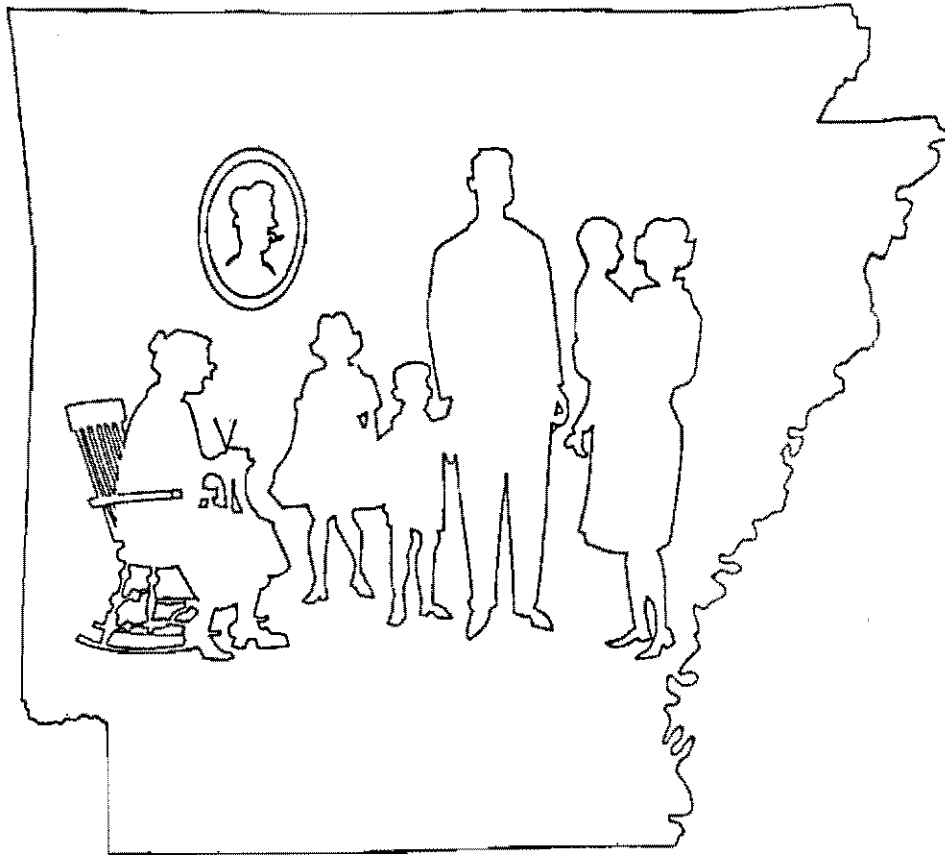

President's Page

14 July 1986

It is probably natural to be fullest of what we have done most recently when we begin to write about any subject. That means I am full of *Australian* genealogy, since returning ten days ago from two months there. What has that to do with Arkansas? Perhaps quite a lot. Our origins are very similar. England dumped about 68,000 convicts on the American colonies prior to the Revolution, and many of us are descended from some of these, though we now remember them as Revolutionary soldiers (!); not convicts. After 1776, England could no longer dump their convicts here, but the jails were still full, so the convicts were sent to Australia, which Captain James Cook had discovered and named 'New Holland' in 1770.

Some of the American convicts were related to some of the Australian convicts. Some of each were related to other persons who remained in Britain. Yet others who emigrated to either America or Australia were related to some of the convicts of one nation or the other, or both. Many 'gaps' may be filled here.

The 'First Fleet' of eleven ships left England for what was later Sydney, Australia, 13 May 1787, with 1350 men, women and children aboard. Nearly 170,000 other souls followed these to populate Australia, Tasmania and Norfolk Island. Because of the sensitivity of modern politicians to the charge that they might be descended from convicts, the Australian Parliament has had the nation's census records destroyed. ! They make a census each five years. This month, they will spend \$60 million making a census, then shred it ! In Australia, one begins genealogical research very differently. He is almost totally dependent upon vital records, which fortunately are quite good in most cases.

Never mind the erroneous listing in the *Guinness Book of Records*; the largest cemetery in the world is *Rookwood*, located in the Sydney suburb of Lidcombe. It is a mile square, has 1,200,000 grave plots and as many as 5 persons buried in some plots.

The *Society of Australian Genealogists* has 21 tons of index cards in its library ! These are being converted to microfiche as rapidly as possible.

Your president is now member #11,159 of SAG, and AGS is seeking to work out an exchange agreement with our cousins of the Southern Hemisphere so that they can read the *Arkansas Family Historian* and we can read their quarterly, *Descent*.

Nick Vine Hall, Executive Director of SAG, was very generous with his time. An American living in East Killara, New South Wales, Ray W. Parker, who has traced American Civil War Veterans in Australia, was also extremely generous and will be sharing his research with us.

Australian time is US Central Daylight Saving Time *plus* 15 hours.
8:00p in Arkansas is 11:00a the *next* day in Sydney.

The society has an 'Annexe' at 8 Argyle Street (near Richmond Villa) where its microform records (90 million references to baptisms and marriages, cemetery records, parish registers, shipping records, 1851 Scottish census, etc.) are stored.

Hours: Only Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday from 11:00a to 4:00p. An alarm is sounded at 3:50p so that the buildings are entirely cleared by 4:00p.

The library rooms are open *for members only* on the second Tuesday of the month from 5:30p to 9:30p.

Library and 'Annexe' open free only to members. All others pay a fee (\$A 12.00 per day) to use research materials. Membership is at \$A 25.00 per year with *Descent* received quarterly by surface mail, or a \$A 10.00 surcharge is added for Air Mail.

The current exchange rate between \$A and \$US can be located in daily newspapers. It is roughly \$2US for \$3A, or \$US 0.6414 for \$A1 (22 July 1986).

Microform readers should be reserved at least 24 hours in advance by phoning 27-4533 or 27-3953.

The Honorary Research Secretary may provide a small amount of assistance free of charge to overseas members. Membership number *must* be quoted on all correspondence.

Current membership of the society is now 11,159 plus, many with U.S. connections.

AMERICAN CIVIL WAR VETERANS WHO EMIGRATED TO AUSTRALIA

"ROY W. Parker is a man with a mission. As honorary historian of Sydney's American Legion Post No. 1, he's interested in the fate of other Americans who have come to Australia, specifically Civil War veterans. The graves of three brothers who fought for the Union were found in a family crypt at Waverley Cemetery a few years ago. Now the grave of another Northern soldier has been found in the same cemetery. The war was fought a long way from Sydney, and long ago (1861-65) but Australia attracted some of the survivors who were looking for a new life--or gold. Does any reader know of more?"

"JOSEFIN Cresp was born in Cap' d'Antibes, southern France, in 1849, went to sea at 10, jumped ship in the Confederate States of America, joined the CSA Army when he was 15, and later crossed to the winning side. He eventually joined the trickle to Australia of American Civil War veterans (Column 8, yesterday), and died in Berrl, South Australia, in 1922--on his 73rd birthday. His 70-year-old grand-daughter, a nun, says 478 people have descended from the line begun in Australia by Monsieur Cresp and his Irish-Australian bride.

DESCENDENTS of Charles Mooney, native of England, who died at Casino in 1903 and is buried there, will check with voluminous US Army archives in Washington to determine whether their forebear was a Civil War veteran, as they've long suspected. What tales these men, long gone, could tell."

RESEARCH ON AMERICAN CIVIL WAR VETERANS IN AUSTRALIA

Mr. Roy W. Parker of 41 Churchill Road, East Killara, NSW, 2071, Australia, is an American who became a military pilot at Clarksdale, Mississippi in 1942. He served a tour of duty as a bomber pilot in the Pacific Theater in World War II, married an Australian girl, flew 26,000 hours with an Australian airline, and is now retired in a Sydney, New South Wales, Australia, suburb.

Roy has long has an interest in tracing veterans of the American Civil War who went to Australia in the 19th century. In 1982, he went public with his search. He has since discovered about 20 such veterans who lived and died in Australia, and is attempting to confirm about 20 more.

