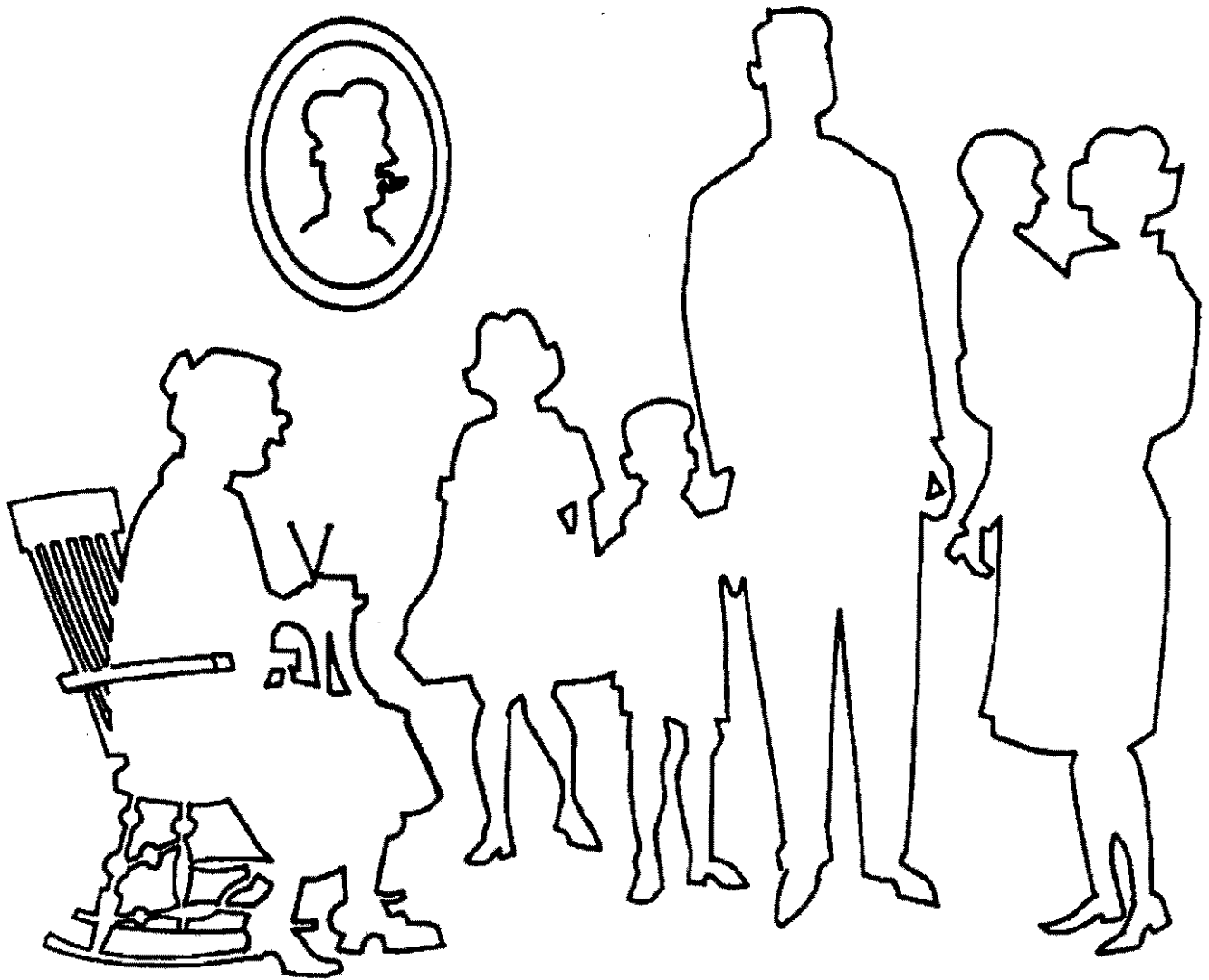

The following is quoted from the Constitution of the Arkansas Genealogical Society, approved and adopted in 1965:

ARTICLE II -- PURPOSE

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## ARKANSAS COUNTY

The early boundaries of Arkansas County were defined as follows: "All that portion of the territory bounded north by the south line of the county of New Madrid, east by the main channel of the Mississippi River, south by the 33d<sup>o</sup> of north latitude, or the northern boundary line of the State of Louisiana, westwardly by the western boundary line of the Osage purchase, and by a line to commence upon the River Arkansas, where the boundary line of the Osage purchase intersects the same, thence in a direct line to the main source of the Wachita, thence south to the northern boundary line of the State of Louisiana, or 33d<sup>o</sup> of north latitude, shall compose a county, and be called and known by the name of the county of Arkansas."

