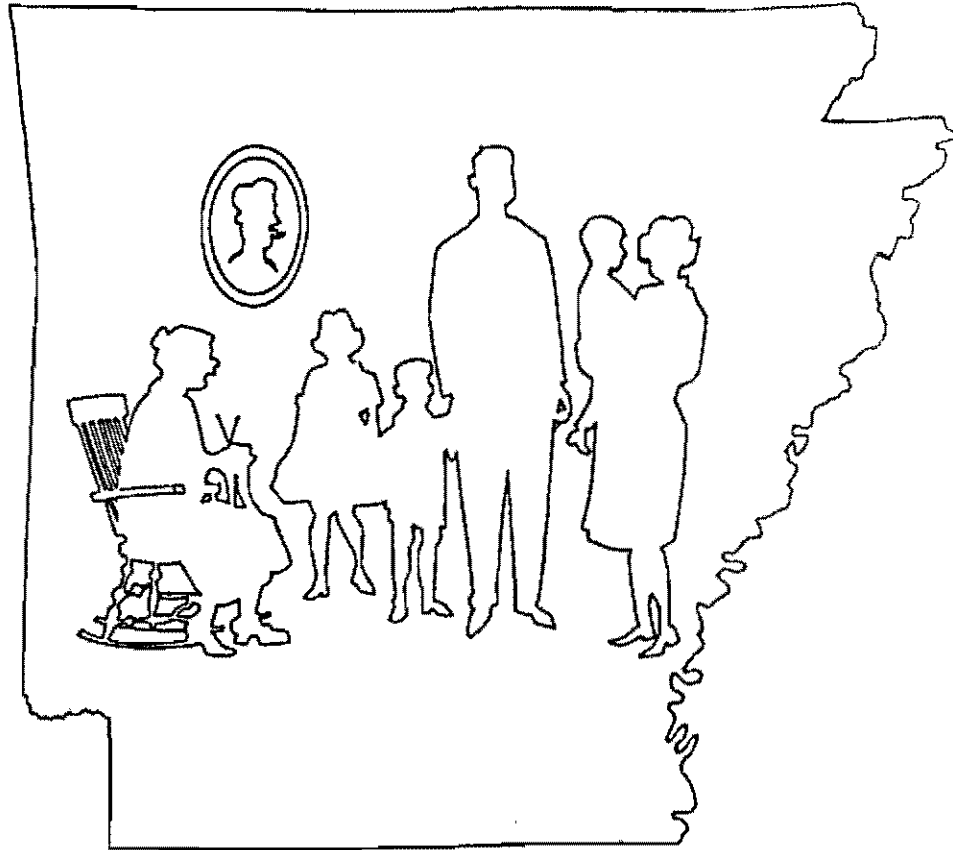

GENEALOGICAL REFLECTIONS

I seem to vaguely recall a time in the very distant past, when I knew nothing of the lure of genealogy and the only roots I was aware of belonged to the bermuda grass constantly threatening my flower beds. It was a time when: I watched television; I didn't get long-distance calls from all over the United States at all hours of the day and night from other fanatic genealogists; I could drive right by a cemetery and never give it another thought; I was interested in things that occurred within the past year; my office wasn't a firetrap with stacks of books and assorted notes and papers teetering from every inch of horizontal space; I could converse with normal people about soap operas or movies; people didn't hide their old pictures when they saw me coming, intent on ferreting out every last impression of days gone by; I spent vacations on the beach absorbing sun instead of closeted in a library from opening to closing time; I read trashy novels instead of historical dissertations on migration patterns in the South; and I still thought putting together a family tree was a cheap hobby!

Now my life is totally changed. The thought of all that history out there changing and disappearing and being lost keeps me on the move every moment, lest some small remnant of historical importance be lost. I just KNOW that somewhere out there in the county this week, SOMEBODY cleaned out an attic and threw away all of Grandpa's dusty old letters about the Civil War. Today, some uncaring pigeon deposited another coating on those fascinating court records housed in the courthouse attic. Somebody old, that knew all kinds of interesting things that nobody else knows, died -- and I simply didn't get a chance to visit with them to hear all about it and now nobody will ever hear about it again for all eternity.

When I was growing up, my father was in the Air Force, and we moved thirty-six different times before I turned eighteen. After I married, my family and I finally settled down in Saline County. As the years went by, I began to understand the importance of belonging someplace, of waving to people you knew as you drove or walked down a street, and of knowing all the short-cuts down old dirt roads that you wouldn't have known about unless you'd lived here a while.

Years ago, my great-uncle died, and rather than allowing all of his boxes of papers to be thrown away, I hauled them home. They were full of years of research he'd done from his living-room chair, in an effort to learn more about our family. Immediately, I was hooked! I took up where he left off and haven't been able to put it down since.

