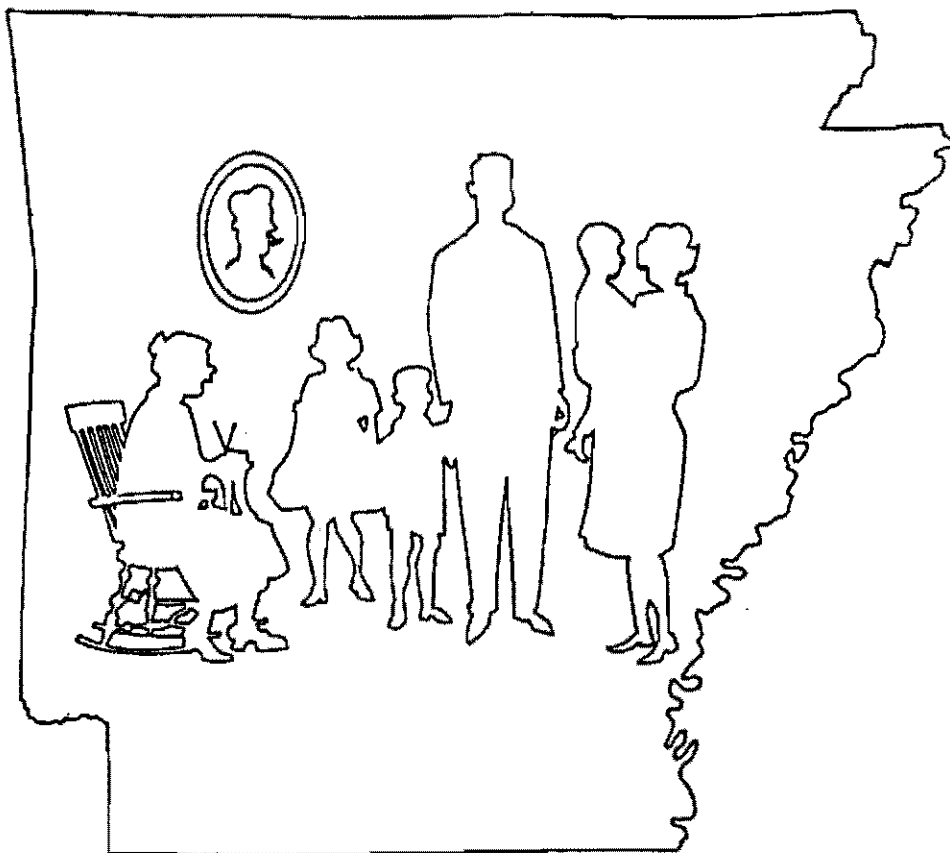

I'm very pleased to announce the beginning of Arkansas Genealogical Society's surname directory. We are interested in uniting family history researchers with others working on common lines and we are using the directory as a means to promote membership in Arkansas Genealogical Society. We will gather information for the rest of this year and compile the data early in 1990 (deadline for name submissions is 15 January 1990) and produce the surname directories. A number of them will be donated to libraries with genealogical collections throughout the United States and they will be offered for sale at a nominal cost to AGS members and at a little higher rate to non-AGS researchers. The directory will list up to 15 surnames per submitter with the Arkansas county in which the family lived, and inclusive years. The surnames will be arranged in alpha order with a list of submitters in the back. Isn't it a rewarding experience to contact a distant cousin and share genealogical information? We hope this surname directory will make that possible for many of you. A registration form is included elsewhere in this issue of the *Arkansas Family Historian*, and I hope you will take some time to complete it and send it in.

Mark your calendars for Arkansas Genealogical Society's 1989 Fall Seminar! We're having the seminar at Inn of the Ozarks in Eureka Springs, a unique Victorian resort in the mountains of northwest Arkansas, on November 3rd and 4th. #### **More on the Rodgers/Rogers Family**

We've received the following from Tim Johnson relating to the Rodgers/Rogers material that was published in the December, 1988, issue of AFH:

"I was delighted to find the information I assembled on the Rodgers/Rogers family and sent to Jean Stiponovich a couple of years ago appearing in the December 1988 issue of 'The Arkansas Family Historian', pages 201 through 208, and including pictures of my great-grandparents, Levi and Serena (Moore) Rodgers.

"Since I sent the information to Jean Stiponovich a few additions and some changes need to be added to the account of the Rodgers/Rogers family that appeared in your quarterly, that I thought you might like to make your subscribers and readers aware of:

"First, please note, on page 201, that I am TIM (not Jim) Johnson.

"On page 202, Reuben Rogers, son of Joseph & Mary Rogers, married Temperance JAMES. Unverified data recently received states that John Rogers, the son of Joseph & Mary, may have married Martha ? Hill? and that his daughter, Priscilla Rogers, married, 26 Nov 780, her cousin, Michael Rogers; Sarah Rogers married 25 Nov 1783, in Wake Co., N.C., Jacob Hunter; Rebecca Rogers died unmarried with her Will dated May 1855; Mary Rogers married 19 Mar 1772, in Wake Co., N.C., James Hilsman; and that there was an additional daughter of John Rogers, Martha, who married a Mr. Cheves.

"On page 203, Polly Rogers, the wife of Turner Perry, possibly died after 1850. Stephen Rogers, the son of Josiah Rogers, was born about 1780. Recent research into the family of Col. Jeduthan Harper makes it seem somewhat unlikely that Frances (or Elizabeth), the first wife of George Rogers, was his daughter. However, since she had a son named Jeduthan and another named Henry Harper Rogers, there does seem to be a potential for some connection to the Harper family but, as of now, what (or if) the connection is remains unknown.

"On page 204, Levi Rogers, Jr., the son of Levi & Sarah Rogers, did not marry first, Rena Milstead. Rather his first wife was Dorthana \_\_\_\_\_, who was born about 1820 in Alabama. This particular Levi Rogers was found to be living in Panola Co., Mississippi in 1850 (with his wife, Dorthana) but had returned to Warren Co., Tennessee by 1860.

"On page 205, the '6 Dec 1800' date of birth for Jane Rogers, the wife of Josiah Rogers, is somewhat doubtful. However, it is likely that she was indeed born about 1800 in Chatham Co., North Carolina.

"And finally, but very importantly, I would like to acknowledge the help and assistance of several others who have supplied me with information and assisted in researching the Rodgers/Rogers family, most notably Steve Rogers, of Franklin, Tennessee; Mary Elizabeth Barnes, of McMinnville, Tennessee; and Maurice Rogers, of Birmingham, Alabama. I should also like to point out that the information regarding the earliest generations of the Rodgers/Rogers family comes almost entirely from an article 'Rogers of Surry' by Dr. B. C. Holtzclaw, that appeared (I believe) in one of the volumes regarding SOUTHSIDE VIRGINIA FAMILIES by Boddie. I also want to thank Jean Stiponovich for submitting the Rodgers/Rogers article to you.

"I hope that this additional information will be of interest to you and suitable to appear in the next issue of 'Arkansas Family Historian', which always enjoy reading.