The county at one time covered the whole State, but new counties being formed from time to time, it has been reduced to its present boundaries. (Goodspeed's Eastern Arkansas)

A Petition to Congress by the inhabitants of Arkansas County November 2, 1818 endorsed "Petition of 144 Inhabitants of Arkansas, pray that the right of preemption may be extended to them up to the end of this session of Congress and more particularly that the right may be given to all those that were settled on the Lands lately purchased from the Quapaw Indians stating as a reason that the quapaws had but the shadow of title, & that the acknlegement of the U States that it was theirs drawn from the purchase, has deprived them of a right that they considered as Vested. Prays general relief Jany. 30, 1819 - referred to the Committee of Public Lands. The petition was signed by the following:

We have identified several persons in this listing of inhabitants who in 1830, '40, or '50 were living in counties later formed from Arkansas County, such as: Mosby, Pulaski Co.; Belcher, Conway Co.; Crain (Harris), Pope Co.; Carlile (Wm.) Washington Co.; Bland Conway Co.; Barkman (Barrackman) Clark Co.; Barnett (Abraham) Conway Co.; Barnett (John), Independence Co. There were Massingales in Conway, Pulaski and Lawrence Cos. and Massingills in Pulaski; Hibben, Conway Co.; Kuykendall Conway Co.; Cato in Conway Co.; Flanakin in Chicot and Pulaski Co. and Pyeatt and Carnahan were in Washington Co.

Goodspeeds' History says that among the early settlers of Arkansas County itself was one A.B.K. Thetford, who also filled the office of sheriff of the county at one time (From 1825 thru 1835). Thetford's ferry takes its name from him. At the time of his death he was living in Arkansas County on the north side of Arkansas River, but this same house was, at an earlier date, on the south side of the river. The bed and current shifting left him on the north side.

The 1850 census listed his family in Dwelling 1, Douglass Twp:

HalliBurton's History of Arkansas County reveals that the late Jason Thetford, a younger brother of A.B.K., was a pilot on a steamer then in the Arkansas River and New Orleans trade.

"Tradition says that from 1820 to 1825, A.B.K. Thetford carried mail matter from Arkansas Post to Helena once a week. When the water in White river permitted, he went through from one point to the other on horseback, but when the water was too high to permit this, he went on horseback to the bluff where the village of St. Charles is now located, where he left his horse and getting into a canoe with his mail, floated down the White river to the mouth of Big Creek east of White river, and went up that to the road leading to Helena, where he procured another horse on which he proceeded to Helena. Returning, he again took a canoe on Big Creek, floated down it to White river, went up that to the bluff and there remounted his horse and returned to Arkansas Post."

Two brothers, Benjamin S. and Rowland Haller, came to Arkansas very early. Benjamin was judge of the county probate courts from 1835 to 1842, and up to middle life, according to Goodspeeds History, "was an infidel, but when about 50 years old was converted and began preaching. He was remarkable for his sound common sense."

Another character somewhat noted, according to Goodspeeds, was Julian M. P. J. DeVisart, Count De Boicarme, a Belgian, who came to Arkansas early in the 30s and settled within a few miles of where DeWitt now is; here he died in 1852, his life something of a mystery. He appeared in the 1850 census of Arkansas Twp: Vizart, Julian, Sr.(fmr)60 m Belgium

Halliburton says that Maria Phillippe Julian Joseph Visart, Count of Bocarme, immigrated to this county in the year 1836. This man settled on Little Lagrue, about 25 miles north of Arkansas Post, where he, with his family, remained until his death in September 1851.

At the time of his settlement, there were not more than five or six families within as many miles of his residence; and no school, church, post office nor trading point nearer than Arkansas Post. Here, three children, two sons and a daughter, were born to him. In 1845, the mother of these children died, and sometime between that date and 1851, when the father died, the youngest son died.

At the count's death, the son who came with him to this country, (Julian, Jr.) and the son and daughter who were born here, survived him. For services rendered the French government by the count, previous to his coming to this country, a pension was settled on him, which continued to the close of the year 1850, and soon after this time, he made application by filing with the Clerk of Arkansas County, his petition to become a citizen of the United States. Occasionally during the years intervening between 1836 and 1850, the count went to France to obtain his pension.