In the process, I learned the value of roots. I'm not an isolated speck on the face of the earth; I'm a link in the long chain of people who lived and struggled before me. And chances are, if I investigate deeply enough, I can find a common link with my neighbor, if not a kinship. In fact, not long after

I began my quest for ancestral knowledge, I discovered that five families living within a mile of me were in fact relatives! It occurs to me that, if someone were to realize their kinship with their neighbors, we might not have so many problems in the world.

Nowadays, when my everyday problems threaten to overwhelm me (are there any other overwhelmed parents of teen-agers out there?), the thought that I carry the genes of pioneers who faced incredible adversities and survived is a comfort to me. How can I feel too sorry for myself when I'm sitting up gnawing my fingernails, waiting for my nineteen-year-old daughter to come home, when I realize that my great grandparents buried every other child born to them? If the washing machine leaks water all over the floor, remembering the way Gramma washed is a settling thought! Every fiber of my body and mind is composed of the genes of thousands of people stretching back in time, and they all survived their troubles (at least long enough to complete their link in the chain!).

I think I might just survive too - if my husband and children just don't unplug my computer someday trying to get my attention!

A HUNDRED YEARS OLD
Death Comes to the Oldest Arkansan

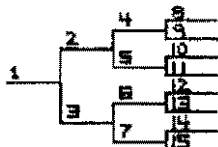
Mr. James Howard, an Old and Honored Citizen of Union County
Goes to His Final Reward

El Dorado, April 21 - Union County has again been called upon to give up one of her pioneers, an honored citizen, and one who had passed the century mark. On Monday last, four miles north of Lisbon, Mr. James Howard, Sr., paid that last debt and his spirit was gathered home to the fathers. Uncle Jimmie, as he was familiarly called, was born in North Carolina, October 16, 1796, moved to Tennessee, where he grew to manhood and he was married to Miss Elizabeth McGowne. He came to Union county in January, 1847, and has lived on the same place ever since. Over half a century on the same farm is a long time.

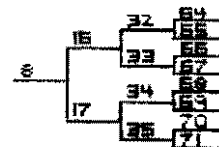
Uncle Jimmy was of the class of gentlemen of revolutionary times like Jefferson, Adams and others of that day. He was scrupulously honest, charitable to a fault, was always first to help the needy and distressed. In appearance his figure was erect, his carriage graceful and was as active as a man of 50 until the last five years; and unlike most aged persons, his memory was perfect up to the time of his death. He could relate incidents and circumstances that occurred in his boyhood and from then on through life.

Uncle Jimmy was what is called a moralist and adhered to these principles all through life; he was temperate in all things, a good neighbor, a devoted husband and a loving father. He was the father of ten children, four boys and six girls. Three of each are still living. He was a life-long, "died-in-the-wool" Democrat and has voted for every Democratic nominee for president since he was of age in 1817. The family have the sympathy of the entire community and of their friends everywhere.



A PEDIGREE NUMBERING SYSTEM

As computers become more popular, better means of utilizing them for genealogy must be considered. Since computers like numbers best of all, genealogists should become familiar with a system of numbering ancestors called the Sosa-Stradonitz system, or the Ahnentafel numbering system, first used in 1676. This is a basic system already in common use by experienced genealogists throughout the world.

It seems that few Americans are aware of this system. This article will hopefully explain some of its advantages, especially as it relates to computer usage. Most of us just devise our own systems, sometimes so complicated that others cannot understand our work. While accepted standards have also been developed for use in numbering descendants, only the Sosa-Stradonitz system will be discussed here. Persons interested in descendants' numbering should see the March 1986 issue of The Genealogical Helper.

The accepted pedigree numbering system was introduced to most of us when we noticed the numbers on fill-in-the-blank four or five generation ancestor charts. The number 1 position is where we all first wrote in our own names. I have chosen to have a single numbering system for ancestors of both my wife and myself, making my daughter number 1. The compressed pedigree chart included with this article demonstrates how the system works. Notice how it is possible to put so much more information on a single page than when using the standard, branching pedigree charts.

While my chart is not as easy to read at first glance, its advantages outweigh any shortcomings. The Sosa-Stradonitz system owes its wide acceptance to its simplicity and its usefulness. One determines how people are related by simple mathematical calculations. Note that every male ancestor has an even number, every female an odd number. To find a person's father simply multiply the person's identification number by 2. Then add 1 to find the mother. A wife's I.D. number is always 1 more than her husband's. Divide a number by 2 to locate a son or daughter. These rules apply through all generations. While the number for your ancestor will not match another researcher's system, you are forever able to associate your ancestor with his/her I.D. number. The number will never change as long as you are doing genealogy.

One of the wonderful ways this is useful with computers is that one can include the pertinent part of the ancestral chart with the first letter written to a researcher. While I have included my entire chart with this article, it is a simple task of editing out the irrelevant parts when typing a letter. For information about word processing and genealogy see the June 1986 issue of The Arkansas Family Historian.

