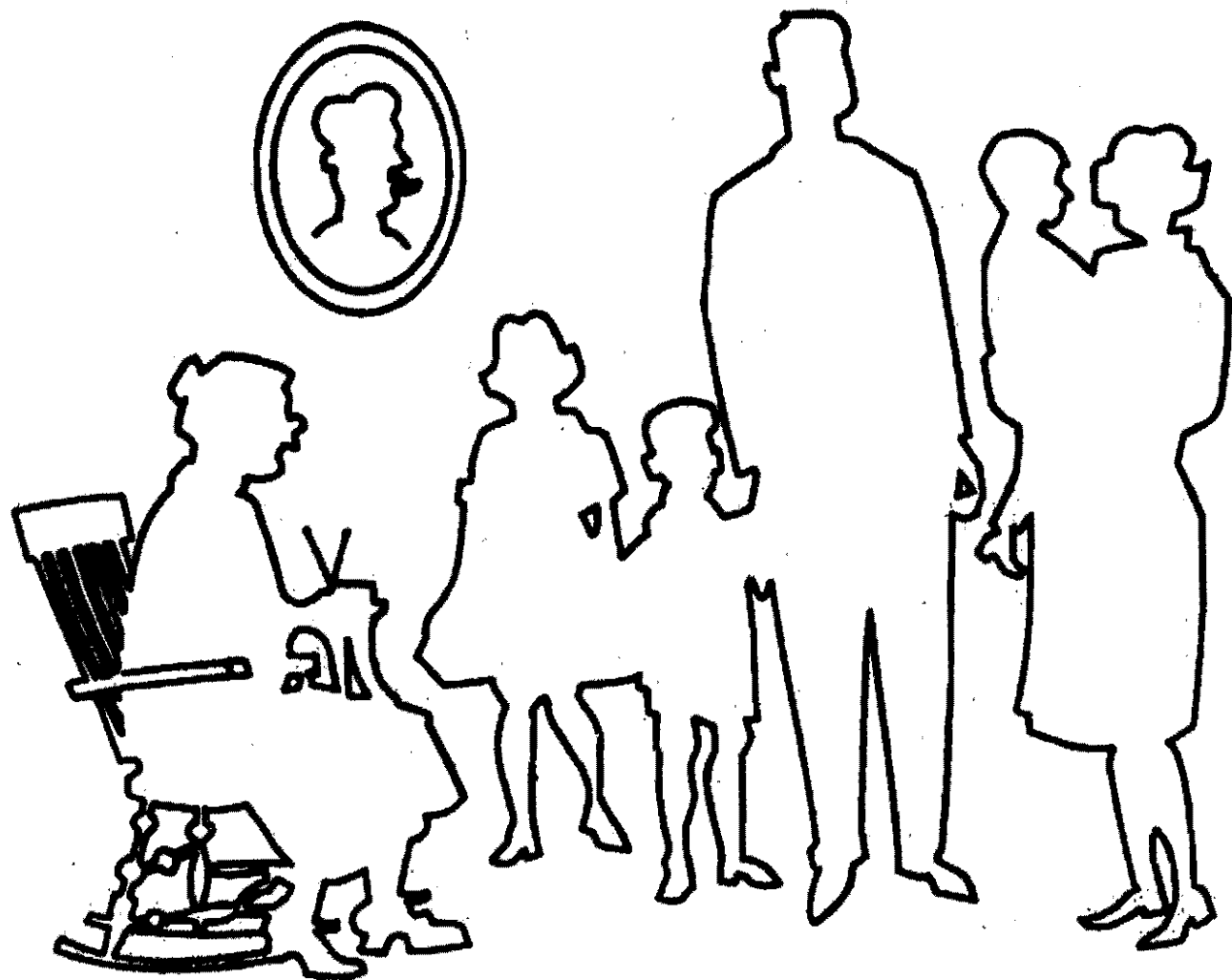

### ANNOUNCING TWO AWARDS IN ARKANSAS HISTORY - April 1983

The ARKANSAS HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION awards annually two prizes in Arkansas History. The first, the Violet B. Gingles Award, established in memory of the late Violet B. Gingles of Benton, Arkansas, carries a \$300 prize and a framed certificate. The award is given to the person who writes the best manuscript article on an Arkansas subject. The article can deal with any phase of the history of the state or with any individual connected with its history, and must not have been published previously.

The second prize, the Lucile Westbrook Local History Award, established in honor of a prominent local historian of Nashville, Arkansas, carries a \$200 prize and a framed certificate. The award is given to the person who writes the best manuscript article on a local Arkansas subject. The article must deal with some phase of neighborhood, city, county, or regional Arkansas history, or some person associated with local history. Edited documents will be considered for this award. Submissions may not have been published previously.

Any person is eligible to submit manuscripts for these two prizes.

Manuscripts for both prizes will be judged on the basis of (1) their contribution to expanding our knowledge of Arkansas history; (2) the judicious use of primary sources and to adequate understanding of and appreciation for the secondary literature related to the subject matter of the article; (3) creative interpretation and originality; and (4) stylistic excellence.

Manuscripts for both prizes should be no more than thirty-five pages, should be typed double-spaced, and must be documented. The footnotes, however, should be typed double spaced on separate sheets at the back of the article. The footnote pages need not be counted as part of the overall text, but should be numbered. The title page should contain the full title, the author's full name, a complete address, telephone numbers, and the name of the contest being entered, whether the Lucille Westbrook Local History Award or the Violet B. Gingles Award.

All entries, including illustrations, become possession of the Arkansas Historical Association and will not be returned to the author.

All articles, including the winners, will be considered for publication in the Arkansas Historical Quarterly, although publication cannot be guaranteed.

The winning articles and authors will be announced at the annual meeting of the association in April 1983. All entries must be submitted in triplicate--an original and two copies--by March 1, 1983, to:

All they have is different Family names, and the first part of the book is some general genealogical information (most any Library has as much or better...GENERAL INFORMATION! The second part is many names taken from phone books (and the like) all over the country. If you are married, you will not receive a letter on any of these books, as you are not listed in the phone book under your maiden name! The best you can do is contact these people (most are not the least bit interested in Genealogy, especially you and yours!!!!

CONSIDER YOURSELF WARNED...AGAIN and try to spread the word to those in your family & and your friends...if they receive a letter of this type about a book \$27.85 or \$19.95 or any other price...drop it in the 1st paper-basket, after you have torn it in several peices. There are all types of fiction books and Genealogy is not fiction! Check with your Library or a good Genealogical Society, before you contribute to these people! PRACTICAL INFORMATION ABOUT CENSUS RECORDS

New genealogists, and sometimes those of us who are experienced genealogists, occasionally need to be reminded of the value of census records. After searching innumerable pages of census enumerations, I have also learned that there are some limits to the value of data recorded in the census.

