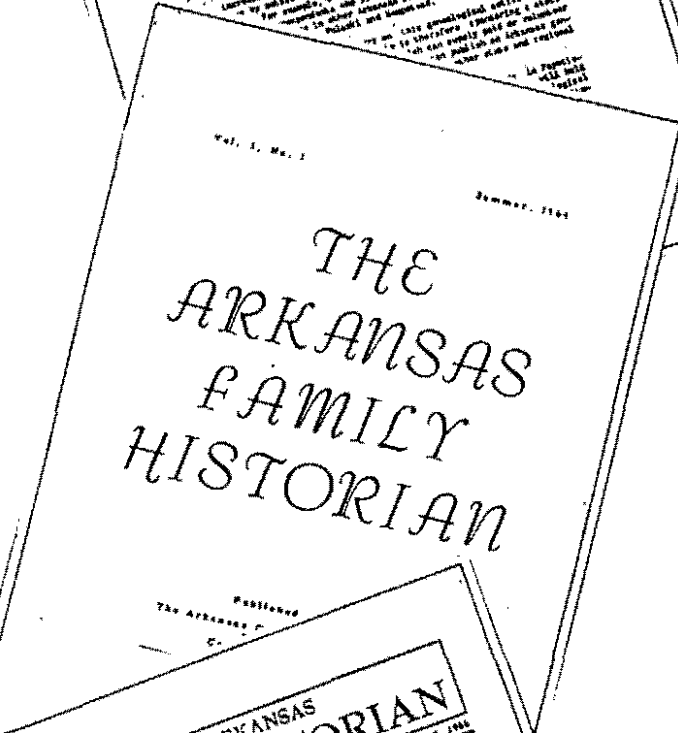

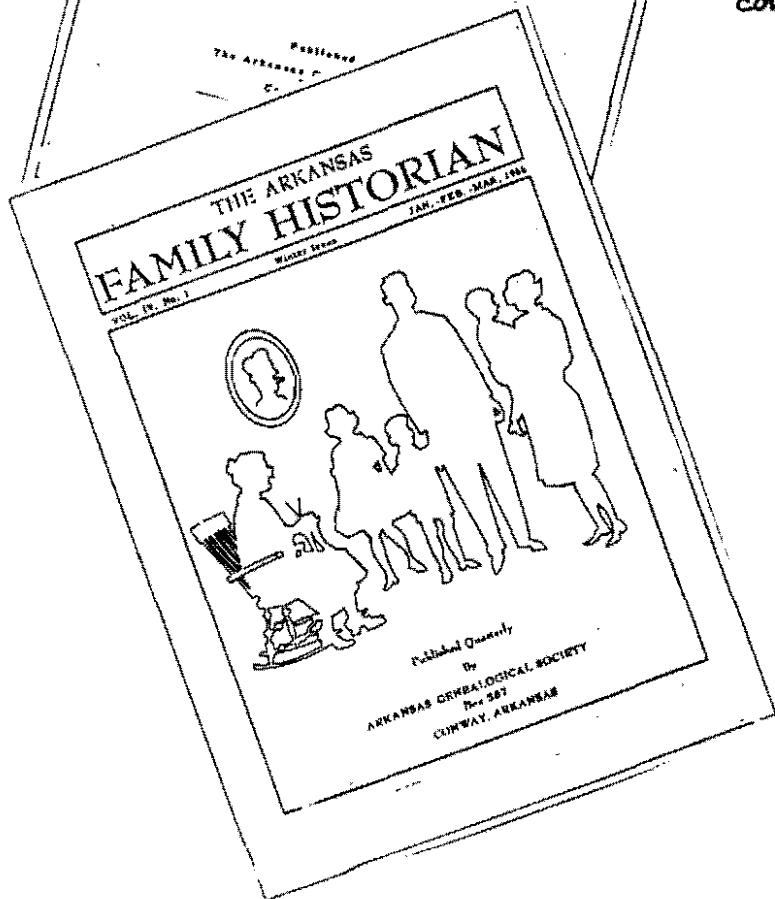

AROUND ARKANSAS

Flashback Vol. 35, No.1, published by the Washington County Historical Society, 118 East Dickson Street, Fayetteville, AR 72701, contained a collection of photographs of the Phelan family and articles on the Greggs and Newtons. Of historical interest, are articles on the old Cane Hill College, and the communities of Winslow and Springdale.

The Northwest Arkansas Genealogical Society, PO Box K, Rogers, AR 75757, publishes The Backtracker, which covers the counties of Benton, Carroll, Madison, and Washington. The current issue contains information on early officials of Carroll county, Benton county 1890 tax lists, and information on the war Claims Agency, Fayetteville, Arkansas. Madison county researchers will be interested in the land patents printed in this issue.

Sons of Confederate Veterans have announced the formation of the Arkansas Division. The only requirements for membership are a Confederate ancestor and "a love of the South." Lawrence D. Rhodes, 534 Mockingbird, #211, El Dorado, AR 71730, Brigade Commander for Arkansas, will be most happy to supply you with further information on the organization. [An SASE would be appreciated!]

The Johnson County Historical Society, PO Box 505, Clarksville, AR 72830, needs information on Confederate and Union soldiers buried in the county. Many of the marked graves have been located, but many of these men are buried in either unmarked graves, or the family markers do not indicate their military service. The society is also searching for church records which are held in private hands. Hopefully, there are some AGS members who can help with both of these worthwhile projects.

Due to an error in printing of the return address on the last issue of Researchin' Ouachita-Calhoun Counties, AR., we published an incorrect address for the society in our March issue. The correct address for the Ouachita-Calhoun Genealogical Society, is PO Box 2092, Camden, AR 71701.

The Journal of The Hempstead County Historical Society, Vol. IX, No. 1, published by the Hempstead County Historical Society, PO Box 1257, Hope, AR 71801, is devoted to "Seats of Justice 1819-1985". Fascinating articles, complimented with photographs, were contributed by Mary Medearis, Don Montgomery, and Mary Nell Turner.

