Blair Letters
Continued from September/December, 1987

April 8, 1883

Dear Father and Sisters,

Yours after so long came to hand and was glad to hear from you. Nothing to write. We are having some nice weather. I have not planted any corn yet but I am ready. This is the nicest country I ever saw now in one more week the woods will be as green as a wheat field. Everything looks well. My cattle would make good beef. My wheat looks fine. I have 22 acres sowed. It is the nicest wheat around here. Wheat is worth 80 cents, corn 25 cents. Cattle are clear out of reason. Milk cows are from \$40 to \$50. I have one that I gave \$15 for 12 months ago that could git now \$50 for if I would sell her. Sucking calves are worth \$10. I think we will have plenty of fruit. Last year there was shipped 150,000 bushels of apples from Benton Co. and I do not think that there was more than 1/3 of the apples that was raised here was shipped either. I confess I did not know what an orchard was until I came here. There was a man give me this spring 60 horse apple trees and I have set them out, just such trees as we paid 25c for there. Tell Dave and Joe Burns I would like to see them. They just missed it by not coming with me. If Dave was out here with the boys that he has he could make a good living. I have bought 45 acres more land for \$160. Have paid \$40 of it down and git until June on the balance without interest and then until September to pay 1/2 of it by paying 10 percent interest and then until March 84 to pay the balance. It is numer one land and a good spring on it. The same fence that encloses it and some of the first land I bought. If my land was in Roane County, Tenn. would sell for \$3000. Really if I pay up on it in June I can get a deed for it then. It was sold for distribution. The title is all right and I will like \$100 of having money enough to pay for it. I wrote to James Blair to know how much there would be coming to me. He did not say, he sent me \$10.35 and said he would send some more in May. If you or the girls either will loan me \$100, I will give you an order to him for all that will be coming to me and will pay you the balance in 12 months with interest. I do not want you to give it to me. I want to borrow it for I can make the money in 12 months if you will loan me the money. Ascertain how much will be coming to me. I can get the money here by giving a mortgage on the place. I do not want to do that. The reason I want to pay up in June, all the rest that bought land at the sale are going to pay up in June and I would like to pay too and get a deed. I have made a good trade. I wish you could see it. I think you would say so. If you can do anything for me, let me know rite a way. Do not discommod yourself.

I am as well satisfied as I want to be. I don't regret coming out here. I would like to see you all, I hope we all meet On earth one time more. I could tell you a heap. So no more hoping to hear from you soon.

Dear Aunties

As Johnnie was writing to Grandpa, I thought I would write to you. We were so very glad to get a letter from you. Aunt Suckie I think it will do Ma good for a whole month, she sayed she just felt like she had seen you and talked with you all day. I wish I could see you come riding up on old Cat, I know you could not help liking our home. Our garden truck looks nice. Pa is ready to begin planting corn, and Ma is going to make soap in the morning. I tell you Aunt Suckie, my Pa eats no idle bread, I like a heap of the Arkansas people, and that is the rason we can have so plenty of every thing to eat or wear, every thing we want. Ma and pa at home and works and makes us too, but I study my lessons every day. I have been thru my third reader three times, spelled all the spelling by heart. So Ma has now put me in a larger reader, one that Pa used to read in at school. Tell Aunt Nance I am going to try my luck raising geese. I have some eggs setting. I think maybe by age 21 I will have me a feather bed. I am piecing me a very pretty scrap quilt called Winding Blades. I can crochet, please send me some little pieces of crocheting for a sample. I want to make some pretty trimming for mine and Maggie's pantiletts.

Dear Aunt much love to you all.

Mary Ann and Jane I never expect to forget you.

At Home, Ark
April 9, 1883

Dear Old Grandpa,

I have not received a letter from you in a long time, so I thought I would write you to see what had become of you. Grandpa the winter was so cold. I tell you it made a fellow dance around to keep warm and now Spring has come I have plenty to do. I have to drive the cows to the pasture every morning and night, feed my calves and shell corn for the pigs besides cut stove and house wood, and help carry water and besides that I find time to learn my lessons and spell to Ma. I tell you Grandpa there is no way to get around the work, I helped Pa to plant a fine big irish potatoe patch the other day. Ma has plenty of little chickens, so just come to see us this Summer and we will feed you on fried chicken and potatoes. We had a fine big wild turkey hen for dinner last week. It made three meals plentiful. We can hear the wild turkey gobbling every where all around most every morning. They're almost as plentiful as rabbits in Tennessee. Ten and 15 in a drove, there is not many squirrels, plenty of deers.