The chart was created using a word processor. Many printers can provide condensed print and 8 lines per inch for use with the chart. By editing out all the names that do not apply in a letter, one can usually place all the relevant ancestral names with dates and places at the top of brief, introductory correspondence. With just a few lines of text the addressee is able to see how the writer is related to the clan s/he is researching.

For readers without computers: it is never necessary to retype any part of my chart unless I am making a correction or addition. This applies whether talking about the whole chart or just bits and pieces of it. Type it all once and never have to type any of the same information again. Typewriters should be on their way out in genealogy, unless you just enjoy typing more than anything else.

FITZWATER

From Mrs. Ina M. Friend, 7262 Palo Alto Ave., #2, Yucca Valley, CA 92284, we have received the following:

I've been intending for some time to write you and tell you about my windfall, which was the result of a query I placed in your quarterly (VOL. 25, No. 4). It is my hope that my good luck will encourage others to continue to place queries.

I was seeking information on my great grandfather, John H. Fitzwater, whom I had last found in the 1880 census of Baxter Co., ARK. In his household in 1880, in addition to himself and his third wife, was his daughter, Sarah (Fitzwater) Perkins Ellard and her two children, Walter Perkins and Charles W. Ellard. Sarah's mother was John H. Fitzwater's second wife, Mary Ann (Crownover) Fitzwater, my great grandmother. Because I could find nothing on John H. Fitzwater after 1880, I hoped one of your readers might know something about him after 1880. One did.

I received a letter and a phone call from a Mrs. Butcher, in Little Rock, ARK, who told me that she had in her possession personal papers that had belonged to a Widow Ellard who, prior to her death in the home of Mrs. Butcher's parents about 1907 or 1908, had worked as live-in help for Mrs. Butcher's parents. Mrs. Butcher's mother, before her death many years later, told Mrs. Butcher about the papers and that she had kept them hoping someday to locate someone in Mrs. Ellard's family and turn the papers over to that person. No one ever came. Mrs. Butcher kept the papers in her home for years, for the same reason. It was over 80 years before a family member was found: me.

Mrs. Butcher sent the fragile old papers to me immediately. They included deeds (many written and signed by my great grandfather, James Crownover, County Clerk of Reynolds Co., MO - former residence of John H. Fitzwater), and various other records dating from the 1850s to the 1870s, and some later, that are irreplaceable because the Reynolds Co. courthouse burned in the 1870s and other copies of these records no longer exist. Among the papers was a small hymn book given to Sarah Ellard by John H. Fitzwater 23 July 1881. Written inside the hymnbook was this: 'John H. Fitzwater departed this life on 17th Dec. 1892, Ark.' This is the only record of his death I have been able to get.

I will always be grateful to Mrs. Butcher's family for keeping the papers. Over 80 years is a long time to keep something like that when there was no family connection. I certainly feel I hit the jackpot when I sent in a query -- almost like a fairy tale. You have my permission to use any of this in your quarterly if you wish. It may help other researchers.

I have enclosed a chronology of John H. Fitzwater with much of what I know about him. A lot of the information came from those old papers and some from what I already had. As you can see, it covers most of John H. Fitzwater's life, except for the period from his birth to about the 1840s. Perhaps this chronology could be placed in your library, or even printed, in all or part, in some future publication for possible benefit to me or other Fitzwater/Crownover/Ellard researchers.

Thank you for a good quarterly and for my windfall.

Lazarus Nichols seems to have bought the lot at a sheriff's sale upon a judgment against several parties, none of whom had any title to it, at least none of record, which would amount to the same thing so far as other parties are concerned. The other party deeding to Fitzwater, and whose name I cannot just now recall, seems to have

had no manner of title so far I (sic) can learn from the records. From all these facts I am of opinion (sic) that the title of Mrs. Byington is not a good one, and is not enforceable in law. The property is now owned by Mrs. Lizzie Newman, who has owned it for ten or fifteen years. It is occupied by a small two-story brick hotel, formerly having been a business house altered for hotel business.

REGISTRATION AFFIDAVITS OF ALIEN ENEMIES IN ARKANSAS: 1918

Submitted by Russell P. Baker

On April 19, 1918, President Wilson signed a proclamation that required all resident "aliens" then living in the U. S. to register with the nearest U. S. District Court. This was during World War I and the government was very interested in finding out where various citizens of Germany, Austria and Turkey were living. Arkansas, especially eastern Arkansas, had a very large German population at the time. The records indexed below were found in the Arkansas County Court House several years ago and brought to the Arkansas History Commission for microfilming. Copies may be obtained from the Commission, #1 Capitol Mall, Little Rock, AR 72201. Please write first for a price quote. The applications are usually four pages in length. All kinds of interesting information was supplied by the "aliens". The forms also included a picture of the applicant along with his or her fingerprints. One of the questions was: "State whether registrant has or has had any male relatives in arms for or against the United States and its allies during the present war". Copies of the original records are at the National Archives, Washington, DC, in Records Group 60, "General Records of the Department of Justice."

