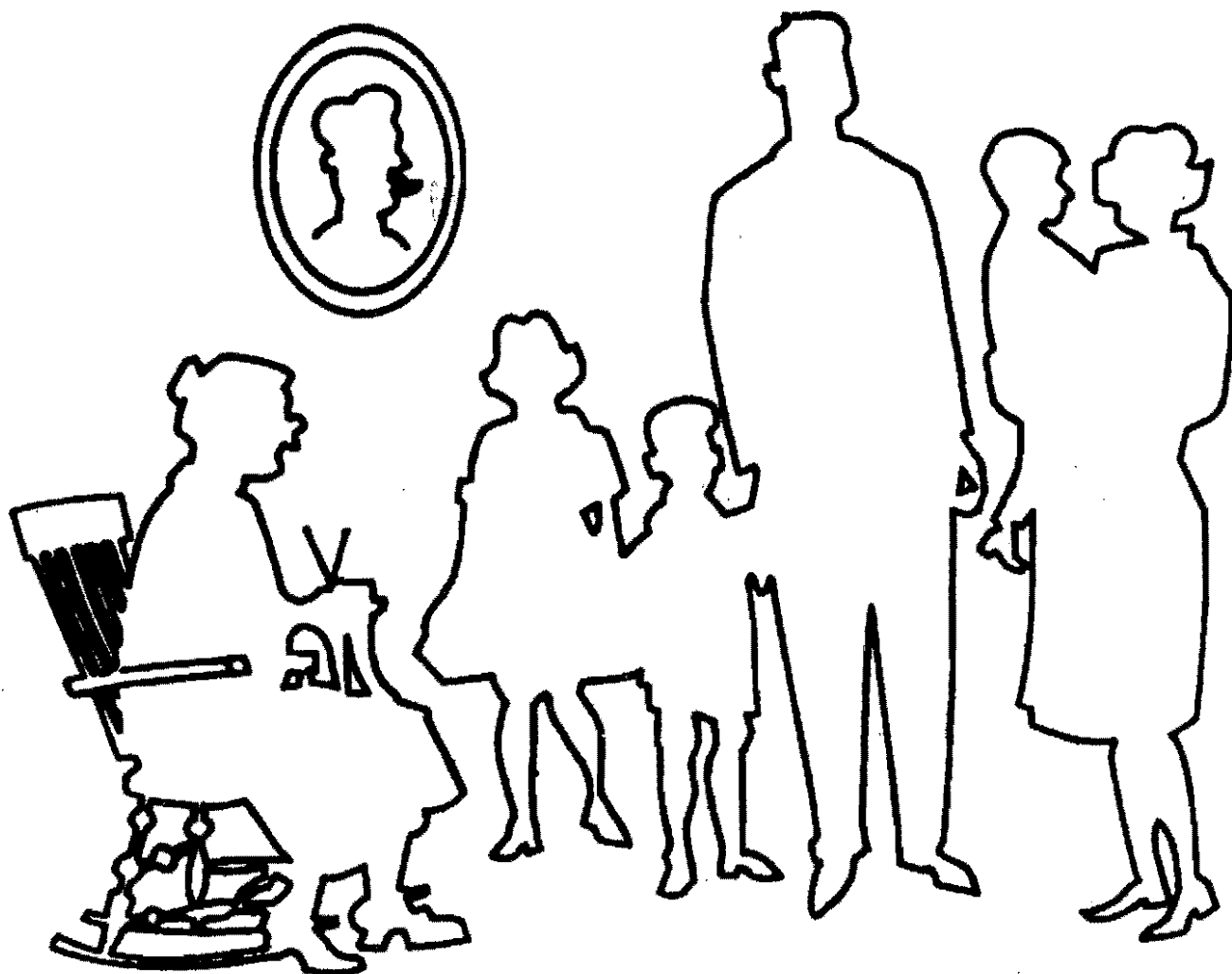

NATIONAL ARCHIVES AND RECORD SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT: CHANGE IN PROCESSING REQUESTS FOR COPIES OF VETERANS' RECORDS AND PASSENGER ARRIVAL RECORDS

Effective May 1, 1984, all requests for copies of military service records or passenger arrival records must be submitted on NATF Forms 80 and 81, respectively. After May 1, prior versions of these forms (NATF Form 26 and NATF Form 40) will not be accepted for processing. All forms other than the NATF Form 80 or NATF Form 81 that are received after May 1 will be returned.

A change in payment policies will also take effect May 1, 1984. NARS has in the past required that payment accompany requests for copies of veterans records and passenger arrival records. After May 1, 1984, payment should not be sent with the NATF Forms 80 and 81. NARS will research the request, prepare copies of any records located, and HOLD THE COPIES FOR 30 days or until payment is received, whichever is sooner. As soon as records are located and copied, researchers will receive a bill and instructions on returning their remittances.

Researchers should also submit a separate NATF Form 80 for each file (pension or bounty-land or compiled service) desired. Previously researchers could ask for multiple files on one form. This change is designed to facilitate processing by the National Archives. NAMPA, Idaho — Chalmen E. "Chal" Green, 70, a former resident of Batesville, died here Sunday following an extended illness.

