowlett, and Starkey.

PIONEERING IN THE EVERGLADES by Ruth Robbins Beardsley, 1973. This is the story of the author's life. The events started in 1916 just before World War I. She had been raised in Chicago and had a degree from the University of Illinois.

She went to West Palm Beach, Florida to teach and was required to take the State teachers exam. In the same group, there was a young man

James Beardsley who had also lived in Chicago. Before World War I, they were married.

This short book relates all of the important events in their lives and adventures in the early part of the development of the State of Florida. Some of the time they lived in the area of the Everglades. It is easy to read because the continuity of events flows smoothly.

A CRACKER HISTORY OF OKEECHOBEE by Lawrence E. Will, 1964.

This book is intended to portray the lives and activities of the early settlers on the shores of Okeechobee. For a time the author operated freight, passenger and tow boats in all parts of the lake and the Everglades. This enabled him to gain a first hand knowledge of people and the development during the early days of settlement.

The local "cracker" dialect is used to describe events of this part of the world as well as its past history. The second title is "Custard Apple, Moonvine, Catfish and Moonshine" is a good indication of the diverse subjects that enter this true story of wide open action.

We are grateful for these gift books.

1850 - 1860 and now 1870 Census of Arkansas County!

Publication of the 1870 Census of Arkansas County, Arkansas, has been completed and is now for sale. This joins the 1850 and 1860 Census which are already available in this Series. The price of this volume is \$10. which includes, packaging, handling and postage to the purchaser. There are 173 pages, 8 1/2 by 11, with a tough plastic cover. It was copied from microfilm of the original, in the same order and arrangement. The index includes all surnames. It is the first census taken after Civil War and includes many black people. The 1870 Census may be ordered from the compiler: R. W. Dhonau, 4410 Lee Ave., Little Rock, AR 72205. Also available are 1850 & 1860 bound together for \$9. or 1860 alone for \$5.

THE JOHNSON FAMILY 1743-1978, a revision and enlargement of a 1972 edition given by compiler: Mrs. Ruby Johnson Wiedeman, 7250 S.E. Sherman St., Portland, Oregon, 97215 Book is for sale with price of \$20. plus \$1. mailing fee.

This is a large genealogical work of the Northwest Arkansas (Madison, Washington, Benton & Carroll counties) descendants of James and Rebekah Martin Johnson, through their sons: William and Martin. There are 10,823 descendants listed by name. A full-name index indicates what a great amount of work has been accomplished in 344 pages. We are grateful for this storehouse of genealogical information and commend Mrs. Wiedeman for her valuable work.

LINDA'S PICTURES FIND A LUCKY RELATIVE!!!!!!

In March 1977, Mrs. Linda Ramsey Ashley of Lexington, Kentucky, was our speaker at the workshop of Arkansas Genealogical Society at Coachman Inn, Little Rock. She announced that she had some old pictures made by photographer, Dayton Bowers, in DeWitt, Arkansas, which she would like to give to any relative of the people in the pictures. One was labeled "Tom Ireland - Nov. 16, 1897" another had "Russell Ireland -1896" on the back. These pictures were found under a cabin that had been torn down recently at Lake Breckinridge, Kentucky.

Since I appeared to be the lone representative from Arkansas County, I undertook to play Sherlock Holmes and try to find a descendant of Tom & Russell Ireland. In the 1880 Census, they were listed as residents of DeWitt, Arkansas. No Irelands appeared in any present day telephone books from Arkansas County.

Last chance, I asked the Editor of the Grand Prairie Historical Society to ask in the "Editor's notes" of her October 1978 Bulletin, "if anyone knew a relative of the Ireland Family?"

IT WORKED! A lady in DeWitt, who knew me, wrote a Mrs. John Black of DeWitt, who in turn volunteered "she is a great, great niece of the Irelands, who moved back to Kentucky. I sent Mrs. Ashley's address to her, so that she might write her and claim the long lost pictures. Finding is fun! R. W. Dhonau, Director.

MEMOIRS OF HARDY FOWLER
GIBSON COUNTY, TEN. & PERRY COUNTY, ARK.
(1821-1898)

(The following is a mement which is all that remains of these memoirs shared with us by Hardy Fowler's great granddaughter, Mrs. Inez McCabe, Adona, Ark. 72001 and copied by his great-great granddaughter, Mrs. Hazel Holbrook, Box 35, Perry, Ark. 72125)

In 1840 I taught my first school at eleven dollars per month; it was at a time when money was very scarce.

Cotton was down to four and five cents per pound and every thing else in perportion; and money was worth more then at any other time.

This was a public school; but we had no normal then, neither did we have any County Examiners; but the three School Commissioners of each district decided as to the qualifications of the teachers to teach in their districts. But this was at a time when lawmakers had some regard to the burden they imposed upon the people. I taught at a number of other schools in that County (Gibson Co. Ten.) before I came to Arkansas.

I got reasonable wages for them the highest wages I ever got in that Country was 25.00 per month, I generally pleased the people. In April 1843 I determined that I would change my life and endeavor to prepare for the life to come. I was a Seeker of religion for several months, and mourners were never called in all this time when I was present, but what I presented myself; and I had the prayers and instructions and encouragement of many good, and noble men and women, but they have gone from labor to reward. And I shall now soon go and join them. I was never satisfied until the seventh of September that was in 1843.

I then became a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

This was before the division of the church; and when that occurred I could but remain with the Methodist Episcopal Church South. I was baptised by Jacob Mathis, and by immersion his brother Elder Elisha Mathis united me and my wife in holy matrimony.

I think it was in 1842 that I became a candidate for constable of Civil District No 1 in Gibson County, Tennessee. I had two competitors, Carlton Mathis and Robert Love the latter ran ahead of me three votes, while the former was away behind. So in this my first attempt at Public life I was defeated, of which I was afterwards very glad, for that office would not have suited me.