During the year 1849, numbers of citizens, infected with gold fever went to California, in quest of fortune. Some hoped to obtain it by mining, some by trading and others by driving cattle from this country to that for market. The saddest event connected with the California cattle trade during these years was the tragic death of George Cook, an old and respected citizen of Old River township. Cook was the owner of a large herd of cattle, which he sold to parties hailing from California, agreeing to pay for them on their safe delivery at Fort Smith, Arkansas. Cook, in company with the purchasers and their men, started with the cattle, going by way of Little Rock. Here they crossed the Arkansas river, and, after reaching the hill country west of Little Rock, the leader of the company induced Cook to leave the herd and go with him into the hills, ostensibly for the purpose of hunting deer, then plentiful in the country. Reaching an unfrequented place in the hills, this man killed Cook and pushed forward to Fort Smith. Here, it seems, he had accomplices, who, on the arrival of the cattle, took charge of them with others they had gathered at this point. The leader, with others of the party, pushed forward toward the plains without waiting for the cattle, which in charge of the remainder of the party, followed soon after. It was some days after Cook's death before the news of it reached his friends at home, who, at once, induced William Daniels and Bazil B. Smith, two of his neighbors, to go in pursuit of the murdered. They followed him as far as Salt Lake City, where they lost all trace of him and returned home.

George Cook was listed in the 1850 census of Old River Twp., age 38 born in Tenn., with wife Malinda, 31, b. Ala. and children, Joseph 13, Phebe J. 8, William 4, and Mary 1/12, all born in Ark. Dwelling 33

Frederick Noterebe, who lived in and about Arkansas Post in the 40s, was the most prominent man in the county, again according to Goodspeeds. He came to Arkansas sometime from 1815 to 1818, and had been a soldier under Napoleon. He died in New Orleans of cholera in 1849. The 1850 census of Arkansas Co. lists only Felicite Notrebe, age 56, born in Louisiana, living in Dwelling 68, Arkansas Township.

Prior to the advent of Noterebe came Charles Bogy, a native of Kaskaskia, Ill, who came with the Federal troops to take possession of Arkansas Post in the name of the United States in 1804. He was a man of Herculean proportions and wonderful physical endurance. HalliBurton's History says "It appears Hewes Scull and Charles Bogy, as partners, were merchandising at Arkansas Post from Dec. 1823 to Jan. 1825. Scull after that date continued the business in his own name."

Baptisms of three of the children of Charles Bogy and Francoise Diane were listed 21 April 1820 in the Catholic Register of Arkansas (1764-1858).

Terrence Farrelly, an Irishman, came from Pittsburg early in the 30s. He was in the sheriff's office, was probate and county judge (1830-1832), a member of the Territorial legislature, a member of the constitutional convention of 1836, a Whig in politics, Governor of Arkansas (appointed by Jackson), a man of commanding appearance strongly marked Irish features, and having a rich brogue. He was for years the leader of his party in politics. A man of sterling integrity, he commanded the respect and confidence of the people to a marked degree. The 1850 census lists this family in Arkansas Township:

Until Lawrence County was formed on January 15, 1815, Arkansas County made up the entire state, covering an area approximately the southern three-fourths of the present state. The county was not organized until the year 1814, her citizens being represented

in the Legislature previous to this date, by a member from New Madrid, Missouri.

On December 15, 1818, Pulaski, Clark and Hempstead Counties were formed from the original Arkansas county, which was the first of six changes for this county. From it was formed the following: Phillips Co. (1820), Chicot (1823); St. Frances (1827); Monroe and Jefferson (1829); Mississippi (1833); Desha (1838); Prairie (1846); and Lincoln (1871). Until those dates, the records of Arkansas County could possibly contain information for other counties as mentioned.

CLAY COUNTY  
TOWNS, POST OFFICES & EXPRESS OFFICES CIRCA 1885

Originally called Clayton County, Clay County was formed from Greene and Randolph counties on March 24, 1873. Two years later on December 6, 1875, the General Assembly changed the name to Clay County. The original county seat was Corning, but was moved to Boydsville following an election held in 1874. The records were never actually moved to the new site. In 1877, a second election was held, and again Boydsville was selected as the county seat, much to the dismay of the citizens of Corning. In 1881, the legislature divided the county into two Judicial Districts, with Boydsville serving the Eastern District and Corning serving the Western District. The county is still served by two county seats; one at Corning and the other at Pigott. The following is a list of communities and offices for mail and express from the period of the 1880's. Maps, the 1880 Census and an Atlas of the period were consulted to compile the list.

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MEMORIES OF MONTGOMERY CO., ARK.

(From the Arkansas Gazette Magazine Section, Little Rock, 1936, by Melinda A. Cubage, whose parents settled at Mt. Ida in 1857, recalls some of the early merchants at Mount Ida. (This is the second of three articles by Mrs. Cubage about her early recollection os Montgomery County.)

(Melinda A. Cubage, the daughter of Dr. Alfred Jones (1827-1891) and Jane Poindexter Clingman (1837-1913) was born 19 Oct. 1854 near Amity, Ark. d. Feb. 1948, Jones Valley, near Caddo Gap, Ark. Married James Dodd Cubage 9 May 1878 in the Jones family home near Caddo Gap. Melinda was the niece of my ancestor, Dr. Willis Cornelius Jones (1830-1906) who was a brother of Dr. Alfred Jones, both sons of Robert and Melinda (Ewing) Jones. - Submitted by Bobbie Jones McLane.)