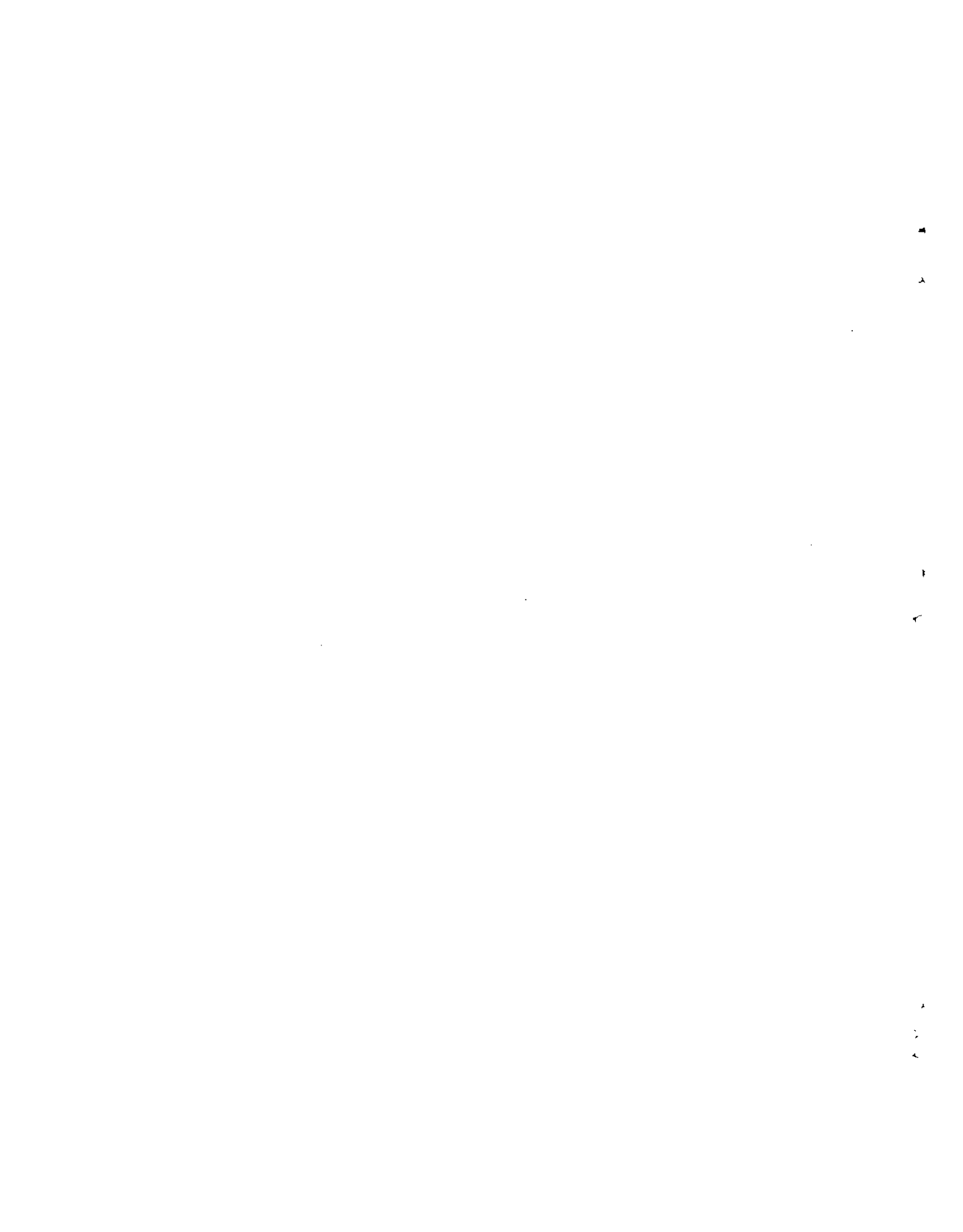

HISTORY OF BAY VILLAGE METHODIST CHURCH
By Thomas Ashley Stone

In September A.D. 1824, Charles Shaver and Rebecca Shaver, his wife, Hanan James, Mrs. Shaver's son by a former husband, two sons, Ashley and Isom Shaver, two daughters, Mary and Emily Shaver, and a few negro slaves, with two ox teams and wagons, ten head of other cattle, and six horses, moved from Missouri to Phillips Co., Ark., now Poinsett County.

They followed an old Indian trail along Crowley's Ridge, until they arrived at Sugar Creek, at a point where the Poinsett-Cross County line touches the north bank of the Creek. Although, it was the dry season of the year, they found abundance of clear, sparkling water in the creek, and decided to locate a home instead on the North bank of the creek, in what is now Poinsett County, Ark.

The next year, Ashley Shaver son of Charles Shaver and Mitilda Shaver his wife, settled on the South bank of the creek in what is now, Cross County, Ark., a part of the old house erected by them is still standing at the time of this writing, [1927]. In A.D. 1827, James C. and Westley Shaver, nephews of Charles and Ashley Shaver came with their families and settled near their uncles in Poinsett County, making a total of four Shaver families on Sugar Creek.

Samuel D., Thomas H., and Robert H. Stone, brothers, and all young men, settled in the Shaver Settlement, and of Poinsett County. In the Year A.D. 1837.

Robert H., married Emily Shaver, daughter of Charles and Rebecca Shaver, pioneer settlers of the "SHAVER SETTLEMENT", and of Poinsett County, to this union were born two children, Thomas Ashley, and Rebecca...Thomas A., is the writer of this sketch. [1927]

Rebecca Stone married Alfred C. Cooper. Mr. Cooper's grand-father, William Cooper, a Baptist minister, settled on Cooper's Creek, three miles north of Wittsburg, near Levesque, in A.D. 1825. Mr. and Mrs. Cooper are the parents of Ed L. Cooper, Sheriff of Cross County, and Claude W. Cooper, Sheriff of Crittenden County, and Gordon Cooper of Hickory Ridge.

Reverend John Harris was appointed to the Helena Circuit of the Arkansas District of the Missouri Conference of the Methodist Church in A.D. 1829. He Preached at the home of Charles Shaver in the SHAVER SETTLEMENT, sometimes during the summer of A.D. 1830. He was probably the first Methodist preacher to visit and preach in the "SHAVER SETTLEMENT."

The Holston Conference, at the Annual Session in A.D. 1835,

sent three young preachers, as missionaries to Ark. In the summer of A.D. 1836, these young preachers, mounted on horse-back with Bible and Hymn Books, and a change of clothing in their saddle-bags, and a heavy woolen blanket strapped to their saddles, crossed the Mississippi River at Helena. One of these young preachers Rev. John M. Steele, made his way along Crowley's Ridge and in a few days arrived at the SHAVER SETTLEMENT on Sugar Creek. He stopped at the home of Charles Shaver, and was given a hearty welcome, the neighbors were called in, and he preached to them. He made Sugar Creek a regular "preaching point", and home with Charles Shaver.

The next summer, 1837, he and Markley S. Ford established the Sugar Creek Camp Meeting Ground, in Polk County, at what is now, Bay Village, and held a great revival meeting. People attended this meeting from Missouri-Arkansas line on the North and from the Old Military Road on the South. At the close of the meeting, they organized the Sugar Creek Methodist Church, now Bay Village. The name was changed when the Post Office was established in A.D. 1876.

Some of the Charter members were; Charles and Rebecca Shaver, Ashley and Matilda Shaver, Isom, Mary Ann, and Emily Shaver, children of Charles and Rebecca Shaver. Hanan James, W.C. Thrower, Benjamin Harris, James C. Shaver, Wesley Shaver, Bright James, Margaret, Virginia, and America James; Mary Eliza, and Martha Thrower, Emiline and Julia White.

In A.D. 1839, Rev. John M. Steele was sent to Marion Circuit, and Rev. Markey S. Ford, was sent to the Madison Circuit. Whittsburg and Sugar Creek were preaching points on the Madison Circuit.

The present building was erected in A.D. 1888. The leading laymen at that time were: A.C. Shaver, J.G. Dobson, G.W. Graves, A.F. Tillery, J.W. Kaisner, W.L. Harlan, Robert Shaver, J.W. Goodwin, R.M.D. Norris, T.J. Graves, W.L. Bledsoe, F.F. Tillery, Dr. A.A. Berry, N.J. Shannon and Henry McAden.

THE SHAVERS OF EVENING SHADE, ARKANSAS

John Shaver, father of John Wesley Shaver, was born in Mecklenburg, County, N.C., 25 May 1773, died in Sumner County,

TN. on 15 July 1857. He married Rebecca Claxton who was born 16 March 1783. She died 23 Oct. 1865, Evening Shade, Ark., and is buried at "Piney Fork Grove Cemetery." She came into Arkansas from Sumner Co., TN to visit her son, John Wesley Shaver, during the Civil War, and died there. John Shaver who died in Sumner County, TN in 1857.....was he a brother of Charles Shaver and early settler of Bay Village , Arkansas?

John and Rebecca Claxton Shaver were the parents of the following children:

1. John Wesley Shaver, born 3 June 1809 in Sumner Co., TN., married Moranda A. Stone on 2 October 1830
2. Milton Shaver who married Mollie ?
3. Elizabeth Shaver who married 18 Feb. 1829, Sumner County, TN to Rowland Horsley
4. Della Shaver who may have married ? Watson.

THE STORY OF JOHN WESLEY SHAVER AND MORANDA STONE SHAVER

John Wesley Shaver and Moranda Stone, married in Sumner Co., TN., Oct. 2, 1830 and lived together for 53 years. The young couple left by flat boat down the Cumberland, Ohio, and Miss. River, and settled on Crowley's Ridge. A wilderness in Nov. 1844.

They removed to Lawrence County, now Sharp County, and settled on a farm in what is now Evening Shade, Ark., in 1851. They stopped at Judge Martin's Spring, on Polk Bayou, first, then to the Spring at the foot of the hill near, Sidney, now occupied by Mt. Carmel Cemetery.

They found a little farm on Piney Creek, and purchased it from Benjamin Moss. Besides farming, John Wesley was engaged in the Mercantile Business, and also served as Postmaster. He joined the Methodist Church in 1839, and filled many positions there, he was a Faithful man, a Leader amongst men, and Highly respected.