Madison County Musings, Vol. IV, No. 1 contains a collection of genealogical data gleaned from a newspaper, The St. Paul Republican. Also featured are a register of claims against estates (1856-1893) and Descendants of William Campbell Montgomery and Amanda Berry, continued from the Winter 1984 issue. COMPUTERIZED GENEALOGY

If you are like most active genealogists, you probably have pages and pages and pages of handwritten notes that are in an order that only you can figure out. If you are like me, you have rarely typed up any of these notes for fear that a letter would arrive that contained much needed information that fit in the middle of a page that had just been typed last week. Therefore, the notes continue to be a jumbled mess forever. However, there is finally hope for "organization."

The computer age, finally affordable for most of us, has recently reached my home. I have a Commodore 64 with two disk drives and a Gemini printer.

There are several genealogy programs on the market. After reviewing most of them, I purchased "Family Roots" by Quinsept, Inc. It costs an unbelievable \$185, but is worth every cent. The program was written by Steve Vorenberg, who is not only a computer programmer, but a genealogist, as well. The program permits me to put all of my records into my computer with the exception of census records. The program will print all the common types of charts and sheets. One of the best things about the program is its ability to "complement" from one record to another. For example, if the record of one individual is edited to include a newly found marriage date it will add that date automatically to the spouse's record. With "Family Roots" there is a great deal of flexibility on exactly how you can keep your records. For example, it permits four different ways of recording and printing dates, whichever way you prefer to set it up.

The cheaper programs will not permit storage of as much information and they usually will only print one type of chart. Even without a specialized genealogy program, a computer can be a substantial benefit. Letters, stories, and some charts can be created and saved with a computer's word processing capabilities. These can be retrieved and edited relatively simply. Keeping copies of letters sent to other researchers is now a breeze. A good data base program can be used to keep an index of the records that are located in notebooks or files. Also, a data base can be used to store census records.

Those family members not interested in genealogy will also get enjoyment from the many other uses for the computer. A popular brand computer is the best buy because it will have lots of different types of programs available for it.

Take note that it took weeks to master the computer and then a few more weeks to figure out how to use it for my favorite hobby, genealogy. However, a computer permits rapid retrieval of information, whether it be of names, dates, places, or lists of children. It must be understood that the "rapid" can start only after much time and effort has been spent entering data into the computer. But, after it is in, it is fantastic! Now it seems impractical that I have been collecting genealogical data for so many years without the assistance of a computer.

As complicated as my records have become, any help and hope for them is welcome. My computer is helping to simplify genealogy and make my files manageable, in a way that I had only dreamed about.

James Autry, born ca. 1827 in Tennessee was one of at least seven children (probably more) of William (born ca. 1797 in North Carolina) and Mary ?, (born ca. 1806 in Tennessee). He married Susan E. ? (Barnett/Burnett ?) (born 1835 in Tennessee). A boy named Levi Burnett/Barnett was living with the family according to the 1860 Obion Co., Tenn. census. He might have been the brother of Susan. The family lived in Obion and Lake Counties of Tenn. from 1849 to ca. 1876. Susan evidently died ca. 1868, probably in Obion Co., Tenn. James then remarried a Rebecca ? (born 1849 in Tenn.) and moved his family to Arkansas, residing in Lafave Twp., Scott Co. as of the 1880 census. Have been unable to locate, or find information on, James or Rebecca after 1880.

The following material was contributed by new member Norma Calkins Harger, 517 Berkley, Ann Arbor, MI 48103, who states this cemetery was not included in the compilation of Franklin County cemetery inscriptions done several years ago under the auspices of the County Extension Service office in Ozark or kept in that office and microfilmed. She states: "In a roundabout way, our family happened to hear of a Harger stone in a 'remote' little cemetery and went to have a look. My husband's parents live in Paris, Logan County, and so we visit them as often as possible.) Although there are few names on the gravestones, it was certainly a wonderful discovery for us!"

Inscriptions copied 14 April 1984. The burying ground is located in a brushy, lightly-wooded area at a considerable distance from any present-day road. It is in the vicinity of the towns of Alix and Denning, on property now owned by a Mitchell family.

Farewell/Alfred/Husband of/ Elizabeth Harger/Born/May 30, 1826/Died/June 4, 1872*

Farewell my wife and children all
From you a father, Christ doth call.
Mourn not for me, it is vain
To call me to your sight again.

(This stone is loose from its base and is broken horizontally just below the "May 30, 1826" line. It would have been about three feet in height in undamaged condition.)

J. H. Roberts/Born/Mar 27, 1812/Died Jan 20, 1885 Masonic emblem carved
at the top.

J. A. Stewart (No dates. This is a smaller stone than the two above and
appears to be a "homemade" one.)

Four small, homemade markers in a wide-spaced row:

M.J.A. L.E.B. J.M. J.B.

(The L.E.B. stone seems to have had another letter carved in place of the "B" at first; however, "B" is surely the final result.)

Another small, homemade stone a distance away from all the others: N A C
(The "N" is backwards but is readable as such.)

There is a fairly large, square area set off by sizeable natural fieldstones placed into the ground, obviously marking the burial site of a family or another group of people. No inscribed stones are to be found. It is said that Civil War casualties may be buried in the plot, or possibly several victims of a smallpox epidemic. These stories come from older residents of the area at the present time. Vandals have moved many of the fieldstones and left this part of the little cemetery in disarray.

Harold and Norma (Calkins) Harger Marvin and Maxine (Blake) Harger

*Alfred Harger, great-grandfather of Harold and Marvin, was born in Allegheny County, Pennsylvania, a son of John and Peggy (McKean/McCain) Harger. Emigrated with his parents, brothers and sisters to Warrick County, Indiana, in 1834 or 1835; and between 1866 and 1868 settled in Franklin County, Arkansas. Probate documents on file at the courthouse in Ozark show his date of death as June 4, 1871.