I afterwards held some Military offices in that County which I wish to write about; and some explanations will be necessary. The Militia of the State at that time was well organized.

The State was laid off into Regiments; the Regiments were divided into a first and second Battalion; each Battalion was subdivided into four companies.

The Regiment was commanded by a Colonel Commandant, and a Lieutenant Colonel. The Battalions were commanded by a first and second Major. Each company was commanded by a Captain and a first and second Lieutenant. The Governor of the state was the commander in Chief; and in certain emergencies could call the Militia or parts of it into actual service in the field.

I lived in the bounds of the 119th Regiment, it embracing about one fourth of Gibson County, and the South East corner of the County. A regiment generally contained from 800 to 1,000 men subject to Military duty. In May 1846 I

was elected Captain of the Company in which I lived; Christopher Butler was my competitor in this race, he was a nice gentleman. On the 30th of November 1846 Aaron V. Brown then Governor of Tennessee signed and issued my commission as such Captain.

When I had held this office about two years, there was a vacancy for the office of 2nd Major. I became a candidate for that office. William P. Tate an old school mate was my opponent a nice gentleman; but I was elected by a large majority; and on the 7 th of October 1848 I was commissioned by Neil S. Brown then Governor.

When I had held this office nearly three years the Colonel resigned, and I was elected to that office without opposition.

THE MATERNAL ANCESTRY OF GOVERNOR AUGUSTUS HILL GARLAND

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article is from John A. Brayton, Box 667, Dyersburg, TN 38024 "This article may be of interest to the readers of the Arkansas Family Historian. There are many genealogies which touch upon these family lines, but I have never seen an effective combination of all of them. No one has ever treated the Granville HICKS family of the Franklin Co. JEFFREY family with any kind of scholarly approach (certainly this contribution leaves things to be desired) and I hope to get something started with this article.

Augustus Hill GARLAND is a relative of mine of whom I had been ignorant until recently. Margaret Smith Ross' article in the Gazette to which I refer was very nicely written and immensely interesting and informative. I regret not to know anything of Gov. Garland's father's family. Perhaps later I will have the time and opportunity to do some research on his family, but I am not related to the Garlands, as far as I know, and it hasn't been a personal concern. I hope with the publication of this article, it will clear up some things. I enjoyed doing it and hope to be of service to whoever has any questions or contributions for it.

My descent is through Barbara HILL'S sister, Mariana Applewight HILL who married John STONE."

Her ancestry has been much disputed. Boddie in his Virginia Families series, as well as W. S. 9. GRANCE BENETT, b. 26 April 1721, Isle of Wight Co., VA, died 1772 Bute Co., NC (w.d. 27 Aug. 1772, w.p. Nov. Court 1772). Children: Henry; Green II; Bennett; Hannah; WILLIAM; Mary; Sarah; Temperance; Elizabeth.

10. SUGAR JONES, b. ca 1727 (Gideon Macon..) married (?) SARAH FRANKLIN. He died in Granville Co., NC 1761 (w. d. 16 July 1761, w.p. Aug. Court 1761-unrecorded WILLS of Granville, 1746-1771, Zae Gwynn's Abstracts of Granville Co. WILLS, 1746-1808, vol 1, p. 12.).

Jesse Franklin, Gov. of North Carolina, whose parents Bernard and Mary Cleveland Franklin were from Orange Co., VA (Biographical History of North Carolina, vol. 4, page 139). App.) She died ca 1820 at Liberty Hill, in Bedford Co., TN, at the home of her second husband. NC near Greenville. His WILL bears no county of probate, however.

27. PATIENCE COTTON, b. ca 1700, probably in Isle of Wight Co., VA. She died in Nov. 1725, according to the Colonial Records of North Carolina, vol 2, page 656. She was probably the mother of all of JOHN SPEIR'S children, since Elizabeth (?) Speir doesn't mention any Speir children: Clare, Apple; and PATIENCE.

30. ROBERT HICKS, SR., b. ca 1720, Flushing, Queens Co., New York (Sketches of William Hicks, Abner Hicks, Jasper Hicks, George Harris, James Crews, John Earl and something of their descendants: Thurston Titus Hicks. Privately printed, Henderson, NC, Sept. 1926. Also Reminiscences and "Memoirs of North Carolina and Eminent North Carolinians, John H. Wheeler, Columbus Printing Works, Columbus, Ohio, pp. 178-79.) married ca 1744 Granville Co., NC. Died October 1791 (estate papers in the North Carolina State Archives, w. d. 15 April 1788, w. p. May Court 1792, WB-2, pp. 290-91. Granville Co., NC).

31. SARAH REEVES, d. ca 1806 (w.d. 9 Feb. 1797, w.p. Aug. Ct. 1806, Granville Co., NC, WB-6, page 194).

The following article is taken from HOPE STAR - Arkansas Centennial Edition - Friday, June 26, 1936. Mr. C. A. Bridewell, born 1838, died 1917, wrote an authentic history of the City of Hope and the entire account was published in this edition of the HOPE STAR. Hope is the county seat of Hempstead County.

Chapter 5

THE CHURCHES

The first one to put a building in Hope was the "Old School Presbyterian church." This church organized in a desire and necessity for more ready and frequent access to the preaching of the Gospel by the Presbyterian families in the neighborhood now known as Allen's about 3 miles northeast of Hope, especially on account of the negroes, many of whom were members of this church. In the fall of 1859 W. I. Friesson, Thos. G. McFadden, Geo. C. Muldrow and Mrs. Quinlittle Morgan engaged the services of Rev. M. J. Wallace, to preach one half of his time in the neighborhood beginning January 1, 1860. Salary \$4.00 per annum.