Mr. Parker has graciously agreed to share his research with the members of AGS. We are indebted to him for his generosity.

We will first trace, for five years, his search as recorded by one of the Sydney, Australia newspapers. After that, we will share the genealogical information on these veterans.

In the early 1800s when America was moving west of the Mississippi, in nearly all the settlements the Methodist and Baptist denominations were the pioneer Christian workers, but in Lonoke County they were the Presbyterians. However, the earliest settlers of Austin and vicinity around 1830 included a colony of Baptists from the Carolinas who organized a church, estimated to be the first one in the county.(1)

Some of the earlier settlers were William Sanders, and the Hogon, Dobbins, and Erwin families. The settlement was known as "Oakland Grove" (1820-1858), then Austin around 1858. (2)

Many do not realize that Old Austin, for many years, was a village of considerable trade and importance. In the Spring of 1858 SKILLERN & MULHERIN (who donated land for the church) began to sell goods, and when the Civil War broke out their sales amounted to more than \$30,000. It was said that no little town improved more rapidly than Old Austin did inside of four years. For example, there were more than 30 residences, 56 drygood stores, 1 large family grocery store, 1 brick house, 1 school house, 3 doctor offices, 1 saddler shop, 1 tailor shop, 3 saloons, 2 blacksmith shops, 2 carriage shops, 1 hotel, 1 livery stable, 1 steam saw mill, 1 cotton gin, and 1 flour mill.(2)

The bustling community was surveyed as a possible site for the state capital and Ouachita Baptist College. (Tradition has it that Little Rock and Arkadelphia won out by one vote for these two sites.) During the Civil War the town was nearly destroyed, business was suspended, and nearly all the stores and a great number of residences were torn down to make winter quarters for the Federal Soldiers occupying the area. After the war the town attempted to rebuild, but the St. Louis Iron Mountain & Southern Railroad (now the Missouri Pacific) was completed a few miles to the north, a depot (Austin Station) was established and most of the businesses began to move towards that area. However, the area did not lose its attractiveness, for the Annual Austin Homecomings at Crabtree Springs became a social event and an important part of the town's history. Nearly 5,000 people used to return each year, many in wagons to celebrate. (3) It is said that there was a carnival, a rodeo, ballgames, and other activities which went on all week, with the people camping out in the area.

The exact date that Old Austin Baptist Church was constituted is unknown. Various Associational Minutes indicate different dates from 1838-1860. However, with the arrival of the earlier settlers in the 1830s who organized a church, the 1830s must be assumed as the time frame of the beginning of Old Austin. It was known prior to 1857 as "Atlanta Church".(6)

In 1853, at our church, the Caroline Baptist Association was organized. There were five churches that came together into the Association: Atlanta (Old Austin), Bethel of Conway, Des Arc, Hickory Plains, and Siloam.(6) No one knows for certain why the Association was named "Caroline", but speculation has it because most of its members were from North and South Carolina.(6) But Old Austin was in the beginning of a work which resulted in the spread of Baptist work throughout Central Arkansas, for the Association grew in the late 1800s and early 1900s to comprise Pulaski, Faulkner, Prairie, and Pope County churches as well as Lonoke. The Associational Annual Meetings "were a time of social, spiritual, and intellectual fellowship." The place of meeting and the preacher of the annual sermon were regarded as among the most important matters brought before the body. The church entertaining the Association made the most elaborate preparations. Dinner was served on the grounds, and neighbors for miles would solicit guests to go home with them. It was no unusual thing for a hospitable farmer to have 40 to 50 guests in his home. The country was sparsely settled, the churches at a distance from each other, so people came from great distances. There was much preaching at the Association. The sermons were rarely less than an hour in length. Often two or three sermons would follow the first one. Sometimes a few messengers would transact the business in the meeting house, while someone would be preaching to the multitude at a stand in the woods. Most of the people came on horseback, some in wagons, and many walked through the woods. The meeting would normally last three days. When the time came for adjournment, usually the moderator or some aged minister would make some remarks and with a rousing exhortation, a song was sung, and amid tears of gladness and shouts of joy, the parting hand of fellowship was extended. Amid many farewells, the people parted and returned to their respective homes and churches."(5)

In 1857 the name "Atlanta Church" was changed to "Austin Church." In 1925 the name was changed to "Old Austin Baptist". In October 1976 a name change was considered to "First Baptist Church, Old Austin" to eliminate any possibility of the church ever being considered anything but FIRST. The next month, in November, it was voted not to change the name.

All the records and minutes of Old Austin Baptist Church were destroyed by fire in 1946, however, from other sources (Associational Minutes, Public Records, Libraries, and personal interviews) the following has been compiled.

- 1853 Pastor was John B. Carroll
- 1860 Caroline Associational Minutes listed 635 white members and 67 colored. The brethren had taken into their hearts to build a first class female school, to be located at Old Austin. The enterprise was defeated by the Civil War.(6)
- 1861 The Caroline Association Annual Meeting was held at Old Austin. "Their desires to advance the interest of the churches had not waned, though the War (Civil) was then in progress which had caused a weakening of their forces and a blockading of their wheels. Thus, body was much discouraged." (6)

- 1862 The Caroline Association Annual Meeting was held at Old Austin and the "body was adjourned in confusion before the advancing forces of the Federal Army." (6)
- 1865 At the close of the war, Ref. R. J. COLEMAN came to Old Austin and found the members of the Baptist Church worshipping with the Methodist Church. There were some feelings of differences arising between the two groups and Rev. Coleman led in an effort to building a Baptist Church. Enough money was raised in one day to build the Old Austin Baptist Church. This building was used until 1925.(9)
- 1866 The Caroline Association was revised again by a call from a meeting held at Old Austin. It was composed of 12 churches, most of which were in "feeble but prospering conditions. (6)
- 1868 Rev. Moses Green was serving as pastor.
- 1872 Land for the church (Lot #55 in the town of Austin) was donated by J. C. & Lucindia SKILLERN, George & Josephine ST CLAIR, and S. M. & Ann Lyda MULHERIN. Deacons and Trustees were William Sanders, William M. Patton, C. E. Emerson and Mr. Garlington.(10)
- 1872 The Arkansas Baptist State Convention met at Old Austin, November 14-16. President: My. Y. Morgan; Secretary: J. B. Searcy; Preacher: J. M. Hart. November 15th was on a Sunday, and all the messengers assembled at 9:00 a.m. for Sunday School. A returned Missionary, A. D. Phillips, addressed the children on how they conducted Sunday School in Africa. At the 11:00 a.m. service, Dr. J. R. Graves (leader of the Landmark movement which resulted in a separation from the SBC and the forming of the American Baptist Association) spoke and he preached from Matthew 27:51 "The veil of the Temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom." He spoke for THREE (03) hours and held his audience spellbound. It was reported to be one of the greatest sermons the crowd had ever listened to. At the same hour, 11:00 a.m., James Nelson, a Baptist preacher and messenger from Mississippi, preached at the neighboring Methodist church. His text was II Cor. 1:5. It is not known the length of his sermon although rarely were the sermons less than one hour.(5)
- 1883 Caroline Association Annual Meeting was held at Old Austin. A Committee was established to "consider a women's work in missionary causes and to assist in organizing this work."(6) Thus, Old Austin had a part in establishing WMU work within central Arkansas.
- 1888 Rev. R. J. Coleman was pastor. He had been a leader and messenger in the organization of the State Convention. He was the State Recording Secretary in 1856 and 1857. He preached the State Convention Sermon in 1879 and 1890.(6)
- 1895 Rev. J. J. SAWYER was Pastor.
- 1900-1902 Rev. J. M. DAVIS was Pastor.(7)
- 1901 The Sunday School enrollment was 50 with an average attendance of 23.(7)
- 1902 Sunday School Director was Nora Robinson with an enrollment of 35.(7)
- 1904 Total Yearly Offering was \$50.00 and value of church property was \$500.00.(7)
- 1905-1906 Rev. Charlie Davis was Pastor.(7)
- 1905 Church was holding services the first Sunday of each month. Church Clerk - J. E. Birmingham; SS Director - H. Monk; Sunday School average attendance was 25.(7)
- 1906 Church Membership listed as 50.(7)