Alfred's widow was Elizabeth (Sturgeon) Cannon Harger b. 1827. Her first marriage was to Edward Cannon in Kentucky, probably Hart County, ca 1844, or 1845. Alfred and Elizabeth were married in Warrick County, Indiana, on 11 May 1861, a second marriage for each. Alfred's first wife was Nancy Ball. Perhaps Elizabeth's grave is near her husband's, although no stone is to be seen there. She died after March 1888. The date of her death has not been found.

Camp Pike is now known as Camp Robinson. Her father, Marvin Tee Terrell, son of Martha Ann Phillips and John Washington Terrell, was born 22 Dec. 1894 at DeRoche, Hot Spring County, Arkansas, died 9 Oct. 1961.

The last three names on the list were handwritten at the end of the page. It is unusual in that it was prepared with no punctuation other than periods; for instance, the first listing is actually shown as:

Allen.Herman. Pvt. Searcy.Ark.

Perhaps it was a defective typewriter; perhaps it was intended for security. Whatever the reason, it was different.

FURTHER NOTES ON THE REV. STEPHEN P. FARISH OF SARDIS,
CONWAY CO., ARKANSAS

By Marcus M. Key, Houston, Texas,

Stephen Farish, Ozark, Alabama

Since the publication of "The Rev. Stephen P. Farish of Sardis, Conway Co., Arkansas" in The Arkansas Family Historian in 1981,¹ additional family records have been discovered and further research has been done, which provide new insights into Farish family history in Alabama and Arkansas, as follows:

(1) Stephen Farish's middle name was Philip--traditional.²

(2) Stephen Farish's mother, Eliza P. Farish, was probably christened Elizabeth, which is how her father referred to her in 1824³ and how a witness to her will referred to her in 1839.⁴ However, she usually went by the name of Eliza, a familiar form of Elizabeth. Her father, George Grissell of Greene Co., Ala., and Warren Co., Miss.,⁵ is believed to have been descended from George Grissell of Chesterfield Co., Va., who died in 1760.⁶ The Grissell name has been variously spelled as Grizzel, Grizell, Grizzle, etc. In 1836 Eliza P. Farish bought 80 acres in Sumter Co.,⁷ situated near her son George W. Farish⁸ and the old town of Gaston.⁹ She died August 6, 1839, in Sumter Co., where her nuncupative will is recorded.⁴ Her son George W. Farish served as Executor, and Stephen shared in the distribution of his mother's estate.¹⁰

(3) Stephen Farish grew up in Greene Co., Ala., where (a) Elizabeth Faris[h] and her children were given slaves by her father in 1824;³ (b) the children of Robert S. Farish were given slaves by their uncle George B. Farish, of Caroline Co., Va., in 1828;¹¹ (c) the Robert Pharish family was enumerated in the 1830 Census with ten children and three slaves;¹² and (d) Robert S. Farish died in 1834.¹³ There is a record of an unclaimed letter to Robert Farish at the Erie, Ala., Post Office in 1836,¹⁴ which probably indicates that the Farishes lived in the vicinity of Old Erie, the first county seat (1819-1839) of Greene Co., and now in Hale Co. Yellow fever and floods adversely affected the town in the 1830s, and many of the early settlers moved to Sumter Co., which had been created in 1832 from former Choctaw Indian land. Whitehead and "Phares" were identified as early families of Old Erie.¹⁵ Stephen probably married Elizabeth Whitehead, his first wife, in Greene or Sumter Co., which are adjoining counties in Alabama's prosperous Black Belt. In Alabama, the families of the Black Belt counties are said to have epitomized the aristocracy of the Old South, corresponding to the Low Country of South Carolina and the Tidewater in Virginia.¹⁶

(4) Emiline T. Vincent, Stephen P. Farish's second wife, who is known to have been born in 1814 in North Carolina¹⁷ of parents who were natives of that State,¹⁸ is believed to have been the daughter of the Rev. John Merritt Vincent of Granville Co., N.C., and Autauga Co., Ala., and his wife Polly White, whom he married March 20, 1811, in Granville Co., N.C.¹⁹ This is based on circumstantial evidence--clues pointing to Granville Co. and the expected profile of Emiline's parents. The names Dyton

and Granville are suggestive of an origin in Granville Co., N.C. These were names, respectively, of a son and grandson of Emiline--the latter named while she was living with her youngest son. The Dyton, White, and Vincent families of Granville Co., N.C., appear to have been related, in that Henry White married Sarah Dyton and had a daughter Polly who married a Vincent.²⁰ The Polly White who married John M. Vincent was probably a granddaughter of Henry and Sarah (Dyton) White--she was too young to have been the Polly Vincent mentioned in Henry White's will (written 1799, proved 1802).²⁰ The profile of characteristics expected of Emiline's parents agrees with what is known about the Rev. John M. and Polly (White) Vincent. They were the parents of a 15-20 year-old, white female in the 1830 Census for Granville Co., N.C.²¹ The 1850 Census for Autauga Co., Ala., indicates that John M. Vincent was a minister and was born in N.C., ca. 1785, and his wife Polly was also born in N.C., ca. 1788.²² Polly Vincent died June 15, 1853, and according to her obituary, she was the wife of Rev. John Vincent of Wetumpka, Ala., was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and left sons and daughters.²³ Emiline was probably one of the daughters, and as such, it is certainly plausible for her to have known an aspiring young Methodist minister in Arkansas, who had just moved there from Alabama and lost his wife. Stephen's older brother Hazelwood may also have played a role; he was a Methodist minister in Wilcox Co., Ala.²⁴

I had no time to gow to see any of them when I was up thare Miss Barnes is very much dissatisfide with this country She started this morning her and Bob both back to Nashville. She told me when she started that she was not a coming back anymore if she does not its likley I shall be up thare in the spring if I don't come in the spring I will be up thare in the fall give my bes respects to all inquiring fendes tell Brother tom that I am a gowing to bring him a little young bear if I can get one this winter I spoke to old man hugings for one he is a old bear hunter he says if he catches any young ones this he will let have them & I will bring them with me when I come tell the old man I will bring him some bar meat when I come & some venesson I want you to be ready to gow with me to Cancies you & gus

During the Civil War a hospital was located at Okolona, Mississippi. The Rose Gates College Buildings were utilized as the main body of this hospital. The Presbyterian, Baptist, Methodist Churches, also the Female Seminary were converted into hospital wards. Many of the wounded from the battles of Shiloh, Corinth and Brice's Cross Roads were sent to Okolona, and the following list of the dead buried there has been carefully preserved.