One day father came in and said, "Joe Bogle is out at the gate." I had heard of him before, and somehow the name itself was bewitching, so I went right on out to see him. He was sitting on a bench hewn out of a piece of oak, with peg legs; it was just long enough to sit on; it was about 18 inches high. I said, "Mr. Bogle, what makes the two little holes on each side." He said, "I have to walk sitting on this bench." Then he set his feet forward a little, raised himself and pulled up the bench. "This turning of my thumbs when I pull up the bench is what made the dents." In fact, the bench was slick and shiny all over. He lived four miles from town and had come all the way on that bench. He was a rheumatic subject, and could not ride in a wagon, or on a horse. When things have seemed difficult to me, I have thought of him, and said, "Joe Bogle would have done it."

Then there was "Uncle" Jimmy Reed. I have been told he was a Methodist preacher, and he was a great Mason. One Saturday night in each month the Masons all came to town, and it seems now that most of them ate supper with us. Of course I had to wait! One night "Uncle" Jimmy spied me standing around and called me, put his arm around me, and asked me what part of the chicken I liked best. I said the "gizzard" and from then on, he always found the gizzard for me every time he came. He was about as handsome as Abraham Lincoln, but I always hurried to the table to get to eat out of his plate. These free lodge suppers lasted as long as we lived at Mount Ida.

Of the Salyers family there were Tyler and Van. I think Tyler died in the army. Of the Van Salyers family, there remains only Fred of Fort Smith.

There were two of the Switzer family after the war, Billy and Monroe. They were left with us to care for during the war, as their mother was dead. Mr. Switzer and son, Asbury, were killed in the same battle.

Of the Wheeler family there were John Wheeler and his wife, Martha, Flem Wheeler, Gabe Wheeler, Ruth, Riley, with a smile that no one could ever forget, and his wife, Susan. There are still Wheelers at Mount Ida. (Rutha, age 22, b. Tenn., and Gabriel Wheeler, age 25, b. Tenn. were listed in the 1860 census with the family of Madison C. Hatfield, D-167, Big Fork Twp. Montgomery Co., Ark. Marriage Records of Montgomery Co. show Gabriel Wheeler, 31, married Martha Haskins, 22, on 25 Nov. 1866, A-23. Ruthy Wheeler married Thos. J. Scott, 21 Oct. 1860, A-158)

Mose and Emanuel Burgeaur, Jewish merchants, moved to Hot Springs and went into business during the war. Judge William Willoughby and family

soon after the war went to Hot Springs to live. (Wm. J. Willoughby, 32, married Mary Ann Robertson, 23, 31 Aug. 1856 by Morgan Ussery, JP, A-113, Montgomery Co., Ark. and are listed in the 1860 census at Mt. Ida, his birthplace shown as Va. and hers Tenn., with two children, Wm., age 6, and John B., age 3, both born in Ark.) Mrs. D. A. Wollard married John Jeffrey of near Black Springs and moved away. (In the 1860 census at Mt. Ida, D. A. Woolard, county clerk, 32, b. Tenn. and his wife Serena ? M., age 25, b. Ala. are listed with three children. Her marriage to John H. Jeffrey, age 40, is listed as Lorena ? M. Woolard, 29, 22 May 1863, A-190, Montgomery Co.))

You ask was there a saloon in those days? Was everything all calm and lovely? Yes, there was one, but it was called a grocery, kept by Simpson and Carlton; the back of it was about 150 yards in front of our house, and temperance leaders were working just as hard to combat the evil then as now. (Martin V. Simpson, age 24, b. Ala., wife and three children, and Alex Carrollton, age 23, b. Ala. were listed in the 1860 Montgomery Co. census five dwellings from the family of Dr. Alfred Jones.) They had a Good Templars Society; it seemed to be secret, and was held from house to house. I remember when it met once at our house, John McDuff, an orphan boy (with his sister, Minerva, and brother Dick), who lived with us, held me up to a window to try to find out what they were doing. I could see nothing but Judge and Mrs. Stall, Mr. and Mrs. Willoughby, Mr. Hester, Mr. Bible, and Miss Betty Garrett, and others sitting around. Their songs were printed on long stiff cards.

There was church frequently, but the most vivid remembrance I have of church was walking out about one and a half miles to the Sulphur Spring to hear "Uncle" Flemming Bates, a Primitive Baptist minister. I guess what impressed me most was sitting on puncheon benches, with peg legs, two hours on a stretch. Father required us to tell him the text when we got home. That was hard to do, and sometimes resulted in a ludicrous rendering.