I went to the mill yesterday, just three miles and while the corn was being ground, I fished in the creek - a whaling big creek called Spavinaw, the Indians named it.

Well Grandpa I tell you Arkansas beets the world for ticks, I have not seen a

flea since we left Tennessee but I tell you the ticks are more plentiful than house flies, some times I think if I just had a good pair of wings I would fly back to old Tennessee and get shet of the ticks.

Be sure and send us your pictures for I do want to see you worse than any body in this whole world, write to us soon. Soon, very soon.

May 20, 1883

Dear Father,

Yours at hand and was glad to hear from you and get your pictures. This leaves us all well. Nothing new to write. Everything looks well. Wheat that was sowed with a drill is fine and that that was sowed broadcast is no account. Mine was sowed with a drill. North of me the specelators (sic) have been offering to advance the money to grow crop at \$1.50 cents per bushel. We will not have any apples this year but will have plenty of peaches.

Well as to my land it will be due the first of next month. I can get the money here but have to give a mortgage on 3 times the amount of land. That is all the way any one can borrow money here. I do not want to do that if I can do any better. That was the reason I send to you for it. I did not want you to give it to me. If you or the girls cannot let me have it, it is all right. If you can send it as soon as you get this and I will pay it back by July 1884. June is our best hog market. I would not have thought it but it was first class land and I got 2 springs and the fence that encloses it encloses part of my other land and if any one else had of bought it I never could have got it for there was no one knew how the lines run until it was sold. I have had the lines run and it surprised everyone the old settlers say I have the finest grove of timber in the country. If is the finest young timber I ever saw. Land is going up mity fast here. Land is about as high again as it was one year ago. There is a farm in 1 1/2 miles of me, the man gave 2000 for it ten years ago, and thought he gave an awful price for it. A while back he was offered \$6000 and if the place was with you it would be worth \$15,000 or \$20,000. He has 122 1/2 acres in one field in wheat, the finest I ever saw. Last year he sold \$3000 worth of stuff off of it. He sold over 1000 bushel of apples. I wished you could see some orchards that is out here. There is one close to me there is 60 acres over 3000 trees in it and there is at Bentonville with 100 acres in it and there is a man the other side of there told me in the Spring he was going to set out 250 acres in trees. The trees you have would not be called an orchard here and it beets the world for grapes. Hogs are fat on the range, there are acorns enough to last them until August. I will close the present hoping to hear from you soon, Your Son,

We had a frost Sunday and Monday night that lifted garden stuff.

At home, May 20, 1883

Dear Sisters,

I thought I would write you, in reply to yours with the Photographs. It is a great source of satisfaction just to have your pictures to look at, when we are so many miles apart, I want too, just as soon as we can have the childrens taken to send them to you, but you see this is the way we have been situated, the first year it was buy everything to live upon, well then we raised a crop, we had plenty and still have, then Mr. Blair bought this land and then he had to buy hogs and other stock, that has always kept him in a strain, and farming tools, so this summer is all the time that I have made anything to sell. I am making butter every week, but I cannot sell it for money, unless I could sent it to Bentonville which is 15 miles, I sell it all at the nearby stores and have been clothing the entire family for 6 months or longer just with the cows, and now you have no idea what it takes for a growing family every day and Sunday ware. My garden looks fine, tell Jane if she only had my John to help her in her garden, she would have light work. I will just say, he is the best hand with a hoe I ever saw for one of his age and there is no stoping him till everything is just to his notion, and then his little old piece of a hoe that the child found and put a handle in it is hung up like it was worth its weight in gold. I expect I am wearying you. I will close. Write soon.

Dear Father,

As I have wrote you and have not got a letter from you in about two months, I am getting uneasy. Nothing new to write you only we have a new commer here, his name is Samuel Thomas Blair. The name is entirely for my folks. He is three weeks old and Hessie is up and doing better than she has ever done.

We are all well and doing well. I am engaged in winding up the business of a Post Office here. Me and another man are put in charge of. The P.M. run off and left it. The name is Decatur. We are having to carry the mail to. I think it will soon be closed.

Corn is turning out fine. I am not quite done gathering yet. I made a fine crop. My wheat looks fine. There is nothing to hinder any one from making a living here when they once get a start.

Did you ever see Reed about the paper I have not got any since I wrote to you. I will close until I hear from you.

