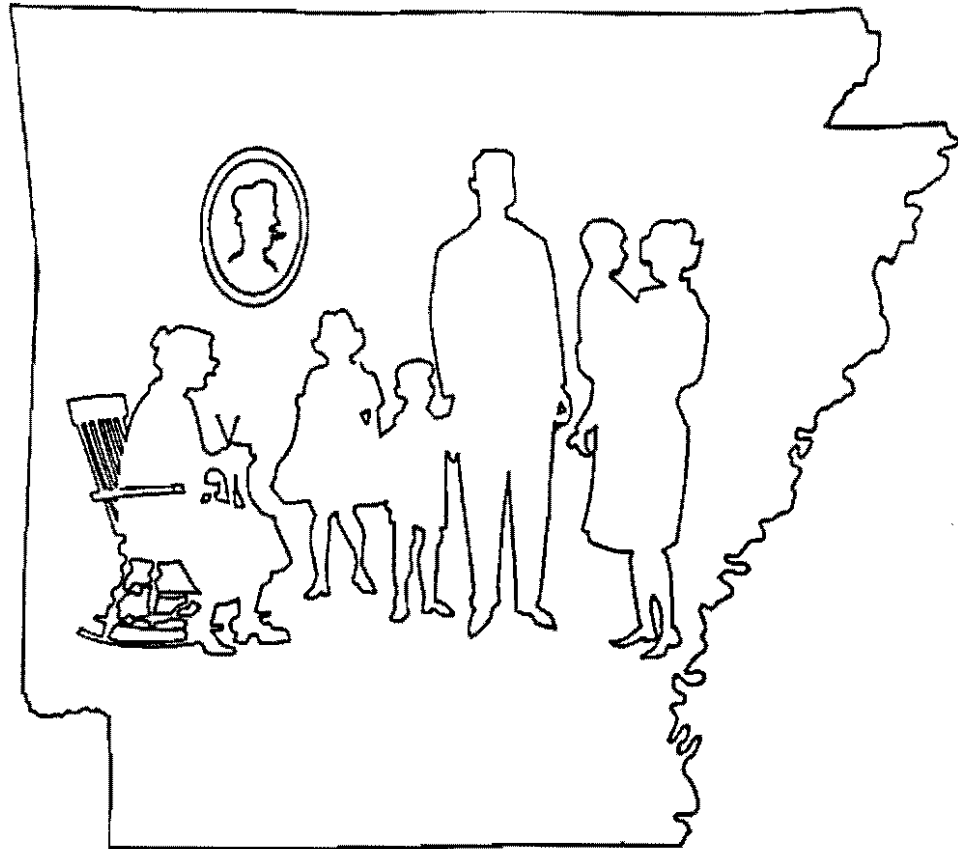

Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama, hosts the week long Institute of Genealogy and Historical Research each year in June. Prominent lecturers teach genealogists at all levels, beginning with a fundamental course. Participants can stay in a college dormitory for a nominal fee and tuition is inexpensive. Write Mrs. Marilyn Miller Morton, IGHR, Samford University Library, 800 Lakeshore Drive, Birmingham, AL 35229, for a brochure about this year's Institute.

Brigham Young University in Provo, Utah, offers degree and certificate programs for genealogists. They have an on-campus genealogy seminar each summer. Write Brigham Young University, Department of Independent Study, 206 Harman Building, Provo, UT 84602, for more information and a catalog.

National Genealogical Society is hosting A Capital Conference, 6-9 June 1990 in the Washington, DC area. Why not recruit a group from your local genealogical society, rent a van, and make yourself a memory? Write NGS, 4527 17th Street North, Arlington, VA 22207-2399, for a conference registration form.

If travel isn't in your plans, NGS offers a tape loan program to it's members and has created a home study course, American Genealogy: A Basic Course, to teach the fundamentals of research. Many of the lectures from NGS conferences are available on cassette tapes from Triad, PO Box 120, Toulon, IL 61483. Request information from NGS about member benefits and the home study course, and write Triad to request catalogs of recent NGS conference lectures.