This Roll was presented by Mrs. Oscar Denton, in the name of the Okolona U.D.C., at the Convention in New Orleans, in November 1902, calling the attention of that body to the number and names of states represented there. A motion was made and carried that these names be sent to Division Presidents, thereby giving them an opportunity to let their Chapters know the names of the dead, and to assist, if they so desire, the Okolona Chapter U.D.C. in the erection of a monument sacred to the memory of the Confederate dead:

HENRY W. MOSES FAMILY OF HEMPSTEAD COUNTY

Henry W. Moses and wife Susan C. Raleigh, were one of the pioneer families of Hempstead County. An interesting note on this family is the claim that Susan C. Raleigh, daughter of John Raleigh of North Carolina, was a great grand daughter of Sir Walter Raleigh, the North American Explorer. The following material was sent by Edison D. Jeffus, 1211 Fountain View Drive, Houston, Texas 77057.

The earliest identified person in this family is Samuel S. Moses, who died in Alabama in 1846. He was the father of Henry W. Moses. Henry was born 1831 in Alabama and came to Arkansas in 1856. He served in the Confederate Army from May 13, 1862 to May 2, 1865. He died in 1920 near Hope, Arkansas and was buried in the Huckabee Cemetery, located 7 miles southwest of Hope. On June 26, 1854, he married Susan C. Raleigh. She was born in 1835 and died in 1919. She was also buried in the Huckabee Cemetery.

MAYOR STANFORD'S WIFE FOUND DEAD

PINE BLUFF, Jan. 7. - Last night Mayor R.H. Stanford went home from his office, and finding his room locked, broke open the door and found his wife lying upon the hearth. Mrs. Stanford was a daughter of Mr. O.M. Spellman, of Arkansas county, and was universally loved for her many graces of mind and person. She had been an invalid for two years, and it was thought her death was the result of an overdose of some noxious drug, and was accidental. [Daily Arkansas Gazette, Thursday, Jan. 8, 1885]

THE JACOB WAGGONER FAMILY

Certainly, the JACOB WAGGONER story would be of interest, if there were anyone alive that would have provided some guidance or Bible Records on this family, but since the story is built by documentary evidence, help is needed badly.

JACOB WAGGONER was born in Virginia in 1773 (possibly in Russell County, located in the Southwest tip of Virginia). It is believed that he had a brother, JOHN WAGGONER.

The earliest records show JACOB WAGGONER in New Madrid Co., MO "as early as 1801". He held a French/Spanish Land Grant for 200 Arpens (acres) of land in the Pemiscot District of that County. By 1803, he is shown as having a wife and one child.

Land records received to date, indicated that the Commissioners set up to prove or disapprove the French/Spanish Land Claims after the Louisiana Purchase, did, in fact disapprove his land claim. Records held in Missouri indicate that many that were denied land held and occupied by them were later given that land as late as 1860.

Sons of JACOB WAGGONER that have been proven were JOHN WAGGONER, b. 1804, New Madrid, MO; JAMES WAGGONER, b. 1806, New Madrid, MO; and WILLIAM WAGGONER, b. 1808 in New Madrid, MO.

ROBERT/RICHARD G. WAGGONER, b. 1802-3 New Madrid Co., MO., died and Will probated 14 Nov. 1843, is also believed to be his son. His will, which showed him as Robert G. Waggoner in Missouri Pioneers, Vol. XI (1971), pp. 318-319, read: ROBERT G. WAGGONER died intestate. Admrs., ZELIA WAGGONER. Sec., Samuel W. Allen & Wm. S. Moseley., 14 Nov. 1843. Left widow, Zelia Waggoner and five children: JAMES O. WAGGONER; VIRGINIA WAGGONER; BELOM WAGGONER; FRANKLIN WAGGONER; & EDMUND WAGGONER, all residing in New Madrid Co., MO. He is listed in both the 1830 and 1840 Census' as Richard G. WAGGENER.

To date, only two documents have indicated what his wife's name might have been. One was on his son, Williams's Marriage Application, which gave her name as LIDIE BEREU, or something similar to that. On one document, she was later listed as LIDIA WAGGONER. Nothing else is known about the wife of JACOB WAGGONER.

From 30 October 1812 to 2 December 1812, JACOB WAGGONER served as Private in the War of 1812. He was a volunteer in the Company commanded by Captain Samuel Philips in the Missouri Regiment of Volunteers, commanded by Colonel Hart. On 17 February 1814, Jacob drew up a Power of Attorney to John Shrader, Esquire "to receive and give receipt in my name for the pay that may be due to me as Private in the company of

Mounted Riflemen, commanded by Captain Samuel Phillips for a tower of duty rendered in the months of October, November and December in the year 1812".

Prior to this time, he lived near the Mississippi River. The devastating and massive New Madrid earthquake occurred at 2:30 A.M. Dec. 16, 1811, with a magnitude of 8.6 on the Richter scale; the second, on Jan. 23, 1812 of 8.4 magnitude; the third and biggest, on Feb. 7, 1812, measured 8.7 to 8.8. Chimneys toppled and thick stone walls cracked in St. Louis, Louisville, and Cincinnati - the latter city 400 miles from the quake center. There was utter devastation in an area along the New Madrid fault, about 150 miles long and 50 miles wide. The earthquake changed the structure of mountains and streams and rerouted the Mississippi River. Needless to say, much of New Madrid Co., MO washed down the river.