Dear Father and Sisters,

In reply to your kind letter, which we received some time ago, and was so glad to hear from you. We have neglected to write you, thinking we would get one letter from you, stating, that papa and you Susan were coming to see us, the is just was I surmised from your writing that you would write again before coming and write something that would surprise us, but I fear we are all doomed to be disappointed, we received a letter from Sammie Blair, and Mary wrote a little note in it, stating that her Aunt Nannie was married. Do write to us all about who it is. I truly hope she has a worthy man. I think she deserved that kind of a husband.

The children are all well and growing very fast. Johnie is a world of help can go and shuck corn and do all of his pa's feeding and watering of horses and feeding hogs, and he said the other day that Grandpa had just quit writing to him and he would like to know if he was mad about any thing. Write soon to us all the news far and near.

Mr. Blair says do not think hard of him writing no sooner, he has been away from home nearly three weeks, he had his wheat crop to take care of up on the prairie, 13 miles away, and has been helping to thrash wheat every where, he has been uncommonly stout, and I will just say he has this whole Summer come nearer doing 3 mens work than one and now he is in his millet up to his soulders, trying to save it. He hardly gets a moment's rest only on Sunday.

I do not know whether you have ever heard of our trouble as well as prosperity. Brother Hardy's wife took down sick with pneumonia fever the first of July and after 14 days of great suffering died, she was perfectly sensible to within about 2 hours of her death and talked, with difficulty, to the last, all of her trouble was leaving her family of 6 children, the two oldest are large enough to be of some benefit and the 4 younger ones are all a little smaller than mine, her death, it was truly a great blow to us all. Mother promised Becca to take charge of her children and after that she seemed perfectly satisfied to die, but Mother is so weak and feable without a great change she will not live very long, I am greatly afraid, Johnie Cotton's wife has a fine daughter, their first child, about one month old, and she has not done well and kees (sic) quite feeble. The rest of the connection are all well, hoping to hear from you soon

John P. Minton was born ca 1825 in Jackson County, Georgia, to Jason Minton and Mary Ann Matthews. John married first, 24 July 1845, Cherrokee County, Georgia, Anna Cook. Their children, all born in Cherrokee County, Georgia, were: 1. Charles A. born June 1846, married ca 1869 Louise Hopgood; he is buried on his farm in Avant, AR, unmarked grave. 2. John W. born Feb. 1848 married first Milly McCoy, second 2 Dec. 1886 Mary (Housley) Lillard. 3. Mary A. born Feb. 1850. 4. Eliza born ca 1853 married 1 April 1877 William Kilby. 5. Emily Fronus born 11 April 1854, died 7 March 1905, Garland County, AR, married 28 Jan. 1879 Albert F. Kilby. 6. Sarah C. or E. born ca. 1857 married 15 Feb. 1880 James M. Redding. 7. Minerva I. born c. 1854. 8. Joseph J. born Nov. 1850, died 1934? Garland County, AR, married 11 March 1888 Nancy Ellen Avant. 9. Amanda born ca. 1865 married 5 March 1886 John F. Cass.

John P. Minton married second Elizabeth Purser Sparks 29 July 1866 in Bartow County, GA. Elizabeth born ca 1840, daughter of William and Elizabeth Purser. Elizabeth was the widow of James Sparks and had one child, Elizabeth "Lizzie" born 25 Jan. 1862 Bartow County, GA, died 24 Jan. 1917, married 8 June 1884, Jerry Hughes. "Lizzie" went by her stepfather's name.

John and Elizabeth had four children: 1. James Matthew born 16 June 1869, Cherrokee County, GA, died 21 Oct. 1842, Garland Co., AR, married 9 Dec. 1888, Mary Ann Judith Avant, daughter of Moses Marshall Avant and Milly Caroline Lamb. 2. Florence R. born Aug. 1871, Cherrokee County, GA, died 21 Feb. 1965, Garland Co., AR, married first 3 Feb. 1889 George Godwin, second Willis Mayfield. 3. Louisan G. "Lois" (or "Bash"), born 17 Aug. 1876, Arkansas, died 8 April 1963 Garland Co., AR, married 14 Dec. 1893, Eliza M. Riley. 4. Parlie Mickie born 15 Feb. 1881 Arkansas, died 11 March 1963, Garland County, AR, married 2 Nov. 1897 William Pink Godwin.

John P. Minton with his large family moved from Georgia to Arkansas by wagon, family; members remember hearing that while crossing the Mississippi River the wagon got stuck and John had to rock the wheels to get it free, then one of the family riding on the wheel to keep from getting stuck again. It was also told that John walked with a limp from an old wound he received in the war. John was

a tall man and Elizabeth was a short woman.