Check your local community colleges and universities to see if they are offering non-credit classes in genealogy. If you are a self-directed learner, order yourself a good, basic genealogy textbook and get serious about reading it! Is Val D. Greenwood's The Researcher's Guide to American Genealogy on your bookshelf? Treat yourself to a copy.

I hope I have encouraged you to learn more about this fascinating hobby and I wish you the best in your research endeavors.

Lora McVey Miller of P. O. Box 334, Nowata, OK 74048, asks that we print her letter of November 7, 1989.

"WARNING - OUTLAW GENEALOGY"

"On Oct. 5, 1892, the Dalton gang attempted the simultaneous robbery of Coffeyville, Kansas' two banks. Emmett Dalton was the only survivor of the gang. After serving time in prison for his part in the Coffeyville raid, he met and married Julia Ann (Johnson) Gilstrap/Lewis in Bartlesville, Oklahoma, on Sept. 1, 1908.

A lot has been written about the Dalton gang and much of what has been written and is now being written is nonsense or pure fiction. Early writers invented facts, did not research the records, wrote books and articles full of errors and inaccuracies. Writers after them only researched to past books and articles, repeating these original errors. The more these inaccuracies appeared in print, it began to go down as history. Emmett put out several books, articles and movies that contained a lot of fiction also.

For the past few years, there has been a Dalton hoax going on. A new group of less-than-ethical writers have been exploiting the Dalton myths and legends and creating new ones as they go. The stories these writers put forth have no logic, no records to support any of their wild claims and propositions. Most of what they print is not substantiated. They substitute undocumented correspondence and interviews for primary research. They are doing more damage to true Dalton history and the history of connecting families than any other writers before them. Family files and pictures are "missing" from libraries. They are researching and writing about any and every family connected to the Daltons, weaving tales as they go, destroying true family histories. One of them "pretended" to be kin to the Johnsons in order to get information, and in turn twisted and turned what was said to make her own story. They are using any tactic they can to get information so they can blow it up and add to it to make a "juicy" story to sell. One source for their books came from a man in Mo. who claimed to be a Dalton descendant. He was a fake who had been in a mental institution. One writer in this group wrote a booklet based on information provided to him by this fake Dalton descendant. One writer has a fake genealogy out on the Daltons, which he has three different Dalton families that are unrelated, pulled together as one. He has fake pictures in his booklet also.

Readers and genealogists beware on booklets and articles coming out of Springdale, Ark., Waxahatchie, TX, Penn Valley, CA, and Tulsa, Okla, on Daltons and connecting families. They are very wrong and misleading. It is a hoax. They are NOT true histories on these families. They should be sold under FICTION instead of documented research."

Mrs. Miller states she found three outlaw queries in one of our recent issues and feels a lot of Arkansas families are affected. Emmett Dalton's sisters lived in Arkansas at one time and the fake genealogy put out has Arkansas connections - and gives genealogy a black eye!

Record of Sevier County Probate - May 1866

In the matter of the estate of Strother Flowers, Decd. by Marinda Flowers - his widow. Motion on property _____

Comes said Marinda Flowers the widow of said Strother Flowers deceased and filing her inventory and appraisal bill of said Estate, which were severely examined by the court and is found to have been made in accordance with law and has been approved by the court. And it appears to the satisfaction of the court from the reading of said appraisal Bill of said Estate that the property of the Estate of said deceased was appraised at the sum of one hundred and seventy five dollars and fifty cents. Therefore on motion of said Marinda Flowers widow as _____ it is ordered by the court that the Estate of the said Strother Flowers deceased be and the same is hereby vested absolutely in the said same Marinda Flowers widow of said Strother Flowers deceased. In accordance with the statutes in such case made and promised.

Early Arkansas Supreme Court Records

Arkansas Genealogical Society has a well-kept secret that may help your research, especially in 'burned counties,' counties in which records have been lost. Early Supreme Court records can help fill the record void in burned counties and provide information for other counties, too.