# GENEALOGY OF JAMES H. CROW

James H. Crow was born in 1811 in Missouri. He came to Clark County, Arkansas, in 1818. His parents, Walter and Margaret Crow, his grandparents, Benjamin and Ann Crow, and several brothers and sisters settled near Okolona. He received a meager education, typical of that available to a farm boy on the frontier at that time. He was married to Emily Wells in June 1832. She was of a pioneer family. Her father, Jacob Wells, settled in Clark County in about 1811.

In 1836 James H. Crow was appointed coroner of Clark County. He was elected County Judge twice, in 1844 and in 1846. In 1848 he was elected to the legislature, and in 1850 Sheriff of Clark County. In 1852 he was elected state senator from the district composed of Clark and Montgomery counties. However, he resigned for business reasons before the session convened. During the Civil War, he served as mayor of Arkadelphia. All of the above is evidence of his popularity and ability as a public servant. He died in October 1863. His wife, Emily, died in 1878.

James H. and Emily Wells Crow were the parents of eleven children:

I. Austin McLain - b. 6 December 1833; d. 26 October 1911; m. Abigale Mendenhall, 16 December 1862. Abigale was born on 14 January 1842 and died on 17 August 1931.

II. Amanda Caroline - b. 1835; d. 1916; m. Anderson Newton in 1852.

III. John Washington - b. 1839; killed in Civil War.

IV. Jacob Walter - b. 1841; d. 12 October 1900; m. Nancy Reed in 1866.

V. Ellanora F. - b. 1844; d. 1869; never married.

VI. Sarah E. - b. 1847; d. 1870; never married.

VII. Nancy Malissa - b. 1848; d. ; m. A.J. Tate in 1865.

VIII. Mary Leona - b. 1850; d. 1924; m. James M. Hawkins in 1877.

IX. Harriett - b. 1852; d. ; m. L. L. Reeder in 1883.

X. Victoria A. - b. 1855.

XI. Minerva - b. 1859; d. 1936; never married.

## I. Austin McLain Crow and family

He was raised on his father's farm and educated in the public schools. At age 24 he took over the operation of his father's saw mill. In 1869 he engaged in the dry goods business with a Mr. Rush. In 1870 he began a real estate and loan business, said to be the first in southwest Arkansas. As agent for the St. Louis and Iron Mountain Railroad, he controlled about 10,000 acres. He was very active in the Methodist church, was a Mason, and served many years on the local school board. Austin and Abigail Mendenhall Crow were parents of nine children. Abigale died in August 1931.

He worked on the Panama Canal, Alaska Railroad, Mississippi River, and numerous other major engineering projects. Children:
1. Frank Austin - b. 6 January 1891; d. 1971; m. Margaret Scott in 1916. He was a civil engineer who lived most of his life in Arkadelphia. Children:
    - a. Frank Austin, Jr. - b. 28 August 1918; m. Martha Marbury in 1941. He was a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy and later taught at the University of Missouri at Rolla. Children:

    - b. Margaret Scott - b. 23 September 1924; m. R. S. Martin, Jr. They live in Kilgore, Texas. Mr. Martin is in the transport business. Children:

      - (3) Scott Donnelly - b. 29 April 1965
  2. Mildred Leigh - b. 11 November 1892; d. 8 January 1971; m. Jacob Lawrence Newberry, 19 January 1916. He was an auto dealer in Arkadelphia, Arkansas. He died 10 December 1937. Children:
    - a. William Lawrence- b. 16 November 1918; m. 20 August 1947 to Dorothy Lillard. He was in the insurance business in Arkadelphia, Arkansas, for 20 years. Children:
      - (1) William Thomas - b. 15 October 1949; m. Ann Cohen, Richmond, Virginia, 15 April 1977. He has one child and lives in Sacramento, California.
      - (2) Mildred Jane - b. 17 October 1953; m. Sam Jones, Little Rock, Arkansas, 16 October 1980. She lives in Shreveport, Louisiana.
    - b. Emily Leigh (adopted) - b. 16 January 1924; m. (1) Harry Clark. Had one child. She lives in Arkadelphia, Arkansas.

## WILEY M. HORTON FAMILY

Submitted by Mrs. L. M. Rathbone, 16413 Fitzhugh Rd., Austin, TX 78736, who stated this is a brief account of this family that lived in Boone County, Arkansas, for many years and there are still descendants living in Arkansas. Some of the birth and death dates come from private family records that are not available elsewhere, making them very important to have in print and preserved.

Wiley McKendre Horton was born 18 February 1812 at Lancaster, South Carolina (1) and died 30 June 1888 in Boone County, Arkansas (2). On 20 August 1832 he made a bond in Williamson County, Tennessee, for his marriage to Elisabeth Wilie [sic], with bondsman Reuben T. Craig (3). Elizabeth M. Wiley or Wylie was born 22 November 1812 at Charlotte, North Carolina (1) and died 19 July 1874. She is buried beside her husband in Newton Cemetery, in southeastern Boone County.

Wiley Horton does not appear in the deed records of Williamson County, Tennessee, but paid a poll tax there in 1833 (4). He seems to have been in Alabama in 1837 when son John was born, but had returned to Williamson County by 1840 (5). By 1850 he had moved into Davidson County where his occupation was given as "overseer" (6). In later censuses he is listed as a farmer.

He remained in Tennessee until after the birth of his youngest child, and then moved to near Springfield, Greene County, Missouri, where he is found in the 1860 census in Campbell Township (7). The most notable tradition in the family is that in 1862 when the Civil War was going on, Federal troops set fire to Wiley's house, barns, etc., telling the family to leave the country. They left Springfield and may have lived briefly in White County, Arkansas before settling in Boone County. Here Wiley and Elizabeth spent the rest of their lives. In 1870 and 1880 the family is listed in Jefferson Township, with Rolling Prairie as their post office. (8)

Although the Hortons of South Carolina, Tennessee and Alabama were closely associated with the Methodist Church, Wiley Horton and most of his children are thought to have been affiliated with the Christian Church, or Church of Christ, in Arkansas.

The children of Wiley McKendre and Elizabeth M. (Wylie) Horton were (9):

1. Probably a son, aged 5-10 in 1840. This child does not appear in the 1850 census, nor in the family records, and it is thought he died young.

2. John J. Horton, born 8 March 1837, Alabama, and died 2 January 1891.

3. Lawson S. Horton, born 21 May 1839, Tennessee, married 30 January 1860, White County, Arkansas, to Margaret A. E. Baines. (10)

4. Mary Elizabeth Horton, called "Lizzie", born 28 June 1841, Tennessee, died 24 October 1935, Gonzales County, Texas. (11) She is buried in Old Rancho Cemetery, about a mile north of the present town of Nixon. She was married on 10 September 1867 to Henry Moore (11). Henry was born 5 October 1830 in Rockingham County, North Carolina, and was a son of John Moore (Jr.) and his wife Betsey Jane Lemond, of North Carolina and Cole County, Missouri. (12) Henry died in Jackson County, Texas, on 23 June 1889 and is buried in Strane Cemetery near Morales. Lizzie probably married Henry Moore in a county near Boone County where they were living when the 1870 census was taken but the record hasn't been located. They remained in Boone County until they moved to Jackson County, Texas, in 1889, where Henry's sister and brother-in-law, Betty and Presley K. Miller, had already settled. After Henry's untimely death, Lizzie was left to raise their children alone, assisted by the Millers. As far as we know, Lizzie never saw any of her brothers and sisters again. Though one of her brothers moved to Texas later on, she was unaware of it.