John and Elizabeth lived for several years in Avant, Montgomery County (now Garland County), Arkansas. John died in the 1880s and Elizabeth died in the early 1900s. They are buried in unmarked graves in the Avant Cem. Most of John P. Minton's descendants still live in Garland and Montgomery Counties of Arkansas.

ROBERT M. FLINN

Robert M. Flinn, the eldest son of Hugh and Mrs. (Botterell) Flinn, was born on Mountain Fork, Crawford Co., AR, in 1844.

When attending school in childhood the writer knew him as a big boy who would kindly help him to cross the creek named Bob Flinn. The friendship resulting from the early association, has undergone no abatement in the flight of years.

Stated in a few words the war record of Bob Flinn is as follows: Without disclosing his intention to any person, he walked away from home, enlisted in Co. B, Capt. Clark's third Missouri regiment, under Gen. Sterling Price, and participated in the battles of Elkhorn, Corinth, seige of Vicksburg, siege of Charleston, siege of Petersburg, VA, and others.

He was wounded seven times: at Elkhorn through the bowels; at Corinth, in the limb; at Grand Gulf, Miss., in the knees; at Vicksburg had his thigh broken; at Charleston had his arm broken; and consequently his thigh was broken again in the same place. In one instance he was laid among the dead, but was found to be alive when the bodies were being buried. He was captured three times; exchanged twice and paroled at the end of the war.

Since nothing was heard of Bob after he left home, his former neighbors would speculate and theorize as to what had become of him. Before the war was over, his old friends for the most part decided that he was dead.

Early in 1865 the Flinn family moved to the river bottom a few miles from Van Buren. In midsummer a boat came up the river with Bob on board. This boat made the Hayes Landing. Then and there Bob learned that his family were living on the Lacy farm nearby, whereupon he went to their place of residence. On arriving at the house, his father did not recognize him as he was lame leaning on his cane for support and had grown a mustache during his more than three years absence from home.

Soon after the Flinn family moved back to their old home on Mountain Fork.

Although walking was attended with difficulty and he was suffering from gunshot wound that was slow in healing, Bob wanted something to do. He helped my father make sorghum molasses as he could sit and put the cane through the primitive mill.

In the spring of 1866, the doctor removed three bullets from the body of Bob. However he was soon hobbling about doing whatever he could. Very naturally his bearing and persistency excited the wonder and admiration of his neighbors, while he gradually regained strength, his injured knee proved a serious impediment to efficiency.

Always ready and willing to aid others, Bob would go to the log-rollings in the neighborhood of his home. On these occasions the onerous labor would affect his nerves, thereby causing involuntary shaking of his weak knee.

Bob married a good woman, bought a farm on Mountain Fork, and reared a large famiy of useful, respected citizens.

On December 20, 1925, he answered the last roll call. Dec. 22 his body was laid at rest near the remains of his kindred in Lewis Graveyard (?), Evensville, Washington County, Arkansas.

The imperishable lustre, clustering around the names of Jackson and Lee, was made possible by the heroism of the common soldier. Bob Flinn contributed in full measure to the winning of their everlasting renown.

This proud distinction, this signal honor, will pass on to his grandchildlren as a priceless heritage, who should keep it untarnished in the far summers that we are not to see.

In speaking of Heroism, Emerson says: "Heroism is an obedience to a secret impulse, of an undaunted boldness and of a fortitude not to be wearied out."

In threefold measure, the life and character of Bob Flinn exemplify these characteristics and essentials in a high degree. First, in the clash of arms and the tumultuous din and terrific carnage of war. Second in the peaceful pursuits of life his indomitable spirit brushed aside obstacles that would have daunted many in the pride of life and strength and finally he showed remarkable patience and fortitude while confined to his bed for a number of years until death freed him from further physical suffering.

Columbus is listed with cousins: George, John and Jacob.
Jane S. Misenheimer lived to be 108 years old in Rowan County.
It is not known if she married again after Reed's death.

It was told to me by William James Misenheimer (Willie) that his

father, Columbus, was married three times.

Tishey Waggoner was supposedly his first wife. She was an Indian woman fully believing in the vows of marriage. Columbus loved to roam and travel. He and Tishey were supposed to have had two children. She got fed up with his "laying out at night" and fixed a dinner for him laced with a potent Indian remedy to put you permanently to sleep. When he came in that night, he threw it out to the chickens because it was stone cold. The next morning, all the chickens were dead in the yard. He left her and divorced her as soon as possible.

Columbus soon emigrated to north Arkansas with his family which included his brothers and cousins. They settled in Izard and Independence counties - later moving to Stone county.