- 1909 Messengers from Old Austin to the Caroline Association Annual Meeting were: S. W. Cochran and W. B. Webb.(7)
- 1910 Rev. R. H. White was pastor. Church Clerk - W. W. Cochran.(7)
- 1911 Rev. T. Anderson was pastor.(7)
- 1913 Rev. W. D. Kilpatrick was pastor.(7)
- 1914 Rev. J. D. Gipson was pastor.(7)
- 1916-1917 Rev. W. D. Kilpatrick was pastor.(7)
- 1919 Rev. Jamie Bland was pastor.(7)
- 1920 Rev. A. D. Gray was pastor. Church Clerk - A. G. Cochran. Church membership was 47. Pastor's Annual Salary was \$125.(7)
- 1921 Rev. W. E. Corder was pastor. Church Clerk - A. G. Cochran. Church membership was 50.(7)
- 1923-1928 Rev. George T. Kilpatrick was pastor. Church Clerk - J. E. King.(7)
- 1923 Church membership was 54. Messengers to the Caroline Association Annual Meeting were Mrs. Carrie Comner and Mrs. Zelma Kee. Pledges to Associational Missions for the year were \$20.00 of which H. T. Kee paid \$5.00.(7)
- 1924 Church changed its meeting time from the first Sunday to the third Sunday of each month. Church membership was 64. SS average attendance was 44. Receipts for the year were \$114.00.(7)
- 1925 The name was changed from "Austin Baptist" to "Old Austin Baptist Church." The church began holding services twice a month (1st and 3rd Sunday). Reported 20 baptisms. Church membership was 87.(7)
- 1929-1931 Rev. R. P. Bain was pastor. This man served as Caroline Associational Missionary for 12 years (1904-1917). During those 12 years the records indicate he traveled 70,896 miles (roads not paved and not many of them); preached 3,388 services; witnessed 1245 professions of faith; visited 12,365 homes; organized 11 churches; built 11 meeting houses; organized 23 Sunday Schools. In one meeting in Lawrence County, which he held, he received 149 converts. Back in the 1890s at Ward, he received nearly 100 converts. He baptized more than 92 people at one time in a meeting held in White County while he was Missionary. His highest achievement was having a part in constituting more than 60 churches.(6) He is also remembered for his much quoting of the phrase "ramrod pudding and poker pies".
- 1932 The Caroline Association Annual Meeting was held at Old Austin.(7)
- 1933-1934 Rev. W. B. O'Neal was pastor. Church membership was 98.(7)
- 1935-1937 Rev. Earnest Anderson was pastor.(7)
- 1938-1939 Rev. S. C. Vick was pastor. Church membership was 66.(7)
- 1940-1943 It appears that during the WW II years there were no pastors.
(7)
- 1941 Messengers to the Caroline Association Annual Meeting were Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Cochran.(7)
- 1943 Caroline Association Annual Meeting met at Old Austin, October 20th.
- 1944-1945 Rev. Verl Johnson was pastor. Church membership was 73.(7)
- 1945 All church records destroyed in a fire at the church clerk's home.
- 1947 Rev. V. G. Griffin was pastor.(7)
- 1948-1952 Rev. W. D. Kilpatrick was pastor.(7)
- 1950 The church was meeting the 2nd Sunday of each month. The following excerpts from the church's minutes revealed:
February: "Advisory Committee of three people (Oscar Peeler, A. G. Cochran, Mrs. Zelma Kee) to bring any business they think necessary."

- March: a "Church RAINED OUT."
- April: "Special offering of \$25.45 taken for pastor and \$6.14 for the housekeeper. Spring Revival ran from April 9th to April 23rd (15 days). Attendance was good and interest high. Baptism was set for 5th Sunday but due to bad weather and sickness, was postponed until Summer revival."
- July: Baptismal service held the 5th Sunday in Alfred Cochran's pond. Right hand of fellowship was given to candidates that evening at the church.
- 1951 In January, the church voted to build three Sunday School classrooms. In March, "owing to sickness and absence of the Church Clerk the regular conference was postponed until the 4th Sunday in March." In April, the church changed regular conference (business meeting) from the second Sunday to Wednesday evening before second Sunday. This procedure is still followed to date. In July a VBS was discussed, and Mrs. Zelma Kee was elected to be the Prayer Meeting Director with Mrs. Amy Kee as Alternate. In August the church ordained Carl Fawcett into the ministry. Rev. Fawcett is currently serving as Director of Missions, Arkansas Valley Association, in West Helena, Arkansas. In October, the church ordained Alfred Cochran, Louis Kee, and Owen Dicus as deacons. Rev. Eldon Dicus was invited to preach the 2nd and 4th Sunday of each month. In November the church voted to build outdoor toilets.
- 1952 In February, the church voted to build two Sunday School classrooms and called Eldon Dicus as pastor, who served until October, a period of eight months. In April, the church ordained Eldon Dicus into the ministry and in May voted to purchase collection baskets for the church. In May, Rev. Dicus was called to full-time work and to hold services each week. Also a special called business conference was held for discussing plans for a new church building. Mr. Oscar Peeler read the Church Covenant, which seemed to have been read prior to each conference and the church voted unanimously for a new 32 x 50 foot frame building with concrete flooring and 10 foot walls. Building Committee was Elihue Seaton, Oscar Peeler and Edgar Robertson. In September the church voted to begin taking an offering each Sunday morning and evening. They also voted to begin using envelopes for the SS offerings. During this month there were quite a number of baptisms held at the Railroad Pond. On October 26, a worship service was held for the first time in the new auditorium (this is the present fellowship hall).
- 1953 Earl Robertson was ordained as a deacon and in March, Rev. Troy Carroll was called as pastor, who served until August, a period of five months. In June, the church received \$250.00 as a gift from the Department of Missions, Arkansas Baptist State Convention to be applied towards the new auditorium note. In September, Rev. L. E. Jolly was called as pastor, who served until October 1954, a period of one year and one month.
- 1954 On March 7th the new church auditorium was formally dedicated and a note burning ceremony was held. In March Thelma Ruth Dicus surrendered to mission work, and in June Johnny Johnson surrendered to Special Service. In November Rev. Melburn Hill was called as pastor. He served until May, 1957, a period of two years and six months.

- 1955 Melburn Hill was ordained into the ministry in January. In March the church voted to sell the wood burning stove to Bro. Amber Dicus for \$5.00. The WMU began its work at Old Austin in October and in December the church voted to observe the Lord's Supper once every three months, the first Sunday of each quarter. This practice is still continued.
- 1957 Rev. William Craton was called to be pastor in June and he served until April, 1958, a period of ten months.
- 1958 On April 20, Paul Hall surrendered to the ministry and was licensed. In June, Rev. Cecil Fuller was called to paster and served until November, 1960, a period of two years and five months. Dorothy Craton surrendered to Special service. The deacons serving at this time were M. M. Fuller and Ronald Smith. In September, Hunter Douglas was called as Minister of Music.
- 1959 A census of the area was taken in February, which revealed 118 families in the area. In April, building plans were adopted for three new Sunday School Classrooms and a Pastor's Study; the pledge system was used to raise funds. On Mother's Day, May 10, corsages were given to Mrs. J. D. Hughes (youngest Mother), Mrs. Edith Witcher (most children present), and Mrs. Lillie Haggard (oldest mother). In December, Hunter Douglas, who was serving as Minister of Music, delivered his first sermon, "Great Temptations of Jesus".
- 1960 On March 20, Hunter Douglas was licensed to preach and in June, John Holden was also licensed to preach. April 10th a mission project was undertaken and the church donated its old church pews and paid the electricity deposit to establish a mission at Williams Chapel, now known as Cocklebur Baptist Church. In June, the church assumed responsibility for conducting the services at the new mission and authorized Paul Hall to preach and baptize. In August, just a few short months, the Mission was averaging 50 in attendance and the offering for the month was \$93.32. That same month Old Austin ordained Paul Hall into the ministry. In December, Rev. Claude Hill was called as pastor of Old Austin and he served until January 1963, a period of two years and one month.
- 1961 In June different individuals offered labor, land and money towards building a parsonage, if the church would raise \$2,000. The offer was accepted. July 23 the church granted permission, and the required letters, and assisted in constituting Cocklebur Baptist Church. During this year, the church ceased using various ponds for baptizing and began to use the baptistry of FBC, Cabot.
- 1962 Bob Potts, lennie Mobbs, and Albert Seaton were ordained as deacons.
- 1963 Rev. Milburn Spence was called as pastor, who served until March, 1965, a period of two years. In November Elihue Seaton and Floyd Witcher were ordained as deacons.
- 1965 Parsonage construction began, a note was signed, and money borrowed. In June Rev. Harlon Hogg was called as pastor, who served until September, 1966, a period of one year and three months.
- 1966 The church was paying someone \$10.00 per month to "light fires" in the church. In December after much donated labor and money, along with borrowed funds, the parsonage was completed. Also during December Rev. Elmer Madison was called as pastor, who served until May 1968, a period of one year and five months.
- 1967 In January two additional classrooms were built and a baptistry was installed. In February, Jackie Tedford was licensed to preach. A revival was held in March which resulted in 18 being baptized and