My uncle, Dr. A. M. Clingman, went to Cincinnati in 1860 to attend medical lectures, and left the practice all to my father. Father was to go the next winter, but the war came on and he never did. (Dr. Alex M. Clingman, age 30, b. Tenn., was living in the household of Dr. Alfred Jones, 32, b. Tenn. in D-164, Big Fork Twp., 1860 census, Montgomery Co., Ark.) The practice of medicine was different in those days; there was so much malaria, bilious fever and congestion of the stomach and brain, typhoid fever, pneumonia and congestive chills were frequent; we didn't fear the mosquito except for his bite. People died, lots of them. In the few years just before and during the war, among the prominent people whom I knew who had died were Mr. and Mrs. McDuff, Mrs. Hester, Mr. Woollard, Judge Stall, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Salyers, Miss Betty Garrett and J. B. Garrett, and Mrs. Switzer, beside many children. That was a high mortality rate for a small village.

Dr. A. M. Clingman was a delegate to the Confederate convention from Montgomery Co. when the Southern States seceded from the Union. He was for staying in the Union till the last, and only voted yea to make it unanimous. He was assistant surgeon in the Confederate army stationed in Little Rock. (Alexander Michael, b. May 15, 1830; died June 15, 1870; married Julia Saunders near Rock Creek, Pike Co., Ark. about 1862. He was the son of Alexander Brandon Clingman b. in NC, and his wife, his first cousin, Ann Martha Clingman, who was the daughter of Alexander Michael, the first. His)

sister, with whom he lived in 1860, was Jane Poindexter Clingman (Mrs. Alfred Jones.)

I remember a time in Mount Ida when there was no one to feed the court, and my parents undertook that. It was right after the war, I think the first court held. It must have been very hard, of course, no screens, and insects everywhere. What impressed it on me so much was that I had to stand around and try to fight them off with a long peach tree limb. One day at dinner there were seated around the table Ex-Gov. Harris Flanagan, H. B. Stuart, J. L. Witherspoon, and others. I remember we had white head-cabbage, pickled beets and a dish of strained honey on the table. I don't remember what else, but I was fighting terribly to keep the insects away, and somehow I forgot my brush for a second. Presently someone called out, "Melinda!" and I suddenly jerked up the brush out of the strained honey right into Major Witherspoon's face and one to his shirt front. All that saved me was the distinguished company present, and the time it took mother to get a pan of water and a clean white rag, and clean Major Witherspoon up. As to myself, I got busy after a new brush, and started in on the insects again, amidst the hurrahs of the crowd. Major Witherspoon's hair was rather red, and his face, naturally red, grew redder at the jibes of the others.

In the fall after this my father bought a farm near Caddo Gap and we moved; a lot of his practice was around Caddo Gap, anyway; in fact, it extended from the Ouachita to the Caddo. In those days it was not uncommon for him to encounter a pack of wolves in the dead of the night, and pretty common for him to grow hungry riding those long stretches. Often the people could hardly furnish a spoon to give the medicine.

After the war, Mount Ida began to change. New people moved in. In 1868, I believe it was, an old resident of Ouachita County, James Dodd, came to this county and bought the Drew Wallace place on the Ouachita River. Father, being agent for Wallace, who had moved to Texas, necessitated the coming to Caddo Gap of Mr. Dodd, who paid my father \$1,000 in gold. They counted it out and stacked it up on a little table. That was the first and the last time that I ever saw that much gold at one time. Mr. Dodd went back home and in a short time died. Ross Watkins, who had married Emma Dodd, came and took charge of the farm; with him came his brothers, Jerry and John Watkins, and Dr. William R. Cubage, who had married Carolyn Dodd (these were related to David O. Dodd), and Capt. O. H. Overstreet, who had married Mary Dodd.

There was a Dr. Kennedy there a while. With him came Martin Kennedy, his brother, who was married to Ella Stall, and Noble Penland, who married Anne Stall. J. B. Cunningham married Sue Stall. Mr. Penland was a brother of Mrs. Marcus and Mrs. Carrol Simpson. They all left later for Sebastian County. (Ella, Anne and Sue Stall were the daughters of James A. Stall, b. Feb. 27, 1821, Deerfield, Ohio.)

The next summer, after arriving at Caddo Gap, we attended a three-month school three miles from home and had to wade the Caddo River. Father said this would never do, so he hired Guilford Goodner to teach through the winter in an old log church near our home. Several others attended beside our family.

The following summer father induced Dr. W. L. Harrison of Rockport, an old friend of his, to come to Caddo Gap, and between them they started a school in the fall of '69. There were several boarding students, Miss Bell Stall, John

A. Watkins of Mount Ida, Henry Brewer of the Ouachita, Arthur K. Clingman and sister, Mattie, Richard Burke, and two sisters all from near Amity and Isaac Welch. These were all young people of more than ordinary intelligence and were leaders of business and social affairs later on. There were about 75 students in all.