Columbus had inherited a sum of money which he spent riding the railroad back and forth from North Carolina to Arkansas. He was forced to settle down somewhat when other children were born to him from his second wife, Ms. Dorsey of Batesville, Arkansas.

No one knows what happened to Ms. Dorsey. She was said to have passed away right after their marriage and the births of the children. Two daughters, Lottie and Lillie, and one son, Purley James, were the only known children from the marriage.

Columbus married Clara Jane Fielder formerly of Batesville, Arkansas. Their later years were filled with following the White River and gleaning the mussel shells for the pearl buttons then in style. They loved the river somuch that they stayed in a tent on the river and followed it all the way to Des Arc. Mary Marie died at two years of age and shortly afterward, Columbus became ill. They moved back to Batesville where Columbus died shortly afterward. He was buried in the Batesville cemetery. Clara Jane is also buried in the same cemetery.

Willie narrated this to me. He said he remembered his dad as being a very strong man. He watched him cross the White River carrying his mother on his back while swimming and never breaking is stroke.

Any information to complete this genealogy of Reed and Jane Miserheimer (German immigrants) would be very much appreciated.





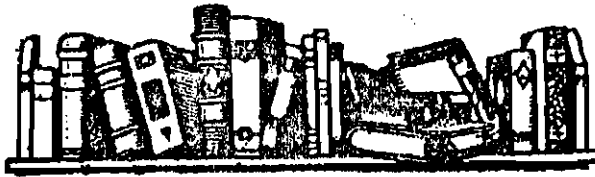

1988 HISTORICAL CALENDAR by Shirley "Gypsie" Cannon depicts Historical Churches of Polk County, AR. The calendar includes pictures of the churches and a history of each. Some of these churches have histories dating back to the 1840's and some came into existence when Mena became a boom town in 1896, with the coming of the railroad. POLK COUNTY, ARKANSAS OBITUARIES 1899-1900-1902-1904-1914, plus Selected Others, by Shirley "Gypsie" Cannon, PO Box 683, Mena, AR 71953. Velo-bound, 119 pages, \$12.00. Polk Co. had its share of newspapers, some political and some just newsy, but all are now gone with the exception of the MENA STAR est. 1896, and a few years of the DEMOCRAT. The STAR purchased the DEMOCRAT and the St. John family preserved the remaining copies. Since Polk Co. courthouse suffered three fires the last in 1883, these papers serve as the best source of information for this lost period. - BJM

ASHLEY COUNTY, ARKANSAS, 1880 CENSUS. This record contains over 10,600 indexed surnames listed by townships as recorded in the census. It includes every person in the household, relationship to head, age, race, occupation, birthplace, and birthplace of parents. Published by the Ashley County Genealogical Society, PO Drawer R, Crossett, AR 71635. Softbound, 8-1/2 x 11, 156 pages, \$15.00 postpaid. (VERY inexpensive for this well-done census!) - BJM

SUMNER COUNTY, TENNESSEE, WILL ABSTRACTS, 1788-1882, by Shirley Wilson, CG, 106 Leeward Point, Hendersonville, TN 37075, hard cover, 192 pp., \$24.00, plus \$2.00 shipping and handling. Tennessee residents need to add 7-3/4 sales tax. The original wills, which were found among the Sumner Co. court records at the Tennessee State Library and Archives, were the primary source used in the preparation of this book, supplemented with microfilm copies of the will book. In this computer generated volume, the will abstracts are in alphabetical order with a complete name index, and any item of genealogical interest such as the family Bible, specific place of burial, etc. was included. The Personal Property Tax Records and real estate records for the Lower District were also used in compiling this record. This Genealogical Society, with the help of several of its members, has done an excellent job of reconstructing this missing census. - BJM

A-1 is the earliest extant will book for Saline County and virtually every name has been extracted from it and included in this book, including the names of heirs, executors, administrators, witnesses, and slaves. All dates are included and obvious errors are noted.- DWA

The Family History of Eula Mae Miller Fisher, Compiled by Carolyn Earle Billingsley, Saline Research, 270 Midland Road, Alexander, AR 72002, 49 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Softcover, Full name index, Bibliography, \$10.00 plus \$1.00 postage. This is a pictorial history of "Grandmommie," born 1887 in Milam County, Texas. Her husband was Fred Haynes Fisher and the book was compiled to commemorate Mrs. Fisher's 100th birthday. Mrs. Fisher's ancestors include the Martin Miller family of 1820 Mulhunberg Co., KY; the Kittinger family of 1750 Philadelphia Co., PA; the Shaver/Schaaber family of 1752 Berks Co., PA; the Stewarts of of Muhlenberg Co., KY; and the Edward Jarvis family of Muhlenberg Co., KY. Copies of photos and original source documents and transcriptions of letters make this a very interesting family history. - DWA