- 10 more coming on "promise of letter". In September, Guy Spence was licensed to preach.
- 1968 A Hammond organ was purchased in May; in June Rev. Ed Walker was called as Interim Pastor, who served until September 1969, a period of one year and three months.
- 1969 In September, Cleo Field and Clifford Porter were ordained as deacons. In June Rev. Bob Corson was called as pastor and served until March 1972, a period of two years and nine months.
- 1970 In February a storeroom and carport were added to the parsonage.
- 1972 In April, Otis Chapman was called as Interim Pastor, who served for three months and then John Edwards was called as pastor in July. He was ordained in September and served until May 1973, a period of ten months. In October, a room was added onto the back of the parsonage and the church voted to build a new educational building.
- 1973 In June Rev. J. A. Harvey was called as pastor who served until May 1975, a period of one year and eleven months. In August, Conway Thompson surrendered to the ministry and in September Russel Van was licensed. In December the new Educational Building was in use (where the present auditorium stands).
- 1974 Larry Mobbs, Frank Witcher and Don Neeley were ordained as deacons. Larry and Frank began serving with their fathers who were already deacons. In May the church borrowed \$10,000 to brick the entire church complex and other improvements. This is the brick on the present Fellowship/Educational Building.
- 1975 In May, Rev. H. L. Lipford was called as Interim Pastor and served until August when Rev. Eugene Irby was called pastor. Rev. Irby served until March 1981, a period of five years and seven months. Bro. Irby's pastorate was the third longest tenure, following G. T. Kilpatrick who served six years, and W. D. Kilpatrick who served seven years.
- 1976 In January Rev. Irby, after being in the field for four months, led the church to evaluate its insurance coverage which was discovered to be very minimal. In February the church voted to change insurance companies and upgrade its coverage. In just a few short weeks a tornado, on March 29, destroyed the Educational Building and damaged the remaining facilities. The next month the church received \$68,078 from the insurance company and rented a double-wide trailer for classrooms at \$75.00 per month. In May the church voted to enter into a Building Program for a new auditorium and convert the then auditorium into a Fellowship/Educational Building. In June a bid from the Charles Evans Construction Company was accepted for \$89,620 and construction was begun July 10. The first service held in the present auditorium was in December.
- 1977 On April 27th the present auditorium and additions were formally dedicated. The Invocation was given by Linnie Mobbs; the Message was presented by J. Everett Sneed, Editor of Arkansas Baptist News Magazine. Floyd Witcher pronounced the Benediction. The Building Committee consisted of Linnie Mobbs, Chairman; Lewis Kee, Floyd Witcher, Don Neeley, Frank Witcher, Clifford Porter, Joyce Howell, Muriel Mayfield, Opal Goodwin and Larry Mobbs.
- 1978 Larry Gibson and Mike Griffin were ordained as deacons. Since 1981 the church has experienced numerous change in its leadership: E. O. Martindale served as Interim pastor from April to June 1981 John Ferguson served as Pastor from June to August 1981 Danny Loretz served as Interim Pastor from August to October 1981

Don Hook served as Interim Pastor from October to December 1981
 Gene Carmichal served as Pastor from December 1981 to May 1982
 Dale Cook served as Pastor from August 1982 to January 1983
 E. O. Martindale served as Interim Pastor from March to June 1983

Due to the numerous changes in leadership, no permanent program could be established; thus the church's progress was impeded. However, the work continued with souls being added to the kingdom. In 1882 the highest Foreign Mission Offering collected at Old Austin amounted to \$1203. In July 1983, Rev. James L. Edwards was called as pastor and has been able to devote full time to the work of Old Austin. In October the PA system was installed for \$1373.00 and in November, Robert Craig was called as Music Director. In twelve months the Sunday School Enrollment has reached 148 (an increase of 80), the Sunday School average attendance has doubled with ten attendance records set, the monthly offerings have increased by an average of \$1551.00 and the church debt has been considerably reduced. There have also been thirty five additions into the church family.

Thus, Old Austin has had a long, fruitful, and lasting ministry which spans close to 150 years. Many souls have come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, many young men and ladies have surrendered to special service within her walls. Many young ministers received their ordination and indoctrination into the pastorate. Old Austin has ministered, is ministering, and will continue to minister; which is God's purpose for its existence. Truly, God has been with this church and its greatest years are ahead and in the future. "Amen, Come, Lord Jesus!" "Maranatha"

FRANCIS DOLLY CATT

Submitted by Mrs. Mrs. Jimmie L. Jones, 502 Catherine Heights, Hot Springs, AR 71901.

Francis Dolly Catt was born 7 Nov. 1832, Oaktown, Indiana, Knox Co. She was the daughter of William Catt and Margaret Phillips. The Catt family had a ferry boat service on the White River. It is not known how many children William Catt and Margaret Phillips had. It is believed they had a son Lewis.

Francis Dolly Catt married James C. Lockhart 7 Feb. 1851 Knox Co. Indiana. James C. Lockhart was also born in Oaktown IN. It is not known who his parents were. Francis Dolly and James C. had a daughter, Belle. They could have more, but it is not known for sure. Belle was born 7 August 1855 Oaktown IN.

Francis Dolly and James C. Lockhart got a divorce. James C. married Hannah Wolfe in 1860. They had three children: Martha Ann, Levi Jefferson and James McClellan. James C. died 1904, Hoxie, AR. Francis Dolly married Henry M. Shy 21 March 1859. The census lists his place of birth as KY. Henry and Francis Dolly had only one daughter that I know of. Her name was Barbara Ellen Shy, born 16 Nov. 1859 Oaktown, IN. 1860 Federal census shows Francis Dolly living in the household with her mother, Margaret Hooten. I have no record of Henry Shy. I have no record of what happened to William Catt, father of Francis Dolly, but her mother married James Hooten 1853 Knox Co., IN. In 18650 there was a probate where James had died. The Catt family moved to MO. Francis Dolly met the Tatum family at Anderson, MO. She first went there to take Barbara Ellen to live with her sister, Belle, who had married H. A. Falk. They lived in Pineville, MO. Francis Dolly first married an older Tatum man. He had some kind of spells so she left him and married his younger brother, Joseph W. Tatum. He was the son of James W. and Julia Ann Tatum. They must have married about 1877, because I find deeds in Tatumville, AR, Saline Co. at that time. In 1877 Joseph W. Tatum bought 40 acres from B. F. Thompson and wife in Saline Co.