The United States Constitution, written in 1787, provided for the census to be taken every ten years, primarily to determine the number of Congressional Representatives for each state. We genealogists have developed a use for this decennial record which our founding fathers did not even consider. In my opinion, these census records provide the most useful genealogical research tool for the time period 1790 to 1900. Often we can easily track our ancestors back through the nineteenth century using nothing but the censuses.

The first six censuses recorded the names of heads of households with other family members recognized only by sex and an age range. In 1790, members of the family were counted in only three categories: males over 16, males under 16, and females. In 1800 and 1810, this was expanded to five age groups for each sex: under age 10, 10-16, 16-26, 26-45, over age 45. The 1820 census was similar to this, but added a column for males age 16-18. In 1830 and 1840 age ranges were more specific with five-year divisions before age 20 and ten-year divisions after age 20.

Beginning in 1850, the census records become even more valuable for the genealogist. The 1850, 1860, and 1870 censuses recorded names of every person, along with their age, sex, and state or country where born. The 1880 census added relationship to the head of the family and recorded birthplaces of each person's parents. The 1900 census added month and year of birth, number of years married, number of children born to the mother, and number of those children still living. The 1910 census (released in 1982) was similar to 1900, but did not include month and year of birth.

Other information, less important from a genealogical standpoint, has been recorded on certain censuses, such as occupation, number of slaves, value of real estate, ability to read and write, etc.

The 1790 census has been printed and published. All other census records mentioned have been reproduced on microfilm. A fire in 1921 destroyed practically all of the 1890 census, indeed a major loss for those interested in ancestral research.

Census information was not made confidential until 1880. It is released for public inspection only after 72 years. The 1980 census will be released in 2052.

Most census records through 1850 have been indexed. These indexes make it possible to quickly locate most families. Few states are indexed for 1860 and 1870. The government indexed the 1880 and 1900 census records by sound, rather than alphabetically. This is called the Soundex and families are listed under phonetically codes. The 1880 Soundex contains only families who had young children. One must keep in mind that errors have been made in indexes, making it difficult to find some families.

Through my experience, I have learned that even the census itself is not without error. One reason for this is, that it was not until 1910 that people were given an exam to see if they were competent before being hired to collect census information. Too many of the census takers of the 1800s were poor spellers with sloppy penmanship. This fact, added to the problem of fading ink on some records, makes some names practically impossible to interpret. It also causes some families to be overlooked while searching the microfilm.

It is evident from comparing records that some family data is inconsistent from one census year to another. This is understandable if we consider the situations under which the census was taken. The census taker probably spent a very short time at each house. Many people resented answering his questions because they felt it was an invasion of their privacy. The census was usually taken during the summer while most of the men were working in the fields. The information was probably supplied by only one family member, who, I suspect, was usually the wife. She might not remember the exact age of her husband and certainly might be unsure of the birthplaces of his parents. She possibly was uncertain of her own age because far less emphasis was placed on age during the 1880s as compared with today. The census taker usually did not ask how to spell names, because too many citizens were unable to read and write. Some people were listed with their first name in one census and with their middle or nickname in another. Some families were completely missed by the census taker.

The wise family historian must be aware of certain limitations of the census and not exclude a pertinent record simply on the grounds that it is not exactly as one expects it to be. People tracing their family tree, but not familiar with the United States census records, often become frustrated with illegibility, inconsistencies, omissions, and other problems of this record. The researcher who is knowledgeable about the proper value of census records will reap great genealogical benefits.

EDITOR'S NOTE: Our thanks to Dr. Cole for taking time to explain this valuable information (especially glad it is written in a nice simple form, so most of us can understand!) Many of our early census records for our Arkansas Counties have been published, and are indexed (are available for reasonable prices) some of the census records in printed books, also have marriages recorded in that county and for either the same period or perhaps another book of only marriage records. With the Census records, the marriage records, and of course the Cemetery records, the genealogical is so much easier now than it was only 5 or so years ago!

INFORMATION TO BE SHARED

"Enclosed is this letter found among a relative's papers...this person does have some good pointers for genealogists." This was written many years ago, but is still timely. cc November 1962

"Dear....

I'll betcha your phone bill is going to be a lulu with that last phone call on it! From what you say, I take it that you are more in the general historian class than genealogist...and it that be the case, perhaps it would not be amiss to try to be a little more specific about the whys, wherefores, ways and means..of genealogist procedure, that is. Of historians I imagine genealogist are the most nagging when it comes to having things as EXACT as possible...which must make us seem to be shrews and harpies! But...after you've been at for years or so you will see why. When you go farther than "the general big picture" and get down to the point where you are studying the histories of specific people or their immediate families the chances for error become tremendous. And that is true even of a name as rare as Wofford. Most everything that is in print today regarding Wofford is in error. The ones who prepared that "History of the Wofford Family" re to the Spartanburg Woffords made errors so very serious it may well be impossible to get it straight. Let a thing get into print, and the hooks scattered around and most folks think "It can't be wrong -- it is in the BOOK." Well...the first BIG ERROR was in their statement that there were no Woffords but those 5 brother. There were many! In fact - in the Spartanburg District there were Woffords there who were related TO the 5 brothers...but if so, it is distant. They were in South Carolina before the 5 brothers left Maryland! The Woffords of South Carolina who wrote that book took the doings of at least four men named William Wofford--- ASSUMED that all referances were to Col. Wm. Wofford, eldest of the 5 brothers... a serious error! At the time that book was written one descendant had a Rev. War. furlough signed by Col. Wm. Wofford. You'd think those folks would have knocked themselves out getting photostats of that signature! They did not! Many original papers are extant re to men named Wm.--- some of them signed by name; some by mark; and it may be that some of these Williams could be separated by how they signed.

But I veer from my original thought. Let it suffice to say: DON'T take ANYTHING for granted in this business. Don't take any Wofford DAR Records seriously; or any other record (printed or otherwise); don't take that old History of the Wofford Family seriously. Don't be blinded by traditional tales. Each scholar has to do his own work and research. Makes notes of everything BUT accept NOTHING for which there is not legal proof. On our own line of Woffords I have unbreakable proof back to John Wofford of Rockingham County, North Carolina. As to the Spartanburg bunch I have the general run of data...that region needs work desperately...and is the task for those concerned.