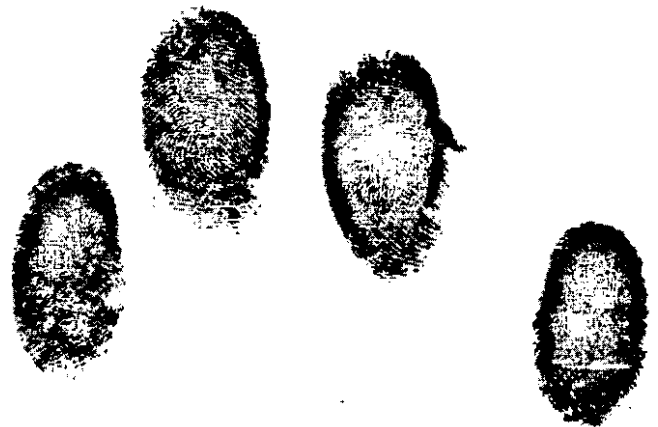
Plain impressions of the four fingers taken simultaneously.

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THE JAMES GARVIN BREWSTER FAMILY

Submitted by Martha Hawkins, 197 West College, Monticello, AR 71655, who states this material was prepared by Walter Brewster in 1981/82 and was originally planned for inclusion in a Dallas County, AR, history that did not materialize. Walter Brewster and wife, Edith, are retired and active volunteer genealogists. They have published Norfolk County, Virginia, Will Book III, 1788-1802

My grandparents, James Garvin Brewster and Mary Arabella Josephine Ferguson were married in Bradley County, Arkansas, on 25 November 1869, by the Reverend Mr. J. M. Carr.

James Garvin was descended, in his paternal line, from Joseph Brewster, born in the last decade of the 17th century to Zachary and Elizabeth Brewster of Melton Mowbray Parish, Leicestershire, England. In 1724, Joseph married Mary Newton of Thorpe Arnold Parish, Leicestershire. They moved, with their three children, Elizabeth, Joseph, and Zachariah, to Staffordshire, where Zachariah was married to a young widow, Elizabeth Huss, in the Stretton by Penkridge Parish Church on 19 February, 1758. Their son Robert Brewster, James Garvin's grandfather was born at Bushbury, Staffordshire, in 1767. After his marriage to Betty Onley, of Ombersley Parish, Worcestershire, on 10 Dec. 1793, and the birth of one child there, and two at Wolverlay, he settled his family at Salwarpe Mill where their remaining children were born. They are the parents of eleven children, among whom was son Thomas, born in 1803 and married in 1823 to Mary Row, a gentlewoman, of the Walk Mills, Dodderhill Parish, Worcestershire.

Thomas and Mary Brewster moved to France where they lived from 1829 to 1839, when they went back to England briefly before sailing for America in 1840. They settled in Drew County, Arkansas, in 1857, after stopovers in Tennessee and Mississippi where James Garvin was born in 1847, the youngest member of a truly cosmopolitan family. Five of his siblings were born in England, four in France, and four in the United States.

My grandmother was the daughter of James Lawrence Ferguson and his second wife, Mary Ann Edwards. They had migrated to Bradley, Arkansas, from Chester County, South Carolina, in 1858. She was descended from James and Agnes (Adams) Ferguson who migrated from Goochland County, Virginia, to Granville County, North Carolina, in 1754, and from there to Chester County, South Carolina, in 1767. Her maternal ancestors, John and Olive (Exum) Edwards were from Halifax and Edgecombe Counties, North Carolina. Olive (Exum) Edwards' father was a colonial official of Edgecombe, which he later represented in the North Carolina General Assembly in 1799.

After their marriage, my grandparents settled at Bradley (now Pansy), Arkansas, where he owned and operated a plantation, a commissary, a cotton gin, and was the postmaster for several years. Their children, all born at Pansy, were: Alma Brewster, who married Dr. Charles Francis Thomas, and lived at Fordyce, Arkansas; Delaware Brewster, who married Dr. William Hunt Blankenship, and lived at Pine Bluff, Arkansas; Dr. Beaufort Brewster, who married Irene Breedlove, and lived first at Bearden, and then at McCrory, Arkansas; Lawrence Jewell Brewster, bachelor who lived at home with his parents; Walter Thomas Brewster, who married Ruth Irene Whatley, and lived at Fordyce, and Bearden, Arkansas; James Earle Brewster, who married Minnie E. Hamilton and lived at Pine Bluff, Arkansas; Albert Edwin Brewster, Sr., who married Lily Evelyn Hightower, and lived at Pine Bluff, Arkansas; and Mary Murphye Brewster, who married Frank Herman Crary, and lived in Dallas County, Arkansas.