After a year's time the success was such that steps were taken to build a house and to apply to Ouachita Prebytery for organization and a name. A building 36 x 50 was erected and application made to Presbytery. The committee appointed by Ouachita Presbytery was composed of: Rev. S. Williamson, D. D., Rev. M. J. Wallace and Elder Hon. Edward Cross. On Saturday, June 8th, 1861 the committee proceeded to perform the duty assigned.

The following presented letters of dismissal from their churches, to-wit: W. I. Friesson, Prytonio church, New Orleans, La.; Thos. G. McFadden, Sarah F. McFadden, E. A. Q. Morgan and Sarah A. Muldrow from Washington church, Washington, Ark.; E. Wilson Green, Trunnel Hill, Ga.; Leonard C. Friesson, Prytonia, New Orleans, La.; Rachel Green, Dolton, Ga.; Thos. Baxter, Richard, Ark.; Martha Baxter, Richard, Ark.; and were organized into what was then "The Greenwood Presbyterian church." During the years 1861-62 40 negroes, belonging to the families in the neighborhood were taken into the church. Thos. G. McFadden, who was the Elder in the Washington church was elected and enrolled in this church. May 9, 1863 W. J. Friesson was elected, ordained and installed an Elder. One June 2, 1865 E. Wilson Green was made an Elder and on December 3, 1865 James Green was made an Elder and in November 1868 L. A. Black and J. V. Green were made Elders and installed November 27th, 1868.

About this time the question of removing to Hope came up and on February 1, 1874, arrangements were made to take down the building and move it to Hope. This was done and it was rebuilt, being finished on the 7th day of March 1874. Judge A. H. Carrigan furnished the teams and with others superintended the removal. The church was dedicated to the worship of God, first Sabbath of April 1874, Rev. M. J. Wallace preaching the sermon. Text John 2: 13-16 and Mark 11: 15-17. The name of the church was changed to The Hope Presbyterian church by the Presbytery. During the year 1874 John B. Christian, John F. Green and J. M. Mims were made elders of the Hope church.

The lot on which the church building was erected was donated by James M. Loughborough, attorney in fact and trustee for the Cario & Fulton Ry. Co., the deed being made to Elders James Green, V. J. Gretn (??) J. F. Green, J. B. Christian and J. F. Mims, and their successors. The lot was 100x140 and lies in the NW corner of the block owned by the Hope School District, on which is the high school building. The deed to the lot can be found in record book 6, page 558.

Among other early members of this church and on profession of faith were: Benj. W. Green, James Hervey and Nancy Lloyd, W. Y. Chester and Ellen F. Chester, J. Anderson Lloyd, Thos. Herning Green, Mrs. Allice A. Hannah, T. A. McFadden, Leonard Hardy, Mrs. J. W. Finley, Mrs. L. V. Betts, John Allen and wife, Mrs. Baird and a host of others. Then the new comers to Hope begun to fill the church and official position.

Rev. M. J. Wallace continued the pastor until his death in Friday, June 21, 1878. During his ministry C. A. Bridewell, W. B. Foster and Jno. M. Allen were added to the bench of Elders and at his death together with J. B. Christian and J. F. Mims constituted the full board. On August 6, 1876 S. R. Oglesby and wife became members of this church and soon after, Mr. Oglesby was made a Deacon, the record showing that he was the first after the church had been moved to Hope.

From the organization of this church till his death, from 1860 to June 21, 1878, 18½ years Rev. M. J. Wallace was the pastor. Next after him was Rev. W. T. Harrison, who was living at Arkadelphia and serving the Presbyterian church there for a part of the time. On invitation of the Hope church he agreed to supply it for one half of his time. He continued as stated until the meeting of Presbytery at Arkadelphia October 18, 1882, when he left the state. There was then for more than a year an interregnum during which time Dr. Thos. Boyd, a retired minister, father of Mrs. James Henry and Miss Lucy Boyd, agreed to and did preach most of the time for the congregation. Our Presbytery, in April 1884 met in Washington and at that meeting Rev. A. J. Cheatham was licensed and ordained to preach the Gospel. C. A. Bridewell was the delegate to Presbytery and was so impressed with Mr. Cheatham's trial sermon that he persuaded the church to invite him to preach for them. This resulted in a call to him to accept the pastorate of the church. He did and remained such from May 20th, 1884 to September 1st, 1894, when, on account of failing health of his wife, the pastoral relations were dissolved by Presbytery and he and family moved to Missouri.

The church began to look for a pastor at once, yet it was without a preacher nearly six months, when in February 1895 Rev. C. C. Williams, D.D., was secured and remained as pastor until his death, which occurred at Mena, Ark., August 18, 1913.

The church then remained without a pastor from the time of Dr. Williams' death until April 1, 1914. In the interim many applications were received, many of the applicants coming to Hope to preach to the congregation, so there was scarcely a Sabbath without preaching. On December 7, 1913 at a congregational meeting called previously, the names of applicants were presented and by a secret ballot were voted for and the present pastor, Rev. LeRoy Thompson was elected and begun his ministry on April 1, 1914.

As Hope grew and most of the congregation settled south of the railroad it was determined to sell the old building and lot to the Hope School District and lots 7-8-9- in block 31 was bought from the St. Louis, Iron Mountain & Southern Railway Co., the contract was for \$300 dated February 4, 1881 and the deed, May 7th, 1883. A frame church building was put up and on the first Sabbath of 1884 the first services were held in the church. This was during Mr. Cheatham's ministry. By very generous assistance from several members of the church, Mr. Cheatham built himself a comfortable dwelling where the present house stands. In 1897 both the church building and Mr. Cheatham's house were destroyed by fire and the church records from 1888 to 1897 were destroyed. Not daunted by this disaster, the congregation at once began to build the present church building and occupied it the first Sabbath in January 1898. The house was built in 1904 and occupied on November 22, 1904 by the Pastor, Rev. C. C. Williams, D.D.