Moranda A. Stone, born 20 Feb. 1815, Albermarle Co., VA., daughter of Thomas Stone and Charlotte Dalton Stone. In her youth her parents moved from VA. to Sumner Co., TN. She professed Religion in 1839, joining the Methodist Church. She was modest, unassuming, and of few words. She died 9 Nov. 1884, at the residence of her son Charles W. Shaver. She was a most Faithful woman, Faithful to the Church, Faithful in every relation of Life.

John Wesley Shaver and his wife, Moranda Stone Shaver are both buried in the "Piney Creek Cemetery", near Evening Shade, Ark., near their old home place.

2. Martha [Mattie] Gaines Booker, born 3 Feb. 1856; married 23 Feb. 1875 in Fayette County, Tenn. to Jacob Hare Stone. She died 12 Feb. 1945 in Memphis, Tennessee. Martha and Jacob are both buried in Sheffield, Alabama.
3. Mary Malloy Booker, born 15 Jan. 1853 and died 6 Dec. 1859
4. Samuel Morris Booker, born 10 January 1851; married 11 March 1876 to Ida Tandy Holman
5. Helen Virginia Booker, born 4 May 1848 and married Archer Reynolds.
6. Ann Elizabeth Booker, born 11 June 1846 and died 13 June 1847.

Louise Stone Irwin also has an enormous amount of data on the STONE FAMILY. The lineage of Jacob Hare Stone goes back to John Stone and wife Mary [SEMMYNS ?] of Calvert County, Maryland. John Stone's will entered for probate on 8 March 1764. Legatees listed: granddaughters - Susannah Stone, Martha GRIFFIES, Mary Stone, Margaret Stone, and Rebecca - One grandson named Littleton - nine children; Ann, Margaret, Elizabeth, Mary, Rachel, Priscilla, Samuel, Thomas, and William Stone. Thomas Stone named executor of will.

Another Revolutionary Hero Gone To Rest

Died in St. Francis county, on the 18th December 1847, William Lancy, in the 92d year of his age. - He was one of the glorious pillars that supported the Declaration of Independence, and fought at the battle of King's Mountain, under command of the brave Col. Campbell. He also fought at the Eutaw springs, at the Cowpen, and at Guilford Courthouse. In the late war with Great Britain, and her Indian allies, he fought at the Horse Shoe, and in various other battles in the Creek country. [Arkansas Gazette; January 13, 1847; Page 3, Column 5.]

Since that time, forest fires and the wages of time have taken their toll, leaving only seventeen tombstones when the inventory was done in 1969.

Sketches of R.D. Neal, son of Noel O. Neal, and William R. Latimer, husband of Rebecca A. [Willis] Latimer are found in Goodspeed's Biographical & Historical Memoirs of Southern Arkansas. Publication Committee - A.G.S.

WILLIAM R. LATIMER (p. 278,279) was born in what is now Howard County, Ark., on January 29, 1843, and passed the greater part of his youth at Centre Point, attending school. When twenty-four years old, he left home and devoted his attention to farming. He enlisted in the Nineteenth Regiment Arkansas Infantry in 1861, under Col. Hutchison, and afterward had command of the regiment. Mr. Latimer was in the battles of Arkansas Post, Chicamauga, and all through the Georgia campaign. He left the regiment at Tusculumbia, Ala., was taken prisoner at Arkansas Post and confined at Camp Douglas for three months; was then exchanged and sent to Richmond, Va., after being kept at Petersburg for some weeks; was wounded at Chickamauga by a ball in the right hip, a wound from which he has never recovered. A heavy loser by the war, both in stock and cotton, Mr. Latimer has since been highly successful in agricultural pursuits, owning 320 acres of valuable land in Howard County. He was twice married; first, to Miss Nancy A. McCown, a daughter of Jackson McCown, of Arkansas. She died August 14, 1886, leaving seven children: James J., Annie E.L., J.W.H., George P., Floretta R., Mamie O., Clarence E. June 29, 1887, Mr. Latimer married Miss R.A. Willis, of Mississippi, who was born October 11, 1848, and is still living. They have three children: Claud A., Mary C., Willis V. Mr. Latimer is a son of Isham P. Latimer, who was born in Kentucky in 1812, and died in 1876. He married Miss Mary C. Henry, of Tennessee, who died in 1847, leaving nine children. In 1850 Mr. Latimer married Mrs. Mary A. Meers, of South Carolina, and they have four children, of whom Lydia P., Samuel M. and Isabella V. are now living.

R.D. NEAL (p. 283,284), a leading citizen of Mineral Springs, Howard County, Ark., was born in Monroe County, Miss., July 17, 1840, and educated in Howard County, at private schools. He gave his attention to agriculture, marrying Miss Judith V. Morgan, of Arkansas January 13, 1862. She was a daughter of Samuel B. and Nancy Morgan. They have no children, but have raised and educated several orphans. Mr. Neal is a member of the Centre Point Masonic Lodge No. 87, has been justice of the peace for ten or twelve years, and is now and has been county and probate judge for four years. He takes an active interest in all public matters and worthy enterprises. This year he bought an interest in the business of E.R. Martin. Both Mr. and Mrs. Neal belong to the Missionary Baptist Church. His father, Noel O., was a farmer by occupation, and a native of Georgia. He was born in 1802, and married Miss Hesky McElroy, of Mississippi. They had ten children: Giles M., Noel G., Francis S., Caroline, Sabrina, Joseph L., Sarah E., Rufus D., James L., and Hesky A., and others who died in infancy. The family located in what is now known as Howard County, Ark., in the fall of 1840.

SOME MONTGOMERY FAMILY LETTERS

In the spring or summer of 1857, James Riley Montgomery and his brother Hugh Porter Montgomery left Murray County, Georgia, to move their families west to Arkansas. They were the advance party for their mother and father, Thomas and Mahalia (Maulden) Montgomery and their Hames in-laws who followed in the fall of 1858. These four letters are a sample of those they sent back to Georgia describing life in Arkansas. Spelling is as it was in the originals.

State of Arkansas

Conway County

Nov. 29, 1857

Dear Father and Mother

We now take the opportunity of letting you know our whereabouts. We have stopt in Springfield, Conway County and has bought a house and three lots and give two hundred and seventy-five dollars. We are all well and has stood the trip very well. Dock and Quince has stopt about ten miles from heare. Quince has bought land has bought one hundred and sixty acres and give his wagon and Steers. Dock has not settled yet as we know of I have lost one of my Steers Buck he died with the muri----- Mel and Robert is agoing to work in the Shop blacksmithing is very high here horse shoing is one dollar and fifty cts and other things in propotion and there is no doubt but what we can get more work than we can do. I think if we keep our health we will make money fast there is plenty of cheap land heare up land is worth from 12½ cts to one dollar per acre anyone can do better to look a round a while I am not able to tell you all whether you could better your selves or not but I will tell you more about it after a while tell Jep not to give Arkansas two bad a name he might want to come back agane turn over

What we are is the heltist looking place I have seen in Arkansas the people looks helthy here Tell Abb thaare the out shootings people here for a fool I ever seen I am about to sell my gun for twenty five dollars I got a dollar aday for house carpentering last week and I think we will get our shop in blast next week. Robert says to tell Bob Wood to come on to burn coal Coal is worth from five to ten cts per buchel Corn is worth from 35 to 40 cts per buchel pork 5 cts per lb.

Dec 1 1857 I will make a new starte I sold Charley yesterday for 20 dollars a bad loss. Abb I killed a turkey yesterday lots of game heare but not time to hunt teel Keeler I wont to heare him laff and I would like to see the Connection and friends if Jim is started I wont you to write to me as soon as you heare where he is write as soon as this comes to hand write how Sick is and whare you are all Sitled and every thing else give my best respects to the Connection and inquiring friends and if you find anything you cant reed lit it rip So nothing more at present but remains your sones and daughter un till death.