At the end of the nine months Dr. Harrison had to go to Texas and that broke up the high school - but it had made an impression on the community, and we began to have more and better schools. A cousin of my mother, Miss Minnie Clingman, from Alabama, came and taught at the old log house. There was such a scarcity of teachers that father decided to make me one, so I took the examination when I was 17 and got a third-grade certificate. I procured a school near Black Springs and taught for \$20 per month. At the end of three months I entered school at Center Point, Howard County. As I came from school the following summer, I stopped in Pike county and contracted for the school where Daisy is now, though it was woods then. I was to get \$100. for three months. One day soon after the noon recess, a gentleman came to the door. He was red-headed, and I thought he was the superintendent. I kept thinking he would say I had better dismiss and take an examination, but he said nothing. He sat there the whole afternoon, seeming to enjoy everything. I saw him writing something, and when school closed he said, "You are getting on fine with your school." and handed me a folded paper; it was a second-grade certificate. He had moved me up a grade, without asking me a question.

I am relating my experience for the interest of young teachers now. I had arrived now, to the status of the present day high school student, except Latin. I was still a student.

My next school was a subscription school at Mount Ida. When that closed, the patrons gave me the free school for the summer, and Zara L. Cotton, who was then the county clerk and examiner, made me a present of a first-grade certificate. I taught three terms at Mount Ida and they gave me the fourth, but I resigned to take my home school at Caddo Gap. This was my last school. I became postmistress that summer. My father was assistant. The office had been kept at the Basinger store across the river and was called Centerville. That fall we got it changed to Caddo Gap, both in location and name. The next spring, May, 1878, I married James Dodd Cubage and turned my postoffice over to Ben Johnson, and went to live at Mount Ida. My school teaching days were over. I had taught five years and had taken only one examination.

In the few years at Caddo Gap, there had been a great change. When we first moved here there lived, where the town of Caddo Gap is situated, James Gamblin, who had married the widow of Elijah Tweedle; (Montgomery Co. Marriage Book A-28 lists James H. Gamblin, 47, to Harriett Tweedle, 40, 3 April 1866. Harriett is listed in 1860 census as wife of E. L. Tweedle.) Mrs. Gordon, a widow, who lived on the high hill west of the ford of Smith Creek, and owned the land south of the house; (The only Gordon listed in 1860 census was Geo., whose wife was Martha and they lived at Gap Twp.) W. A. Hopper, whose farm lay south and east of Collie's Creek and on the road to what is now Buttermilk Springs; Mrs. Collier, who lived on the farm near the springs and was the mother of Tom and Jack Collier. (1860 census lists Maria Collier in Gap Twp. with children, among whom are Thomas, age 4, and Jackson, age 1) On the other side of the creek from the Hopper farm was "Uncle Jeff" Collier. Duncan Merideth soon settled on the east side of Collier's creek, opposite the Silas Vaught

place. This was the neighborhood, including my father, Dr. Alfred Jones, who had bought the Smith place on Smith's creek. W. A. Hopper soon traded farms with J. H. West who lived on the south side of the Caddo several miles down the river from Caddo Gap. W. A. Hopper was the father of John F. Hopper of Caddo Gap, who married Martha Burke, daughter of the well-remembered Captain Burke of Civil war fame. John and Martha were the parents of Ira Hopper, a lieutenant in the World war, who spent the whole time in France, and on coming back was selected secretary of state. He is now a lawyer in Florida. His brother, Claude, is an electrical engineer.

David Basinger had a store on the south side of the river for many years. The Robins family, Macky, Owen, Julius and Jeff and Bob Gladden lived on the west side of the Caddo.

People were badly scattered but after we got the school spirit started, we were able to have a pretty good school. "Uncle Jeff" Collier had a large family, and he was always for school, and everything that was moral and uplifting.

My two sisters, Fanny and Mary, younger than myself, attended the university in 1876 - the first students from Montgomery county. They traveled there and back in a two-horse wagon. In '77 they took our brother Granville with them, renting rooms and keeping house.

Fanny has taught school 50 years in Arkansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Texas. She married William H. Highsmith (19 Oct. 1878, Bk. B-24) who also attended the university and who was county surveyor eight years. They were the parents of six children, their oldest son, R. A. Highsmith, is pastor of the Christian Church at Prescott.

Mary the other sister, married W. O. Diffie, one-time county judge of this county. Their youngest son, after finishing school at Texas Christian University, went abroad to study history spending one year in Spain, some time in France and England. Then he came back to New York, and has been on the faculty of New York City University for a few years. He goes abroad every summer, and has written a history of Puerto Rico.

Granville Jones married Alice Timms, step-daughter of William Hicks of Caddo Gap. One son, Yancy Jones, lives at Caddo Gap; another, Bailey at New Braunfels, Tex. Two daughters are in Texas, one by a second marriage, in Arkansas.