After I began writing this sketch, it occurred to me that I am the only member of this family with the Brewster surname who is a native of Fordyce, Arkansas. After the marriage of my parents at her home in Como, Texas, they lived for a year in the small town on the Texas/Mexican border where my father was employed. They then moved to Fordyce where he was employed by Mr. "Red" Thomas, the father of Mrs. Mattie May Frazier, and a brother of Dr. Charles F. Thomas. At the time of my birth, my father was employed by the Fordyce Lumber Company., where he worked in the Commissary with Mr. John Harlow, among other local persons.

A story related to the period of my infancy in Fordyce, and having to do with the heroism of a Negro woman who was my nurse, was told to me during my teen years. She was wheeling me along the sidewalk in my pram, when the driver of an approaching automobile lost control of his vehicle and headed straight for us. The nurse gave my pram a good shove which propelled it out of the path of the car. Her effort saved me, but cost her life as she was run over by the car.

When I was very small, my father became Manager of the lumber company's logging camp at Ivan which was in the wilderness in those days. Mr. Duncan was in charge of the logging operation and Dr. McLaughlin was the camp physician. The Brewsters, Duncans, and McLaughlins, had converted railroad box-cars for residences. Our home consisted of three cars. The lumber company kept a passenger car at Ivan for our use when the roads through the forest were impassable. There were no "soap operas" then, but my parents were hooked on a movie serial called "The Perils of Pauline" which ran at the "picture show" on Saturday nights. My only memory of this serial, retained probably because I was so terrified, is the closing scene of one installment. Pauline was tied across the tracks of the railroad and the segment ended just before the train ran over her. To this day, I do not know how she escaped.

We must have attended the First Baptist Church at Fordyce during this period, though my father was a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church-South. What I remember is the largest, most beautifully decorated tree that soared toward heaven as it almost reached the ceiling of the sanctuary. It was all glitter and magic which held me entranced as I waited for my name to be called to go down the aisle for my gift.

I know that the "Brewster House" has been surveyed as a possible candidate for historical preservation since it represents a bit of the heritage of Dallas County. It will always be preserved as a magical place in the memory of a boy

now long grown into manhood. When I was five years old my parents moved to Bearden, Arkansas, where my father established a mercantile business. However, from that time until I was fifteen, I spent most of every Summer with my grandparents and Uncle Jewell "on the farm".

In those days, if you stood on the front porch and looked to the Southwest, in the direction of the village of Thornton, only two neighbors' houses were visible - the Fielders and the McClains, each on top of its hill. When you looked toward Fordyce, you could see one farm house a good distance up the road (I cannot remember who lived there, but Mr. Dedman built his home just beyond it.) and as you neared town you came to a grocery, a bit to the West of Russell's - Vinson's, wasn't it? That little store stocked the best peppermint-stick candy in Fordyce. My grandfather bought his coffee, green whole beans, by sholesale lot. Every morning, he roasted a pan of the beans and ground them himself. I suppose that was a custom acquired by his parents during their residence in France. He would drink no ready-roasted, ready-ground coffee, and his tea had to be made from "gun-powder" leaves that he purchased in bulk lots.

In the evening twilight, after supper, when we sat on the front porch, we could catch a glimpse across the valley, through a break in the trees, of the Cotton Belt passenger train lights as it whizzed along on its way to Pine Bluff. The long, lonesome, blast of its whistle would roll back across us as we, each in his imagination, took a trip to wonderland.

Aunt Murphye Grary's husband, Uncle Frank, owned a large acreage on each side of the road where the Ledbetter family now lives. On the tract across from his home, he built an eighteen-hole golf course, and renovated the farm house for use as a clubhouse. He operated this enterprise until it was purchased by the Club Association and became the Fordyce Country Club. His children attended the Beech Grove Elementary School that occupied, as I remember, a two-room building. All grades were taught in one room, each class taking its turn on the front row for recitation and instruction by the teacher. Once, I was fortunate enough to be allowed to spend a visiting there with my Grary cousins. During recess, and lunch, we played in the woods, and searched for fox grapes - I thought it was a great school. When I was in Fordyce in 1977, I could not find Beech Grove but I believe it was near the junction of the by-pass and the Country Club road.

Grandfather was a good businessman, and he managed a prosperous operation on his farm, which resembled a small village, until his death. He did not depend solely on cotton for income, but practiced product diversification. The farm had a large orchard containing both fruit and pecan trees; large numbers of hogs were raised each year in order that hams and bacon could be cured for sale, as well as home consumption; in season, fresh vegetables were grown for sale in Fordyce; and, he marketed large quantities of cured sweet potatoes. He was an artist with iron, and at his forge he repaired tools, hinges, and made other items of iron needed for the maintenance of the farm. The residence, and all of its subsidiary buildings were kept in excellent condition. Were he to return, it would be difficult to convince him that the house, in its run-down condition, is the one in which he lived.