Besides the officers mentioned in the forepart of this chapter, the following, in the order named, were added to the Bench of Elders: T. E. Wilson, Dr. K. G. McRae, E. C. Allen, Charles McRae, D. L. Paisley, S. A. Scott, S. R. Oglesby, Robt. A. Cloud, A. L. Betts, Jno. T. Barr, W. Y. Foster, K. G. McRae, LeRoy B. Allen.

Deacons: Geo. W. Taylor, P. Foster Finley, E. C. Allen, S. R. Oglesby, W. Y. Foster, Dr. R. M. Wilson, W. G. Allen, J. D. Spraggins, C. C. Spragins, K. G. McRae, E. S. Greening, G. S. Spragins, Chas. F. Wingfield, C. M. Walter, W. F. Bridewell, E. P. Garrison, Chas. B. Foster, Dorsey McRae, and Wm. B. Oglesby.

Four of these Deacons have been advanced to Eldership and the church now has eight Elders and seven Deacons. Two of the original Elders, after the removal to Hope are still serving, to-wit: J. F. Green and C. A. Bridewell. The dates of the election, ordination and installation of these officers are in the church records.

The foregoing is a brief and condensed history of the church that came to Hope.

"I transcribed these statistics from a Bible in the possession of Chester Benjamin Mullins of Wilton, CA. The Bible had been originally owned by Benjamin Oliver LEWIS and his wife Mary Diddmy Robeson Lewis of Yell Co., Arkansas. From them, the Bible was passed to their daughter Rachel Elizabeth (Lewis) Atchley Estep Smith of Clarksville, and later of Madison Co., Arkansas. Rachel Elizabeth gave the Bible to her daughter Parkie Louise Estep Mullins, who passed it on to her son, Chester Benjamin Mullins both of whom were born in Madison County, Arkansas.

DRURY P. GOOCH BN. 1780 - 90 DIED. 18-22 MAR. 1839

We are looking for the parents of Drury P. GOOCH of Jefferson Co., MO. We know he was in MO. before statehood. Who was his 1st wife? She died between 1830 and 1836. Drury was listed as the head of household in the 1830 Census of Jefferson Co., MO., Plattin Township. He had four sons, & five daughters. In his WILL of 1830: William; Samuel; John; Robert; Jane; Nancy; Malinda; Eliza Ann; & Sarah. We would like inf. on any of these or their descendants, and will gladly exchange. Where did Drury originate? We suspect KY and/or VA.

We began our search for the parents of my Grandfather David Drury GOOCH; who came from Ill., and settled in Van Buren Co., AR. Our inf. was scant, and based on family tradition, and as it turned out some of that was wrong! We had heard about Red Bud, and a few other towns in Ill., and his father was supposed to be a John D. GOOCH, who married a Tubitha POSTON. Mrs. Mildred (DAVIS) Burfford of St. Louis, MO., researched in Randolph Co. to no avail, and later went to Monroe Co. Courthouse. She found a marriage record of a Tabitha GOOCH to a John DOOLIN (DOWLIN, DOOLING?) Married in 1854 by a J.P. named A. POSTON. We then viewed the 1850 census of the county, and found: Samuel B. GOOCH born in MO. 33, Tabitha, b. Ill., 30; David D. b., Ill. 3; & Eliza A. (or B.?) 1 or 2 (hard to read). We then viewed the 1830 census of a DRURY GOOCH right across the river in Jeff. Co. MO. Later finding his WILL naming Samuel as a son, then finding the marriage to a Tabitha DUNN in 1838. Also marriages of Jane to Hercules OGLE in 1838; Nancy to Henry BOYCE in 1841; Robert to Leah DUNN in 1846; Drury to Nancy VERNON in 1836; and William A. GOOCH to Mary STATES in 1839; Washington County, MO. As of now we have not found any of the others, but we did find in the 1850 census of Jefferson Co., MO. John GOOCH'S family; she was a MARY? born in Ill. also their children. John's youngest sister; Sarah now lived with them, and was shown as blind, and 19; placing her as the baby in 1830 census.

We have other information on Drury and Samuel and Tabitha such as: land records, Probate, etc. For exchange.

Believing as I do, that it is the will of All Mighty God that I shall be taken hence soon, and wishing to make an equitable disposition of my worldly effects, I therefore make this my last Will, and Testament being (as I consider) in full possession of my natural reason--I do hereby give, and bequeath the farm containing two hundred, and eighty acres, the same on which I now reside, as also a Tract of Land, containing ten acres purchased from GILES STRICKLAND, to my beloved wife Nancy for her maintenance, as also for the maintainance of her son Elijah Vernon, as also for the maintainance of my two daughters, and one son (viz) Robert, Eliza, Ann, and Sarah Gooch.

In case of the death of my wife Nancy, the lands above mentioned will belong jointly to the four children mentioned above--I also give, and bequeath all my personal property consisting of the following articles, to wit: seven head of horses, seven head of cattle, thirty three head of hogs, three sheep, all my farming utensils, household, and kitchen furniture, etc., to my wife, and the four children above forementioned, and for the same purposes, to be kept or disposed of as my wife in her judgement may think proper, for her own use, and the use, and benefit of the minor heirs above mentioned.

I also give, and bequeath to my son William, the sum of five dollars. Also to my son Samuel, the sum of five dollars. Also to my son John, the sum of five dollars. And to my daughter Jane, now Jane OGLE the sum of five dollars. Also to my daughter Nancy GOOCH, the sum of five dollars. Also to my daughter Malinda, the sum of five dollars to be paid by my wife out of the property above bequeathed.