Ashby Funeral Home 1929 - 1940 Book 2 (Benton, Saline County, Arkansas), Compiled by Shirlene Martin Chilton, Published by and available from the Saline County History and Heritage Society, PO Box 221, Bryant, AR 72022-0221; 30 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Softbound, Surname Index, Cemetery Index, \$6.00 plus \$1.25 postage. This book is a sequel to Undertaker's Records: A Personal Account Record of Ashby Funeral Home, 1916 - 1928 which is still available from the same source for \$12.50 plus \$1.25 postage. This book lists the deceased's name, city of residence, death date, and remarks about the name of the cemetery and person responsible for the expenses. The compiler notes the condition of the original record - some pages are missing and several people's handwriting appears in the records. In some cases, the compiler has added the name of the cemetery from other records.- DWA

North and South Carolina Marriage Records: From the Earliest Colonial Days to the Civil War, Compiled and Edited by William Montgomery Clemens, originally published in 1927. This is a scrapbook type family history gathered from a variety of sources. This Davis line descends from John Davis

who came to America and settled on the Pee Dee River and married a widow Williams. Lists of descendants with photos and copies of original documents are included.- DWA

Carroll Frontiersmen From North Carolina to Arkansas 1805 - 1987, Compiled by Elizabeth Carroll Foster, Rt. 1, Box 337, Charlotte Hall, MD 20622, 138 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Available in either perfect (paper) binding for \$24 postpaid or Hardbound for \$28 postpaid. Full name index, Bibliography. This family history is written in a clever, first person style, a refreshing change to the usual lists of people. The earliest Carroll is William Carroll who married Lockey Walton in 1825 and resided in Williamson Co., TN. Quality photos and maps enhance the stories. Descendants are chronicled in an interesting manner. The family's migrations through the south to Arkansas and beyond are presented in a clear style.- DWA

A clear, concise guide to research in Alabama census, church, court, land and property, military, immigration and vital records; also a guide to libraries and repositories. Excellent tool for anyone researching Alabama ancestors! - DWA

Poduska Family History: Martin's American Dream Compiled by Velma D. Poduska, 74 Court Sq., Pocahontas, IA 50574, 140 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Softbound, Full name index. Write the compiler for ordering information. This genealogy commences with the first proven ancestor, Adam Poduska, and gives detailed data on the seven sons of Frank and Anna Skarda Poduska. The format is clearly explained and supplemented with charts. There are a great many photos and a lengthy list of the names and addresses of present-day members of the family. The family originated in Bohemia and in 1871, Martin Poduska arrived in Tama Co., IA. Other members of his family came to America and descendants spread out across the United States, including some who came to Hazen, AR. The background material is interesting to anyone with Czech or Bohemian ancestry. There are source material lists at the end of each chapter. - DWA

This is a must-have book for anyone interested in Montgomery County - too good to miss. - DWA

A tremendous compilation in an attempt to list all known emigrants to the New World. Virtually every source imaginable was gleaned for names, even lists of vagrants, waifs and prostitutes who were transported from English prisons to the colonies. The material is listed in chronological order and is important to genealogists and historians alike. - DWA

North Carolina Taxpayers 1679-1790 Volume 2 Compiled by Clarence E. Ratcliff. Available from Genealogical Publishing Co., Inc. (see above) for \$20.50 postpaid. 230 pages, 5 1/2 X 8 1/2, Full name alphabetical arrangement. This book is a companion volume to North Carolina Taxpayers 1701-1786 and covers 39 counties, listing over 29,000 taxpayers. The two volumes identify all the extant North Carolina taxpayers on lists prior to 1790. These lists substitute for a colonial census and are an extremely valuable source. - DWA

Lester, Neal and Allied Families by Shirley Wimpey Ward, 316 W. Georgia, Anadarko, OK 73005. The book is free to libraries and family members and Mrs. Ward will answer queries about the book; 292 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Full name index, Bibliography. The principal families covered in the book are Lester, Talkington, Neal, Robinson, Harrington, Hill, Whitmel, Harmon, and Petty. Group sheets, photos, maps and lists of descendants make this an interesting compilation of family data. - DWA