Research on the JACOB WAGGONER family actually started in Louisiana, because my Grandmother, Susan Catherine (Waggoner) Douglass' Death Certificate stated that she was born in New Iberia, LA on 22 October, 1859. The research proved futile because no one knew what her mother and father's names were, and the microfilm was so dim, most of it was unreadable. I had one other lead...that some of Susan's brothers and sisters lived somewhere along the OK/AR border. Needless to say, after some two years of researching every county along the border, and other Counties east of the AR border, I located JAMES & EMILY WAGGONER. After advertising in a Baton Rouge, LA newspaper, I came in contact with a descendant of WILLIAM WAGGONER, brother to James, and through his help, and by viewing several copies of microfilm, did locate the family in New Iberia in 1860.

Back to JACOB. The next record I found of him was that he and his sons were listed in 1829 Tax Lists for the years 1821-1829. This was JACOB, JOHN, and JAMES. I do not have records to prove it, but I have read that persons losing their land during the New Madrid Earthquake, were given Land Grants in other parts of THEN Missouri Territory (including what later became Territory of Arkansas, and still later, state of Arkansas). I do not know whether this was the case or not. Jacob and sons were living in Lafayette Co., La Grange Twp., as it was later known. This area is located close to the Arkansas/Louisiana border. Eventually, WILLIAM and JAMES WAGGONER moved to Louisiana, living in Jeanerette, New Iberia, St. Martinville, & Lafayette, LA areas.

WILLIAM WASHINGTON WAGGONER married Carmelite BROUSARD on 11 February 1839. They had four children, two died early. She died in Franklin County, leaving property and slaves to William and two children, JACOB O. and CAROLINE M. WAGGONER. By 1850, William had married ELIZABETH STINE, and had two more children.

For some unknown reason, William and family, and James

Waggoner left Louisiana, and moved to Polk County., AR. The Polk Co., AR Census shows JAMES WAGGONER, b. 1806 MO, married to EMILY WAGGONER, b. 5 November 1835 in AR. After further research, I found Emily's maiden name to be Mc Cravens, daughter of BENJAMIN F. and ANNA McCRAVENS, b. MO 1818. Benjamin F. McCravens was the son of JOSPEH and REBECCA McCRAVENS, both born in South Carolina, b. 1781 and 1785, respectively. Records show that Joseph and Rebecca McCravens lived in SC, TN, KY, IN. There is a possibility that they may have also lived in Missouri, and knew the WAGGONER family in Missouri. Joseph McCravens and family were in Hempstead Co. (which later became Sevier Co., AR) prior to 1828.

After JAMES & EMILY WAGGONER married, ca 1848, they had 5 children; William, Jenny, Jmes H., Mary Ann, and Sarah E. Waggoner. In 1858, they moved to New Iberia, LA and had Susan Catherine, Robert Hilliard, and Lucy V. One more daughter, Martha I. Waggoner was born ca 1865 back in Polk Co., AR.

I was told by an uncle, that JAMES WAGGONER was blind, and that he fell from a wagon, striking his head, and died shortly thereafter. I do not know whether this happened in LA or AR, but it apparently happened ca 1865.

EMILY WAGGONER and family remained in the same area, but in 1873, that part of Polk County became Howard County. Her son, James H. Waggoner died 6 April 1874 and is buried in the Brown Cemetery near Umpire Twp., Howard County, AR. Emily died 12 October, 1894, and is buried in Mineola Cemetery, near Umpire Twp., Howard County.

WILLIAM W. WAGGONER had a total of 13 children by his two wives. He died in New Iberia in 1869. He Succession (Will) was dated 28 September 1869. William was a very wealthy planter in the New Iberia LA area.

Little is known about JOHN WAGGONER, b. 1804, New Madrid Co., MO. What research I have done has not been typed up for record purposes. I do know that JACOB lived with John and his family for many years, possibly 15-20. I have not yet found when JACOB WAGGONER died. The last record I found, he was 87 years old.

John Waggoner married Jane ??? b. 1806 in NC, ca 1824-5 in AR. They had possibly as many as 12 children. Caroline M., Henry, Jacob, William, James, Sarah E., Mary Ann C., Eliza J. or I., and Virginia, all born between 1826 and 1846.

In closing, I am presently researching a MARY ANN WAGGONER that could possibly be a sister to John, James, and William. Female names have shown up in several of the families, such as Caroline, Mary Ann, Martha, and Sarah, and I feel sure that these names may have been passed down from some of JACOB'S and

LIDIE'S daughters.

I am desperately searching for any descendants of JACOB WAGGONER as described. Any help would be most appreciated. I would also desire that a plea be made to anyone knowing of any person either named McCRAVENS or have ancestors named McCREAVENS, McCARVINS to contact me. Benjamin F. McCrevens wife Anna, b. MO 1818 died in 1859 of Child Bed Fever, having her twelfth child. He remarried Hannah, b. ca 1842, and they had nine more children. To date, I have not been able to locate one descendant.

Joseph Mc CRAVEN b. 1781 in SC, married Rebecca _____, b.
SC 1785. He resided in Hempstead Co., AR prior to 1828, but

lived in Sevier Co., AR when Hempstead County was divided into eleven counties in 1828. He was appointed Justice of the Peace in 1828. He and his wife lived in Sevier County until their deaths, ca 1851.

His known children were: Benjamin F(ranklin) Mc Cravens, b. 1812 in KY; Amelia McCraven, b. 1813 in TN; Elvira McCraven b. ???, married Edward GRAHAM on 26 December 1841. They had a son Benjamin Graham b. 1844. Elvira possibly died prior to 1850. Lucinda Orlean McCraven b. 1825, married Gideon JAMES on 2 April 1843. They had several children and she probably died before 1860. It is believed tha they had more children than I have been able to trace.