Feb. 8, 1883

Dear Old Friend,

This bears upon its state evidence of neglyence in not answering sooner.
Please accept it under the old adage "Better late than never". Our Rail
Road has become a fact. I came in to Eureka on the first train Jan. 24
last. The depot is do far from the center of town, that, the west part
of it is almost ruined.

D. D. Shireys property would not bring the cost of the lumber. My house
would sell for the same or nothing. I con't know which. This is undoub-
etedly the dullest city in the world just now. What will be the final
end of it no one pretends to know. I started to Baxter Springs Kansas
last Monday but backed out on account of the extreme cold. Will get off
next Monday if nothing worse comes.

The entire earth is covered with ice about three inches thick which makes
it very difficult as well as dangerous going about. Teaming is wholly
impossible just now.

Are you watching Oklahoma Payne? When will the Government do those
people justice?

Room for so many good homes lying idle without a single attempt on the
part of the authorities to put them in possession of them. Seems strange
if not suspicious. Will it all be yet gobbled by some monopoly?

Payne has the sympathy of all laboring people of our country. We have
another little flower added to our little family. Born, Nov. 29, 1882.
Mary Lucretia. Minnie is near the size our lost Nellie was when she
slept. So that our little family looks much as it did to others, but to
us it feels different.

a healthy New Year. I am very grateful for friends and distant relatives
I have met thru - pen - words via mail thru our Arkansas Family Historian
and also, recently, Virginia Hick's Newsletter, California - to Lu Bennett
of Magnolia, Ark., her sister Daisy and relative Ann Cox, also Loyd Hicks
of Florida, and B. B. Hicks of McLean, Virginia and others. It is wonder-
ful to read of so many people interested enough to research and what a
thrill to receive bits of more information, also to be able to help some-
one else out, in their search.

I live in a small town of approximately 2,000 people. It is very
hilly here and also 3/4ths of this town is composed of old Victorian or
Federal style homes; many small homes, part stone, from the quarries-
Shake Rag Alley- Jail Alley, Pendarve's, all original rock houses from
once Welsh and Cornish miners, all preserved - some privately owned by
well known artists, craftsmen from larger cities, elsewhere. The stone
houses built into the hills were done by the Cornish miners who came here
from Cornwall England around 1820, when this town was a very busy commu-
nity and much larger. Iron, lead & copper mines - much was hauled out
from here by oxen team and used for ammunition in the Civil War. I have
lived here only a little over a year, but know the history as well as if
I had been born and raised here. Two blocks from me is the first and old
Cemetery. If any reader had a relative who was a miner and came up here-
when spring comes - I would be happy to see what I could find in the old
Cemetery here. The original miner and his wife from Wales is buried here.
The Welsh just built holes in the hills to live in. The Cornish were the
Stone masons. Our homes are all built on hills and valleys, all mined at
one time, but so far, we are still on top. Very picturesque place, but
strickly more or less dependant on tourists - few jobs - no industry but
a great place for older retired people to live, and an ideal place to
raise children. Thank you all again. Marie Kramer

BLACK b. 1801, Spa, Logan Co., KY. They are in the 1830 Census of
ROSE Haywood Co., TN., later moved to Carroll Co., AR in the 1830's.
GARRET Thomas H. (?) CLARK married Rebecca RUDD. They also are in
1830 Haywood Co. TN Census & possibly moved to Carroll Co. Ark.
before Nathaniel RUDD.

My Grandfather was William Mann RUDD, oldest son of Nathaniel, b. 27 Sept. 1827. He was at one time a Tanner in Clarksville, Johnson Co., AR, where he married my grandmother, Eliza Catherine MANN, dau. of Christopher Black MANN, who was a Sheriff (1850-1856) of Johnson Co., AR and who died in 1856, I believe. C. B. MANN'S first wife was Elmeny ROSE who died in Clarksville, TN ca 1839/40. My Grandmother was 3 at the time and her brother 18 months old. C.B. MANN'S parents were Joel MANN and Catherine BLACK, married in Lynchburg, VA, 1805. Mrs. MANN was in Mississippi (where?) in the 1840's with children). When Elmeny Rose MANN died, her Mother, Mrs. Alexander ROSE, Jr. (Mary, Polly) took care of the children and when C. B. MANN moved to Clarksville, AR., he moved her and his children, along with her slave Nancy. Mrs. Alex ROSE, Jr. later married a Mr. WARD, in Clarksville. Apparently several of her children moved from TN to Arkansas.

Her son Moreau ROSE, was a merchant in Clarksville. One of his descendants, Elizabeth...still lives there. She is tiny, dark eyed, like my Grandma, so that must be a ROSE trait.

C. B. MANN married again in Clarksville, and had several other children, (see 1850 Census). My Grandmother corresponded with the youngest girl, Martha who married a Felix GARRET. His son and granddaughter still live in Clarksville, but do not know or seem to care about their family history.

We have no idea when Nathaniel and Nancy RUDD died. Our RUDD Family put up headstones on their graves at their old Ranch, between Green Forest and Rudd (Carroll Co., AR.) for 2 years ago. They have 3 "children" buried at another ranch nearby, sans headstones: Absolom, and daughters, Tennessee and Harriett, who I understand, were Post-Mistresses at Rudd, Ark., and lived with their brother "Ap".

Nathaniel RUDD'S son, Benjamin stayed in Ark. (after coming to Arizona with his brother, my Grandfather, in 1876). Ben has "children" living in Green Forest, but they also would like to know about the family history.

His son, (Nathaniel's) James Jasper RUDD went to Oklahoma during the land rush, and his descendants live there.

I would like to know about my Great Uncle David Crockett RUDD, who was a Doctor, and I understand died in Clarksville. My Grandfather, Wm. Mann RUDD, was also a Doctor and practiced in Carroll County, Ark. I would like to know where, if any, they took Medical Training. One cousin claims Grandfather was a Veterinarian, but he practiced medicine on people in both Arkansas and Arizona. He died in 1915, here.