James Garvin and Mary (Ferguson) Brewster were a loving couple to whom the extended family was of paramount importance. One of the great highlights in the family year was the annual Christmas reunion. Their sons, daughters, spouses, and grandchildren, arrived on Christmas eve to await Santa's arrival. Each child had a hook on the fireplace mantle in the sitting-room from which hung a "big"

stocking. One such holiday is etched more clearly than any other in my memory. The children were put to bed on pallets, covered with so many quilts one could scarcely move, which, coupled with the anticipation of Santa's arrival, made sleep difficult. On the particular Christmas I have in mind, we were awakened very early in the morning by the sound of someone on the roof, followed by the tinkling of sleigh bells fading in the distance. When day broke, and we were allowed outside, we were gripped by a sense of awe and wonderment. "He" had landed on our roof - the tracks of the sleigh were plainly discernible in the snow - the bells we heard were those of Santa's reindeer! To us, the "Brewster Place" in Dallas County, Arkansas, of yore is indeed a magical place.

Our sincere thanks to the author and contributor for sharing this interesting and informative article with us.

Wouldn't it be great if more of us reached back in our memory and recorded, on paper, some recollections and facts of times past and family connections?

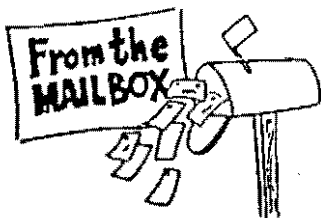

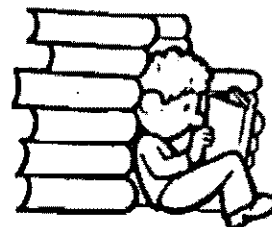

BOOK REVIEWS



Bobbie Jones McLane and Desmond Walls Allen

The following are reviews and/or announcements of book acquisitions for the Arkansas Genealogical Society. These books are permanently housed in the local History and Genealogy Room of the Little Rock Public Library. The Society expresses its appreciation to the authors and contributors. In ordering copies of these books, please remember to say you saw the review in this publication.

Early Pulaski County Marriages, December 1838 to January 1901, Volume 1 A-D, published by The Stanley Co., PO Box 48, Little Rock, AR 72203. This book is the first of a series of books which will contain the marriage index for Pulaski Co., AR for the dates between Dec. 1838 and Jan. 1901. The original index, has some 21,000 marriage entries, and a microfilm copy is on file at the Arkansas History Commission. Both husband and wife are listed alphabetically in the first column and spouse listed in the second column. This produces "double" listings, but also gives a cross check between the two entries. The third column is the date of marriage and the last column is the book followed by the page number where the original record is recorded. Soft-cover, 221 pp., price \$22.00 plus \$1.50 postage and handling. Order from the compiler. - BJM

Johnson County, Arkansas 1860 United States Census by Bill Hanks, 157 pages, softbound, \$15.00 postpaid. Order from Arkansas Ancestors, 222 McMahan Drive, Hot Springs, AR 71913. In 1860, Johnson County contained much of the area that became northeastern Logan County in 1871. The 1860 census was taken just before the outbreak of the Civil War, a time of great social upheaval in Arkansas. Many of the men listed in this book did not survive the war. This books lists households in the order in which they were enumerated, giving names, ages, sex, birthplaces, occupations, and values of real and personal property. Surname index. - DWA

An Index to the Three Volumes: Arkansas 1911 Census of Confederate Veterans by Bobbie Jones McLane, Arkansas Ancestors, 222 McMahan Drive, Hot Springs, AR 71913, 250 pages, softbound, \$28.00 postpaid. At last! An EVERY name index to all three volumes of the Arkansas CSA Soldiers series. In 1911, the Public Acts of Arkansas No. 353, provided that an enumeration or census be made by the tax assessor of each county of Confederate veterans residing in Arkansas. Unfortunately, the records only cover 44 of Arkansas' counties. The 1,751 questionnaires list great genealogical details and military experiences of these soldiers. Many men stated their relationship to Revolutionary War soldiers. The series is arranged alphabetically by the soldier's name. The three volumes are available from Arkansas Ancestors and for those who have the series in their libraries, the new index is just wonderful. The index contains over 30,000 names and reveals the 'hidden' names of parents, wives, grandparents, children, spouses, spouses of children and others in the three volume series. - DWA

1918 Camp Pike, Arkansas, Index to Soldiers' Naturalizations Compiled by Desmond Walls Allen, Arkansas Research, PO Box 303, Conway, AR 72032, 134 pages, softbound, \$18.00 postpaid. In 1918, Congress passed a law which waived the five year waiting period requirement for naturalization provided the

petitioner was enlisted in the US military service. Camp Pike, near North Little Rock, was a large World War I training center for soldiers from all over the US and over 3,000 men filed naturalization petitions under the new law. The records are now a part of the manuscript collections at the Arkansas History Commission. This index lists name, company, unit, date and county of birth, and marital status and gives instructions for ordering copies of the records. - BJM