(Information underlined added from census and marriage records of Montgomery Co. by BJM)

## BOOK REVIEWS

This section contains reviews of books submitted to the Arkansas Genealogical Society, Inc., for notation in the *Arkansas Family Historian*; books reviewed may be seen in the Society's collection at the Little Rock Public Library.

THREADGILLS, BOOK II, compiled by Janis Heidenreich MILLER, assisted by Wordna THREADGILL WICKER, Gateway Press, Inc., Baltimore, 1963. 325 pages, hardback, indexed, \$35.00, postpaid from Janis H. Miller, P. O. Box 2245, Hudson, OH 44236.

This volume is an expanded update of a previous volume, Threadgills in America, published in 1971. It documents the descendants of Deodatus THRELKELD, b. 1657 in France, son of William and Thomasine THRELKELD: Deodatus later became an English watchmaker/clockmaker who m. #1 Hannah Anderson, m. #2 Margaret Ilderton, m. #3 Margaret Moore. By these wives, he had twelve children, one of whom, Deodatus II b. 1687, emigrated ca 1728 to Norfolk Co. VA. Ten generations of descendants are documented, but most efforts have gone into documentation of the pre-Civil War members of the family. The Arkansas Genealogical Society is most grateful to Ms. Miller for this gift to their library.

Medical Education in Arkansas, 1879-1978, by W. David BAIRD, Memphis State University Press, 1979. 505 pages, hardback, indexed, \$22.75 postpaid from UAMS Bookstore, 4301 W. Markham St., Little Rock, AR 72205.

This is a centennial history of the medical center of the University of Arkansas, written by Dr. BAIRD during his tenure as a faculty member in the History Department of the University at Fayetteville; he currently serves as Chairman of the History Department at Oklahoma State University. The book is much more than a narrow history of one institution—it is a story about individual leadership, of medical care in a tumultuous political setting, of a medical school that repeatedly was threatened with extinction. How it emerged through the years to become one of the uniquely strong Colleges of Medicine in America is the focus of Dr. Baird's analytic study. The book has won national acclaim for its broadly based scholarship and easy readability; it will be of most interest to members of AGS because in the Appendix there is a complete listing of the physician graduates and medical faculty members from the day the medical school opened in 1879. Other students and faculties are listed from the Graduate School (beginning 1945), the College of Pharmacy (beginning 1952), the College of Nursing (beginning 1953) and the College of Health Related Professions (beginning 1973). This gift book will be housed in the AGS collection at the Little Rock Public Library.

The Source: A Guidebook of American Genealogy, edited by Arlene EAKLE and Johni CERNY, published and sold by Ancestry Publishing Company, P. O. Box 476, Salt Lake City, UT 84110, published 1984. 786 pages, hardback, indexed, \$39.95 plus \$2.25 postage/handling charges.

This is a wonderful book that would be a worthy reference source for every genealogist's desk—whether just beginning, considerably advanced or professional. It begins with a general discussion of searching for family history and elaborates on those tools that merit particular attention or pose special problems. Thereafter the sources are listed in an organized fashion, with sections roughly graduated into complexity to correlate with beginning, intermediate and advanced skills in research.

The first section focuses on "home sources": family records, photographs, interviews, cemeteries, marriage sources, census records, and special lists of blacks, Indians and others that are available. The second section covers original data such as court records (e.g., civil, criminal, equity, probate), land and tax records, military records, prison/school/hospital records, and sources for extant genealogical lists/biographies/newspaper files. The third section covers immigration, overseas research, use of computers, handwriting analysis, lineage research, societies and the like.

The book would make a splendid birthday or Christmas gift for the dedicated family historian; its stiff price (less than expected for a book of this quality, however) means that many AGS members will want to study it in the Little Rock Public Library before deciding to make such an investment. If you DO get a copy of your own, read it -- don't use it as an encyclopedia or dictionary (for reference purposes only)--absorb it; it's designed for fireside reading, the bedside table, the long weekend at the beach...you'll be a better genealogist at the end of every chapter!

Cemetery Records of Lincoln County, Arkansas, published by the Lincoln County Extension Homemaker's Council, 1984. 400 pages, hardback, indexed, \$32.00 postpaid. Copies may be bought from Mrs. Neena BAUGH, Box 277, Yorktown, AR 71678.

Eighty six cemeteries were found in a countywide survey, plus many more that contained no legible markers. Simple line drawings have been made to indicate the location of the cemetery plots, and directions for travel have been carefully laid out. In addition, brief histories of the cemeteries have been provided wherever possible. The book is a most valuable source for anyone searching family members in Southeast Arkansas, and the AGS is proud to have such a volume in its library. Thanks so much to the ladies of the Extension Homemaker's Council for their prodigious efforts.