Grandfather & Grandma RUDD's children were most all born in Arkansas, but the last 3 were born in Springerville, Ariz. I lost my last 2 little Aunts, 95 and 99, in 1976. Neither were senile.

I joined DAR on Grandma's ROSE line, but want to know all I can about the RUDD; MANN; & CLARK Families. I was in Green Forest, and went thru Rudd, 3 years ago, and saw where my grandparents grew up and lived. They also lived near Fayetteville during the Civil War, and heard the cannons! After seeing all the green trees, I felt sorry for my little Grandmother to move to Arizona with just pines. They left by Wagon train for Arizona from Fort Smith, Sebastian Co., Ark., in April 1876. Apparently my Grandfather was quite domineering and some of the wagons turned off and went to Texas, as he "pushed them too hard". He kept a Diary, but it has long disappeared. My Aunt Katherine was sure a relative in California had taken it, as she saw a movie that seemed to have a lot of scenes as mentioned in the Diary! His brother James Jasper's wife, Sarah also kept a Diary. Her descendants in Oklahoma have made copies of it. They were on the journey to Arizona with Grandfather. I will appreciate any additional information, and will be happy to share with others.

THE INCORPORATION OF MOUNTAIN VIEW, ARKANSAS
By Graham Steven Collins, Jr.

On August 8, 1890 Stone County Judge W. B. Cothran declared Mountain View, Arkansas, an incorporated town in Stone County. The town became incorporated following the drawing of a plat, the submission of a petition signed by 26 qualified voters residing within the corporate limits, and at least one hearing before County Judge Cothran.

Stone County Clerk G. C. Hinkle, who also listed himself as ex-officio Recorder, attested to the completeness and accuracy of the documents cited above, and recorded the documents in the County Court Record, Book "C", pages 32, 33, 34, and 35 on August 11, 1890. There is also a note on the documents in the office of the Arkansas Secretary of State that reads, "Filed, July 7, 1890. G. C. Hinkle, Clerk," and this apparently refers to the original petition and other material submitted with the petition.

Another note on the documents reads, "Filed Aug. 14, 1890. B. B. Chism, Secretary of State, by J. H. Shirrre (sp?), Chief Clerk."

The petitioners whose names appear on the document are W. C. Nelson, John F. Chappell, J. J. Kemp, C. Dennian, Wm. H. Rosa, T. D. Martin, Solomon Jacobs, Green V. Killian, George W. Stephens, J. F. Maloy, Z. W. Casey, D. C. Dodson, K. W. Killian, T. Y. Casey, Joseph Hickson, R. M. Emerson, A. R. Roburson, C. T. Evans, T. B. Lancaster, C. McMurtry, W. H. Cunningham, John W. Humphry, A. B. Moffitt, I. J. Kemp, James Maloy, and H. F. Haley. Their attorney was S. W. McClure.

The plat was drawn by J. Hixon Co. Surveyor, and copied by S. W. McClure.

Some property owners in Mountain View are named on the plat, and they included W. E. Maxfield, J. T. Kemp, H. Dennian, C. McMurtry, Casey, Hixson, J. M. Burgess, J. S. Ivy, Condor (?) Burgess, Prater, M. E. Church, Revelle, W. H. Rosa, Acadney, A. B. B. & Son. Several pieces of property were identified by the initials of their owners; they were G.C.H., H.U.E., T.N.B., J.F.C., C&B, J.J.K., J.T.K., H&E., and R.L.B.

I do not claim any hold on perfection, and some of the names may be misspelled due to the difficulty I had in deciphering the handwriting of the period, or some may have been misspelled by the county clerk when he recorded the documents.

My father Charlie Oliver Pierce was born in Maud, Okla., Pottawatomie County, on May 25, 1910.

He married my mother Ora Magdaleen Vaughn Ellis in Ardmore, Okla., Carter County on October 8, 1936.

My grandfather Henry Lovel Pierce (PEARCE) was born in Gravett, Ark., Benton county on April 15, 1883. He married my grandmother Mary Melinda Hager Matoy in Chandler, Okla., Lincoln County on July 10, 1901. He died in Ukiah, CA., Mendocino county on March 31, 1962.

My grandmother Pierce (PEARCE) was born in Missouri on March 25, 1884. She was of German descent. I think she died in Blanco, Okla., Pittsburg county on Feb. 13, 1920. On my grandfather and grandmother's marriage certificate the surname Pierce is spelled different than my maiden name. It is PEARCE. My father said that my grandfather changed the spelling due to some trouble the Pierce (PEARCE) family got involved with. Also my grandfather was supposed to have belonged to 3 different lodge societies. These were: The Masonic Lodge of Savannah, Okla. during the 1920s he was supposed to have been a 32nd degree Mason; also the Odd Fellows and the Woodman of the World.

My grandmother is supposed to have had a funeral service done by the Savannah Lodge of the Masonic Order. This was supposed to have been at either Blanco, Okla., or at Savannah, Okla.

My great grandfather William C. Pearce (PIERCE) was supposed to have owned a hardware store in or near Gravett, Benton Co., AR. My father says the old story goes that half of the store was in Arkansas & half in Okla.

He married my great grandmother Malinda Goss SEAY. Both great grandfather and great grandmother are buried in a family cemetery in or near

Gravett, Benton Co., Ark.

My great grandfather and great grandmother HAGER (I know very little about). Great Grandfather, Peter Joseph HAGER was born in Germany. By trade he was a Carpenter, Casket Maker and a Furniture Maker. He spent his last years in an old soldier's home in either Neosho or Joplin, Miss. He is supposed to be buried in the old soldier's cemetery in either of these towns. He died of Tuberculosis, I would like to know the date of his death. Only known thing about my great grandmother is her name: Martha Gentry Hager. My aunt told me grandmother Mary Melinda HAGER MATOY was supposed to have had some money coming to her from her father. This was supposed to have been from Germany.