After her children were grown, Lizzie made her home with her youngest daughter for a number of years and then lived briefly with her youngest son in New Mexico. She spent the last few years of her life in the home of her oldest granddaughter, Mrs. Ira Caraway, and it was there that she died in 1935.

Although her eyesight failed during the last years of her life, Lizzie refused to be idle. With six great great grandchildren born between 1931 and 1935, there were plenty of baby diapers to fold. It is said that the diapers looked as if they had been ironed after Grandmother folded them. She loved and petted the babies and was greatly loved by all who knew her.

In addition to the seven children Lizzie bore, she raised two step-children, Henry Moore's daughters by his first wife, Nancy Jane Thompson, who had died in Missouri in 1865 (13). These two children were Viola Moore (born 8 December 1859, died 26 November 1881) who married Charles Galloway (14), and Ella Moore (born 9 July 1860) who married 13 April 1882 to John Willhite. The Willhites were living at Galloway, Missouri c1916. Following are the children of Henry and Mary Elizabeth (Horton) Moore, all born in Boone County, Arkansas, near Rally Hill: (11)

a. William Minor Moore, born 23 December 1870, died 18 March 1881, Boone County.(15)

b. Leota McNite Moore, born 28 September 1871, died 3 December 1948, Gonzales County, Texas. She was married on 6 July 1890 in Jackson County, Texas, to Richard Austin Flournoy, as his second wife. They are buried in Nixon Cemetery, Nixon, Texas. They were the parents of nine sons and four daughters, the oldest daughter being the maternal grandmother of the compiler.

c. Emma Jane Moore, born 17 February 1873, died 27 October 1963, Guadalupe County, Texas (16). She was married on 17 July 1890, Jackson County, Texas, to Richard P. Wingfield. Issue.

d. Lonnie W. Moore, born 18 August 1875, died 10 March 1879, Boone County, Arkansas. (15)

e. Daniel Paul Moore, born 1 April 1877, died 17 September 1948, Bexar County, Texas, buried at Sabinal. He was married to Mary Jane Jernigan. (17) Issue.

f. Henry Silas Moore, born 8 November 1878, living near Arrey, New Mexico c1916. He married Alice \_\_\_\_\_. Issue.

g. Walcy Moore, born 11 February 1881, died 30 September 1961, Travis County, Texas.(18) She was married on 9 March 1898 to Henry Lofton Fortenberry. Issue.

5. Benjamin Seward Horton, born 19 April 1842, Franklin, Williamson County, Tennessee, died 24 July 1921, Searcy, White County, Arkansas. He was buried in Oak Grove Cemetery (19). He married Sarah Ann Alice Baugh and in 1965, their daughter, Mrs. Alex James Martin (Grace Blanche Horton) was living in Searcy.

6. Sarah L. Horton, born 22 February 1845, Tennessee, died 2 July 1877. She was married 9 January 1867, White County, Arkansas, to Alfred M. Query (20). In 1969 her grandson, Floyd Benjamin Layne, lived in Los Angeles, California.

7. William H. Horton. born 2 April 1848, Tennessee, died 31 May 1932, Live Oak County Texas. (21) His first wife was Maggie, in 1880 Boone County Arkansas census. They had at least one child. He was married again on 20 November 1920 to Mrs. Laura Bomer, (21) who survived him. His son Hobbs Horton was living at Plumerville, Arkansas c1964.

8. Sarilda H. Horton, born 1850 in Tennessee. She was probably born after the 1850 census was taken on 6 September since she is not listed on her parents' record that year. She died in 1864.

9. Salina Horton, born 5 August 1854, Nashville, Tennessee, died 23 June 1942 in Morrilton, Conway County, Arkansas. She was married to Jacob Brown c1874. (23) A granddaughter, Mrs. T. W. Parker, was living in Little Rock in 1964.

**SPANGLER, STEELE, PIPKIN, RANSOM**

Some time ago, we published a photograph of S. W. Spangler in a Knights Templar uniform. It was recognized by member Fred A. Steele, of 1598 Hillcrest Dr., Arroyo Grande, CA 93420, who wrote us giving the following information. Mr. Steele and his wife believe S. W. Spangler was Judge Seth Spangler. They have typed handwritten records of Judge Spangler in a guardianship matter heard in Franklin County and present them here. Mr. Steele adds these comments as background:

George Ransom was the grandfather of William E. Steele. The father of Wm. E. was William R., who died in about 1851. Winnie Emmeline Steele married a Pipkins immediately after Wm. R.'s death. Her monument as well as her son's are in the Harmony Cemetery in Franklin Co.

The interesting part of all the hearing is that other daughters of Ransom were all speaking against their own father. Almost every person mentioned in this story has a story behind them. -

Alva Floyd was later a clerk in the court house, Julia Ann (Ransom) Nichols and Hannah Harrison would be of interest to the queries in the Silver Anniversary issue [pages 73 & 66] Even the last sentence - two boxes of tobacco - gives me a thrill. My great grandmother (Caty Anderson Steele) was known to have smoked a pipe. Maybe she got some of it.

Mr. and Mrs. Steele have more information - and went to Vicksburg to find exactly where the 20th Alabama group were located, which goes with another story on Chris C. Steele, grandfather of our contributor who went to Bibb Co., Alabama to join the Alabama 20th Division.

Harmony Cemetery is east of Ozark, AR, and includes monuments for Wm.E. Steele, Emeline Steele Pipkin and Elizabeth W. Steele.

And to an amount for which said acct. claimed credit for the value of certain Confederate money valued by him at.....\$45.00

And therefor said Emeline Pipkins prays this, her bill of exceptions may be signed, sealed, and made a part of the record.

TESTIMONY IN THE CASE OF EMELINE PIPKINS (HEIR) OF WILLIAM E. STEELE (WARD) VS. GEORGE RANSOM (GUARDIAN) No date or other information copied.

ALVA FLOYD, a witness for Emeline Pipkins, said:

After Guardian was discharged from Army and before Ward was, Guardian came home and said he was going back to Miss. to peddle goods in the Army for the soldiery;

That Heir had once told him that she wanted George Ransom to go after Ward, but that having received a letter from C. C. Steele that he was improving and doing well enough, she was satisfied, and did not care about his going.

CHRISTOPHER STEELE, witness for Heir, stated he was a soldier serving with Ward in same reg't at the time of Guardian coming to Miss. Ward was at hospital. He heard from him frequently and certainly that Ward was improving under hospital treatment, was getting well of wounds when Guardian came to Miss. Ward had money whilst in the Army, and received some when finally discharged. Soldiers wounded and sick were cared for by the Army, and when discharged had transportation home or money in lieu thereof. Ward was about sixteen years old when he entered the army. His mother was opposed to his going into the army on account of his youth, and his father was then dead.

That Emeline Pipkin, the executor, is the mother and only heir of Ward, William E. Steele;

That Ward died intestate and without issue;

Guardian was hauling about camps while in Miss. and seemed to be making money.

WILLIAM KENDRICK, witness for Heir, says Heir had sent Ward to school and paid for same.