Benjamin F(ranklin) Mc CRAVEN b. 1812 KY, married #1 Anna, b. 1818 in MO. They married ca 1834 in AR. Their children were Emily b. 5 Nov. 1835; Rebecca b. ca 1837; Henry b. ca 1839; Henriet b. ca 1841; Margaret b. ca 1844 [all these b. in Sevier Co.]; Eliza b. ca 1846; Catherine b. ca 1848 (not clear on census); Martha Ann b. 1857 in Polk Co., AR. His wife Anna died Aug 1859 of Child Bed Fever.

Benjamin married #2 Hannah b. 1845 in AR. They had Angaline (Might be Elizabeth A.) b. ca 1864; Alfred b. ca 1866; Caroline b. ca 1869; Levi b. ca 1870; Adaline b. ca 1873; John H. b. ca 1874; Amanda L. b. ca 1878; and James b. ca 1879. LETTER FROM THE BROWNVILLE RIFLE GUARDS
In Camp Near Gainsville, Ark., July 6, 1861

EDITOR CITIZEN: Nothing of interest transpired on our trip from Des Arc to Pocahontas. The latter place we found to be a hill-side town, distinguished mainly for high prices and mean whiskey. We may here remark that it is an absolute outrage, and one for which the public indignation should be severe, for merchants to raise the prices of goods simply because they are needed by the soldiers. We know of several instances of this kind but shall not now particularize.

The two companies from Prairie left Pocahontas on the 24th of June, and arrived at Gainsville on the evening of the 26th after a most fatiguing march of more than two days. The route, for a great portion of the way, was through Cache river bottom, and the mud and water made the trip one long to be remembered.

The election for regimental officers, for this, the 5th Regiment of Arkansas Volunteers, transpired on Friday the 28 ult., and resulted as follows: Col. D.C. Cross; Lieut. Col. B.F. Sweeny; and Major Pope. The election of Col. Cross caused dissatisfaction among some of the companies who preferred the elevation of another gentleman to that position. Believing that they sincerely regret their course in the premises we forbear mentioning their names. The Col. elect has not yet arrived and we are consequently enabled to judge him only by report. His high position in life, and the testimonials of his friends induce the conclusion that the selection has been a wise one.

Lieut. Col. Sweeney is a gentleman of commanding personal appearance, and is eminently qualified for the position [sic] to which he is elected. In the absence of the Colonel he has taken charge of the Regiment.

The two companies from your county have had some sickness in their ranks, but no case however, of a serious nature. The men generally are cheerful and contented, and perform their duties, even when severe, with the utmost alacrity. The Regiment will probably remain here for some time yet, and friends desirous of writing to members of our company may direct to Gainsville.

Enclosed you will find an accurate roll of the officers and members of the "Brownsville Rifle Guards" which you will be kind enough to insert.

Des Arc Citizen - Saturday, July 20, 1861

The following advice for those who were about to report for duty in the army, was printed the column beside the roster and letter from the Brownsville Rifle Guards. The text is printed, complete with "typos", as it appeared in the Des Arc Citizen.

Volunteers must bear in mind that the Confederate Government does not furnish clothing when they first enter the service, but commutation therefor in money. Every volought, when mustered in, for his own comfort and health, to be sufficiently provided with articles of uniform and dress, to meet his immediate wants, and for the probable necessities of at least three months.

It is there for recommended that each volunteer will, as far as practicable, present himself at the rendezous, where he is to be mustered into the service of the Confederacy, provided with the following articles of uniform and dress, viz:

- 1 coat or jacket, as may be the uniform
- 2 Pairs of Trousers
- 1 Forage or Fatigue cap
- 2 Flannel Shirts
- 2 Pair Drawers
- 3 " Socks, woolen or cotton, woolen best
- 2 " Bootes, Ankle of Jefferson, or Brogans, with full broad soles, and low flat broad heels
- 2 Colored pocket handkerchiefs
- 1 Light black neck tie
- 1 Comb
- 1 Strong pocket knife
- 1 Small tin cup
- 1 Iron Spoon
- 1 Knife and 1 Fork

DIED - At Crystal Hill, on the 13th inst. Miss Nancy Hogan, aged about 11 years, daughter of Gen. Edmund Hogan. (Arkansas Gazette, January 27, 1824)

DIED - In this township, at the residence of his son, Maj. Samuel H. Hinkson, on Sunday evening last, Mr. Rob't Hinkson, late of Missouri, aged 68 years.

At Washington, Hempstead county, A.T., on the 5th day of December, 1834, Maj. Samuel H. Davis, one of the oldest settlers in that part of the Territory. Maj. Davis was born and raised in the State of Kentucky, and, for several years previous to his emigration to Arkansas, resided in the State of Missouri. Hempstead county, perhaps, could not have lost a more valuable citizen. He was a highly respectable gentleman, a useful, and ingenious mechanic, an affectionate husband and father, and a generous and devoted friend. The citizens of Hempstead county, to most of whom he was well known, unite with his bereaved widow and orphaned children in deploring his untimely death. (Arkansas Gazette, December 23, 1834)

The Hall Family of Kentucky and Texas by Roy Marland Hall, believed published ca 1984, hardback, 174 pages including index, book available in libraries only and not for sale.

David HALL b. 1775-9 in NC or VA, m. in 1800 in Mercer Co. KY the widow, Elizabeth (RUBLE) HALE b. ca 1767 Henry Co. VA. They had three children: Theodosia (DeHAVEN), Elizabeth (?POOL) and Jesse. This book focuses primarily on the descendants of Jesse HALL b. ca 1804, who moved to Ohio, Grayson and Meade Counties KY before settling in 1847 in Titus (later Morris) Co. TX. Some of the major connected families are RUBLE, HOGE, RUTHERFORD, DUNCAN, ROUNTREE, ALLEN, BURKHEAD, CARRIGAN, CLARK, TANKERSLEY and HALBROOK. The book is replete with wonderful family pictures and biographical data of the family members.