In 1881 Joseph W. sold 80 acres to Daniel Lindsey and lists Francis Dolly as his wife. He bought 80 acres from Millard Harrison. 1882 Joseph W. and Francis Dolly deeded one acre to Shady Grove Baptist Church, Saline Co., to erect a church. 1884 80 acres was bought from William Hudson. In 1884-85 the Arkansas State Business Directory lists Tatumville, AR, a settlement on the Hurrican River in Beaver Township, Saline Co., AR. It is 10 miles north of Benton, the county seat, and nearest railroad station, and 19 miles southwest of Little Rock. Little Rock is nearest banking. It contains a steam saw and grist mill and a corn mill, cotton is shipped, population 60; mail weekly; Dolle Tatum postmaster. Nathan Faulkner, shoemaker, Daniel Lindsey, saw and grist mill, Schneideer, blacksmith, E.J. Snodgrass, Wagonmaker, Dollie Tatum, general store, J. W. Tatum general store, J. B. Wilson, Justice of the Peace.

1886 Joseph and Dolly sold 80 acres to R. A. Whitmore. In 1890 they had to foreclose because of nonpayment. While living in Saline Co. Francis Dolly broke her leg above the knee. I found a letter about this that had been left by her family. It is now known when Joseph W. and Francis Dolly moved to Little Rock, but in the obits it said they had resided there a long time. They owned a mercantile store on the corner of 19th and Wolf. They were very active in church work. They helped to establish the Immanuel Baptist Church on 10th and Bishop. Joseph and Francis Dolly lived on the corner of 19th and Marshall.

1900 census lists an adopted son, Joseph W., Jr., who was 14 years. It also listed Ida Carger as housekeeper. 1880 census, Saline Co., lists a child Loid, Jr. He was 13 at that time. Francis Dolly and Joseph W. had no children between them. Feb. 1903 the newspaper report from Little Rock stated: Mrs. J. W. Tatum dropped dead. A visitor had dropped by to see Joseph W., who had been very ill with pneumonia. Mrs. Tatum was showing the gentleman out when he heard her call, "Catch me I am falling", he caught her to break her fall. She gasp and died. She used a crutch to help her walk as her broke leg gave her a lot of trouble. She was a large woman and had asthmatic trouble which affected her heart. Mr. Joseph W. Tatum followed her in death April 1903. They are both buried in Oakland Cem., Little Rock, AR.

In their will they list Belle Falk, daughter of Francis Dolly, as to have custody of Joseph W., Jr. They gave them a home at 2503 Bishop Street. Joseph W., Sr., gave his gold watch to J. H. Johnson. The housekeeper, Ida Carger was given money. He gave his parents, James W. and Julia Ann Tatum, money after property was sold. Barbara Ellen and Belle were both in their wills. Belle had two sons, A. J. and J. F., and one daughter, Mae, who later married a Champion. Belle later married H. A. Hitch, and asked to be relieved of her caring for young Joseph. I don't know what happened to young Joseph. Belle died Sept. 1927, Little Rock, AR.

Barbara Ellen married Benjamin F. Caton of Cooper Co., MO. They were married in Pinville, MO, in the home of her sister Belle. They had six children, all born in MO. Benjamin was in the Civil War. He had marched so long and hard his legs froze. He developed ulcers on his legs. He died 1895. They had moved to Saline Co. at Tatumville and had been given 40 acres by Francis Dolly and Joseph W. Tatum. They farmed for a living. Benjamin F. Caton is buried in Pleasant Hill Cemetery, Saline Co., AR.

Barbara Ellen met Samuel (Buck) James of Saline Co. He had lost his wife and had five children to raise by himself. Barbara Ellen and Samuel married 1898 Pulaski Co., AR. They had two children between them. Warren James died at birth. Millie Irene was born in Saline Co. The family moved to Hot Springs for a while and then to Kaufman Co., TX. While living in Texas Samuel died. The year was 1916. Barbara Ellen moved back to Little Rock. The children had all married and gone except Millie. She lived in Little Rock with her sister Belle. After Belle died, Barbara Ellen moved to Hot Springs and resided there until her death July 4, 1936. She is buried in Gravel Hill Cemetery, Saline Co., AR.

OLD "REID FAMILY CEMETERY"
Clark County, Arkansas

This information was sent to us by Gearldean Horton Musgrave of 1781 Woodmont Circle, Erlanger, KY 41018. She states that this cemetery has been lost to the public for many years. "It is the burial place for my father's gut-gut grandparents and many of their children and grandchildren. I do have copies of pictures (all were made prior to 1880 in Clark Co.) of George Reid [4] and his wife, Nancy W. Ezzard (Izzard). Also some pictures of four of their fifteen known children. One of the pictures is from a portrait made prior to 1863. It is of John L. Reid who was killed in Clark County, Ark. 15 February 1863. ...

This cemetery is located on the farm of Mr. Lloyd Stockton, Hwy. 26 between Clear Springs and Hollywood in Clark County, Arkansas. Additional remarks have been added in parentheses by the contributor of this article. This cemetery was found by Mr. Garland A. Horton of Camden, Arkansas, and his daughter, Gearldean Horton Musgrave, of Erlanger, KY. Mr. Horton had searched for many years for this cemetery which they knew was in the area, but had been lost for many years to the family. Through many trips to the County Courthouse at Arkadelphia and searching the land records and deeds, they were able to finally locate the vicinity of the cemetery. There are only two or three stones standing at this date, and many broken pieces of headstones that had to be pieced together to gain the information presented here. As far as it is known this cemetery has never been published in any cemetery records before. Through the stubborn perseverance of Mr. Horton who had said he would never stop searching, the following is as nearly correct as can be ascertained.

Many land records, Bible Records, and census records have been used in verifying the identification of these graves. Traditional stories from several branches of this family proved its existence, but it had eluded us for so long. We have also made some pictures of stones that were pieced together.

The cemetery was rediscovered 2 October 1983. Thanks again to all the residents along Hwy. 26, who had sought to help us in finding it. Many thanks to the ladies of the courthouse who helped us in searching the records.

This family touches many of the families in the Clark County area. There were at least fifteen known children in this family. When we found them in 1860 Census - we found them clustered next door to each other in a family group. What a tragedy, three of George's daughters were living alongside of their parents and brother, John L. Reid and all three were young widows with small children.

John L. Reid was buried there after being killed by sniper bullets in a civilian battle in the Civil War (See "CHRONICLES OF ARKANSAS") February 15, 1863. This story was printed in an early copy of the CLARK COUNTY HISTORICAL JOURNAL, VOL 1-2 1973-74, in an article by Grace Benton Nelson.

PERSONS KNOWN TO BE BURIED IN THE "REID FAMILY CEMETERY"

1. George W. Reid, b 1 March 1803, d 10 Feb. 1881 (George was born in GA, son of George (3), George (2), Alexander (1). Alexander Reid was the immigrant ancestor of this family and was born in Ireland. He, along with several brothers, arrived in America, settling first in Pennsylvania, removing to Rowan

County, NC, where Alexander Reid died (will found there in 1777). Shortly thereafter, members of the family began moving into Georgia. It was here that our George was born, married and began to rear his family.

2. Nancy W. Reid, b 2 April 1805 (SC) d 30 May 1875. (Nancy was the dau of John Lzzard (Ezzard) and wife Margaret Ward? both of SC. Nancy became the wife of George W. Reid (4) 15 Feb 1821).

3. John L. Reid b 22 Nov 1822 d 15 Feb 1863 (son of George and Nancy Reid).

4. Mary Reid b 1819 (GA) d 25 Jan 1880 (d/o of a ?? Griffin and ??Lzzard mother). She was wife of John L. Reid above.

5. Nancy E. (Ellen) Bridges b 1832 d 1 Oct 1873. She was the d/o George W. Reid and Nancy W. Ezzard. She was a widow in the 1860 Census with 4 small daughters. Her husband and one small dau had died prior to census.