Springfield Conway County Ark Mar 31st 1858

Dear father and mother and all the Connection and friends

I now Site down once more to drop you a few lines We are all well at presant and doing very well but very much displeased with our old Georgia friends and connection from the way you have all treated us so fare as writing is concerned I wrote about twenty letters my self and received Soerely none in return I watch dailey for the male and see it a coming and run to the offis and like the man's goose nothing thare I want you to write often

Mother I red yourse like print and I think any boddy that has negroes could take time to answer all the letters I can write July you try it. I can rede anything if you can't think of nothing else put houdy in a letter and sent it on tell the Balippes to write and Daniels and the Blands and Sicks and all the rest. It is true that my letters aint much interesting but I do the best I can I wrote to Jim and he wont answer my letters So I recon I disgust the people with my letters please inform me if that is the case and I will stop Ab the turkeys is a gobling like thunder here I have got our same old gun and knife yet. Dock has filling the turkeys with Pepper now vegetation is sprouting up smartly Catle can live fine in fact thare is a great many winterd them selves where we have had a very wet Spring there is some comenet planting corn our town is improving they have comect a very lare Court house Dock is working on houses and gets 1.50 cts per day Common hands can get fifteen dollars per month and borded the price of Stock is low at this time negroes is very high one the sise of Sicks Caroling will brign Six hundred dollars I am well sadistied with Ark. so fare I want you to write whether you intend moving to this contry next fall or not I believe from what I have seen and herd from this countryry further north would suit you better than here So I will have to come to close give Uncle Nathan and Aunt Sally my best respects and all the Connection and friends. Nothing more at present but remains youre Son until death

Springfield Conway County June 6 1858

Dear brothers,

I once more avail my self of the opportunity to pitching in a few more lines We are all well and able to eat more than we can get me and Dock and Robert all weigh on notch 61 lbs the prospects of crops looks rather bad at this time We have had a bundance of rain ghis Spring ans General green has took posesion of all the farms Wheet is tolerable good oats is not wort a cent the rust has took them. Sick as to mills I think wind mills would do the best business here in a dry time as there seems to be plenty of that I wrote to you about the Hurricane we had which plade smart with us but the town is improving very fast I aim at selling out the first chance and enter land some where I haven't desided whare yet but I have come to the conclusion that there in Conway is a bout as suitable a place as any whare If I had the money to speculate on I would enter land on the Arkansas river from four to six bits per acre and thare let lie in a few years it will be worth from twenty five to fifty dollars per acre land seems to be rising ver fast the reason I ain't bought land before now I want to find a place to my notion and settle down during life. Abb you may think when you get here you will kill lots of deer and turkey but if you land here as poore a man as mee you will have something else to do I would like to see you all very much I recon we would all take blows if we didn't have lots of joley compeny that keeps us in fine sperits and once in a while I get a few scetches of Jack downing and Crocket writings which gives us great pleasure and a few scetches a bout the goper rines Well now I will commence in new as we read two letters today one from Mother and one from Sick dater May 15 1858 Which we was delited to here that you was all well it rather surprised me to here that Sick aimed at landing at Baitsville the first of June but it is about the best plan he could fall on I understand from a letter that Quince got from his father that Jim Johnson had landed back to Murray a boutas I expected a lone man cant live here so well and he thout it was best to pitch back to Joab. I waunt you to write whare Trimble is if you know Mary Sais She is a guine to have a mess of Beans tomorrow. We have a very nice garden Give my best respects to all inquiring friends So nothing more at present.

(This letter was written to Ab Hames by his brother-in-law James Riley Montgomery)

Izard Co., Ark June 6, 1858

Well, Ab. I have laz about all day --til I have got so devilish that I shall have to let off the steam. We are all well fat and hearty as pigs can eat all we can get and more to if I had not hapened to get some of the best cows in the world I do not expect we could got enought to eat. We have one cow that I reckon to put her to her best she would give a barrel of milk at a time where she lies of a knight the milk will run clean across the pen so I think we will have plenty to eat from this out.

It was the wettest Spring I seen in my life it has nearly been a perpetual rain all the time I am now by my farm like the man was by making the broad axe I expect now to make a froe out of it. I thought all the time I would have it planted in corn but now I think I will sow it in wheat next fall if I miss that I will then try it in oats and if they fail I will make a froe out of it my wheat I think will do to cut this in comeing week it is tolerable good I have got the best Cabbage pach I ever seen and the Corn I tend myself looks now like a black Cloud the worst I have against tending of it is that I cant hit the ground with my hoe for there is a rick in the way evry time and I cant being to chaw tobacco and plow.

Ab Inow think if I have no bad luck I shall make a rise I come to Ark. to get me a home and I now own 480 acres of land and aims to have more if nothin hapens and a heap of it good land Ab that I let my horse go in my last land trade so I am now a foot and expects to remain so unless some you wall take pity on me and bring me a nag when you come from wat I hear there will be a jolly crowd of you all on the road next fall. So you may expect to be skinned on the road you will have to come with your purse in your hand and your hat turned strait up --if you will do that maby you will come through safe. I seen your girl the other day and the steam has run up and singed all the hair off her head. Ab I am sorry to inform you I have had bad luck in the gopper line it has been so wet I reckon is the cause of it. I did one on Johns account but as he is determined to do his best or burst the boiler he will have to go a head and see what he will come to. ... Ab I should like to see you all if I could be there one knight wil you all together. I expect there would be a right smart of talking done and maby some laughing but I suppose I shall have to wait till you all come. I am still well pleased with my moove it was the best day work I ever done or at least I think so now and I do hope when you all get here you will all be satisfied and do well. I think Dock and Hugh will come up in this section of the Country. I think it is as good as any part we can find so when you all get here we can soon find places to enter or improved places to sell low for Cash Land is cheaper in this section of the Country than any I could hear from and I think Healthier the most of the people told me before I left when I got to Ark. I would think of my well when I wanted a good drink but I do think I have got as good water as I ever tasted and plenty of it cold and purt.

I want you all when you get ready to start to write me a letter and start ity so I can sorter fix for you and know about the time when you will land and I will try to kill some turkeys and a fat hog and have my Keg filled and of corse we will have plenty of milk and butter. So I reckon we will have a jolly time--my advase is to be certain and start agaist the first of October any how and dont load to heavy fetch all you conenantly can for you will find it a job to get things here scarce and high.

June 8th. Well I have commenced clearing a turnip patch but I will swear it is so hot I do not know whether I can make the trip or not it seems to me like it is now hot enough for August but I have one comfort while I am at work I think it is a little the best ground I ever seen it more manure the Coosawatt land very easy and as to the depth of the soil I can't tell any thing about it it may be fifty feet deep for all I know the growth on it is sassafras shoemate hazelnut grapevine elder cherry and mulberry all small but as thick as the hair on a dogs back and the biggest richest looking weeds you ever seen—Ran is running 3 pairs son in my field today so maybe he will get it planted time enough to make risten ears if nothing else. Tomojrow I want to go to the post office to get the sythe blade so I will then mail my letter and I am in hopes will find some in the office for me.

If it keeps as hot as it is now I expect I shall let my wheat stand in the field for I dont believe I can make the trip to cut it and then see to the thrashin-. Tell Lewis if he can get plenty of thrashing to do there he need not come as there is now one in three miles of me and it uncertain about getting mine cut be a certain and keep writing give my best respects to all the friends so I will stop untill the Spirit mooves me again.

The following is taken from the family Bible of William Henry Alexander and his wife Mary Ann (Molly) Edwards. William Henry Alexander was the son of Joseph J. Alexander and Pheriba Whitfield (?) and was born in Hickman County, Tennessee. Mary Ann Edwards was the daughter of William Edwards and Mary Ann Tisdale. She was born in Graves County, Kentucky.