Sierra County, New Mexico Cemetery Records Vol. 1, Hot Springs Cemetery 1907-1980, Truth or Consequences, NM Compiled by Mrs. Lyn Rogers, Published by Sierra County Genealogical Society, c/o Truth or Consequences Public Library, PO Box 311, T or C, NM 87901, 100 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Softbound, Surname index. Mrs. Evelyn Nance Pyles donated this copy to A.G.S. Her grandfather, George Thomas Sanford, is buried in Hot Springs Cemetery, and his first wife, Willie Maer Baisdon Sanford, is buried in Pleasant Grove Cemetery, Scott County, AR. The cemetery record is very nicely done - the arrangement of the graves is maintained with detailed information about the types of markers on the graves as well as the spaces between them. Sierra County death records for 1907 - 1924, and information from a cemetery card file are also listed in the book. - DWA

Kershner Kinfolk Vol. 6, 1987, Published by The Kershner Family Association, 1449 Fox Run Drive, Charlotte, NC 28212-7125, edited by W. E. Kershner. 119 pages (four quarterlies bound in one volume), Softcover, 8 1/2 X 11, each quarterly is indexed by full names. A.G.S. receives this publication each year and it is an invaluable tool for all Kershner researchers. Reunion information, family history, lists of descendants, and transcriptions of primary source material is included. This volume is available for \$15.00 and past volumes are still in print as well as other Kershner family histories. - DWA

Wattensaw Revisited by Hazel Owens Hawks, 7835 Sandusky, Kansas City, KS 66112. Only a few copies remained unsold at the time this book was donated to the A.G.S. library and the price is \$15.00. 146 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Hardbound. Wattensaw is a community of neighborhoods in Lonoke County, and this book is an excellent history of the area. It includes information about churches, schools, the post office, merchants, the water supply, telephones, both world wars, all sorts of farming information, social activities and more. It includes a transcription of the 1880, 1900 and 1910 Federal census reports for Prairie Township. The book is well written and well organized and contains several photos. This is excellent local history material. - DWA

Jackson County, Missouri Marriages 1861-1868 Abstracted by Chester E. Crenshaw. Published by and available from the Jackson County Genealogical Society, PO Box 2145, Independence, MO 64055 for \$5.00. 37 pages, 8 1/2 X 11, Softcover, Alphabetically arranged by groom with a bride index. Published Jackson County marriage records did not include the 1861-1868 time period and a small volume of marriage records was discovered in the courthouse and transcribed. References

to the grooms' military service is included. This book fills an important gap in the county's published records. - DWA

Alexander Barentine 1817-1890 and his wife Tabitha Eleanor Overton 1818-1864; Silas Monroe Barentine 1821-???? and his wife Emily Morris 1821-1888; South Carolina to Georgia to Arkansas with Related Families of Campbell, Brewer, Sorrels, Griffin, Orrick, Henderson, Overton, Cash, Riggins, Watkins, Hight, Self, Tedder and Smith by Fay Campbell Stone, 29990 South Barlow Road, Canby, OR 97013, 458 pages, softcover, 8 1/2 X 11, Not indexed. 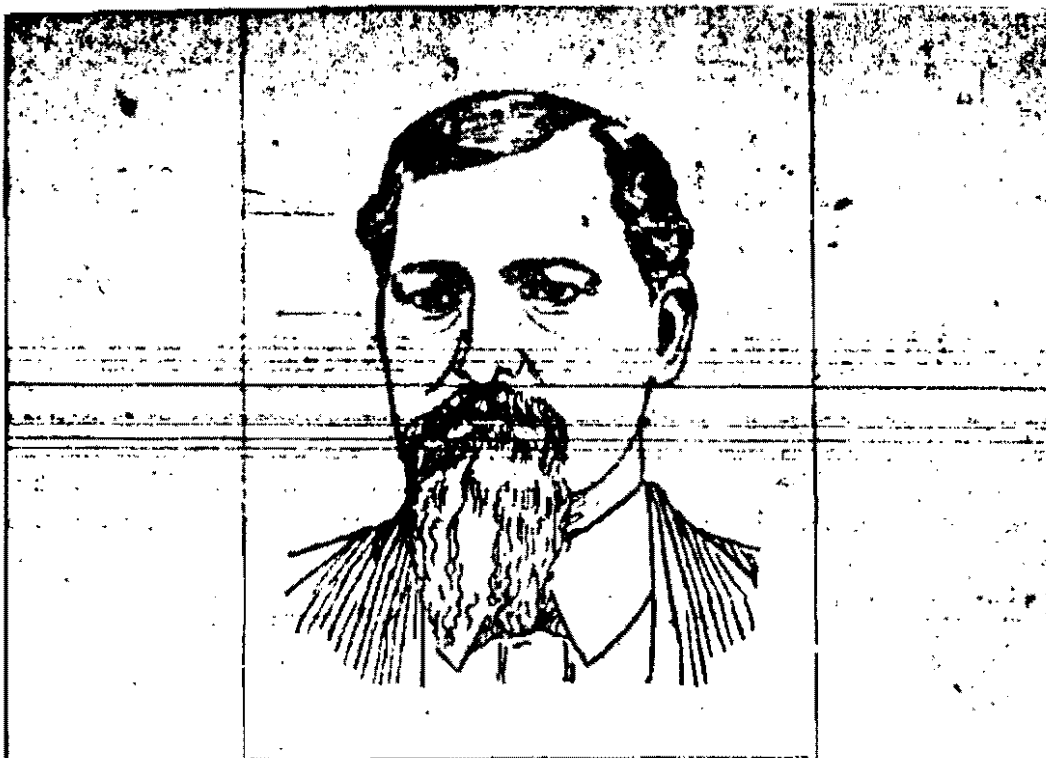