HANNAH HARRIMAN (HARRISON?) and JULIA NICHOLS (JULIA ANN RANSOM NICHOLS) said they knew of Guardian buying horse and giving to Ward.

And this was all the evidence given in the cause. Witnesses in the matter being submitted to the court. The court ordered the said Guardian should pay to the said Ward eighty-nine dollars and all the costs incurred in these exceptions -- to which order and judgement the said Heir, Emeline Pipkins, excepted at the time, and afterwards on this 5th day of April the said Heir by her attorney pled [sic] her motion for a new trial herein, which motion was by the court overruled. To the intervening pending motion she excepted at the time and therefor the said Heir tenders this, her second bill of exceptions thereto and prays the cause may be signed, sealed and made part of the record in this cause, and verifies her affidavit at the same time according to law praying an appeal to the court of Franklin County herein.

Be it remembered that in the trial of this cause the said Guardian, to sustain the correctness of the credits claimed by him in his said invoice, introduced as a witness one:

ANDREW RANSOM, who testified:

That he knew of the Ward, William, having gotten a horse and saddle from Guardian, as charged in said account;

That the Ward was then about sixteen years old.

That he got the said horse to ride in the Confederate Army, and did so use him.

That said horse was worth say eighty-five dollars.

That he went to Mississippi with Guardian, the Guardian remained there some time, two or three months, hauling about the camps, and then returned, William traveling with him.

That witness paid ten dollars to Mr. \_\_\_? \_\_\_ at request of Guardian.

That Ward was wounded and lying in hospital in Miss.

That this Guardian handed Ward over to his mother.

When he arrived in Miss. that Ward went with and assisted Guardian in hauling in produce from the country to Reg't. to serve and keep up the mess of which witness was one.

[New handwriting, but same witness]

That William E. Steele was badly wounded at the Battle of Corinth, and Emeline Pipkins, the mother of Steele, insisted on George Ransom, his Guardian, going after him, stating that he has William E. Steele's funds in his hands, that if they were not sufficient all she had should go to pay him \_\_\_\_\_? \_\_\_\_\_.

That George Ransom took a two horse wagon and went to Granada, Miss.

That when arriving, said Steele had not been discharged.

That he remained until he was discharged and then returned with him to his home.

That the trip was worth two hundred dollars.

That in 1862 the witness returned to Ark. and told Emeline Pipkins that if she desired he would take the house back as well as saddle.

That she declined.

That George Ransom arrived in Miss. some time in Dec., 1862, and left some four months afterwards.

That said Steele was not discharged until in February, 1863, at which time he, himself (Andrew?) took sick.

That George remained until his recovery.

That during that time George Ransom bestowed attentions to his said Ward and purchased provisions for him.

That he (?) went with George Ransom as far as Vick. (?), Miss. on his trip to Gremada.

\*\*\*\*

JOHN DUNCAN, a witness for Guardian, said he knew of the Guardian's being in Miss. with Ward. Ward and Guardian were hauling about there together for some time.

That Ward was in hospital when Guardian went there.

That the Army had means of taking care of sick and wounded and did so.

That after the discharge of William E. Steele and while witness Andrew Ransom was sick with smallpox, he (Duncan?) and one or two others as well as George Ransom, William E. Steele and a surgeon went out in the country from the command and no communications allowed except with persons detailed to bring out rations. This was in February or March. The cook being sick the surgeon would not allow William E. Steele to cook, but cooked himself for the mess, stating that he (William?) was not able to do so.

URIAH NICHOLS, a witness for Guardian, stated he knew of Ward getting a horse from Guardian.

That Emeline on the occasion of an attempted arbitration said she would admit the claim for the horse rather than have any difficulty about the matter, but that he had charged too much for the horse & saddle.

SEVILLA (SAVILLA) BARNES, wit. for Guardian said ---- (no entry)

\*\*\*\*

DORCHULA HENDERSON, witness for Guardian, said she knew of Guardian going to Miss.

That Ward came home with him.

Guardian brought home two boxes of tobacco and some other articles.

That at one time Emeline Pipkins desired Guardian to go to Mississippi and bring Ward home.

## CASEY-CARROLL

The following material was sent us by George Bleimes, 4565 Hamilton Rd., Gahanna, OH 43230, who states this material is from the 1886 History of Union County, KY. Mr. Bleimes has no connection to these people; his interest in Union Co., KY, is that is where his grandmother, Bertha Rose Smith, was born, along with her sister, Mary Barbara Smith.

Both these ladies, with their mother, moved to Memphis, then to Little Rock, in the 1870's. They all married there and started their families.

Martha (Bettie) married Peyton Robinson, grandson of Gen. Hardy Robinson and they had two children, Edward Fenton and Bertha Louise before Peyton died from falling off his horse. They lived in Argenta. The family cemetery is still out there.

Mary (Mamie) married Julius Richter, had three children, Emma, Amelia and Julius, then her husband died. She then married Wm. Kranz.

The mother, Emelie Ruser Smith, married Wilhelm H. Amrhein, a widower with two sons, Andy and Gus. Her first husband was a German immigrant whose name was supposedly Schmidt. She and Mary apparently used the surnames Schmidt and Smith as it suited their purposes. When they married Germans in Little Rock they were Schmidts. Emelie acquired a few pieces of real estate around the neighborhood and is said to have, at one time, owned Duell Park.

Andrew Amrhein married Fanny Balch and became a cement contractor. You can still see his logo in some of the Little Rock sidewalks.

### "The Casey Family

Among the names that are indissolubly connected with Union County is that of Casey. A hundred years ago a man of that name (the subject of this sketch), came to Union County and surveyed lands within its limits. His connection with the after history of the county makes him a conspicuous figure.

Peter Casey's ancestry were Irish. Three brothers, Benjamin, Nicholas and another, whose name is not known, came to America before the Revolutionary War. The oldest brother, Benjamin, was a soldier and killed in the War for Independence. The next oldest moved West and the family lost sight of him. The third was Nicholas, the ancestor of the Union County family. He settled in Virginia, and was the father of Peter Casey.

Peter Casey was born in Virginia early enough to participate in the Revolution. About the close of the war he married Nancy Waggener, a daughter of Andrew Waggener, who lived near Fredricksburg in Spottsylvania County, VA. Mrs. Casey was born in 1762.

An old scrap from the New York Herald gives the origin of the name Casey; and compliments the three older Caseys very highly, and pursues their genealogy back several generations.

In 1785 Peter Casey superintended a survey of lands in Union County, a grant to which he had been allowed by the Government for his services in the Revolution. He located lands at the mouth of Highland Creek below where Uniontown now stands; on Casey's Creek, a branch of Highland Creek; and at the mouth of Tradewater, on both sides, some 15,000 acres in all. These lands, at his death, were divided, each of the children receiving 200 or 250 acres, and the balance was sold on joint account. He traded the Tradewater lands because

he thought there was coal in that vicinity. He told Samuel Casey, in 1827, that from the resemblance to Virginia coal fields, he suspected the presence of coal in that neighborhood.