The Joseph J. Alexander family consisted of five children: (1) Whitman Whitfield Alexander, (2) Nathanal Thompson Alexander, (3) Margaret P. Alexander, (4) Nancy Ann Alexander, and (5) William Henry Alexander. Sometime between 1850 and 1860, the family moved to Humphreys County, Tennessee. Joseph J. Alexander and his two older sons Whitman Whitfield Alexander and Nathanal Thompson Alexander were killed in the Civil War. William Henry Alexander took his mother and sister Margaret to Kentucky where he worked for the Illinois Central Railroad as a civil engineer. After his mother died and Margaret married, he married Mary Ann Edwards. In 1883, he brought his family by wagon train from Graves County, Kentucky, to Independence County, Arkansas.

Mary Ann Edwards was no stranger to Arkansas. Her family first immigrated to Arkansas between 1850 and 1860, and her father William Edwards served with an Arkansas regiment for the Confederate army. When William Edwards did not return to the family in Conway County, Arkansas, after the war, Mary Ann Tisdale Edwards took her children back to Graves County, Kentucky. When William Edwards returned to Conway County, Arkansas, and found his family missing, he followed them back to Kentucky. About 1892, when his wife died, he returned to Arkansas to live with his daughter, Mary Ann Edwards Alexander.

THE BROWN FAMILY

"Several years ago, Lily Brown Taylor sent me a Brown Family History, which was the story of our Brown ancestors beginning with the Revolutionary War Pension of Amos Brown who was born in Virginia. Mrs. Taylor did an immense amount of work and research on this project. Perhaps this information about the Brown family of Benton County, Arkansas, will benefit a reader of the Family Historian."

Amos Brown's son Alfred and his wife Narcissus traveled west to Benton County, Arkansas in 1852. They were accompanied by nine of their ten children. They were Elvira, Darling, Amos, Arra, Asoph, Alfred, Jackson, Harriet and John Wesley. An older son, James and his family, came to the Indian Territory, now Adair Co., Oklahoma in 1871.

Two sons, Darling and Amos, never married; also the three daughters, Elvira, Arra and Harriet.

AMOS BROWN was born in 1766 in Virginia. His residence at the time of enlistment as a volunteer in the Revolutionary War was Lincoln, N.C. His residence in 1832: Macon, N.C. Amos died August 25, 1842 in Cherokee Co., N.C. He was a private in Capt. Whitners Co., Gen. Morgan's Regt. in the Georgia Line for 7-1/2 months. Paid at rate "25 per annum to commence 4 March 1831." Certificate issued 15 May 18__ and sent to L. P. Casson, Pleasant Gardens, Georgia. Act June 7, 1832.

Amos Brown is shown as a purchaser at the sale of the effects of John Brown, Senior and his wife Sarah in Burke County, N.C. on November 23, 1807, at which time other Browns were John, Joshua and Thomas, all living in the same district or company much of the time. Amos and his family were living in Burke County in the 1800 census. The first recorded data is in Lincoln County: 1878--Marriage Bonds Tryon and Lincoln: Amos Brown to Elizabeth Brown--March 17, 1785 (page 23, Bynum's Book of Marriage Bonds). 1790 Census of Lincoln Co. (Clark's Vol. 25 State Records):

It seems the Brown family moved into Burke County and are listed in the 1792 (Henry Hilan's Co.) Tax List (File CR 14.120). Amos Brown is shown to have lived in six counties in North Carolina. He may have lived in the same area, even on the same land most of the time. As the areas became settled, the counties were cut up, new and smaller counties being made up from the larger ones. The following data shows how this was done.

Burke County formed from Rowan 1777
Haywood County formed from Buncombe 1808
Macon County formed from Haywood 1828
Cherokee County formed from Macon 1839

Taken from a letter written in the office of Thad Eure, Secretary of the State of North Carolina. "Amos Brown received a grant for 640 acres in 1812, and a grant for 4-1/2 acres in 1821 in Haywood County from which County Macon was formed. The grant is copied just as it is in the grant book at the Dept. of State, Raleigh, N.C., State of North Carolina."
(Land Grant Book No. 126, Page 398, File No. 35)

The Cherokee Territory was formerly occupied by the Cherokee Indians. Around 1837 these lands were surveyed into districts and districts into smaller tracts or sections. The purpose of these surveys was to divide the land so that later grants could be issued to people making entries. At this time the Cherokee Indians were moved to Oklahoma.

ALFRED BROWN was born December 16, 1739 in North Carolina. Died January 3, 1876 in Benton County, Arkansas. Married Narcissus Belk born December 29, 1793 in Georgia. Died August 1, 1879, Benton County, Arkansas.

This story was told by Jeff Brown: the family was getting ready to move to Arkansas. They had a little box full of gold. They signed a note for a man to buy horses. He took the horses and left and they never heard from him again. They had to pay off the note so it took all their gold and they had to wait until they could save enough again to make the trip. In 1852, Alfred, at the age of 63, and Narcissus age 59, with all their children except James, made the trek by wagon from North Carolina to Arkansas. Children:

This is the story of his death as told by Jefferson Brown to his daughter Edrie Marchbanks: They had heard that their family had been burned out and were trying to get home to see about them. They and some other men were camped about a mile or so from home; one morning early they built a fire to make some coffee and a bushwhacker and his men saw their smoke and slipped up and killed them.

This story of the James Brown family was taken from a letter written by Frances Hart Pace, great granddaughter of James. The Browns lived at Murphy, N.C. They had a plantation and owned slaves. They decided to go west across the Mississippi River over the Trail of Tears (so named because it was the trail the Cherokee Indians took when they were moved to Oklahoma). They traveled with oxen and covered wagons. Jim settled in the Indian Territory, which is now Adair County, Oklahoma, in 1871. The Indian blood came into the family through Jim Brown's wife Eliza Rapers. Martin Raper lived with Jim and Eliza until he was 102 years old and never married.

"Jim was a large six footer. Eliza was small, weighed 80 pounds. The community where they lived was called the Knee Scoot Prairie.

"Aunt Love, or Narcissus, married Bob Thompson. He built the first flour and grist mill in the country. It was placed on the banks of Tiner Creek. It had a big water wheel for most of its power. Shortly after he built the mill he found he would have to have help as he was a schoolteacher. He sold the mill to his brothers-in-law, John and Cap Brown. They ran the mill until John's sons, Dick and Bob, were grown. They they took over and ran the mill for several years. Today this huge mill stands on what is known as the Gus Hart Farm, near Westville, Oklahoma. Gus Hart bought the mill and moved it to make the largest barn in the country.

"After the boys took over the mill, John turned to politics. He was sent to Washington, D.C. as a representative of the Daws Commission Act. He was the leader of the group that formed the section lines that made the roads through Adair County."

There is evidence that other related members of the Brown family may have made the move from North Carolina to the Indian Territory. These records were taken from books by Mr. Carslowey on the history of the Cherokee Nation.

William Shepherd died Jan. 23, 1890.

Joseph Young was a member of the National Council and Executive Officers of the Cherokee Nation for the regular session in 1877. He was also a member from the Illinois District of the Cherokee Nation National Council in 1879.

Marriages in the Cherokee Nation: Jesse Raper and Mary McDonald. Charles Raper and Sarah Franklin.

Cemetery records taken from the Baptist Mission Cemetery north of Westville: Mary Raper 1798-1890 Jesse Raper 1797-1897

AMOS A. BROWN born Feb. 2, 1820, N.C. Died May 26, 1890. Never married. Lived with his sisters, Arra, Harriett and Elvira. Taken from Goodspeeds History of Families living in Benton County in 1889:

Amos A. Brown, a farmer of Benton County, Arkansas, was born on the second of February 1820, and located on his present farm of 260 acres in 1852.

He has lived a quiet uneventful life, but always taken a keen interest in matters pertaining to the welfare of the County in which he resides.

He has 130 acres of land under cultivation and is in a prosperous condition, financially.