Waters Family of Maryland & Virginia by Gladys E. (BELK) SMITH, published 'ca 1984, softback, 73 pages plus Index insert, \$10.00 postpaid from the author, 906 Thousand Oaks Dr., Virginia Beach VA 23454.

Edward WATERS b. 1584 England, m. before 1622, in Virginia, Grace O'NEILL b. 1603. They had at least two children; Margaret and William, the latter inheriting his parent's land in Northhampton Co. VA. This book delineates the progeny of William WATERS and contains liberal quotations from courthouse records to document the official footprints of the family members.

Brown and Related Families: North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Maryland by Gladys E. (BELK) SMITH, 906 Thousand Oaks Dr., Virginia Beach VA 23454, publ. 1975, softback, 40 pages plus index, price not known.

These are miscellaneous BROWN family notes extracted from Bible records, marriage bonds, published excerpts, cemetery lists, church registers, court files, pension applications, etc. in the listed states. There is no attempt to concentrate on particular BROWN lines, and therefore this reference sourcebook will be of interest to all with this rather common surname. This is not a comprehensive listing of BROWNS in the four states, but rather appears to be the incidental findings uncovered during other genealogical studies.

Histoire du Patronyme Welde(n) by Armand Vanwelde, publ. ca 1984, softback, 45 pages, not indexed, available in library only, untranslated from the original French.

Monsieur v. Welde has written of the legends and records of the WELDE(N) family, originating in Bavaria and with broad representation in Belgium. The last half of the manuscript provides brief accounts of family descendants in the U.S.A. The author is a member of the Belgian and Dutch Genealogical Research Societies.

Mississippi Terry Records, compiled by Robert M. Terry, Box 1531, Enid OK 73702, softback, 47 pages, indexed, \$5.00.

This is a collage of TERRY surnames appearing in available Mississippi census records, 1810 to 1860, and including a list of registered TERRY marriages in Mississippi to 1920. The publication is under the auspices of the Terry Family Historian and will be an indispensable research aid for persons with TERRY family ties. There are even some early Natchez (Spanish Territory) records of TERRYs dating back to 1769!

The 1880 Soundex for Texas Terry Families: Including Terry Marriages to 1920, compiled by Robert M. Terry, Box 1531, Enid OK 73702, softback, 55 pages, indexed, \$6.00.

This is another project of the Terry Family Historian, and represents an important reference document since many primary records for TERRYs who died between 1880 and 1900 are not available. (Readers will recall that Mr. Terry has previously donated the Texas TERRY 1900 Soundex to our library, and that it sells for \$8.00).

1890 Faulkner County, Arkansas, Personal Property Tax Book, compiled by Desmond WALLS ALLEN, P.O. Box 303, Conway AR 72032, publ. 1984, softback, 56 pages, \$8.00.

Ms. Allen has initiated a project which will be the major goal of the Arkansas Genealogical Society in honor of the 1986 state Sesquicentennial Celebration, i.e. the construction of the missing 1890 Federal census for Arkansas from the individual county tax records. This volume contains a transcript, arranged alphabetically by surname, of all the listings in the 1890 Personal Property Tax Book in Faulkner County (county seat, Conway). The township of residence and race is recorded, but items on which the tax was based (the number of mules, horses, cows, etc.) have been omitted, although the information is available in the original records. Ms. Allen is to be congratulated on such a fine and laborious achievement!

My Folks: Pritchard, Vaught, Beasley, Sargent, by Thelma P. Sargent, 518 No. Olive Dr., Mesa AZ 85203, leatherette covers, 353 pages, indexed, \$20.00, publ. 1984.

Mrs. Sargent writes interestingly and provides solid genealogical information about her maternal (VAUGHT) and paternal (PRITCHARD) lines, plus those of her first (BEASLEY) and second (SARGENT) husbands.

Joshua FRITCHARD b. 1782 SC m. Millie TIPPEN b. 1784 SC and lived in Cobb Co. GA. The descendants lived in Navarro, Llano and Eastland Cos. TX. Benjamin Franklin VAUGHT b. 1808 Bledsoe Co. TN, grandson of the German immigrant William VAUGHT, m. #1 ca 1830 Sarah McANALLY b. ca 1811 Franklin Co. TN; this family lived in Caddo Gap, Montgomery Co. AR. Richard BEASLEY b. 1830 KY, great grandson of John N. and Permelia BEASLEY, m. in Stone Co. MO Parazada BOWMAN b. 1835 MO and moved to Johnson Co. TX. Stephen N. SARGENT b. 1795 MA m. Persis WARNER b. 1796 MA and lived in Medina Co. OH. Their descendants lived in Keokuk IA, Smith Co. KS and Franklin Co. NE.

Cross County, Arkansas, Cemetery Records, vol. 2, compiled by the Cross Co. Genealogical Soc. and the Cross Co. Historical Soc., Inc., Box 943, Wynne AR 72396, softback, 160 pages (numbered consecutively after Vol. 1, 122-280), includes Index for Vols. 1 and 2, \$17.00 postpaid (Vol. 2 only).

This second volume contains a description of each cemetery, its location, and a complete listing of all information on each tombstone. Occasional historical/biographical sketches are scattered throughout the book. In a further attempt to identify the large number of unmarked graves which were found, local newspapers were searched for death notices as far back as records were available, and this most helpful and unusual composite list is provided as a supplement at the back of the volume.

Conway County, Arkansas, Marriages (Part 2), 1875-1890, transcribed by Emogene Tindall, 5310 Wood St., North Little Rock AR 72118, publ. 1985, softback, 120 pages, \$12.00 postpaid.

Ms. Tindall provides us with an alphabetical listing of Grooms and of Brides, with the age of each, date, and volume/page reference to the original sourcebook. This will be an invaluable reference volume for genealogists with family members who have been in the Morrilton area of the Arkansas River Valley. One could only wish that the original notetakers had regularly listed the township and parents of the partners in each of the 3,134 marriages listed.

Bradley County, Arkansas, 1860 Federal Census, compiled by R.W. Dhonau, 4410 Lee Ave Little Rock AR 72205, publ. 1984, softback, 131 pages including Index, \$15.00.