This is a family history of Thomas Cooper, born ca. 1617 in England, and his wife, Sarah Slye, who settled in Springfield, MA. Cooper was killed by Indians in 1675, leaving children Sarah, Timothy, Thomas, Elizabeth, Mary, John, and Rebecca. The book lists, with detailed source notes, the descendants and allied families of the Coopers. It is very well done and easy to follow. - DWA

Cemetery Inscriptions of Carter County, Oklahoma Vol. III Published by Search-N-Print, 200 Sherry Lane, Farmersville, TX 75031, 8 1/2 X 11, softbound, 231 pages, \$18.00 postpaid, Surname index. This book contains a cemetery inventory of Rose Hill Cemetery, the largest and oldest cemetery in Ardmore, OK. Graves from an older cemetery were moved to this cemetery about the turn of the century and it was the burial place of the veterans in the Confederate Veterans Home in Ardmore. There are 2,700 surnames in the index, a plot of the cemetery, and a row by row transcription of tombstone information. This massive work follows two other volumes of Carter County cemetery inscriptions available from the same publisher at \$18.00 each. This will be a valuable tool for researchers with Carter County roots. - DWA

Was There a Real Belle Starr? by William Watkins, Oark, AR 72852, 8 1/2 X 11, \$3.95, Softbound, 16 pages, No index. This is an informative booklet about Belle Starr, the outlaw, and the people with whom she was associated, written by a descendant of a collateral line of Belle's husband, Jim Reed. Mr. Watkins recounts many popular stories about Belle, noting that she was never legally Mrs. Starr. Photos illustrate the narrative. - DWA

This is a history of the known descendants of John Bearden of Sumner County, TN and Washington County, NC, a Revolutionary War soldier, focusing on the line of his son, Lambert Smith Bearden. Lambert married Nancy Ward in Fayette County, IL in 1822. Family charts and primary source references make this an interesting compilation. - DWA

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF DAVID EDWARD BARKER
DREW COUNTY



Hon. David Edward Barker, of Drew County.

The above-named gentleman is a recognized leader, not only in the house of the present general assembly, but in the politics of the state. He is sometimes referred to as "hard-headed," but it will be noticed that his "hard-headedness" is evidenced only in the advocacy of what, after mature deliberation, he believes to be right. Once his mind made up, he is as firm as the rock and as true as the needle to the pole. Mr. Barker made his first appearance in the legislature at the session of 1879, as the representative from Drew county. Recognizing his merit by his excellent work, he has been continually returned by his people, a sure proof, a hearty endorsement of his official acts and private life. The present is his fourth legislative term. At his first term he was chairman of the penitentiary committee. In 1881 he was a member of the committee on auditor's and treasurer's books. In 1883 he was chairman on the part of the house of the joint committee on auditor's and treasurer's books. The steadfastness with which he dug up the facts and figures during that session, won for him the highest honor. Nothing deterred him, and his services were of untold value to the state. At the present session he is chairman of the committee to examine the books of the commissioner of state lands and the superintendent of public instruction, and, also, a member of the committee on ways and means. He will also be found hard at work on the special committee on revenue. Mr. Barker came to Arkansas in December, 1855, settling in Drew county, where he has ever since resided. His home is eight miles west of Monticello. While he is a successful farmer, he is possessed of unusual legal knowledge, although not a lawyer and never having been admitted to the bar. Judges on the bench have several times, on their own motions, offered to admit him, but he has always declined the license. He is a native of Tennessee, born in July, 1836, and a bachelor. Many of his friends are urging him for congress from the Third district. He is, certainly good material.