Now - as to genealogists. I realize I sound like a shrew & harpie when I drill away at you to go to work on those courthouses in your region and pick them dry on Wofford-Warford. Perhaps if I explain the psychology of the genealogist it won't sound so harsh and mean or flippant.

First - in general - genealogists are the most generous of people. Most of our work is done through an exchange of letters with folks working the same surnames we are, and we try to help one another. BUT...all of us have been badly "stung" at least once by what we call "The Vultures" and therefore are a wee bit wary.

Genealogy is hard work...painstaking. Some of my penpals have been at it 50 and 60 years and are still going strong. I exchange letters with a few professionals but most of my exchanges are with the hobbyists who have spent a life-time in this rewarding and fascinating study. It can be an expensive hobby. Most all of us prefer to do our own work...but with ALL of us a problem will arise or some data will be urgently needed and the ONLY way to get it (short of taking a trip to the other end of the country), is to engage a good professional who lives on the spot. Unless you ARE free to travel freely - you'll find it impossible to do this work without hiring a professional now and then - the only other alternative being a trip to the required place yourself. Now! Hiring a pro DOESN'T take the fun out of it. After you GET the report - YOU are the baby that must put in the study - digest it - make sense out of it and give it meaning! As in any other kind of study - no one will "pablum-ize" it for you...that is, pre-digest it! When you get finished, it will STILL be your brain-child...your work. Therefore - you can still feel that great pride in a job well done. On this point, I agree with you wholeheartedly; the fun and enjoyment comes as the result of one's personal labors! But...over the years...for some things...we have ALL needed to hire a professional now and then.

But now...as to genealogists. We help one another...yes...but we've all been stung by "THE VULTURES". They are a hated breed...and no one wants to get such a reputation among the folks working the same lines. For example - there's a WOFFORD descendant out in Utah, who is a prime vulture! When she started her research she was lucky enough to stumble on to persons who were able to hand her her line on a silver platter. She took and took and took anything and everything she could get out of us...and gave us the sum total of nothing in return. When I wrote here when I was helping gather data for the revised Wofford history

sending Family Group Sheets for her to fill out so her family might be represented we asked if she'd go to that very fabulous genealogical library in her town, and see if there were any data on Wofford in Orange County, Virginia. She refused! She mentioned how highly enthused she was about our work, and the proposed new history...and could hardly wait until it got into print, and the library thought it so she could read it! Too ----- cheap to even buy a copy of her own! I didn't even bother to reply. I figure my time (which is limited, too, of course) is too valuable to waste on someone like that. What time I have I want to spend on serious and honorable students. In other words: she bled all of us, sat on her royal doing nothing, spending nothing (not even time) - allowed US to knock ourselves out, spend OUT money, energy and time - and SHE reaped our harvest. Needless to say - we pass the word around among ourselves - and it'll be a cold day, before she gets anything out of any of us again. As in all other phases of society, the vultures, the cheap, the free-loaders, etc are found among genealogists, too!

Which may seem a strange thing to tell you...but it (when you get going) you run into seemingly wary genealogists...they are probably "testing" you! And...no matter who you write on this (serious hobbyists) one of the first things any will ask you will be re to those ARKANSAS County records...since (being your family) they are your project and your responsibility. And...in order to get specific data from others you' have to give your data to them. It works out wonderfully well.

And...in the end, nothing is really wasted. A year or so ago, one of my penpals in Georgia, a distant cousin in California, and I pooled our funds (\$120) and had some North Carolina records checked by a pro. We got but little out of it, as Woffords weren't in the region. But...in Rowan County, we got some nice Warford data. It's a value to us, is negative...but one of these days we may be able to offer it in exchange to someone who has data of vast value to US.

Because of the time factor and other considerations, I have had to stop sending copies of any and all my data, on a given name to just anyone who wants it. I did that for a long time and found that I had no time for anything but making copies of my work, to send to other people. Now, if I trust them, I may loan them my file copies...but that is highly risky business. Or - if they want it badly enough - and want it badly enough to pay what it costs to have photocopies made, most anything in my files with but few exceptions is free. Take Wofford, for example. I have saved every paper and note over the years...and I guess my Wofford files would cover 750 pages of material. Which may explain my reluctance to go poking deeply until we are certain WHICH you are: Wofford or Warford! Now, when you learn the ropes on the hows of searching for genealogical material from Court Houses - you are sitting in a fascinating area which (to my knowledge) is largely untapped by Wofford scholars. So...anyone working Woffords in general would be interested in working with you on an exchange basis - data FOR data. And - you could, over the years, contribute MUCH to the study of Woffords. As I understand it, Arkansas, is full of Woffords...unrelated sets of them. SO - early Arkansas data MAY explain what happened to various eastern seaboard Woffords who "disappear". So...I am not being mean and hateful when I urge you to get all your basic work done. No one can, will, or SHOULD do it for you. You see, when you GET all those basic data, not only should you have a better idea which you ARE...but you will have some marvelous material to offer in exchange. Then when you contact various fellows or gals working Wofford or Warford, you can give them an exact picture of who YOU are - say you have data to exchange, ask for their opinions on data prior to your earliest Arkansas date.

Now. You may have full knowledge of procedures, I will outline to you. If so - you are free to tell me to go fly a kite. But it may be (if you've not done it before) that you don't know exactly how to go about GETTING this information.

First, you have to find out where the desired data is located. In Missouri we have no centralized Archives - any extant records are located in the county courthouses themselves. What your situation in Arkansas, is, I do not know. But...just for fun let's say they are in courthouses. Well...in Missouri...the deed books are located in (usually) the office of Recorder of Deeds. But no matter - just ask for the office where the Deed Books are located. Start in with the oldest book. Some places, the Direct and Indirect index is all in one book; others have separate grantor and grantee Books. Get all Wofford/Warford/Waufford/Waughford, etc entries from both direct and indirect (or inverted index) records. Then start looking them up and abstract them. Here's an example:  
Chatham County, North Carolina:

Deed Book L, page 70 May 12, 1800 Matthew Welch to James Welch for \$90, 37 acres, land on both sides of Ephraim Creek his part of division of land by the WILL of his father. He relinquishes also his 1/4 part of 71 acres held by his mother as her 1/3 part of the above estate. Signed: Matthew Welch Witnesses: Lemuel Smith: Benjn. Bagley and Ezekiel Keasy (?)

If the Deed mentions the names of persons who lived on adjoining land, note this - it is important. Also note, if a wife signed, releasing her dower rights

Or here's the abstract of a very valuable (to US) Deed in Campbell County, Virginia.