Arkansas' Mexican War Soldiers Compiled by Desmond Walls Allen, Arkansas Research, PO Box 303, Conway, AR 72032, 135 pages, softbound, \$18.00 postpaid. Ms. Allen adds to her growing catalog of Arkansas military titles with another important historical document. This book contains a roster of 1,552 men who served from Arkansas in the United States' war with Mexico, 1846 - 1847. Names, ranks, ages, units and companies are listed with remarks about deaths, discharges, prisoner status, enrollment dates, desertions, etc. Background material about the war includes a rare reminiscence by Silas M. Shinn, contemporary newspaper accounts, and letters from eyewitnesses. War Between the States historians will find many of Arkansas' Confederate leaders, men such as Albert Pike, in this book. - BJM

Index to A History of Lamar County, Alabama, Revised Edition and Third Edition by Joe G. Acee, Index by Barbara Hankins Martin and Index, Historical Collection of New Jersey by John W. Barber, Index by Barbara Hankins Martin and Daniel Begat by Robert Lee and Edith Jackson Hankins and Florence Jackson Hankins have been donated to the AGS collection by Mrs. Edith Jackson Hankins, 3733 Birchvale Drive, Memphis, TN 38125. Having used unindexed materials, we are all grateful to Mrs. Martin for her indexing work. Daniel Begat is a family history beginning with Daniel Jackson, born about 1797 in SC. His wife was Nancy Woodruff, widow of John P. England. Allied family names are Stewart, Malloy, Thomas, Turner, Boman, Swan, Hollis and Holliday. The book includes photos and traces descendants to present day. Full name index. - DWA

1890 Reconstructed Census of Mississippi County, Arkansas by Joan G. Threet, 100 Charles Drive, Alexander, AR 72002, 77 pages, softbound, \$16.00 postpaid. A list of 1890 era residents of Mississippi County has been compiled from marriage records for 1890, deeds, real estate records, Osceola Times newspaper, and family records. Section, range and township descriptions of land are included and comments from the source records give additional information. This volume represents an important contribution to AGS's 1890 census reconstruction project and it is evident a great deal of work went into compiling this data in light of the missing personal property tax record. - DWA

Saline County, Arkansas, County Court Record Book Volume 1, January 26, 1836 - December 31, 1839 by Sybil Crawford, 100 pages, softbound, \$13.75 postpaid. Order from Saline County History and Heritage Society, PO Box 221, Bryant, AR 72022-0221. This is a FULL transcription of the original, handwritten records for this period. Names of road viewers, early property owners, and those taking part in governmental affairs are listed. All sorts of matters were handled in this early court, even some probate matters. Saline County researchers are fortunate to have a transcription available of such a valuable source. Full name index. - DWA

On the Watershed of Ecletto and the Clear Fork of Sandies II by Karon Mac

Smith, Route 1, Box 190, Nixon, TX 78140, 450 pages, softbound, \$32.50 postpaid. Stories in the main body of the book tell about pioneer families, history, and muster rolls, of Gonzales, Guadalupe, Karnes and Wilson Counties in Texas. The appendix contains cemetery records, legends, church records, marriage and land records, newspaper clippings and individual research material. Photos, illustrations and facsimiles of records are included. Both the main body of the book and the appendix have full name indexes. - DWA

Sumner County, Tennessee Deed Abstracts 1793 - 1805 Abstracted by Joyce Martin Murray, 2921 Daniels, Dallas, TX 75205, 176 pages, hardbound, \$25.00 plus \$2.00 postage (TX residents add tax). This book lists the sellers, purchasers, date, witnesses, acreage, price, and locations by watercourse, roads and neighbors when given for the second oldest county in Tennessee. Additionally, many previous residences, powers of attorney, wills, bills of sale and deeds of gift are included. There are three indexes: full names (3,500 names), slaves and places. This is marvelous material, and the good news is that Ms. Murray is working on a second volume. - DWA

The John Frederick Ledrick Families 1820 - 1988 Compiled by Bob Boyd, 513 Springwood Drive, Little Rock, AR 72211, softbound, 32 pages, write Mr. Boyd for availability. Mr. Boyd's sense of kinship with his grandfather prompted him to "gather his little flock together ... and document them for generations yet to be born." The central figure in the book is John Frederick Ledrick, born 1859 in Holmes County, OH. He settled finally in the Round Mountain area in Faulkner County, AR. Information about the Mayflower community is included. Photos, documents, transcripts of letters, newspaper clippings, chronologies and lists of descendants make this an interesting work. - DWA