After his survey he returned to Virginia, and soon moved to Harrod's Station, Ky., where he was engaged in fighting the Indians sometimes. He held the office of Captain at that time, and farmed some land and operated a mill. He finally moved to Union County, and first settled at Carthage, or 'the rocks', below Uniontown, but afterward went to Morgnfield and kept hotel. The exact date of his death is not known. His widow survived him many years, and lived to the advanced age of eighty-two. She had forty grandchildren, most of whom were present at one reunion. Twenty-five were young men and women grown; and yet she never saw a great-grandchild of her own. The following tribute to her memory is from the pen of John C. Rives, the founder of the Congressional Globe.

DIED.-Near Caseyville, Union County, Kentucky, on Monday, the 12th day of July, 1847, Mrs. Nancy Casey, widow of Judge Peter Casey, in the eighty-fourth year of her age. She was born on the 8th of October, 1763, near Fredricksburg, Spottsylvania County, Virginia, and about two years afterwards her parents moved to Mill Creek, Berkley County, in the same State.

Her life affords another example in proof of the influence on character of great and interesting events in a country. Although this excellent lady was distinguished for her kind and feminine nature, yet her zeal for public cause in every crisis of difficulty rose above the weaker feelings of the sex, and made patriotism the most remarkable trait of her character. She was reared in the midst of the struggles of the Revolutionary War, and passed from them into the most sanguinary scenes of the Indian warfare of Kentucky; and in those fearful times she acquired the spirit which taught her, though the fondest of mothers, to give up one of her sons in the War of 1812; and prompted her, in her feeble old age, to go forth to urge the young men of her neighborhood to engage in the present war against Mexico. She even attended their drills, to stimulate their zeal. When this was remarked on by some as exhibiting a want of Christian feeling, she replied: 'These young men who are preparing themselves to fight for their country, will do it more good than some who preach against the sin of the war.' She did not inquire by whose fault the war was brought on, or whether it existed 'by the act of Mexico', when war was declared by Congress. She looked only to the duties and sacrifices which the occasion demanded, to conclude it well for the country.

Mrs. Casey was the daughter of Major Andrew Waggener, who was an officer (first a captain, and then a major) in the Continental Army of the Revolution. During the greater part of his service he was under the immediate command of Washington, and fought well in many well fought fields, especially at the important battle of Brandywine, which was the key to Philadelphia. All the accounts of that battle agree that the troops 'led' by Captains Waggener and Porterfield behaved more gallantly than any others. Indeed, none but those troops are named as having fought bravely; and it is believed if all - or even a moiety - of the army had shown the desperate valor which distinguished the little corps of Waggener and Porterfield the battle of Brandywine would have been won by Washington and Philadelphia saved.

Miss Waggener married Peter Casey about the close of the Revolutionary War, and soon after migrated to Harrod's Station, now Harrodsburg, Kentucky. This was then the most exposed point of Indian attack in Kentucky. The place as beseiged again and again; and when these formidable attempts were intermitted, lurking parties of savages were continually breaking in upon the settlements; insomuch that the inhabitants took their rifles to the fields as regularly as they did their implements of husbandry, and had often to fight their way back to the fort.

Mr. Casey lived in the neighborhood of Harrodsburg, until about the year 1810, when he moved with his family to Union County, Kentucky, then very thinly and rudely settled. Here the influence of Mrs. Casey's example was soon felt in teaching the comforts of good

housekeeping and kindly intercourse. In a few years it became obvious to everyone that there was amelioration of manners and improvements in every respect in the neighborhood, and it was generally ascribed to the active benevolence and intelligence of Mrs. Casey. She was loved, and admired, and imitated. She did here utmost to give relief in every case of distress, although it often stunted her own means of comfort, and she gave personal exertions when her health and strength would hardly justify it. She took orphans into her own family, reared them, and treated them as kindly as she did her own children; and there was never a more affectionate or devoted mother.

Her husband died nearly twenty years before her; and although widowhood generally circumscribes the efforts of the mother of a family into its immediate circle, it had no such effect on her. She still went about doing good. She was looked up to by all around her as one who lived more for others than for herself; and hence throughout her life she had the love of everybody as the recompense for the absence of self-love. I knew her for thirty-seven years, and knew most of the persons who lived in her vicinity during that time, and I have never heard her spoken of but in the most exalted terms. I cannot say this of any other person.

Mrs. Casey belonged to no religious sect, but always attended the worship of any denomination of Christians, when in her power to do so; and she advised and encouraged others to go to church. Her religion was, like her charity, universal and practical, and made her end happy. A friend writes to me that her life passed gently away from the gradual exhaustion of vitality, as a fire goes out for want of fuel.

This tribute to her memory is written by one of the orphans raised by her, who, though no blood relation, feels as if he had lost a natural parent. He as little expects to 'look upon her like', as upon her face, again, on this earth; and hopes and prays that she may be happy eternally.

The children of this couple were Samuel Casey, who was born in 1787, and died December 22, 1859; Nicholas Casey, who died February 24, 1863, and John Casey, who died December 25, 1867, aged sixty-seven years.

Nicholas, the second son of this couple, who was destined to play an important part in the development of Union County, was born in Harrod's Fort, Ky., in the year 1790. He attended such schools as Harrodsburg afforded at that early day, and afterward attended the select school of Judge Marshall, in Mercer County, in company with such men as Letcher, Burrough, Bowen, Etc. When his father was living in the vicinity of Uniontown in 1814, he went to the Saline River, in Illinois, and filled the office of Government Clerk on the 'Mineral Reservation.' While there he married Miss Susan G. Finnie, of Morganfield, in 1815. He returned to Union County in 1824 and prepared to go to Caseyville in 1825. He moved his family there in 1826 or 1827, and began to break the wilderness. His object in going there was to establish a wood yard, boat store and ferry. He dug the first ice house between Louisville and New Orleans, in 1828. In those days, a steamboat, in ascending the river, had to frequently stop at 'Casey's Landing' as it was then called, and lay in a stock of provisions. They would often lay over an entire day, awaiting the slaughter of meat and arrival of other provisions from the country back of the landing. He was elected to the Legislature and secured the incorporation of Caseyville. He was a Magistrate for over twenty years. His rulings were not always satisfactory to the lawyers, but they were undoubtedly characterized by sound sense and native justice. Once a man was sued in his court for the possession of a cow. The defendant had bought the cow on credit, and when the plaintiff asked for his money he did not pay, and plead the benefit of a law which allowed a man two cows, when he should be sued for debt. Judge Casey became satisfied in this man's case, that the intention had been to plead the benefit of this law from the first, and he accordingly awarded a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, saying: 'It may not be strictly legal, but it is right that the defendant should return this cow for which he has never paid a cent.'