This is a complete record of the inhabitants of the county which now claims to be

home of the pink tomato. Mr. Dhonau, one of the current genealogists of note in this state, has a distinguished record of making available valuable material to other searchers. This record of the County made just prior to the Civil War is particularly important, and many of our readers will rejoice in its availability. Bradley was created in 1840 from a part of Union County; Mr. Dhonau gives a short history of its development in the Introduction. His comments on the problems in transcribing the old-fashioned script of the original records need to be understood by all genealogists, and his suggestions for those who are frustrated in locating an ancestor are classic and might well be placed in the preface to every genealogical text..."With the many national accents and brogues, the census taker had to spell the unfamiliar names by sound...Be flexible in your thinking, to account for this...the name Riley may be spelled Rilie, Rily, Ryley or Ryly....The first letter in the name is often made with curliques that hide the basic part of the letter and make it illegible. When the first letter in the surname is wrong, it naturally misplaces it in the Index. Don't stop searching if the name is not in the Index. Pronounce the name and study similar sounds. The letter 'T' is often difficult to decipher....finally, remember that inaccuracy is still found in present day records (so be a little humble in your forgiveness)..."

Computer Genealogy: A Guide to Research through High Technology, Paul A. Andereck and Richard A. Pence, 1985, Ancestry Inc., P.O. Box 476, Salt Lake City UT 84110, 280 pages, softback, \$12.95.

It was inevitable, with the national craze for the personal computer, that programs would become available to help the researcher deal with some of the unique problems that are encountered in family studies. This book is written for genealogists whose files are overflowing with scattered facts, and who need the help that the computer can offer but don't know how to proceed. No one has expressed it better than Diane Dieterle (Editor, Genealogy Tomorrow):

"The fun part of genealogy is the detective work. The un-fun part is the paperwork. A computer can be used for all the repetitious clerical work that a genealogist does: keeping current pedigree charts and family group sheets; keeping a record of correspondence; keeping a research calendar; keeping updated documentation for your research; writing form letters to record offices; writing letters to relatives to bring your genealogy up to date; making research time reports for clients; printing alphabetical lists of records...; indexing.."

This book is written for beginners and contains the basic information needed to get started. From one who has experimented, however, let this reviewer confess that it isn't a project for the faint hearted. It isn't like a box cake where you pay \$1.39, add milk, stir and bake at 375° for 45 minutes; a personal computer and the needed software costs \$2,000-3,000 and you have to work like a sweatshop laborer to put it to use. But it's such a forward step, you should buy this book anyway!

Ancestry's Guide to Research: Case Studies in American Genealogy, Johni Cerny and Arlene Eakle, 1985, Ancestry Inc., P.O. Box 476, Salt Lake City UT 84110, 364 pages, softback, \$10.95.

This is a companion book to The Source: A Guidebook of American Genealogy and is designed for those family searchers who are just getting started. The basics are taught through case studies and extracts, and it is a commendable volume to pave the way to quality research without those innumerable start-up mistakes, omissions and blind alleys.

Dallas County, Arkansas, 1890 Tax Receipt Book, prepared in conjunction with the Arkansas Genealogical Society by Duane Jacobs, Rt. 1 Box 183, Fordyce AR 71742, 1984, softback, 94 pages, \$14.00 postpaid.

This book is part of the sesquicentennial AGS series to recreate an 1890 census for each county in Arkansas from other local records. Mr. Jacobs has, in this instance, made a major contribution to our knowledge about Dallas County in the South Arkansas woodlands. There is an alphabetical list of names with the page number of the 1890 Tax Receipt book; the section/township/range number of the land taxed; the town, lot number and block number where located; and other miscellaneous information which was included in the records. The volume is a companion piece to the one next listed.

Dallas County, Arkansas, 1864 Map, 1983, Duane Jacobs, Rt. 1 Box 183, Fordyce AR 71742, softback, 66 pages including index, \$11.00 postpaid.

This is an absolutely marvellous booklet for those individuals with Dallas County roots during the Civil War period. The map is printed in several sections, by township, and contains the location of the homes of 419 residents, plus churches, schools, businesses and the like. The map printed is identified on a file card in the National Archives as a captured Confederate map turned in by Capt. McAlester in 1865. What a treasure for the family historian! The two Dallas County volumes will be available to the public in the Society's repository in the Little Rock Public Library.

1890 "Census" of Randolph County, Arkansas, as constructed from the Personal Property Tax List by Burton Ray Knotts, 1985, 7316 Dahlia Dr., Little Rock AR 72209, softback, 70 pages plus an index of 37 pages, \$11.00 postpaid.

The reconstructed census of this Northeast Arkansas county is an interesting contrast to that of Dallas County, above, created from the Tax Receipt book. Much less information is provided on the personal property list, although the list of families living in the county may be more comprehensive than that in the Dallas County land listing. Mr. Knotts has alphabetized the family names in each township, and a master listing can be found in the Index. A handy reference map is included in the front of the book.

"Dear Parents", The Civil War Letters of the Shibley Brothers of Van Buren, Arkansas, compiled and edited by Ruie Ann Smith Park, 1963, softback, 81 pages, \$10.00; order from Louise A. Scroggins, 59 Hwy. North Box 94, Van Buren AR 72956.

This delightful and poignant volume was published over twenty years ago by the Washington County Historical Society, Fayetteville, as a contribution to the observance of the Civil War Centennial. Forty seven letters are included of the Shibley brothers to their parents in Van Buren (Sebastian County). The brothers enlisted together, trained and fought together, survived and returned home together. Their observations of fellow soldiers in the lull between battles, in sickness and injury, in joy, in despair; their deepening Christian faith; the memories of their family and home -- all these emerge in the letters in a rich and varied tapestry of human endeavor. The AGS is pleased to have a copy of this volume for its permanent collection; all Civil War buffs likely will want their own copy of this one!