Families! Volume I, Number 2 from Yates Publishing, PO Box 639, Ozark, MO 65721, 50 pages, softbound, \$5.00 (Subscription for 4 issues is \$20.00). The Family Group Sheet Exchange by William A. Yates is the basis for the information in this volume. A concise list of male names with birth year and state, marriage year and state, wife's name and birth year and state. From this material, copies of the sheets submitted by participants in the FGSE project can be ordered for a small fee. Mr. Yates is known for his long standing reputation in the genealogical publishing field and his 'satisfaction guaranteed' policy toward his customers. - DWA

Johnson County, Arkansas Marriages - 1850/1890, Books N, O, P, Q By the Johnson County Historical Society, PO Box 505, Clarksville, AR 72830-0505, 117 pages, softbound, \$20.00 plus \$1.50 postage. These records list the grooms in alphabetical order, giving age and residence in some cases, the bride, her age and residence, the date of the marriage, record book and page number, and remarks. There is a separate index to the brides and other people mentioned in the records. This book represents the earliest extant marriage records for the county and the records are missing for the War Between the States era. This is an excellent addition to compilations of Arkansas' county records. - DWA

Sugar Loaf Springs: Heber's Elegant Watering Place by Evalena Berry, 11300 Bainbridge Drive, Little Rock, AR 72212, 104 pages, softbound, \$14.50 plus \$2.00 postage. This book grew out of Mrs. Berry's research for Time and the River: A History of Cleburne County, and aptly presents a cameo portrait of the resort known today as Heber Springs. Many photos depict hotels and rooming houses, an old soldiers reunion, the M & NA Railroad, schools, churches, festivals, and the spring around which the town grew. Newspaper accounts and advertisements enliven the detailed research of the text. There is a full

index of names and places. - DWA

Four Hundred Years of Hollowell History by Evalena Hollowell Berry, 11300 Bainbridge Drive, Little Rock, AR 72212, 168 pages, softbound, \$9.50 plus \$2.50 postage. The book begins with William Hollowell, born about 1560 and follows 428 years and 15 generations of the Hollowell family. The book is divided into chapters about the English development of the family, their life in colonial Virginia, 100 years in North Carolina, migration to Kentucky, then to Arkansas and beyond. Maps, photos, and illustrations enliven the text. Letters, stories and newspaper items add a personal touch to the usual genealogical facts. There is a full index of names and places. - DWA

1880 Federal Census, Arkansas County, Arkansas Compiled by Robert W. Dhonau, 4410 Lee Avenue, Little Rock, AR 72205, 166 pages, softbound, \$20.00 postpaid. What a convenience to have an 1880 census in print! Researchers often must use the 1880 Soundex with all its inherent limitations as a finding aid for the Federal Census Reports, and it is refreshing to be able to have a full transcription for an entire county available. The material was transcribed as recorded by the enumerator and has a surname index. - DWA

Hempstead County, Arkansas, United States Census of 1880 Published by The Hempstead County Genealogical Society, PO Box 1158, Hope, AR 71801, 191 pages, softbound, write the society for price and availability. Hats off to an active society for their transcription of a much needed resource on their county. This is a full transcription and it is so handy to have it to study and use for reference in the comforts of home without the neck strain of a microfilm reader! Full name index. - DWA

Pleasant Grove Families (Saline County, Arkansas): Recollections of A Church, A Cemetery, A Community of the Past By Carolyn Earle Billingsley, Saline Research, 270 Midland Road, Alexander, AR 72002, 202 pages, softbound, \$23.50 postpaid. EVERYTHING you ever wanted to know about this once small community in Owen Township, Saline County is in this book. Only a cemetery is left today, but the book resurrects the people, the church, family relationships, and events that comprise the history of the area. The main families represented are Buntt, Claghorn, Counts, Dodgen, Dunlap, Gantt, Glidewell, Lawrence, Lequieu, McClain, Mettetal, Prillamon, Rowland, Studor, Thomas, Thomason and Turbyfill. A cemetery survey and land ownership maps are nice touches. Gossip columns from old newspapers, oral history traditions, and many photos make this especially interesting. Full name index. - DWA

Cemeteries and Burial Sites of Randolph County, Arkansas By Margaret A. Barnhart, 459 pages, hardbound, \$44.95 plus \$3.50 postage. Order from Pegasearch, Route 1, Box 120A, Warm Springs, AR 72478. (A large map with the cemeteries marked is available for \$5.95.) This is a beautiful example of what a county cemetery census should be! A list of cemeteries with driving directions is included in the front, and the cemetery inscription information is listed afterward. Cemeteries near the Randolph County line but in other counties are included as a thoughtful addition. Family information, obituaries and earlier cemetery surveys supplement the material. There is a full name index. Any person or group thinking of compiling a cemetery census should definitely examine this book - it's first class. - DWA