Cemetery Records: Arkansas County, Arkansas, published by the Arkansas County Extension Homemaker's Council, 1984. 335 pages, hardback, indexed, \$32.00 postpaid. Copies may be purchased from members of the Council at Rt. 1, 1009 Liberty Drive, DeWitt, AR 71041.

Arkansas County is the oldest in the state, established in 1813 as a part of the Missouri Territory, and it had white settlers at Arkansas Post as early as 1686. The latter was a thriving community in 1819 when the Arkansas Territory was formed, and was its capital city for a year until the government was moved to Little Rock. It is especially sad to see in these cemetery records, therefore, the end result of generations of decay and neglect. Additionally, the construction of permanent memorials as a tribute to their loved ones was not a custom of these early settlers. In a quick scan of the book and its cemeteries I found very few pre-Civil War markers; there was an 1854 stone for Richard D. OWEN in the Fish Cemetery and an 1822 stone for Joseph STILLWELL in the Stillwell Cemetery, but these are the rare ones (I could have missed others). It is our sincere misfortune to have so little left of the important embryonic period prior to statehood (1836). We nonetheless must be grateful to all those individuals who dedicated their evenings, holidays and weekends to preserving for the future what DOES still survive in this great historic county. Eighty seven cemeteries were found with definable headstones, and historical notes and cemetery locations are designated in the book.

Pope County, Arkansas. Historical Articles, Book 3, compiled by J. B. LEMLEY, 1120 N. Detroit Ave., Russellville, AR 72801, 1984. The book has a soft cover and consists of 193 pages of excerpts from the Russellville Courier-Democrat in 1906, indexed, \$15.00, postpaid from the author.

This is another interesting collage of information from the turn of the century which has been selected and edited by that remarkably dedicated historian, Mr. LEMLEY. The book starts with newspaper coverage of a massive fire that destroyed half of Russellville on Jan. 15, 1906. Then follows several pages of photocopier pictures (of poor quality, unfortunately) and descriptions of the major businesses/institutions in town, including a pontoon bridge across the Arkansas River. Several newspaper advertisements are included for local color. Murders, local crimes and court trials are covered in detail, and some nineteenth century historical events are reviewed (e.g., history of Pisgah Church and Cemetery, Pea Ridge battles during the Civil War). A curious insert is a 1967 questionnaire on Arkansas History, distributed by the Arkansas Historical Commission. All in all, this new volume is another valid piece of the mosaic that Mr. LEMLEY is drawing of Pope County heritage; it is presented to the AGS by the author and by Mrs. Elzine Weir CIA.

Since marriages often were not recorded promptly, there is a good bit of chronologic overlap in the different marriage volumes. The author has pulled from the original records all the pertinent information including full name and age of each of the marriage partners, name of the officiating person, and other comments as may have been present in the document. The AGS is pleased to have this material published and present in its library and it looks forward to future additions from Mr. DHONAU on this key Southeast Arkansas County.

Solomon Webber SHAW was born in 1825 in Christian Co. KY and there married Martha Jane HUBBARD. In the late 1850s the family moved to White Co. IL. At least three of his children by Martha came into Jackson County, Arkansas near the town of Grand Glaize: Thomas Alvin SHAW (1853-1908, never md.), Frances Hester SHAW (1859-1907, md. Lafayette GRAVES), and Mary Ellen SHAW (1862-1912, never md.). In 1867 Martha died and Solomon subsequently md. Eliza Jane REECE and had nine additional children, one of whom (James M. SHAW, 1887-1952) also moved to Jackson County, Arkansas.

This is a warm and informative narrative about some of these children and their offspring; the volume is filled with personal stories and family anecdotes, clearly a labor of love and a nice change of pace from the classical family histories which provide little more than names, dates and serial numbers. The members of AGS are pleased to have a copy for their library and hope that 'lost' members of the SHAW family still living in the state will learn of this delightful treatise and will be able to contact the authors.

It appears to be an excellent genealogy of this family in Germany, Kentucky, and Arkansas, with many interesting family details.

FULTON COUNTY  
TOWNS, POST OFFICES & EXPRESS OFFICES CIRCA 1885

By and act of the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, Fulton County was created on 21 December 1842, from territory taken from Izard and Lawrence Counties. In 1855, part of Fulton County was taken into Marion County, while also gaining territory from Lawrence County. In 1873, part of Baxter County was formed from Fulton County. Fire destroyed the Court House at Salem twice; once during the War Between the States, and a second fire occurred in 1870. [A list of Court House fires, compiled by Russell Baker, Archivist, Ark. History Commission, shows a fire taking place in 1877.] The following list was compiled from the 1880 Census, an Atlas ca 1884/5, and maps of the same period.