Mr. Brown votes the Democratic ticket and the best he can remember, his first vote was cast for James K. Polk.

He is a member of Missionary Baptist Church.

His parents, Alfred and Narcissus (Belk) Brown were married in their native state of North Carolina and migrated to Tenn. in 1832, and from Tenn. to North Carolina in 1834. In 1851 they left North Carolina and arrived in Benton Co., Ark. in 1852. Their children were as follows, Elvira, Darling (Deceased), James, Amos A., Arra B., Asoph (Deceased), Alfred, (Deceased), Harriet, J. M. and John W. Their paternal grandparent was an Englishman and came to America at an early day.

The following was taken from a letter written by Pearl Caldwell Brooks, granddaughter of Alfred. "Our grandfather's name was Alfred Brown; he was of English descent. He was not a large man but very strong, and athletic and full of fun. He loved his family very much and that was the cause of his death. It was almost the end of the Civil War and he was away from home with the army when he received word that his wife was about to give birth to their youngest son, Remington. He went home to see her and the baby with one of his brothers, a bachelor, Darling. They made it home but on the way back to the army, they were waylaid by a bunch of Union Soldiers, fourteen of them, at a ford in a little creek. When they opened fire on the two, Grandfather jumped behind a tree and

yelled to his brother, Darling, to fight; but Darl got down on his knees and started to pray because he knew they were outnumbered and had no chance. They shot him while he was on his knees but Alfred kept fighting. He got eleven men out of the fourteen before they got him. They were so mad they took his gun and broke it in two and threw it into the creek. Mother said her mother could hear the shots from the house and knew what had happened. His hat was shot full of holes. He was married to Jane Centers. She was a rather large, strong, healthy woman and a very good midwife. After Alfred was killed she married a Mr. Conley."

From a letter written by Edrie Marchbanks: "Grandpa fought with the Confederacy during the war. He was never wounded but one day when they were in heavy fighting at Prairie Grove, Ark., a bullet hit a rail and bounced off and hit him on the knee. He thought he was really hurt but it didn't even break the skin." There is no record in the National Archives of either John Wesley or Alfred having fought in the Civil War but they may have been fighting with independent Confederate troops.

MEMORIES OF MONTGOMERY CO., ARK. (From the Arkansas Gazette Magazine Section, Little Rock, Sunday, August 30, 1936, by Melinda A. Cubage, whose parents settled at Mt. Ida in 1857, writes of some of the people and places she remembers. (Submitted by Bobbie Jones McLane)

(Melinda A. Cubage, the daughter of Dr. Alfred Jones (1827-1891) and Jane Poindexter Clingman (1837-1913) was born 19 Oct. 1854 near Amity, Ark. d. Feb. 1948, Jones Valley, near Caddo Gap., Ark. Married James Dodd Cubage 9 May 1878 in the Jones family home near Caddo Gap., Ark. Melinda was the niece of my ancestor Dr. Willis Cornelius Jones 1830-1906 who was a brother of Dr. Alfred Jones, both sons of Robert & Melinda (Ewing) Jones. BJM)

(This is the first of three articles by Mrs. Cubage on her recollections of early Montgomery County.)

For some time, I had contemplated writing of Montgomery County as I remember the people, customs and manners of a time farther back than anyone living recalls, except two persons I know, Mrs. June Whittington and Mrs. Sug Anderson.

I confided my plans to my brother, the late Dr. Isaac Jarratt Jones of Little Rock. He said: "Let's drive around and see some of the old places, and scenes, we used to know."

Mr. Cubage and I got in the car with him and drove through Black Springs, where we had spent eight years of our early married life, on past the Middleton farm to the John Scott place.

The fine old sulphur water was still bubbling up out of the ground, through pipes now. A. Forester lives there now, and has built a cage over the spring branch. Several people were standing around, a kind of community gathering place, most of them were descendants of people we had known.

Our minds were carried back to "Uncle" John Scott, who we knew in early life; white-haired, rudy-faced, strong of character; he left his imprint on the community and passed to his reward long years ago.

Near the spring stands a giant elm, perhaps a century old.

At Black Springs we turned toward Mount Ida, passing the Sanders Swindle place, we recalled that the family was all blown into the well in the 1884 tornado; but all survived, lodging on rubbish which went in first.

At Mount Ida we drove straight to the old home where we had lived many years and where Granville Jones was born April 22, 1861, and Dr. I. J. Jones was born November 23, 1864.

The house was in a good state of repair, still being occupied. Many memories were stirred up as we walked through the house and about the place. We went down to the creek, and I recalled that where the ground is high and dry now on the left there were two soughs and I saw father gig a large bass from a boat.

On our way out of town we called on our friends, the Whittingtons. Every foot of the road on the way back was filled with memories.

I was 16 again, and bridesmaid in the wedding of Miss Belle Stall and Arch Whitten. (Montgomery Co. Marriage Records, Bk. A, p. 261 reflect Samuel A. Whitten, age 24, of Clark Co. married Isabella A. Stall, 20, on 8 Jan. 1871, by Alfred Jones, MG) We were all on horseback, bound for a point 25 miles distant for the in-fair dinner, a custom prevailing at that time.

Her trousseau was in a pair of saddlebags thrown across Mr. Whitten's saddle and in a carpetbag hanging on the horn of her saddle; and I recalled it was only a few years till I traveled over the same road, on the same errand, carrying my things the same way.

In that far-off yesterday, some girls were lucky enough to have a new split log house waiting for them. My mother was one of those. I have heard her say that the proudest moment she ever had, the house was so clean and white. Father bored two large auger holes in the back, put long pegs in them, and made a shelf four feet long, after the custom of those days, on which she folded all their clothes, putting a curtain over them. "Uncle" Abe Jones used to refer to the people of that custom as "clean-clothes poor folks, the best people in the world." My father, Dr. Alfred Jones, was a young medical student and settled near my mother's father, DR. A. B. Clingman, that he might finish his education, working in the field by day and studying by firelight at night. Grandfather had attended medical lectures at a medical school in Georgia, and was competent.

In 1851, Dr. William Binkin? Robison came from North Carolina and married the daughter of Dr. A. B. Clingman and went to study and practice with him at Mount Ida. (Clark Co., Ark. Marriage Records reflect a marriage of John B. Robinson, 28, to Elizabeth Ann Clingman, 16, 5 Nov. 1850 at res. of Dr. A. B. Clingman, by J. Edington, JP, Book C, p.168)

In 1857, my father moved to Mount Ida to join my uncle, Dr. A. M. Clingman, in the practice of medicine. I was not yet four years old. During the years they practiced there together there were several doctors who came, Dr. Huickle, Dr. Howard and Dr. Farris, but did not remain long. (1860 Census of Montgomery Co. has Dr. John K. Farris, 24, and wife Mary E., 24, both b. Tenn. in Big Fork Twp.)

Montgomery Co. was organized in 1842, and Judge Thomas Boles was the first judge. He was elected three times as county judge and once as county surveyor. although still called "Judge". He lived under the brow of the hill, when we moved there in 1857. I especially remember him because of his little daughter, Helen.

Another who comes to my mind is James Alexander Stall, who was born Feb. 27, 1821, at Deerfield, O. and moved to Scott County (now Logan County). He married there and moved to Mount Ida in 1848, buying a farm on the north side of Southfork. He built a large double house, with a hall and portico above and below, painted white and in full view of the town, though some half a mile distant.