Campbell Co., VA. Deed Book 8, page 500 Sept. 8, 1809

John Welch and Cloah, his wife, of Iredell Co., N.C.: Abner Dudley & Lucy of Pittsylvania Co., VA.; Wm. Dudley and his wife Charlotte; John Brown and Fillis; Absolum Dudley & Betsy his wife; Betsy and Preston Dudley of Campbell Co., VA., all sign a Deed to John Dudley - 120 acres on Stanton River adjoining Phillip Payne. Signed by: John Welch; Chloah Welch; Abner Dudley; Lucy Dudley; Seley Dudley; Wm. Dudley; Charlotte Dudley; John Brown; Fillis Dudley; Absolum Dudley; Betsy Dudley; Betsey Dudley; Preston Dudley. Wit.: Benjamin Davis; Eppa Harroway; Jesse Haney; Mitchel M., Callion, Jesse Dudley; Christian Mohr. This is as it was sent to me. It is a poor abstract - but the value of the Deed is tremendous!

Well - I need to order a copy of the full Deed from Virginia State Library, as the above abstract, contains some confusing points - BUT - what this abstract shows us, is... all these above persons appear to be the heirs of some deceased male Dudley who died intestate (without leaving a WILL)...that they heired his lands jointly...and that jointly they are selling their interest in it to (possibly) another of the heirs.

Now. My husband descends from the above named John Welch, a Revolutionary soldier, born 8 Nov. 1756 in Baltimore Co., Maryland, who served from Bedford Co., VA. - the son of John and Mary (Gilbert) Welch. We know our John's wife was named Chloe from other Deeds wherein she signed the release of her dower rights. And the above Deed gives us proof that the maiden name of Chloe was DUDLEY. It gives us proof that it is the SAME John and Chloe who had moved to Iredell Co., North Carolina.

There were other deeds in Campbell Co., VA. that were equally valuable...they constitute LEGAL PROOFS. One was filed/ recorded not only in Virginia, but also in the Iredell Co., N.C. Deed Books...even tho' the land was in Virginia. You never know WHAT valuable stuff will turn up...and oftentimes, it will turn up in places, you would never suspect. But at any rate...the deed records are of PRIME importance. A MUST!

With you, now, for example. Your grandmother, you say, was born June 1859 in Hot Spring Co., Arkansas. Her father was James Warford. You didn't tell me the name of the wife of James Warford. You say your grandmother was the only child. The marriage record of James Warford and his wife should be in the records of Hot Spring County, AR. The 1860 Census of Hot Spring Co., should list James Warford, his wife, their baby (your grandma). The 1850 Census of Hot Spring Co., show show James Warford, still at home with his parents: Isaac, I believe you said.

In re to Arkansas census material you gave me - you gave it to me on the phone. You mentioned an: Isaac Warford, age 48, b. N.C.; Polly, 43, b. SC.; Wally, 20, b. Tenn (male or female?); Wilson, 17, b. TN; Dorcas, 15, b. TN.; James, 13, b. TN.; Anderson, 1. b. TN.

What County? Is this your Isaac - and is the 13 year old James YOUR James WARFORD?

If so - what OTHER Warfords, were listed in that same county 1850 census? Isaac and Polly might have a son or two who are already married - and Isaac might have brothers living in the same County or adjoining ones.

At any rate - if this is your Isaac Warford - then you know he was born about 1802 somewhere in the state of North Carolina...that his wife was born about 1807 somewhere in South Carolina...that they called her Polly (her name as probably Mary)...that it is quite probable that Isaac and Polly married somewhere in Tennessee - and that if Anderson Warford, the year old baby is their son, that they were still IN TENNESSEE until 1849.

Now - IF this Isaac is Yours - and IF that Robert Warford "born about 1794 in North Carolina - from Kentucky" is his brother...you have the names of TWO of the family anyway.

The name Isaac is common enough in Woffords...but Robert is never seen in older Woffords...yet the name Robert is common in WARFORDS. John, James, Benjamin, etc. are common to ANY family. Wilson and Anderson as given names in the family of this Arkansas Isaac, could well be family names. Polly may have been a WILSON or an ANDERSON. Isaac's mother could have been an ANDERSON...or a WILSON.

If that is your Isaac - you'll have to look for him somewhere in the 1840 census of Tennessee...which may prove to be quite a task; locating him. But I think I have already sent you clues on that. Your closest bet if you want to read these rolls from microfilm yourself is to take a trip to Memphis. Their library has all those films which were made from the original books in Washington, D.C. Or...of course...Nashville. If you are lucky you might find out where your man came from in the Deeds right there in Arkansas. When you place your man in Tennessee - then - you start all over again thru Deeds, Marriages, Court records, etc. If that's your Isaac, you know he came in from North Carolina, which is a help - and there weren't that many of them in North Carolina. There was a batch of them in

Rowan County. It cost us Wofford researchers \$120 to find that out - and to learn that THAT data didn't do US a smitch of good! Ha!

Now IF that's your folks...there's a possibility that YOUR people go back into VIRGINIA records...and if so, I can give you ways and means to attack THAT problem. There's no way (short of going there yourself) that you can help investing some real money into it... but Virginia is a much nicer place to have an ancestor than many OTHER states! All Virginia DEEDS to 1850 are in one place.

As to Arkansas census records - it isn't necessary to go to Wahington to view them! Where are you state Archives &/ or State Library? They will probably have every Arkansas census roll from the first one up to 1880 on microfilm, you can examine yourself. There are probably a thousand clues you can pursue and the libraries or archivist would be glad to help you. None of them will do the work FOR you...but they will advise you as to what records are available, and where to find them, and how to use them. It just depends on how much time and effort you personally wish to put into it. No one can do your lines half as well as you can yourself. The BEST pro (being unfamiliar with your families) can miss a clue that you'd catch, were you doing it yourself.

So...you see...I do do hope you don't take any of this in the wrong spirit. If I didn't want to help you, I'd certainly not take the time and effort to sit down for entire afternoons to try to spell out the situation for you...to explain what records we use, why we use them, tce. I'm only telling you what anyone doing this work would tell you - if they take the trouble to put it down. From what you tell me, you have very valuable material. So, when you get it tagged, labeled, organized and typed up, and get your basic material together, you'll be beauffifully in business. Until this is done, we are uncertain, just how we COULD really help you in older data.\*

It is totally impossible to do genealogy with nothing but generalities to GO on. It has to be written down and has to be exact...and as complete as possible.