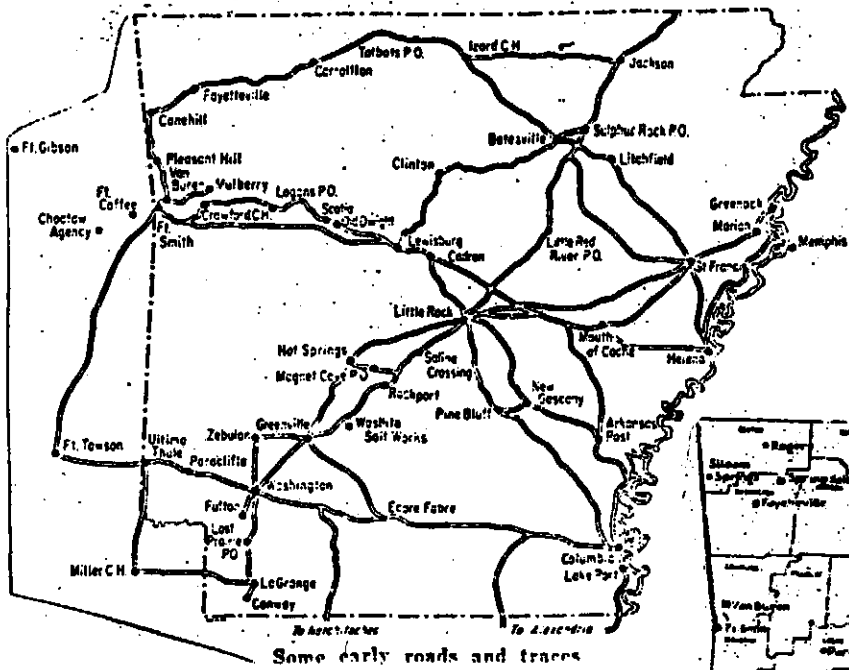
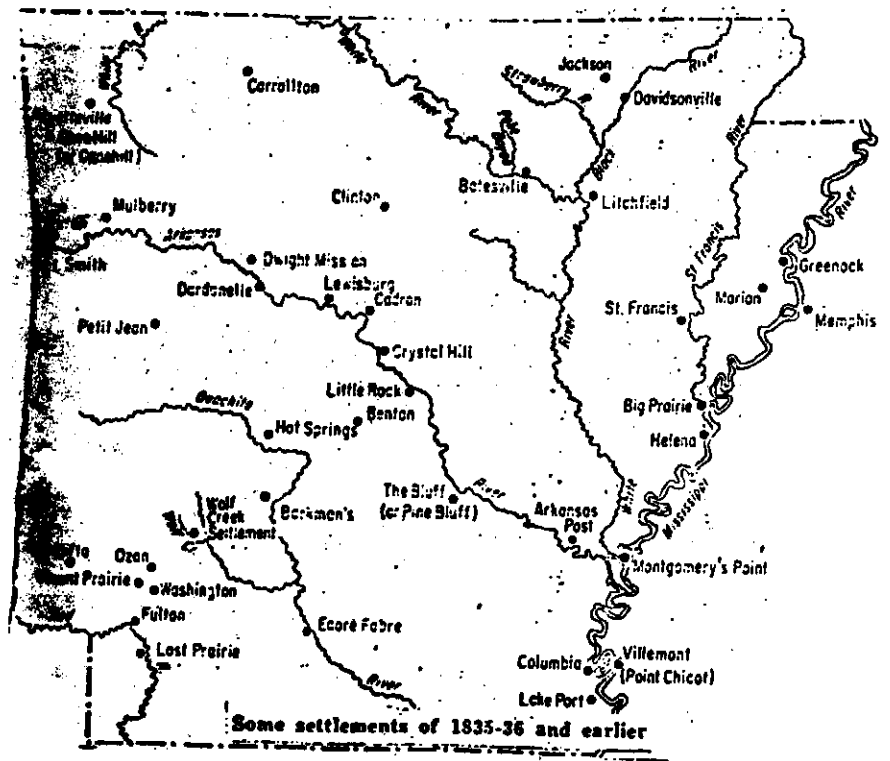
Moving Day for Books

The Daniel Moving and Storage Company of North Little Rock has begun moving boxes of books and other materials — at the rate of about nine tractor-trailer loads a day — from the Arkansas Library Commission's offices at 506½ Center Street to its new home on the top floor of the new \$10 million Multi-Agency Complex ("Big Mac") on the Capitol grounds. The moving began Monday and is scheduled to be completed by January 31 under a

\$45,370 contract. The work is being supervised by Jack Hallett of Chicago, an agent for American Red Ball Transit, with which Daniel Moving and Storage is affiliated. Red Ball has had experience in moving libraries before. The top floor of the "Big Mac" complex will house the books and documents making up the state Library and the Archives of the History Commission, and other state agencies will occupy other levels.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Arkansas History Commission Office, is supposed to move in early April — but further notice will be made in our Arkansas Family Historian, after the move has been made.

Mrs. John Kesner (Martha Hill)

Dies in 102nd Year

MRS. JOHN KESNER

Mrs. John Kesner (Martha Hill) was born in Illinois July 19, 1821. She was the daughter of James and Arrillia Hill. She had four brothers and two sisters and one half brother. Two brothers and one sister are buried in Texas, two brothers and one sister are buried in Illinois and one half brother (perhaps) living in Texas. She was married to John Kesner. To this union were born two sons and seven daughters. All lived until they were grown: Rev. James Alexander Kesner, Mrs. Leah Ann Cook, Mrs. Martha E. Thomas of Kingston, Arkansas, Mrs. Louisa Barker and Jacob B. Kesner of Oklahoma and Mrs. Mary L. Garrett of Clarksville, Arkansas, are living. Lucinda Jane Cypher and Susannah A. Mitchell have gone before. She left fifty-eight grand children, eighty-three great grand children and three great great grand children.