He had a dry goods store in town and several families of Negroes on the farm. He was elected county clerk twice, treasurer three times. Some old deeds and papers I have show him to have been a very efficient officer as county clerk. Not his efficiency in office prompts me to write of him as much as

his sterling qualities as a man and neighbor. When my mother was sick or needed help in any way Judge Stall always sent a Negro to help. I remember on one occasion a Negro woman Charlotte stayed the whole time of an evangelistic meeting, when the Rev. Mr. Robinson of the Christian Church was at Mount Ida in February, 1859. At the close of the meeting my mother, James A. Stall and wife, Mrs. Granville Whittington, the Wheeler family, and Salyers family were baptized in Southfork. I remember seeing them break the ice and float it out into the swift water. The Negroes had a great log fire burning on the bank, and they had some little tents of quilts and blankets to change in. It did not hurt one of them, I have heard my mother say.

In November 1863, the judge died. Before his death he asked my father to administer his estate and look after his children. Mrs. Stall went back to Scott County. The store was robbed and burned, the Negroes were freed and there was only the home left. Father continued to care for his five girls till they were grown.

Granville Whittington was born and reared in Boston, Mass. married there, and then followed his brother, Hiram, to Arkansas, settling in Hot Springs. One historian records G. Whittington as having been elected county judge for 1836-1838 for Hot Spring County, but he probably resigned before the time was up, as an old account book shows that in 1837 he was selling goods in Mount Ida, in what is thought to have been the first store there. When Mr. Whittington came from Boston he left his wife and little son, Granville, behind. When he sent for them, his wife's mother convinced her that the baby, being a delicate child, could not stand the trip over the rough road in a stage coach. So he was left behind, and his parents did not see him till he was 16, when he visited them. Then he went back to Boston and remained until he was grown.

In 1848, Granville Whittington, Sr. represented Montgomery County in the legislature. In 1864-1866 he was county judge of Montgomery County. Though he was always called "Colonel", I never knew any reason, except that the title sat well upon him; he looked every inch a colonel; tall and straight, always neatly dressed, and wore a high-topped hat; he was familiarly and affectionately called by his friends "the old Colonel" or "Mr. Whit." Well-mannered, sober, he was fond of dancing, an amusement very popular just after the Civil War.

I remember him quite well; when my oldest brother was born; the Colonel heard about it, and got on his horse and rode over to see him, saying he had come to name the baby. He wanted to call him Granville Whittington, and mother and father readily consented, all being great friends. So he wrote the name himself, closed the Bible, and laid a \$2.50 gold piece on it, saying, "Buy him a sheep with this, and save all the increase till he is old enough to look after them himself, and that will give him a start in life." They had quite a bunch of them once, but sheep-killing dogs got them finally. That is how Granville Jones got his name.

Mrs. Whittington was one of the most cultured women I ever knew. She seldom went out, being very devoted to her home and family. They had four other sons and one daughter. Hiram married Miss Martha Garrett, daughter

of a former Sheriff J. B. Garrett (Montgomery Co. Marriage Records Bk. A, p.159 Hiram A. Whittington, 27, to Martha A. Garrett, 22, 4 Nov. 1860 by Wm. J. Willoughby, Probate Judge) June married Miss Celia Stall, oldest daughter of Judge Stall, just after the Civil War. (Montgomery Co. Marr. Records Bk. A, p.46 Junius G. Whittington, 28, to Lucinda Celia Stall, 21, 24 Nov. 1867 by Wm. F. Bates, MG) He was a farmer and took his bride to a splendid new double log house on a high hill, and she still lives there with her oldest son, Granville, who married Miss Annie Fall, daughter of Professor Fall, one of the best teachers Montgomery Co. ever had. He taught several years at Buckville, and later at Mount Ida. The second son of June and Celia Stall Whittington is William G. well known druggist of Mount Ida. Both sons are known for the splendid care they take of their mother, who is now 90.

The "old Colonel's" only daughter, Delia, married John Elder, who came here from Ouachita County soon after the Civil War, and out county treasurer at present is their descendant. (Montgomery Co. Marriage Records Bk. A, p.261 John S. Elder, 26, to Zilphia C. Whittington, 21, 11 Sept. 1870 by M.V.B. Salyers, JP, res. of G. W. Whittington)

Granville N. Whittington, the baby who was left behind in Boston, brought his family here in 1858, and remained till 1863. As was the custom in those days he also built a log house on a hill which was later known as the Saunders place.

He was a well educated man, a Mason, one of the friendliest men in the county. Although born in the North, his sympathies were with the South. He went to Washington, DC from here and spent the remainder of his life there working in the capital. In some old letters to my father, he never forgot to inquire about old friends here, especially Masons. He refused to sell his place for some time, saying he expected to live in Arkansas again.

At the time I first began to remember Mount Ida, there was D. A. Woolard, who was county clerk preceding Judge Stall. There were Scotts, Simpsons, Pierces, Salyers, Lairds, Garretts, Moses and Emanuel Burgeaur, Willoughbys, Hesters, McDuffs, Switzers, Marcuses and Lavenders. Nearby in the country there was Judge Harrison Graves, John May, Fryors, Wilhites, Bates, Standridges, Cogburns, Carrolls and Shirleys. John Simpson was captain of the first company of Confederate soldiers who went to the front. He was soon killed and John W. Lavender followed him in command.

Carroll Simpson was sheriff in 1860, and Harmon Scott, who married Sue Simpson, was his deputy. (Montgomery Co. Marriage Records Bk. A p.131, Harmon Scott, 21, to T. C. Simpson, 16, consent of parents in writing, 30 Dec. 1858 by Samuel Hendrix, JP)

J. B. Garrett was sheriff from 1854 to 1860 and had been county judge from 1850 to 1852.

Of the best remembered citizens, one of them was Mace Scott, a blacksmith, a staunch member of the Methodist Church; he has one son, Billy, living.

Comment: Arkansas Genealogical Society added 73 titles to its library in 1983. 68 books were donated and 5 were bought from our Memorial Fund. I chose to say titles instead of books because one is a 3-volume set.

The Clark County Historical Journal, Fall 1982, published by Clark County, Arkansas, Historical Association, P. O. Box 516, Arkadelphia, AR 71923. It has 225 pages with surname index, 8½ x 11 inches, soft cover. Price: \$7, plus \$2 postage and handling. Order from Treasurer, OCHA at address given above. Membership in Association \$5 from Jan. 1 thru Dec. 31, open to all. Feature articles in this issue are: 1. The life and Times of Meriwether Lewis Randolph, who is buried in south Clark County. He was a grandson of Thomas Jefferson Randolph who served as the last Territorial Secretary of Arkansas; 2. Jefferson Family Descendants; 3. The Confederate Monument on the Clark County Courthouse Square.

The genealogy of at least nine families is included. Cemetery listings are given as well as Census reports by families. We appreciate the donation of this County Journal which gives so much history and genealogy.

1860 Federal Census of Izard County, Arkansas, by Mary Cooper Miller, published in 1984, 89 pages with a full name index, 8½ x 11 inches, soft cover. Order for \$14.00 postpaid from M-F Publications, 350 E. Charles, Batesville, AR 72501. This written record of the 1860 census was transcribed from a microfilm which had been re-photographed from the original using a process to enhance the illegible sections of the first microfilm. This certainly makes a more accurate copy possible. The preface has valuable information in it.

This 1860 census included, in addition to present-day Izard County, parts of the following counties: Baxter (created 1873); Sharp (1868); Stone (1873); and Cleburne (1883). This information is very helpful to the researcher. All family groups are listed as the original census and it is particularly clear and easy to read. The full name index is a welcome feature. This volume was donated by Mary Miller. We appreciate it very much.

1870 Census of Inzrd County, Arkansas, by Ardith Olene Foster. It has 68 pages with a surname index, 8½ x 11 inches, soft cover. It may be ordered for \$9.50 postpaid at the address given in the previous review.

The households and families are in the arrangement of the original census. The surname of the family is followed by the given name, age and state of birth of each person listed. A few corrections in spelling of names makes the name more easily recognized. This is helpful without losing any of the colloquialism of the time and area. Thanks to Miller-Foster Publications for the gift of this book to our Library.