Until I'd see legal proofs to the contrary, I'd say off-hand that I do not believe you are of Wofford descent. I would say that if known kin of yours are using the Warford spelling...then your problem has nothing to do with the Wofford one. Now, I am not referring to the butchering of the name, that Clerks so often make...I mean the man HIMSELF...if HE spells it Warford - then it is suspicious. I have been in close contact the past few years with thousands of Woffords and Wofford descendants and not ONE of them changed that WOFFORD spelling. When we find a varient spelling - they ALWAYS turn out to be negroes.

If the 1850 Isaac Warford is you man - it might be a good idea to try to trace the descendants of every one of those children listed in 1850 and see how they spelled the name.

If you ARE Wofford and ARE of the South Carolina bunch - then you DO have an expensive job cut out for you. Most everything thought true about them is NOT true so all the basic research needs doing...in about 5 different counties in South Carolina. No one has ever done it!

Later on if you feel you want copies of my Wofford material out of Guilford and Rockingham Counties, North Carolina; Stewart and Henry Counties, TN.; and wish to pay the fee for photocopies, I'll take them out and have them copied. An office equipment company does it for me. They charge as follows: 1 sheet is 50¢ (that is a sheet of paper this size); 2 to 25 sheets is 25¢ per each sheet; 26 to 50 sheets comes at 20¢ per each sheet; 51 up comes at 15¢ per each sheet.

Well...I've been at this since this morning and it's almost 11pm...so I'd better get ready for bed.

MOSES HICKERSON'S OBITUARY

Moses HICKERSON was born in Tennessee, Oct. 3, 1815 and died at his residence in Scott county Ark., Feb. 2 1873. He made a profession of religion when about eighteen years of age, and connected himself with the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, but on removing to Texas, and finding none of his own denomination convenient, he connected himself with the M. E. Church, South, in which he was a constant and useful member for nearly twenty years, and though he had returned to his own church before his death, he seemed to be with us in feeling, and was ever ready to meet with us in the class-meeting and other services of our church, and was also ready at all times to assist us in the promotion and the various interests and enterprises of the Church. When he came to die, he was ready and willing to go; expressed himself as resigned, and in full assurance of eternal life in the world to come. He was a good man, and many besides his afflicted widow and children will relize that they have sustained a great loss by his death.

Son, James' Family settled in Lonoke Co., AR. Have all inf. on Thomas' sons: Hugh LaFayette and Jesse S. of Carroll Co., AR and ancestry of all. Will help anyone with problem.

WALLACE P. K. Holmes, Box 66, Newport, AR 72112 - Anything beyond Wesley William WALLACE, born 14 Feb. 1807, Fairfield Dist., South Carolina, some census reports show place of birth as Edinburgh, Scotland. Married Isabella RUTHERFORD, Rutherfordton, North Carolina. Family moved to Mt. Pleasant, Miss., about 1852, thence to Jackson Co., Arkansas in 1859(8). Died 16 Oct. 1864(5) on Litchfield farm, Jackson Co., AR, buried Walnut Grove Cemetery. Note: See Family Group Sheet in FAMILY GROUP SHEET VOLUME #15 (to be published in 1983) Many WALLACES descend from Wesley William WALLACE, and it hoped that someone will see this & respond, with some information on same. Any man who was the father of 11 surviving children! The descendants should know something about.

N.C., wife Margaret (not sure of name) 52, b. NC. James BEARDEN, 24, b. TN. Orange D. gr. 17 b. MO., living in the home also was Rebecca A. Kirby/King, 6. ; Eliza Woodue? 35 b. TN. 1860 census, Orange D. BEARDEN was a farmer, same location is an uncle of my Thomas BEARDEN of Ouachita Co., AR., also 1850 Lafayette Co., AR census (Pea Ridge Twp.) Washington BEARDEN, 22 Farmer, b. Mo., wife Mary, 31 b. KY., believe to be my Thomas BEARDEN brother Washington, both sons of Lambert Smith BEARDEN and Nancy VARD, died in Barry Co., MO. COLLINS Mrs.(J. D.) Fannie McClanahan, Ervin Route, Hugo, OK 74743 - I am trying to learn more on my husband's great grandparents. They moved to Texas from somewhere (?) in Arkansas. His name was James A. COLLINS, SR., born 1833, died 11 Sept. 1911, buried Fort Towson, OK., Doaksville Cemetery. 1st wife's name unknown. 2nd wife was Elizabeth "Becky" Stennett, born 22 Oct. 1846, died at age 94 years. James COLLINS, Sr., was a Mason and has the Old Fashioned Masonic Head Stone. Tradition among the family is: that they (the COLLINS) came a jump ahead of the Law...but it also is Tradition that Grandma "Becky" took a casket back to Arkansas and buried it...so they would stop looking for James Sr. The story goes that "James killed a man, after he came to the house asking for him. At the time he wasn't home, and he told "Becky" he was going to kill James, Sr., but for some reason James Sr., did not come home by his usual route. When he arrived home, and was told about the incident, he got his hand gun, went down the usual route and sure enough, the man was there to ambush him!" I am not sure just where James A. COLLINS, Sr., was born but believe East Tennessee or this area. The family has it that this family is part Chicksaw Indian. I am very interested to learn more on this family, if at all possible. I have the list of most of James' children by 2nd wife, but only have the name of one by his 1st wife. I do not know if her name was "Victoria" but she was always called "Aunt Vivk". She also married a man named VICK (this was his surname). Can anyone please help or suggest where I might search further?

Believe another dau. to be Sarah, b. ca 1820, MO., wife of Bowman TURNEY, b. 1810, Tenn. They lived in Searcy Co., AR 1850-60. Can any one please help. Will be happy to exchange data.

ROGERS Beverly J. Denton, Rt. 1, Belle Plaine, KS 67013 - I need information on my  
FELKER great-grandfather's death. His name was William Elijah Rogers, born in  
1852 in So. Carolina. Wife's name was Francis Felker. She died in 1877  
in E. Texas. He remarried and moved to Ark., lived in Hope around 1900, died between  
1920-1926. Will appreciate any information.