6. Solomon Bridges b ? d Mar 1860 (husband of Nancy E. Reid above).

7. Ellen Bridges b 11 Dec 1855 d 18 Aug 1858 (d/o Nancy E. Reid and Solomon Bridges - Footpiece reads E. C. B.).

8. Isaac L. Reid b 1845 d ? (part of stone having deathdate was lost - son of George W. Reid and Nancy W. Ezzard).

9. Mary L. Reid b 24 Sept 1840 d 21 ?? 1858 (Footpiece reads M.L. R. and she was d/o George W. Reid and Nancy W. Ezzard).

10. Miranda C. Malone b 10 Aug 1811 d Oct 1860 (Father-in-law of George W. Reid, Jr. a son of George W. Reid Sr. and Nancy W. Ezzard. This Geo. Jr. married Elizabeth Malone. Will of Miranda C. Malone in Courthouse in Arkadelphia, Ark.).

11. Nancy E. May b 3 Oct 1860 d 12 Nov 1903 (was this a dau of Miranda C. Malone who married James May - if so was she born after her father's death?).

12. D. L. Etcherson (Etchinson-Etcheson) b ?? d ?? (Only a name on a stone found, no dates determined - tradition says there was a kin).

13. Dorcus wife of D. L. Etcherson b Dec (9 or 12) 1834 d 15 Feb 1879.

14. W. R. Price b 25 Dec 1843 d 6 April 1887 (Footpiece reads (W.R.) (s/in/law of Miranda C. Malone and Nancy).

15. Nancy A. Price daughter of W. R. and S. J. Price - b 9 Aug 1869 d 31 Aug 1869 (Footpiece - N. A. P. -- S. J. Price above was the dau of Miranda C. Malone and wife Nancy).

16. Infants - twin daughters of W. R. Price and S. J. Price b and d 12 Aug 1874.

17. Susan D. daughter of W. R. Price and S. J. Price b 22 Oct 1867 d 24 Dec 1867.

(#15, 16 and 17 - all children of Wm. Price and Sarah Jane Malone).

The following persons are almost certain to be buried there - but no stones were found - many of the graves apparently had no stones or the stones were all so broken up they could not be matched. Considering the location of these families in the 1860 and 1870 census and the approximate known dates of death, I believe that it is a correct assumption that they are also buried in this family cemetery.

Elizabeth Reid Horton b ca 1823 d 1862 and was living next door to her brother, John L. Reid at the time of death; that location being adjacent to the family cemetery. Her husband, William J. Horton, had died ca 1856 on GA. She was another daughter of George W. Reid and Nancy Ezzard.

Prosser Horton son of Elizabeth Reid and William J. Horton - last census record was 1860 when he was age 15.

Robert A. Reid b ca 1827 d Dec. 1869 - son of George W. Reid and Nancy Ezzard. His will is in the Clark County Courthouse.

From all appearances there were quite a few more graves and at one time this cemetery was a very large one.

YELLOW DOC, THE RANGER:
AN ARKANSAS LEGEND

His friends called him "Yellow Doc" or just "Doc". His enemies called him "that Banditti Rayborne", or "Captain Rayborne", or just "Rayborne". We now know that his real name was Howell A. Rayburn and that he was born about 1841 in Roane County, Tennessee, the son of Hodge and Susan Rayburn. His family moved to Shelby County, Texas, in 1849 and later settled in Johnson County, south of Fort Worth. There he seems to have been orphaned before 1860. His military career began at the age of 20 when he enlisted in 1861 as a private in Company "C" of Parson's Twelfth Texas Cavalry, C.S.A. In appearance he was slight, even "feminine" in frame, weighing less than 100 pounds. He had long blond hair, loosely draped over his shoulders, hence the nickname "Yellow Doc". His eyes were blue and at times seemed to lose the innocent look of adolescence, and take on a quality of mercilessness and harshness toward those who differed from him in their views, that belied his young years.

He rode into history early in 1862 when his unit arrived at Des Arc, Arkansas, for transport down the White River. He was astride a magnificent chestnut sorrell horse known as "Limber Jim" and was wearing a Mexican sombrero of unusual proportions, fringed with small bells. A pair of immense spurs complimented his Confederate uniform. He was armed with a saber and two large pistols. While at Des Arc, he was stricken with a "malignant fever" and was prevented from proceeding to the War front with his fellow Texans. When he finally recovered in 1863, he found that Federal forces had cut him completely off from any attempt to rejoin his unit.

Not deterred, however, he set about organizing a guerrilla force of some fifty local boys of "like adventurous spirit" aged sixteen to twenty, from Prairie and White counties. His "boys" elected him as their Captain. Unfortunately, no records of their unit have been preserved. Rayburn chose as the "lair" for his command the wilderness of the Little Red River bottoms in and around West Point in White County, Arkansas. His field of operations extended from Searcy on the west, to Cotton Plant on the east, to DuVall's Bluff on the south. To escape frequent Federal patrols, he kept his band in constant motion.

There is some indication that he was a participant in Price's raid into Missouri early in 1864. However, by the summer of that year, he was once again harassing the Union garrison at DuVall's Bluff in Prairie County. Late in July a force of several dozen soldiers scouted toward Searcy and West Point in an attempt to ferret out Rayburn and his men. A detachment entered West Point, and after destroying the mill, took over one of the houses where they waited for the main command. Suddenly, about sixty rebels, commanded by Rayburn, fell upon the unsuspecting Yankees. Since they were dressed "principally" in Federal uniforms, the Union forces were at first ordered not to fire. However, a few shots were exchanged. One Yankee was killed along with two of Rayburn's boys. Nevertheless, "Yellow Doc" managed to capture most of the patrol and scatter the rest. More of the enemy were captured a few days later.

In November of 1864, encouraged by reports of Rayburn being reported near West Point, the commander at DuVall's Bluff again sent a scout into White County, this time consisting of 150 infantry and 100 cavalry. They meant to ascend the White River by boat and move into town at night in hopes of

surprising Rayburn. However, he and his men slipped through the Union dragnet and moved rapidly south into Prairie County, where they "liberated" livestock and cut off small parties of troops.

Late in December, Rayburn sent his lieutenant into DuVall's Bluff with an offer to exchange prisoners. The Yankees had recently captured two of his men, Pope Pipkins and Charles Naiffinger. However, upon learning that they had been taken to Little Rock for incarceration, he gallantly paroled a Union captain, two sergeants, and nine privates.

It was also at this time that Rayburn undertook his most daring and most imaginative raid. It was nearing Christmas. He and his boys were camped near DuVall's Bluff in the Wattensaw swamps. Some of the guerilla fighters--despite all, they were still for the most part adolescents--were jesting about what that Old St. Nick might have in store for them. Their Captain in his "droll" way said, "boys, I am going to be your Santa Claus this year. I plan to go into DuVall's Bluff tomorrow night, and bring out each of you one of Uncle Sam's best cavalry horses." But how will you pass their lines unnoticed, doc?" they asked. "Wait and see," was his reply.

The next day saw him at the home of a southern partisan from whom he borrowed a woman's dress, shoes and hat. Dressed in these, plus the "make-up" of a woman, he came near deceiving even his most intimate friends. It is possible that he might have made use of this type of disguise before. It was a natural for someone with his slight physique and long blond hair.

Thus attired, on Christmas night, he stole stealthily through the Federal lines, walked boldly into the officers quarters to join a "rousing dance" then in progress. According to legend, "little out of the ordinary could be noted about this seemingly rustic maiden who entered without escort." However, "her" walk was somewhat impeded due to the projecting barrels of the two revolvers that were strapped to "her" thighs under the hoop skirt and petticoats.

"Come, let's dance," said one gallant Union officer. Rayburn willingly complied with his request and spent the rest of the evening in the company of one of his enemy, swaying to the martial music of Uncle Sam's regimental band. Little did the officer realize that he held in his arms one of the most dangerous men in Arkansas.

After the festive evening was over, he bid adieu to his new "friends" and assured them that he would attend their next social function. He then quietly stole to the corral. Mounting the fabled horse, he stampeded the score of others, and made a complete getaway before the astonished guards could be fully aroused. His promise of a Christmas present for his men was faithfully fulfilled.