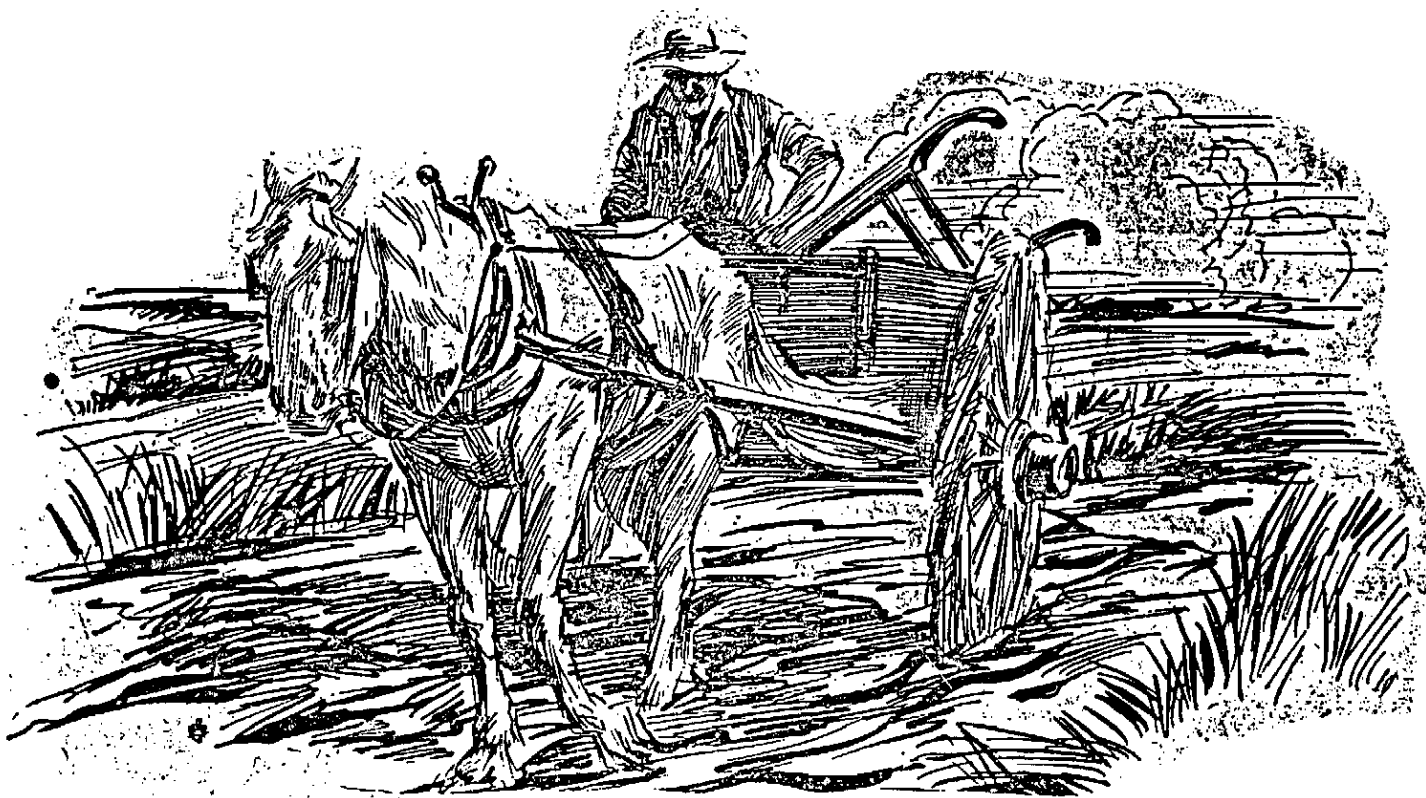
Susan Gibson Finnie, the wife of Nicholas Casey, was the daughter of John and Rachel Finnie, was born September 18, 1797. Her father was a Colonel in the Virginia line during the Revolution. Her mother, Rachel Taylor, before marriage, was a resident of Clark County, Ky., when she met Col. Finnie. Her parents moved to Woodford County, and afterward to Union County in 1810 or 1812. She died in Conway County, Ark., August 6, 1871.

The children of Nicholas and Susan G. Casey were John Gibson and Andrew Benjamin, who died in infancy; Ann Trapnall, who was born in 1819 and died in 1884; Samuel Lewis, born February 18, 1821, whose biography will be found in the Chapter on Coal; Peter, born February 13, 1823, died at Vicksburg, Miss., February 8, 1875; Nicholas Waggener, born August 3, 1826, now living in New Orleans; James Finnie, born March 22, 1830; Susan Gibson, born December 29, 1831, died August 6, 1871; Rachel Ann Casey, born November 5, 1835, and died in Harrodsburg, Ky., June 17, 1850.

The married children of this family are as follows: Peter married Sarah Attoway Finnie, daughter of James W. and Eliza Finnie, December 17, 1851; Nicholas W. married Eliza McCall Taylor, daughter of John Gibson and Elizabeth Lee Taylor, December 13, 1853; Susan Gibson married Charles Arthur Carroll March 11, 1858; James Finnie married Emma Dent, of St Louis, February 14, 1861; Rachel Ann married Dr. John H. Carroll, in Little Rock, Ark., May 5, 1867.

Samuel Casey, the oldest son of Peter and Nancy Casey, was a man of considerable ability, and held the office of United States Treasurer at the time of his death. ..."

### **ARKANSAS CONFEDERATE SOLDIERS KILLED AT THE BATTLE OF MIDDLE BOGGY AND BURIED AT THE CONFEDERATE CEMETERY, ONE MILE NORTH OF ATOKA, OKLAHOMA**

Gwen Walker of the Atoka County Historical Society, P. O. Box 245, Atoka, Oklahoma, has supplied this interesting information. The following is from a brochure supplied by their Museum to visitors, open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. except national holidays. The facilities are open to the public without charge and are denied to no one due to race, color, age, sex, disability, or national origin.

Battle of Middle Boggy - February 13, 1864

Early in 1864 approximately 1,500 Union soldiers under Colonel William A. Phillips set out on an expedition to cut a swath through Confederate Indian Territory from the Arkansas River to the Red River.

The purpose was to bring the area under Union control and to offer the amnesty terms provided in President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation of the previous December. Colonel Phillips wanted not only to sever Confederate treaties with the tribes, but also to gain recruits from the Indians.

Before departing Fort Gibson, Colonel Phillips told his men. "Soldiers! I take you with me to clean out the Indian Nation south of the river and drive away and destroy rebels. Let me say a few words to you that you are not to forget ... Those who are still in arms are rebels, who ought to die. Do not kill a prisoner after he has surrendered. But I do not ask you to take prisoners. I ask you to make your footsteps severe and terrible Muskogees! [Creeks] the time has now come when you are to remember the authors of all your suffering; those who started a needless and wicked war ... Stand by me faithfully and we will soon have peace..."

On February 9 the Union troops reached the Boggy Depot area, where Colonel Phillips camped to wait for a large part of the 14th Kansas Cavalry under Colonel Thomas Moonlight to arrive from Fort Smith.

While waiting, Colonel Phillips sent an advance of about 350 men under Major Charles Willets to a known Boggy Depot outpost on Middle Boggy River (now known as Muddy Boggy). This force consisted of three troops of the 14th

Kansas Cavalry and one section (two guns) of howitzers, commanded by Colonel Solomon Kaufman.

The Confederate forces at Middle Boggy may have numbered as many as 90 men and no artillery. They were composed of Captain Nail's Company "A" of the First Choctaw and Chickasaw Cavalry, a detachment of the 20th Texas Cavalry, and a part of Lieutenant Colonel John Jumper's Seminole Battalion of Mounted Rifles.

The Confederate forces were completely surprised when Major Willets first shelled and then attacked them. The Confederates fought desperately for approximately thirty minutes before scattering into the surrounding woods, dashing for the safety of Colonel Jumper and the remainder of his Seminole Battalion who were camped at Boggy Depot.