She was born a few days after James Monroe was inaugurated president second term and lived under twenty of the twenty-eight presidents of the United States. The state of Illinois was only three years old as a state when she was born. Arkansas was organized into a territory including Indian territory two years before she was born and she was over 15 years old when Arkansas was admitted as a state. She talked to men who lived in the days of Washington and the Revolutionary War and men who fought in the War of 1812 and lived to see her country pass thru the Mexican War, the Civil War, the Spanish-American War and the World War.

She came to this state with her parents when a little child and lived here since except two years, one in Texas and one in Oklahoma. The Kesner and Hill families settled near Marshall, Searcy county. Fifty years ago John and Mrs. Kesner settled in Madison county, near Kingston. Some of their early neighbors were James Phillips, Wesley Burney, Thomas and Gray Little, David Cook, Wm. and John Combs, Nattie Bunch, John Barker and Aunt Anna Bowen. These strong men and their families made the history of this section of Madison county.

John Kesner went early to the Civil War and left the cares of a large family on Mrs. Kesner. His old father lived with them. She made frequent trips of 15 and 20 miles to get meal for her family. She rode 9 miles to a neighbor's named Thomas and asked if he had any corn. He told her she might find some in the crib but only a few ears. She found these few ears and Mr. Thomas told her to take all of it and she carried it home and made hominy for her children. Jacob Kesner, her father-in-law, was working one day in a corn field. Some men came and took him from the field and compelled him to walk four miles and wade a creek. Then they shot the old gray headed man and left him there. She followed and found him and with the help of a neighbor woman took a team of oxen and cart and carried his body to the nearest neighbor.

She raised the cotton, picked it, carded and spun it, and with what wool she could get made all the cloth for this large family. Rev. James Kesner says he has heard his mother up many times in the middle of the night and could hear the old spinning wheel while he fell asleep. Her husband tanned the leather and made all the shoes. Some times they only had pork and corn bread to eat for weeks with wheat and rye coffee. They cut the wheat with a reap hook and flailed it out on the barn floor or ground. Some times they would "tramp" it out with oxen or horses. Their plows (two in number) were made by the local blacksmith. One was a small turning plow and one a bull tongue.

One day a neighbor was attacked by twelve large wolves. He climbed a tree and with his old navy pistol killed four of them before the others would leave the tree. James A. was sent to the pasture about that time for the old family mare. Just as he was getting over the fence the wolves began to howl and the old mare ran toward James. He spoke to her and when she stopped he leaped on her and put her in a run toward the house. He met his mother coming as fast as she could to help him.

Their houses were "log cabins" with stick and clay chimneys. The boards were put on without nails or pins—held in place by long poles. In these homes the neighbors would visit and, after a feast of venison, wild turkey or bear meat, they would put quilts on the puncheon floor and all sleep like healthy children. The boys would play marbles and hat ball at the home or in the little fields. The people would have their cardings, spinnings, log rollings and house raisings as their social events and then the young people would dance till day-light in the morning.

They made their money raising corn and feeding it to hogs. They would drive these hogs to Little Rock and get 2 or 3 cents per lb. When the father would return home with the money, all in silver or gold, the family would sit down on the floor and count it. Then the man would put it in his pocket book or in the box on the fire board until they would need it. Very seldom was any thing stolen in those days, so their money was safe.

Few people from the outside world passed thru the country in those days. Most of those who came to stay made good citizens. In Grandma Kesner's early days there were no "free schools." These came after the Civil War. All the schools were called "subscription schools." "A dollar a scholar" was the fee. Some would subscribe one scholar or one and one-half scholar. The teacher would board "round" and teach three months. He would have on an average about twenty in school. The books were the "Blue Back Speller" and the Bible. Rev. Jas. A. Kesner says, "my father was a subscriber to the Arkansas Gazette more than 60 years ago and as far back as I can remember he talked like he had taken it for many years before. It was the only newspaper I saw for years and years."

Grand Ma was converted in Searcy county 80 years ago. She was baptised at the same time as her father and one sister and united with the Methodist Episcopal church on that day. Rev. Grant was the preacher. On that day all the people wore home spun clothes and black wool hats with fur hats or caps on a few. The minister if he was well to do, wore a tall silk hat and a long coat. She put her church letter into the class at Little's Chapel soon after they came to this county. She worshipped at Mt. Zion, Little Chapel, The Cove and Kings-

ton. She was over 50 years old before she belonged to a Sunday school. Her children attended their first Sunday school at Kingston. She gave more than 80 years of her life to the Savior and her church. She was a member of the M. E. Church South when she died.

Her husband died April 17, 1911, and was buried at Kingston. He was in his 86th year. Her youngest child is still living and is now in her 52nd year. Her oldest child would have been 72 years old.

Grandmother Kesner fell asleep early in the morning of March 20, 1923, having lived 101 years, 8 months and one day.

"Into the Silent Land our friends are passing,
The last good-byes are ever in the air,
Out of the strife of tongues, the babble of earth's voices,
They go beyond the reach of time and care.

"Into the Summer Land our fiends are passing,
Where the tempests beat no more on brow or breast,
Where weariness and woe cannot o'ertake them,
And wayworn travelers find their Sabbath rest.

"Into the dear Home Land our friends are passing,
They were but strangers and sojourners here,
Their feet have found the Everlasting City.
And, say we that, there would not be a tear."

She was laid to rest in the cemetery at Kingston. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Elmer J. Bouher.