It is known that Rayburn survived the War. On June 15, 1865, he married Martha Anna Booth, daughter of William A. Booth, a prominent citizen of West Point. However, he seems to have died near the end of that year. There are two different accounts of his death. One says that he was arrested by Union officials and imprisoned for many months at Little Rock. Another version says that he was killed by a disgruntled Confederate soldier. Both agree that he was buried in an unmarked grave near Des Arc, Arkansas, in Prairie County. Thus ends the legend of "Yellow Doc, the Ranger", truly a Southern gentleman in skirts.

BOOK REVIEWS/NOTICES

A review and/or announcement of books contributed to the Arkansas Genealogical Society. These books are housed permanently in the local History and Genealogy Room of the Little Rock Public library. The Society expresses its appreciation to the authors for their generous contributions.

GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH DIRECTORY, 1986, National and International Edited by Keith A. Johnson and Malcolm R. Sainty. Published by the editors. Copies and entry forms for the 1987 directory are available from Mrs. Nettie Schreiner-Yantis, 6818 Lois Drive, Springfield, VA 22150, price \$17.75 paperback, \$22.25 hard cover, including postage. The 1986 Directory contains over 100,000 references submitted by 5870 contributors, 784 pages, a list of several hundred major genealogical societies, worldwide, giving library hours, journal frequency, research policy and membership subscription. The Directory lists in alphabetical order the family name being researched, the time period and place. Each entry then refers the reader to the name and address of the contributor. By corresponding with the contributor much useful data may be exchanged by family historians. The Directory is produced annually but entries are not repeated one to another unless the contributor resubmits entries. For the price of the book, contributors may place up to 15 entries and receive a copy of the book at no further charge. Entries for the 1987 Directory close Oct. 31, 1986.

ROBBINS (Evans, Warner, Little, Clark, Overall, and Bull) by Ethel Marie Evans, Box 945, Big Bear Lake, CA 92315. A family history of John Henry Robbins, patriarch of the clan in Hot Springs, AR was born in England December 25, 1800, and was brought to America by his parents when he was about seven years old (A John Henry Robbins, with wife and three children, was found in the list of passengers of the ship THE SAILOR PRINCE, that arrived in America in 1807.) John Henry Robbins married in NY ca 1824, a Mohawk Indian lady named Katherine, then years his senior, was in Mississippi in 1830, Hot Spring Co., AR in 1835, in the area that later became Garland Co. There are also sections on Warners, Pedens, and McDaniels who intermarried with the Robbins. The book is 300 pages, 8-1/2 x 11, hardbound, with numerous photographs. Numbered statistics for each person with personal stories as well, price per copy \$28.85, which may be ordered from the author.

THE LAST FRIESENS IN AMERICA by Pastor George Schnucker, translated by Pastor Kenneth DeWall, is now available in English. At the time of its publication it was the only comprehensive history of the first 65 years of East Friesen settlements in America. "Die Ostfriesen in Amerika" remains today a goldmine of family, church and local history from their arrival in 1847 to the establishment of 18 colonies in Illinois, Iowa, South Dakota and Minnesota up to 1916. The index prepared by the translator was 1175 entries of individuals as well as the listing of nearly 100 churches founded by these God-fearing, industrious people. Hardbound, 320 pp., price \$19.95, includes postage & handling. Order from Rev. Kenneth DeWall, 143 Virginia Ave., Bethalto, IL 62010.

DERTHICKS AND RELATED DERRICKS, by Jack Taif Spencer and Robert A. Goodpasture. (Order from Dr. Jack T. Spencer, 1303 Azalea Lane, DeKalb, IL 60115, \$25.00, postpaid. This is the first large volume published on the history of the Derthicks (Dethicks) in England and America. It begins with the genealogy and history of the family from the earliest records in England (ca. 1200 A.D.) and

goes on to include all known present-day Derthicks in America up to 1986. The family is documented in England under the surname Dethick, whereas the descendants in America are documented under the surname Derthick and Derrick. The book contains a series of unique ancestral charts which simplify the tracing of family lineages. For example, the English lineage is traced through as many as fifteen generations and the descent is easily followed. The same system of charts is used for all American lineages where the descendants are traced to as many as eleven generations. Thus, the time span is approximately 26 generations during the 800 years. Printed on archival paper by Gateway Press, hardbound, 626 pp., 54 photos, 4 mpas, indexed 3,700 names, including numerous allied families.

ASHLEY COUNTY, ARKANSAS, MARRIAGE RECORDS, 1849 - 1872, published by Ashley County Genealogical Society, P.O. Drawer R, Crossett, AR 71635. Books "AA" & "A" of the original marriage books have been copied by Faith Nowlin and alphabetized by the name of the groom, showing groom, bride, date of marriage and page number of book in which recorded, with a separate section alphabetized by the name of the bride, showing the same information. We are always happy to see marriage records from our Arkansas counties, adding to available genealogical information on our State. The price of this book was not quoted; however, we note a second publication is in preparation listing the marriages of this county from 1873 to 1885, which is priced at \$17.50, prepaid.

SEARCY COUNTY, ARKANSAS 1850 CENSUS, published by Ruby Lacy, P. O.Box 628, Ashland, OR 97520, 55 pp., with surname index. This book is 8-1/2 x 11 inches in size, soft cover. The households and families are in the arrangement of the original census. The surname of the family is followed by the given name, age and state of birth of each person listed, (one or two notes by the author on a very few families). Price is \$8.00, plus \$1.00 for the first book ordered (\$0.55 for each additional book ordered at the same time, as Mrs.Lacy has other Searcy Co. books available.)

1890 SEARCY COUNTY, ARKANSAS PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX BOOK, published by Bobby June Cash Mays, P. O. Box 149, Marshall, AR 72650, is an alphabetical listing of the personal property taxpayers in Searcy Co. for the year 1890 and serves as a reconstruction of the 1890 census of this county. All entries are followed by the township of residence, and notations from the remarks column in the tax book are included. Soft cover, 8-1/2 x 11, the book contains 38 pp., and is priced at \$10.00. Order from Mrs. Mays at the above address.

RED RIVER COUNTY, TEXAS DEED ABSTRACTS, VOLUME 1 (Republic of Texas and State of Coahuila and Texas), abstracted and published by Joyce Martin Murray, 2921 Daniels, Dallas, TX 75205. This volume contains deeds, wills, bonds, deeds of gift, bills of sale, slave sales, mortgages, powers of attorney and other legal documents which were recorded in Deed Record Books A-B, A-B-C,D and part of F of the records in one of the first counties in Texas. A fascinating aspect of these documents is the evidence of the confusion during these years as to where the settlers thought they lived. You will find references to the Department of Texas, the State of Coahuila and Texas, the Arkansas Territory, Miller County, Red River District of the Republic of Texas, District of Red River, Miller Co., Arkansas, Paschal County. There are three indexes, a full name, places, and slave names, 188 pp., hard bound, 6 x 9", priced at \$25.00 (Texas residents add \$1.25 tax) and may be ordered from the author.

1860 POLK COUNTY, ARKANSAS CENSUS Completely transcribed and has every name indexed. Compiled by Georgia D. Halderlein, 22118 Trotter Road, Grass Valley, CA 95949 - \$12.00 postpaid. (The 1870 Polk Co., AR Census is also available for \$11.00 pp.) This book is the second in a series of selected counties in Arkansas to be published. The Polk County records were destroyed by fire during the Civil War and again in 1883, making research very difficult. In 1860, prior to the Civil War, there was a larger population in this county. This volume has 92 pages, soft cover, 8-1/2 x 11", and is easily read. It was printed as the compiler read it from microfilm. A very welcome addition to research materials on this "burned" county.