Colonel Jumper and his troops had heard the howitzers firing and had begun to ride toward the encampment when they met Captain Nail and the survivors of the battle.

By the time Colonel Jumper's regiment and the survivors arrived at the battlefield, Major Willets had occupied Middle Boggy, learned of the approaching Seminoles and retreated to Colonel Phillips camp.

However, Major Willets, following the directives he had given, had taken no prisoners. The bodies of the wounded that Captain Nail had left behind were discovered on the ground with their throats cut.

Major Willets reported no killed and wounded. The Confederate dead numbered forty-seven.

The Gallant dead were buried near the battlefield, beside a burial ground used by travelers of the old Texas Road before the war.

#### The Cemetery

The "burying ground" was first used by emigrants on the Texas Road who camped at the spring, later to be known as "Harkins Spring", just north of Middle Boggy.

Throughout the Civil War, the Confederate forces kept an out-post camp at the spring to guard the route to Boggy Depot. During the winter of 1862, an epidemic, probably measles, swept through many of the soldiers' camps, including the one on the Middle Boggy. The soldiers who died are buried near the emigrants and several of their graves are marked with names and date carved in the native stone.

The soldiers who died during the battle of February 13, 1864, were buried in graves covered with stones, but no one had time to carve their names into markers.

In 1872, when the Missouri, Kansas and Texas railroad came through, their route lay across the Confederate part of the cemetery. The havoc the workmen were creating aroused the anger of a Choctaw woman who lived just south of the crossing of the Middle Boggy.

Eliza Ann Flack, a great-grandniece of Pushmataha, circulated a petition and convinced the railroad to preserve the remainder of the cemetery. At one time

known as Harkins' cemetery because a family by that name owned the surrounding land, this became the first public cemetery in the young town of Atoka until September 1877, when West View Cemetery was established. ...

Gwen Walker, on a trip to Washington, DC, with her husband, devoted many hours to research in the National Archives. She was successful in locating records for four men whose graves had sandstones carved with the letters C.S.A. followed by names and death dates, all in April 1862.

All were members of C. L. Dawson's 9th Arkansas Infantry, Companies "A" and "I" and were mustered in at Nashville and Antonia, Arkansas, two in October 1861, and two in February 1862. In addition to these four, two additional records were found for men serving in Company "A" who died on or about these same dates. As it has now been established that these two companies were encamped here, it is assumed that these two men also died at this location and are buried in some of the marked but unidentified graves in this section of the cemetery.

On her return, Mrs. Walker and Helen Parker began to examine the sandstones more closely and began to scratch way the dirt from one of the identified stones, discovering letters carved into the stone below the ground level. This resulted in a full-scale search and more names and dates were found. One was a very large stone that was upside down. The stone was righted by Jerry Williams and reset. Research is underway to see if these additional names were members of the same regiment.

Known Arkansas soldiers included in this cemetery are:

Baker, Thomas T., private, Co. B, 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. Enlisted at Fort Smith, October 18, 1861, age 17. Died April 21, 1862.

Davis, W.C., private, Co. C, 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. Enlisted in Pike County, October 19, 1861; age 18. Died April 22, 1862.

Floyd, C. A., 2nd Lt., Co. C 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. Enlisted in Pike County, October 19, 1861. Died May 30, 1862.

Johnson, Francis M., private, Co. A, 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. No further record.

Mayben, Thomas, private, Co. I, 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. No further record.

Neugent, James, private, Co. A, 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. Enlisted Oct. 10, 1861 at Antoine, Pike County; age 22. Died April 23, 1862.

Runnels, J. J., 3d Corporal, Co. I, 19 (Dawson's) Arkansas Infantry. Enlisted at Nashville, Hempstead (now Howard) County, February 26, 1862; age 26. Died April 23, 1862.

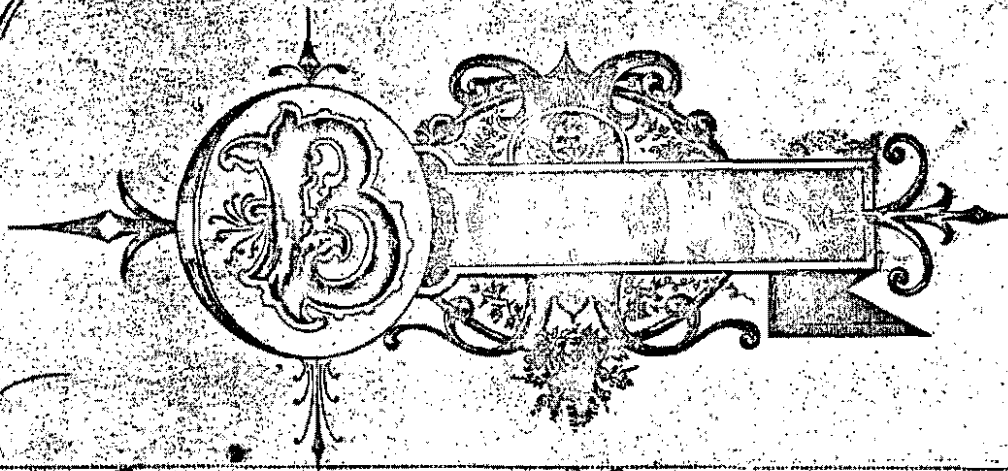

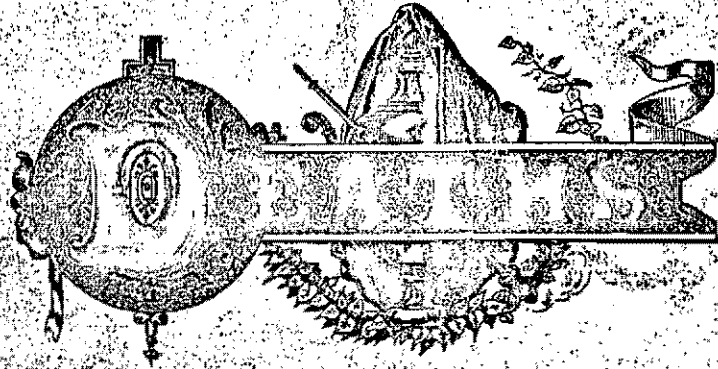

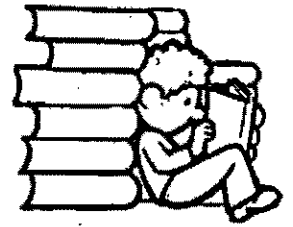

NOTES; Please notice that the surname changes from BOYTT to BOYTTT to BOYETT.

Also, in reviewing the xerox copies containing this data, I'm not sure that it came from a Bible, at least not from the pages included in most Bibles for family data. The pages are 4" X 6" which is not the ordinary size to found within a Bible. In addition, most if not all Bible pages include headings which are printed. These headings are in the same handwriting as most of the entries. It is possible that the pages were tucked in a family Bible, but it seems doubtful that they were actually pages from a Bible.

At this late date and from a xerox copy, it can not be deciphered who drew the lines and arrow which appears in the record. All of the first entries are in the same handwriting and may have been recorded at the same time.