THORNTON Edwin L. Thornton, Box 222, Robinson, KS 66532 - Looking for information on  
CLAUGHTON Samuel Thornton (1810-1872?) and Mary Jane (Claughton) Thornton (1828 - ?).  
Samuel and Mary were married in 1844 in Franklin Co., Va. In the late 1850s  
they left Virginia and moved to central Ark., possibly in the Independence Co. area. I  
believe they arrived in the early 1860s. They brought the following children with them:  
(ages 1860) Susan (Dora), 15, Melvin, 14, Ruth, 12, Henry, 5? and Ellen, 17. Two children  
apparently died on the trip west from Virginia. Not long after they arrived in Ark., their  
home was destroyed as a result of the Civil War. Following this, Mary took all the children  
except Susan (Dora) and went north into Missouri to the St. Clair and Hickory Co. area.  
Samuel apparently remained in Arkansas with daughter Susan (Dora) to work in some type of  
mine. Later (mid 1860s) Samuel and Susan (Dora) joined the rest of the family in the St.  
Clair Co. and Hickory Co. Missouri vicinity. Most sources indicate that while Mary was  
going north following the destruction of the home, she met up with a wounded soldier and  
took him in the home in St. Clair and Hickory Co., Mo. When Samuel eventually arrived from  
Arkansas and learned about the soldier living in the home, the family broke up after a few  
months. Mary apparently left the area with the soldier and three children. They apparently  
returned to Ark., possibly Independence Co. area (some stories say around Cord; others say  
maybe a neighboring county; some say Prairie Co. According to my sources, the three child-  
ren Mary and the soldier took with them to Ark. were Ellen, (b. 1860?), Joseph (Joe), b.  
1864?, William (Willie), b. 1867?. The time period when they left Missouri to return to  
Ark. would be the late 1860s. I do not know the name of the soldier and I do not know if  
Mary and the soldier remained together or if they married, or if the children took the  
last name of Thornton. Some say the child named Ellen married a man with the last name  
of Anderson. I can account for all members of the family of Samuel and Mary that came  
west from Virginia, but I cannot account for Mary and the three children that she and the  
soldier took to Arkansas. A bit of information would be greatly appreciated.

early 1800s. I believe one of the brothers was a Hugh A. MOORE who was in Roan Co., TN in  
1818. 5 names repeated over & over were John; William; Hugh; James; & George. Wm. Moore  
married Unity (from North Carolina) TUCKER in Roan Co., TN in Oct. 1813. I believe John  
MOORE married Mary (?) SCOTT? about 1815/16. I don't know where. Wm. MOORE was bond for  
Hugh A. MOORE in Roan Co., TN in 1818. Hugh was accused of being father to Polly TUCKER'S  
child. William and Una moved to McMinn Co., TN and raised a large family & prospered.

John and Mary MOORE had a daughter Charlotte MOORE, about 1818 in TN; then a son, George in

- "HISTORICAL RECORD OF THE HOLMSLEY FAMILY" by Carrie Homsley Cunningham, 1969. 5½ x 8 inches, 93 pages with no index, Hardcover.  
In the later part of the Eighteenth Century this family began to migrate to America from England: John R. Holmsley, born in 1762, married Mary James, born 1769 in Germany, and they came to America and settled in Tennessee. In 1824 they settled in Arkansas. His brother, Stephen settled in Cherryville, North Carolina, and the third brother, Joseph settled around Pickwick, Tennessee. This book tells of the descendants of these three brothers and others of that family name. They are not connected in many cases.  
Since Mrs. Cunningham died 24 January 1968, before she was able to complete her research, it is not well documented. It gives a great deal of information on families of this name from which others may build their charts. They should find proof and document their connections. Otherwise the book is well written.  
We appreciate the donation of this book to our Arkansas Genealogical Library collection.
- "CHAMBERS HELPING CHAMBERS", Vol. 4, No. 4, by Claudette Maers, P O Box 37010, Bloomington, Minnesota 55431. 1981 Soft cover, 8½x11". This is a publication for researchers of the name Chambers. Published three times a year. January, April & October, 150 pages per year at \$12.00 yearly.  
All types of family information on this family from all parts of the United States & England: Wilkinson Co., GA, Wills; Jo Davies Co., Ill., Cemetery & Stephens Co., Census; Washington Co., Indiana, 1830 census and deaths; 1850 Harrison Co., MO, census; New Jersey Men in Revolutionary War - and many more.

- "THE FORT SMITH STORY, 1817-1896", by Edwin P. Hicks, 65 pages, 6x9 inches. This is a well written history of Fort Smith. Construction on a sandstone bluff 35 feet above the water level at the confluence of the Arkansas and Poteau Rivers, was the perfect spot for the erection of a fort, according to Major Stephen H. Long, Topographical Engineer in 1819.  
For nearly 80 years this primitive fort had a dominant influence on the vast "Indian Country" adjacent to the West. This history is well illustrated with drawings, sketches and maps of important people, scenes and events.

- "GENEALOGY OF THE WELLINGTON ROBBINS FAMILY, Conway, Arkansas" by Helen Robbins Garboshian & husband Walter Frank Robbins, 1982. 8½ x 11 inches, soft cover with velo-bind, 63 pages with full-name index.  
The immigrant, Richard Robbins, was born in England about 1610. He and his brother, John came to New England 1638-39. Richard settled in Charlestown (Boston) Mass.; John in Connecticut. Richard married Rebecca and they were admitted to the church on 24 May 1640. Their first son was baptised on 31 May 1640. Other children were Samuel, 1643; Nathaniel, 1649; Rebecca, who married John Woolard.  
This book includes the American Ancestry of some of the descendants of those Robbins. The history is carefully researched, scholarly written and well documented.

- "THE WILLIFORDS OF GEORGIA (1700-1800) - Including North Carolina Families of HOUSE, HANCOCK, BARRINGER & AUSTIN". Compiled by Wenona H. Rennie, 1010 West Eufaula, Norman, OK 73069 Pub. 1958, 61 pages, no index, 8½ x 11 inches, soft cover. Other Families: MISENHIMER, LUDWIG, FAGGART, PROPST & LITAKER.  
There is a great deal of family information here about the families with names listed above. It concerns the descendants of three Williford brothers, King, James & Wesley, born in Georgia. Their migration west includes Alabama, Tennessee then Arkansas.  
King Williford, the oldest brother came to Arkansas about 1847, and settled in what is now Lonoke Co.; about 1850 Wesley Williford, came to a farm north of Jacksonville, AR.; and last, James Williford, about 1889, came to a farm in Northern Pulaski County, AR.  
This pamphlet was given to our AGS Library, with hope it would help someone else who does research in the Library. Family Ancestor Chart will be published in a future AGS Ancestor Chart Volume/ec.  
Researchers of these families should check this book for information. Mrs. Rennie, we appreciate your donation of this book.