SLAVE GENEALOGY: A RESEARCH GUIDE WITH CASE STUDIES, by David H. Streets. This excellent new research guide provides a very clear discussion of slave genealogy with emphasis on the non-plantation slaves, and vividly demonstrates with three case studies drawn from the records of Wayne Co., KY, the research methods and types of analysis that must be employed, and the importance of researching both owners and slaves. The text is well written, informative, and carefully documented, while the case studies are supported by various charts and diagrams, and numerous extracts from original sources which clearly illustrate the methodology and major types of records used. Any genealogist will find this volume to be fascinating and informative reading. Soft cover, 8-1/2 x 11", 70 pp., price \$11.50 postpaid. THE ARKANSAS GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY has named as one of its Arkansas Sesquicentennial projects the reconstruction of the 1890 Census of Arkansas. This census for the entire country was destroyed by fire in Washington in 1921. For the most part, this reconstruction is being done through the use of county tax records in each of Arkansas' 75 counties. Adding to these records, as well as the 1890 Searcy Co., AR publication reviewed elsewhere in this publication, are:

REAL ESTATE TAX BOOK 1889-1890 ST. FRANCIS CO., ARKANSAS, which was a sanctioned Sesquicentennial Project, compiled by Kathleen S. Bell, former AGS Board Member, P. O. Box 8, Plainview, AR 72857, indexed by Doyle Traxler, Centerville, AR. The compilation is a listing of persons and property assessed for taxation in St. Francis Co., AR, in 1890. The list is given by township, range, and number of acres as listed by the corresponding pages in the tax book. The Forrest City Addition has a simple listing of names. The full name index is according to the page as it is shown in the tax records, not by the page count of this book. The inhabitants of each town who owned property have their name mentioned. Copies may be ordered from Bell Books, P.O. Box 8, Plainview, AR 72857 at \$11.00 each, plus \$1.00 postage.

1890 WHITE COUNTY, ARKANSAS "CENSUS", Reconstructed from the 1890 Personal Property Tax Book, by Wensil Marsh (Mrs. Larry P.) Clark, 1211 Biscayne Drive, Little Rock, AR 72207. Individuals are listed by Township and School District, with notes as to "merchant", "piano", "minor", etc. and covers 30 townships in this county. Soft cover, 96 pp., priced at \$10.00 and may be ordered from the compiler.

JOHN TOOLE - RUTH ANN RANKIN AND THEIR DESCENDANTS, compiled by Joe Mason and Mary Craig, 412 South Barnwell St., Oceanside, CA 92054. This is the history of John Toole, a Presbyterian Irishman, born in Ulster Province, County Down in 1756, who married Ruth Ann Rankin about 1789 and moved to Hawkins Co., NC, later

to become Knox Co., TN. When John Toole drowned on March 11, 1792, he left his land at Toole's Bend to his four sons, James, Matthew, William and John Toole, Jr. and he allotted Ruth Toole, his widow, her equal third part as dowry during life. Many of the descendants of this family settled in Arkansas and this is their story. Soft-cover, 340 pp., photos and full name index. Contact authors for price as it was not given in our review copy.

Desmond Walls Allen continues with the compilation and publication of records for her area of Arkansas. We were happy to receive copies of the following books:

INDEX TO THE TRACT BOOKS FOR FULTON CO., ARKANSAS, by Desmond Walls Allen, 83 pp., soft-cover, 8-1/2 x 11, \$12.50 postpaid, velo binding. This index contains the names of 4,078 individuals who acquired land from the Federal Government in the area of present-day Fulton Co., AR. Purchases, bounty land warrant grants and homestead claims are included from earliest settlement (1830s) through the 1930s. Full names are listed with the year of transaction and land description by section, range and township. The State Land Office track book and page number are listed along with the Arkansas History Commission microfilm roll number. This Index is especially valuable as the Fulton Co. Courthouse burned in 1877 and most of the records were lost. The Index can serve as a finding tool for Federal census records. This book can be a valuable asset to anyone researching Fulton Co., AR ancestors.

PENCE FUNERAL HOME, CONWAY, ARKANSAS 1881 - 1904, VOL. 1, by Desmond Walls Allen, 154 pp., soft cover, velo binding, 8-1/2 x 11", \$16.50 postpaid. This book contains the names of over 3,000 people buried by Pence Funeral Home from January 1881 through June 1904, as taken from four ledgers. The first Pence ledger is indexed separately as it contains much less information than subsequent ledgers. The second, third and fourth ledgers contain the name, age, race and residence of the deceased, the date of death or funeral, cause of death and place of burial, and a "remarks" column which seems to contain the name of the person responsible for the funeral expenses. Pence Funeral Home served Faulkner County and parts of Conway, Pulaski, Van Buren, White and Lonoke Counties. These records of the Pence Collection at the Arkansas History Commission in Little Rock, and at present, only the originals exist.

PENCE FUNERAL HOME, CONWAY, ARKANSAS, 1904 - 1926, VOL. II, by Desmond Walls Allen, 212 pp., soft cover, velo-binding 8-1/2 x 11", \$19.50 postpaid. This book contains 3,313 burial records of this funeral home 31 May 1904 through 31 August 1926 and continues the records in Volume 1. Pence Funeral Home served primarily Faulkner County, but the records show that funerals were conducted for people from Perry, Pulaski, Conway, Van Buren, White and Lonoke Counties. This book covers the fifth Pence ledger on file at the Arkansas History Commission. As Mr. Pence had no significant competition in the funeral home business until Doolin Funeral Home was established in 1928, his records provide a nearly complete picture of commercially conducted funerals in the Faulkner County and surrounding area.

WARNING ON ORDERING CENSUS RECORDS - MULLER GENEALOGY SERVICE Helen J. Muller contacted us concerning various Arkansas census records she has for sale. In August, 1985, the 1880 Census of Hempstead Co. and the 1880 Census of Pike Co., Arkansas were ordered from her with a check enclosed. The check was cashed on September 9, 1985, but in spite of two follow-up letters, no word has been received as to when we may expect these books. We are advising our members NOT

to order books from this company, as the compiler has failed to send publications ordered, has cashed the check, and has not replied to our inquiries.

WE HAVE ACQUIRED A COMPLETE SET OF 35 VOLUMES OF THE DOMESDAY BOOK! Considered one of the most important books ever written, the full Latin text was printed once before, in 1783, but in 900 years there has never before been a complete English translation. Nine hundred years ago exactly - in the year 1086 - William the Conqueror launched the great Domesday Survey of England to ascertain the extent and value of his newly acquired lands. In accordance with his plan, commissioners were dispatched to every county in the realm to discover the names of landowners and their tenants as well as the names of those who owned the land in the time of Edward the Confessor (d. 1066), the extent of the cultivated territory, and the total value of the land, plows, and livestock. The returns from the various counties were collected at Winchester, corrected and abridged, and fair-copied by one writer into a single volume. (Norfolk, Suffolk, and Essex were copied into a second volume, while Durham and Northumberland were transcribed in a volume known as the Boldon Book.) Since this was accepted as the final authoritative register of rightful possession, people called it Domesday Book, by analogy with the Day of Judgment. It is difficult to exaggerate the importance of this work or to over-state its achievement. Arranged by counties, one county per numbered volume, \$650.00 per set.

ANOTHER IMPORTANT NEW ACQUISITION - ARKANSAS CONFEDERATE VETERANS AND WIDOWS PENSION APPLICATIONS, by Frances T. Ingmire, hard-bound, 8-1/2 x 11", 442 pp., \$32.50. This is a State-wide listing of all veterans and widows of veterans who applied for pensions to Ex-Confederate servicemen and their widows from the State of Arkansas. Individuals were from many Southern States. Listed is the veteran application number, surname, with full given name where known, widows application number, in most cases her full name, Company, Division, Regiment, with date served, if wounded, killed in action, captured, injured, or illness, is noted. Date of application for both veteran and widow (in some cases mothers of veteran), county of residence, date veteran died if known, and when his widow died if known. Arkansas and other states by common consent, had agreed that pensions for the C.S.A. would be granted by the State in which the veteran or his widow lived at the time of application rather, than by the State from which he served. Almost 50,000 Arkansans received pensions for the Civil War Service under this program from 1891 until the creation of the State Department of Welfare in 1939.