**MARRIAGES OF NEVADA COUNTY, ARKANSAS, 1871-1901**, published by The Hempstead County Genealogical Society, PO Box 1158, Hope, AR 71801. 234 pp, softbound, \$20.00, 4,793 marriages. Grooms' names are listed alphabetically, followed by (if available) his residence, age, bride, residence, age, date of marriage, official performing ceremony, book and page number. Any notes of consent are included; licenses applied but not executed are also listed. There is a full name index for brides. Maps ca 1871 and 1895 are included showing formation of the county; political and geographical townships with location of major communities. Books A through H have been included in this record. This excellently produced record adds greatly to our genealogical data for southwest Arkansas. - BJM

**PRAIRIE COUNTY, ARKANSAS (AND LONOKE BEFORE 1873) 1870 FEDERAL CENSUS**, Compiled by R. W. Dhonau. Velo-bound, 138 pp, surname index, \$20.00. This census was transcribed from a copy of the 1870 census of Prairie County and makes the data more usable than the microfilm version. It is a full transcription of this census with a surname index. - BJM

**CEMETERY INSCRIPTIONS IN SOUTHWEST ARKANSAS VOLUME I**, compiled by John Purnell Frazier. Softbound, 212 pp., surname index, \$17.75 postpaid. (Texas residents must include \$1.20 State Sales Tax.) Order from compiler, 611 Cypress, Pittsburg, TX 75686. This volume includes inscriptions from cemeteries in the following Arkansas counties: Miller, (5 - Antioch, Corinth-Church of Christ, Mt. Zion, Rocky Mound and Sulphur Fork Cemeteries) Columbia, (11 - Bussey, Chalybeate Springs, Emerson, Frazier, Hephzibah, Presbyterian Memorial, Providence, both new and old; Scott, Trayulor, and Ware's Chapel Cemeteries) Lafayette, (3 - Forest Grove, Mars Hill, and Oak Grove Cemeteries) and Union (4 - Jolley, Parkers Chapel, Pleasant Grove and Three Creeks Cemeteries). Mr. Frazier advises that all of the cemeteries contained in this volume are also available on VCR tape, with copies priced at \$15.00 plus postage. - BJM

**HEMPSTEAD AND NEVADA COUNTIES, ARKANSAS CEMETERY INSCRIPTIONS, VOLUME I**, compiled by Hilton Treas and John Calvin Head. Softbound, 175 pp., surname index, \$16.50 plus \$1.00 postage. Published by J and W Enterprises, 2838 Jody Lane, Shreveport, LA 71118. In this first volume, the authors have included the following Hempstead and Nevada Counties, Arkansas cemeteries: Bairds Chappell, Bethel, Bluff Springs, DeAnn-Old Section, Ebenezer, Graham, Liberty, Macedonia, Marlbrook, Midway, Missionary Grove, Morros, Moscow, New Home, Piney Grove, Pleasant Hill, Providence, Smyrna, and Sweet Home. Most of the listings have been arranged as buried by row rather than alphabetically, and an effort was made to note graves that were unidentified. -BJM

**CHEROKEE BY BLOOD: Records of Eastern Cherokee Ancestry in the U. S. Court of Claims, 1906-1910, Volume 2, Applications 1551 to 4200**, compiled by Jerry Wright Jordan. Order from Heritage Books, 1540E Pointer Ridge Pl., Suite 300, Bowie, MD 20716. 485

pp., index, paper cover, \$25.00 plus \$2.50 shipping. In 1904, the Eastern Cherokees won large cash settlements from the United States because of violations of the treaties of 1835-36 and 1845. The payments, of over a million dollars, were to go to all living persons who had been members of the Eastern Cherokee tribe at the time of the treaty, or to their descendants if they were deceased. Over 46,000 people filed claims. This second volume in the series presents detailed abstracts of those applications including numerous verbatim transcriptions of affidavits by the applicants and their families and friends. Since most of the applicants were descendants, rather than the original tribe members, and had to prove their descent, the quantity of genealogical information is staggering. About 9/10s of the applicants lived west of the Mississippi River in the 1900s when they made application, with the balance living predominately in the southeast. Although the applicants had to have Indian ancestry, the majority were nominally white; a significant number of blacks are also included. - BJM

**SUMNER COUNTY, TENNESSEE DEED ABSTRACTS, 1806-1817** Abstracted by Joyce Martin Murray, 2921 Daniels, Dallas, TX 75205, 192 pp, hardbound, \$25.00 plus \$2.50 shipping & handling (Texas Residents add 7% tax) This book, **second in a series**, (see March 1989 AFH Book Reviews) is an excellent key to the numerous types of civil records for that area, including not only deed abstracts, but many slave sales, listing owners, powers of attorney, wills, bills of sale, Deeds of Gift (often giving relationships), and references to other Counties and States, for present or former addresses. There are three indexes: full names, slaves, and places. The knowledge Mrs. Murray gained thru many years work in her father's County Surveyor's Office and in abstract offices, is indicated in the excellent abstracting she has done in this book, listing all pertinent genealogical information. A real "boon" for folks researching this area of Tennessee! - BJM

**REVOLUTIONARY SOLDIERS IN ALABAMA**, by Thomas M. Owen, published by Heritage Book, Inc. 1540E Pointer Ridge Place, Suite 150, Bowie, MD 20716. 128 pp., paper, \$12.00. A reprint of the 1911 compilation of biographical notices of Revolutionary War soldiers who resided in Alabama. It was assembled by the Director of the Alabama Department of Archives and History from: obituaries in old newspapers, the Revolutionary Pension Roll compiled by the Federal Government, the 1840 census, tombstone inscriptions, published genealogies, the manuscript Pension Book kept by the State Branch Bank of Mobile, and the personal papers of Mrs. P. H. Mell, former State Historian of the Alabama Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). The notices vary in length from a paragraph to several pages and provide essential data on age, residence, military service, and other particulars along with citations to the sources. This report was original published in limited quantity as the department's Bulletin No. 5 and is now scarce; copies of the original edition sell for as much as \$45.00.- BJM

**FRANKLIN COUNTY, ARKANSAS MARRIAGE BOOKS C-D-E-F-G-H-I, 1882-1916** Published by Virginia M. McPhail, 1502 North Hills Blvd., Van Buren, AR 72956. Soft-cover, 248 pp., \$25.00. These marriage records cover the years 1882 through 1916 and include a few marriages from Book 7, located at Ozark, Arkansas. In 1901, a second court house was opened at Charleston for those who lived in the southern part of the county. The first marriage book from this court house is also included in this volume, which covers the years 1901 to 1918. This volume is divided into two sections - records from Ozark and records from Charleston. Each section lists the grooms alphabetically by surname, groom's age, bride's name, bride's age, date of marriage, and location of the marriage record. A brides index for the complete volume ends this work. MMrs. McPhail has also published the First Four Marriage Books of Franklin County, Arkansas, 1850-1882, 114 pp. which sells for \$15.00. - BJM

**THE SCOTT FAMILY OF SALINE COUNTY, ARKANSAS**, by Carolyn Earle Billingsley, 20 pages, softbound. After collecting research data on the Scott family over the years, the author has compiled a twenty page research document on the genealogy of the