"CRAWFORD COUNTY, ARKANSAS - 1850 Federal Census", compiled by Beth Brandenburg, 2207 Taft, Van Buren, AR 72956. 190 pages, with surname index, 8½ x 11 inches, soft-cover with velo-bind. \$15 pp.

A good photograph of the county courthouse sets off the front cover from the usual and is a very attractive volume. A table of the counties in Arkansas, includes dates of creation and people or things (for which the county was named) is useful and extra information.

The column headings at the top of each page of the census are arranged in an artistic manner to please the eye.

"CEMETERY RECORDS OF LAWRENCE COUNTY, ARKANSAS", by Extension Homemakers Council, P O Box 110, Walnut Ridge, AR 72476. Pub. 1982 8½ x 11, 465 pages with full-name index, Hard Cover. \$35. pp

90 Cemeteries are listed in this Volume (far to many to list). There is small wonder, however, since this is Arkansas' second oldest county and dates from 1815.

The index of cemeteries is in the back, just before the full-name index. In general the names are easy to read, but some pages take close scrutiny, because of the hazy effect of dimness (probably due to weak typewriter ribbons).

Since Lawrence County was formed in 1815, 31 counties have been formed, including: Lawrence County (as it now exists). The 89 cemeteries recorded in 1969 and a map of the county is included. (an after-thought..by your Editor..these cem. are: Arnold, Ashby, Austin, Baker, Bratcher,, Calvin, Campbell, Clark, Clover Bend, Coffman, Craig Family (2); Dent, Denton, Dry Creek, Fender, Fortenberry, Friendship, Giles Spur, Halcum, Helms farm, Henderson, Hibarger Family, Hillhouse, Hillhouse Family, Holobough, Hope, Jenkins, Kelley, Kissee, Lancaster, Lawrence Memorial, Lebanon, Lester, Manning #1 & #2, Markham, Martin, Massey #1 & #2, McCarroll, Minturn, Moore, Moran, Morris Family, Mount Zion (2), Murta, New Hope, New Pleasant Grove, Oak Forrest, Oaks, Old Bethel, Old Fry, Oldham, Old Military, Old Pleasant Grove, Opposition, Parks, Penn, Phillips, Portia, Powhatan, Price, Raney, Raye, Robertson, Ruffner, Runyan, Saffell, Salem, Sanders, Scott Sharp, Smithville, Snow, Strangers Home, Taylor-Penn, Townsend, Ward, Ward Family, Watkins, Wayland, Westpail, Whitlow, Whittaker, & Willmuth.

"A BAPTISMAL RECORD of the PARISHES (Of the Catholic Church) ALONG THE ARKANSAS RIVER - August 5, 1796 to July 16, 1802." Copyrighted 1982 by Jefferson County Historical Society. 8½ x 13, 71 pages with full-name index, soft cover.

I hasten to say that I added the words in parentheses to avoid misinterpretation. When an out-of-state guest saw the book, she said "I thought Arkansas has counties instead of parishes."

This is an important collection of very early Arkansas information, saved by the Catholic Church. It was written by early Spanish priests and translated by James K. Underwood.

The original documents were photographed and shown on the page opposite the translation. This gives the reader an opportunity to make his judgement on the translation and possibly answer some question, they might have. One difficult feature is the Spanish spelling of names and particularly French names. Unless you can make that adjustment from familiarity with the correct spelling and Spanish differences, your job is difficult.

I consider the finished work as an admirable effort and commend the Historical Society for bringing this information for our research. "TEXAS COUNTY, MISSOURI, MARRIAGES 1876-1880", compiled by Erma Lee Skyles Brown, 145 - 24th St., S.E., Salem, OR 97301. Pub. 1979, 68 pages & surname index, 8½ x 11 inches, soft-cover. \$7.00

The listings of marriages give names of groom, bride and date of marriage. The (Cont next page)

publication is neat and names and dates are clear and easy to read. We thank Mrs. Brown, for giving our AGS Library this valuable information.

"DREW COUNTY, ARKANSAS - CEMETERY RECORDS" by Drew County Extension Homemakers Council. Copyrighted 1982, by Jo Ann Hales Handley, Rt 2 Box 189, Monticello, AR 71655. Hard Cover 8½ x 11 inches 785 pages with full name index \$40. pp (limited number published!)

A two-page map shows the number of each of the 118 cemeteries listed then listed with the cemetery names, are directions to the cemetery from Monticello (a great help when locating the cemetery site). The classification of white and black persons is given with the name of the cemetery.

Names of persons buried, is listed alphabetically with dates of birth and death. This publication was well planned and well arranged. Information is easy to find. The arrangement is pleasing to the eye.

We commend the Homemakers, who did this valuable work, which was a monumental task, and thank them for donating the information to our AGS Library. (Our large book collection is located on the 2nd Floor of the LR Public Library, 8th and Louisiana, LR).

#### FAMILY HISTORIES

Beginning here, we have a large number of family histories and other historical information which was donated by Don Francis of New York. These single books have been arranged in Hard-cover volumes (AGS RED color!)

"JOHN FRANCIS and his DESCENDANTS" by David Francis, 1981. This is the 1st in this group, which have been bound together. 108 pages 8½ x 11.

It begins with "Francis Family" newsletters dating from August 1980 thru April 1982. This includes all types of information: Family Group Charts, Marriages, birth and death lists, numerous documents and pictures. The Xerox reproduction on the pictures, give a dark, unnatural look, but shows some likeness.

"HISTORY of the FRANCIS COVE CHURCH" by Robert H. Boone, 1846-1970 21 pages (located at Waynesville, Haywood Co., North Carolina. This is a complete and interesting history. Gives many names of members and pastors with all activities, which are well described, and officials listed.

"A HISTORY of the FRANCIS FAMILY - 1763-1923" by Mahlan L. Redman. 36 pages with surname index, 8½ x 11.

This concise narrative begins with William Francis, born in Loudon Co., Virginia, 28 April 1763. He descended from an old Colonial family and a Revolutionary Soldier, who saw the surrender of Lord Cornwallis at the age of 18. He married Mary Romine. They are said to have been the parents of 24 children with four pairs of twins and 16 of the children lived to maturity.

This is the history of their descendants and it is well recorded.

"FRANCIS FAMILY TREE" by Mrs. Maria Clayton Francis Johnston in 1910, 31 pgses. This is a listing of descendants, mostly handwritten, also Bible records. It is rather difficult to read, but fills the purpose for which it was written and without any embellishment.

Thanks Don Francis for donating this large volume of Francis Family information.

ANOTHER large volume of eight Family Histories, etc.