Pope County, Arkansas Obituaries and Death Notices, January 1904 to December 1906, compiled by J. B. Lemley, 1120 N. Detroit, Russellville, AR 72801. It is 8½ x 11 inches in size, soft cover, 72 pages with full name index.

This volume is just what it indicates. Mr. Lemley is a very good genealogist and knows how to select the most valuable for his publications. This is easy to read and up to his usual high standards.

The 1900 U. S. Census of Clay County, Arkansas, two volumes, transcribed, compiled and published in 1983 by Una Pollard, Rt. 2, Box 253, Piggott, AR. \$25.00 postpaid for the two vol. set, total of 434 pages including surname index, softback.

In 1895 the southern boundary between Clay and Green Counties (northeast Arkansas, near the Missouri line) was changed so that Clay included Blue Cane Township. From 1880 to 1900 Clay County had more than doubled in population, and in 1900 contained 3,224 households. All people were white except 6 blacks and 1 Indian. Ms. Pollard has provided superb help to all genealogists/historians by having printed the exact data as it was given in the census records, plus providing a 1900 map of the county. Donated to the AGS by Ms. Pollard.

The 1880 U. S. Census of Clay County, Arkansas, transcribed, compiled and published by Una Pollard, Rt. 2, Box 253, Piggott, AR. \$11.00 postpaid, 156 pages including surname index, softback.

Most of Clay County was taken from Greene in 1873. In 1880, 1,359 households were listed and a mortality schedule and 1880 map of the county have been included in this book. The book was donated to the AGS by Ms. Pollard.

Pope County, Arkansas. Obituaries and Death Notices, 1907-1909, copied by J. B. Lemley, 1120 N. Detroit Ave., Russellville, AR 72801. Price is not listed, 69 pages including index, softback.

This book includes obituaries copied from the Russellville Courite-Democrat during a two-year period, and it is an invaluable resource for those individuals studying early Pope County history/genealogy. Much of this information is unique and would have been unavailable had not Mr. Lemley laboriously searched and copied the material from old newspaper files. This copy was a gift of Mr. Lemley to the AGS.

Yell County, Arkansas Marriage Records, 1878 thru 1900, vol. 2, published by the Yell County Historical and Genealogical Society, copyright 1983 by Erma Lee Masters, 409 Quay, Dardanelle, AR 72834. Price not listed. 165 pages including bride and minister/justice of the peace index, softback.

This volume contains more than 3,000 marriages in Yell County during the twelve year period before 1900. After Yell was created in 1840, Danville was the county seat; later Dardanelle was made the seat of justice for the northern portion of the county. Records from both court houses were copied and published in this volume, donated to the AGS by the Yell County Historical and Genealogical Society.

Crawford County, Arkansas 1893 Poll Tax List, reprinted 1983 by Louise A. Scroggins, Hwy. 59 N, Van Buren, AR 72956, \$4.50 postpaid, 47 pages, softback. This small booklet contained an alphabetized listing of all those who paid a poll tax in Crawford County in 1892. It is another valuable reference guide to those

searching for family members in West Arkansas prior to the turn of the century. The book was donated to the AGS by Ms. Scrobbsins.

Isabella County (Michigan) 1982, the Shepherd Area Historical Society, Taylor Publishing Co., Dallas, 1982. Price not listed, 277 pages, not indexed. Two previous histories of Isabella Co. Michigan have been published, one in 1884 and another in 1911. This is an attempt to annotate the more recent events in the county history as part of that continuum. The bulk of the volume is comprised of short resumes of individuals and families currently in the county, a return from 15,000 brochures which had been mailed to county residents announcing plans to publish a new history. Short sections also are featured on General Information about the County, Businesses of the Past and Present, Churches, Schools, Organizations, Public Services and the City of Mount Pleasant. The book is printed in the manner in which the Taylor Publishing Company has for years published high school/college yearbooks: a heavy 3-dimensional hardback cover and glossy pages. The photographs are of good quality. The overall effect, while not commonly seen in most county histories, is not altogether unpleasant. Readers will be interested to learn that the Taylor Publishing Company has printed more than 300 such county histories across the county, and it does this with no up-front money—rather by pre-selling books to those individuals who have submitted personal material for the text. This book is a gift of the company to AGS to demonstrate to our members this service. The Ancestors and Descendants of John Calvin and Mary Clapper KAGARICE, by Nina Kagarice Bigsby and Margaret Kagarice Yoder, 1980. Mrs. Yoder's address is 14620 Timberedge Lane, Colorado Springs, CO 80909. Price not listed, 69 pages including index and photos, softback.

This is a record of a pioneer Kansas family with origins in Pennsylvania. John Calvin KAGARICE was a carpenter b. 1850 in Bedford Co. PA and d. 1933 at Hutchinson, KS, son of Daniel KAGARICE and Hannah RUSH. His seven children and their descendants are documented well in this compact but interesting volume.

Ellis County, Texas, Cemetery Records, Vol. III, compiled and published 1984 by the Ellis County Genealogical Society, P. O. Box 385, Waxahachie, TX 75165. Price not listed, 163 pages including index, softback.

This is one of a continuing series, listing twenty cemeteries and their graves in Ellis County today. A brief history is given of each of the major cemeteries, with location. The book has been donated to the AGS by the members of the Ellis County Genealogical Society.

CWE YE, Cherokee Blood Newsletter, Spring 1983, Vol. 1, published quarterly at \$12.00 per year, by Shirley Hoskins, P. O. Box 22261, Chattanooga, TN 37422.

Ms. Hoskins has published broadly about Cherokee Indian history and plans to use this newsletter to answer genealogical queries. Most of her information comes from the Cherokee records in the U. S. National Archives, Washington, DC (or in microfilmed excerpts from those records.) This volume contains comments about beginning Cherokee research, Federal Cherokee records, early Cherokee histories, Early East Tennessee Counties, Cherokee Property Valuations, Cherokee Soldiers of 1812 and much more. Ms. Hoskins has sent a sample copy for review to the AGS. It should be a valuable resource for all those with real (or suspected) Cherokee heritage.

The Harbours in America by Louis J. "Lou" Williams in collaboration with William Tyler ROSS, published by the HARBOUR-HARBOR-HARBEE Family Association, 7904 Joliet Ave., Lubbock TX 79423, copyright 1982, \$48.50, hardcover, 666 pages plus index, including more than 50 pages of old photographs.

Mr. Williams is a retired banker who has compiled and donated this book to the Harbour-Harbor-Harber Family Association, which has published and distributed the book; it concerns the ancestors of his late wife, Hazel Harbour WILLIAMS, and covers many branches of the Harbour family, all spellings, from 1700 to the present. Thomas HARBOUR was b. 1675-1695 in Wales, m. Sarah WITT, dau. of John WITT, Jr., one of two Huguenot brothers, and the couple lived in Old Halifax Co., Virginia. Related families featured in the book are: SPURLOCK, WITT, THOMAS, TURMAN, DALTON, ARROWSMITH, PILSON, ROSS, PEDIGO, REYNOLDS, etc. This book and a sample bulletin (Vol. VI:1, Summer 1983) of the Harbour-Witt Family Association were donated to the AGS by Mrs. Carolyn Yancey LITTLE.

Mill's Atlas, Atlas of the State of South Carolina, 1825, reprinted 1980 by Southern Historical Press, c/o Rev. S. Emmett Lucas, Jr. P. O. Box 738, Easley, SC 29640, \$36.95 postpaid.

This Atlas was first published in 1825 by Robert Mills. The 1980 edition contains 44 pages of historical notes with name/place indices, plus 29 sectional maps. The book will be a most valuable aid for anyone researching early South Carolina history or genealogy; would that such volumes existed for other Southern states! This copy was donated to the AGS by Rev. Lucas for display in the Little Rock Public Library.