- (1) "The BALL FAMILY of SOUTHWEST VIRGINIA" - Descendants of Moses Ball of Fairfax Co., VA by Palmer R. Ball, pub. 1933. This is a small study of 30 pages, with some well chosen pictures and cemetery listings. The book was published with hope that future Balls would add information. This includes the states of: Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee, & West Virginia.
- (2) "The BLAUVELT Family of Nova Scotia - from early 1600s - Yarmouth Co., LENTS, The Van NORDENS and HATFIELDS", by Robert B. Blauvelt 8½x 11. This is 19 pages of listings of descendants with brief information available, about them. These families were Dutch Loyalists, who came 1st to New York about 1600, then went to Nova Scotia, when the Revolutionary War started. They settled in Shelburne Co., then moved to Tusket.
- (3) "NOTES on the HISTORY of the BOGART FAMILY in CANADA" by Marshall C. Bogart, with genealogical record of his parents, Lewis Lazier Bogart and Elizabeth Cronk Bogart. Pub. 1918 8½x 11". Besides the Bogart Family, there are the Cronk, Barker, and Lazier Families. 72 pages. Names are listed by families, with available information, little documentation, a few pictures and drawings which do not turn out well in xeroxing.
- (4) "PROCEEDINGS of the BURWELL FAMILY PICNIC, August 18, 1870, Milford, Connecticut". pub. 1870 8½x 11", 27 pages. John Burwell came from England to Milford in 1639. A description is given of organizing the Family Historical Organization. There were speeches given and names of family members and their progress in moving about. There are letters reproduced and a list of people present.
- (5) "SHEPPARD-MARSHALL & ALLIED FAMILIES: BURROWS, CLARK, DEAKINS/DICKENS, CATCHELL, GRAVES, GREEN, HIBBS, HUDSON & others, by Lillian A. Sheppard of San Jose, CA. pbul 1874, 8½ x 11. This book deals only with the HIBBS Family. 41 pages. William HIBBS, born 1630, in England is the earliest ancestor in this record. He married Joanne in 1654 and their seven children were born in England. In 1677 the eldest son, William, Jr. came to Burlington, New Jersey and later moved to Pennsylvania. There are eight generations listed and this book has more information about each person.

- (6) "THE HIBBS GENEALOGY" by Darth Eugene Hibbs, March 1961, Supplement 1981, 2301 The Heritage, 1441 North Rock Road, Wichita, Kansas 67208, 49 pages. This is only a listing of descendants of William Hibbs, born 1630 in England, who was the same man as in the previous book. It gives only name, date and place of birth and death, when available; date of marriage and name of wife and dates of her birth and death.
  - (7) "HISTORICAL SKETCH of ANCESTRY (671-1800) and LIST OF DESCENDANTS (1823-1933) of William V. and Sarah (Hollett) HIBBLS. 54 pages, by Hibbs Reunion Association. These people were Quakers in England and came to America for religious freedom in 1647 under the leadership of George Fox. This book seems to be the 3rd history about the same William HIBBS Family. The dates are not exactly the same but fairly close and some of the names very. Since William was such a common given name, it could have been a different family. This version really starts in West Virginia with a William V. HIBBS, born 1800, and his descendants are listed down through 1948.
  - (8) "ONE LINE OF THE VanGorder FAMILY" by Wilson V. Ledley, New York, N. Y., pub. 1962, 18 pages. This starts with Albert Gysbert VanGorder, born 1620 in Holland and came to Fort Orange (Albany) New York, about 1650. He was listed as a repemaker (ropemaker?) and wheel-wright. His first public record appearance was 1656. He moved to Kingston about 1662 as one of the Commissaries of that town.. He had married Aaltje Wuyerts about 1650. Their two children were Lyebet and Gysbert (1655). Ten generations of descendants of Albert and Aaltje are traced in this history, with brief biographical sketches.
- EDITOR'S NOTE: These small books are also in Hard-cover (AGS Red color) in one large book!ac

Tribute to Perry County was pub. 1976 and the CEMETERY RECORDS OF PERRY County, Arkansas was added when the book was re-printed in 1982 8 1/2 x 11" 340 pages, soft cover, by Perry County Extension Homemakers Council. "JOHN PANKEY OF MANAKIN TOWN, VIRGINIA, and his Descendants, Volume 3", by George Edward Pankey, P O Box 84, Ruston, LA 71270 publ 1981 6x9 inches, hardcover 136 pages with full name index. \$11.50 pp Vol. I & II are available at \$25. per set.

This volume supplements the records given in Volume I & II to round out the family history. The three volumes present records found in fifty years of research. Volume I gave early records, of the family in Europe & America and traces one family, the immigrant's son, Stephan, from arrival in Virginia in 1700 to 1968. Volume II traces another branch, John Peter, of the family in Virginia from 1700 to 1972. This book is a handsome volume of heavy glossay paper, bound in sturdy chestnut board with a blue buckram cover stamped in gold. It was printed in bold-typa that is very clear and easy to read. Surnames most frequently found are: NDERSONS, CHAPMAN, CLIFFORD, CREIGHTON, FARRAR, HARDING, KEMP, MICK, MORGAN, PEARCE, RENEAU, SMITH, AND WILLIAMS.

"KENTUCKY MARRIAGES - 1797-1865" by G. Glenn Clift, pub. 1978 7x9 inches, hardcover. 258 pages with full-name index. These marriages are reprinted from "The Register of the Kentucky Historical Society". They were taken from notices from the Lexington, KY., Public Library's 1787-1865 files of Lexington newspapers. The marriages are listed by years. Names of bride and grooms are given as well as the date and location of marriage. Sometimes the name of the father of the bride is mentioned. Where the principles in the ceremony live is frequently given. The name of the newspaper is given in code and the date published. We appreciate this gift from Don Francis.

"OWY YE - CHEROKEE BLOOD", Volume I. Cherokee Indian Genealogy based on records of the U.S. Court of Claims. 1906-1909, by Shirley Hoskins, 2321 Brookwood Dr., Chattanooga, TN., 37421, 5 1/2 x 9 inches, 142 pages with full-name index, soft cover.

Shirley Hoskins used a computer to store the information on Court of Claims applications for grievances arising from violations of the Treaty of 1835 between the U.S. Government and a group of Indians not authorized to represent the Cherokee Nation. This treaty provided for removal of the Cherokee from Tennessee and nearby states to land west of the Mississippi river. These applications represented about 0,000 persons. (con't on next page)

The final roll of Cherokees eligible for new lands as descendants of persons living in 1835.