Most civil and criminal cases in early Arkansas were tried in either circuit or chancery courts. When decisions of those courts failed to satisfy the parties concerned, appeals to the Arkansas Supreme Court were sometimes made. The appeal process required the attorney of the appealing party to file a 'brief' or record of the original trial with the Supreme Court, citing some valid reason why the justices should review the case. If the Supreme Court heard the case and rendered a decision, the opinion became part of Arkansas law.

Summaries of the cases were written and published chronologically in a series of law books called Arkansas Reports. The original briefs and answering briefs filed by the other party in the case became a part of the Supreme Court's records. Complete sets of the Arkansas Reports series are difficult to find and are indexed only by point of law and by the plaintiffs' and defendants' names.

Now for the well-kept secret: in 1987, Joan Thurman Taunton, a legal secretary with access to a complete set of Arkansas Reports, made abstracts of the cases beginning with the first term in January 1837, through January 1861. She looked at the material with a genealogist's view, pulling all names and relationships from the summaries. Her index, Abstracts of Arkansas Reports: January 1837 through January 1861 was published in 1988 by Arkansas Genealogical Society.

Joan's book lists the case material in chronological order. The case citation, names of all parties involved, brief information about the dispute, and county and court from which the appeal was made are itemized. The book has a full name index.

Unfortunately, the book hasn't sold as well as other reference works published by AGS. Why not? Perhaps researchers don't see the immediate relevance of the material, or they don't want to invest \$20 in a book that might not have any reference to their families.

In response to slow sales, AGS has prepared a 'surname index' (last names only) to Abstracts of Arkansas Reports, containing about 2,400 names. For a free copy of the surname index, send a long self-addressed, stamped envelope to Arkansas Genealogical Society, PO Box 908, Hot Springs, AR 71902-0908. An order form for the book accompanies the index. AGS hasn't the staff (Margaret Harrison Hubbard, party of one and unpaid at that) to look up individual requests in the book's full name index, so please do not ask about a specific name.

What are these cases about? Heavy legal issues? No, many concern common, everyday, even petty, affairs. Who did people sue in the good old days? Why, neighbors and relatives, of course. Your person of interest need not have been a principle in a case to help your research. Suppose you 'lose' an ancestor in a burned county between 1840 and 1850. That's a broad span of time to search scanty sources for a death record notice. However, if you find him signing a bond or witnessing an instrument mentioned in these Supreme Court records in, say, 1847, your search period narrows.

Abstracts of Arkansas Reports can be especially helpful to researchers interested in black ancestry. Slaves were valuable property and often mentioned in lawsuits. A separate index of slave names is included after the full name index.

Here's a sample case from the January term, 1847, (7 Ark. 241.), Carr vs. Crain, et al, appealed from Perry County Circuit Court. (The courthouse burned in 1882.) John Tucker died in November 1832 and his will was probated in Conway County. He left a dollar to his lawful wife, Happy Trance Tucker, and a dollar to his lawful children by her: Elizabeth Lucas; heirs of his deceased daughter Sally Madlock; and heirs of his deceased son, Larry Tucker. He left slaves, Louis, Diana, and Maria, to his "companion" Fanny Smith. His children by Fanny were Martha Crain, wife of Harris Crain; James Tucker; William Tucker; Alfred Tucker; Melissa Titsworth; Jefferson Tucker; and Fanny Tucker. Mr. Tucker left slaves and land to his children by Fanny Smith. After Mr. Tucker died, Melissa married James Campbell; Fanny married Richard H. Burtram; and Fanny Smith married James Carr. Fanny Smith Carr died 12 February 1841 without leaving a will. The children of Mr. Tucker and Fanny Smith sued James Carr to regain possession of the slave Maria and Maria's children, Jack and Winney, who were born after Mr. Tucker's death.

How's that for an amazing amount of genealogical information? Most of the cases aren't that rich, this example is just to illustrate the possibilities. All this information about the Tucker case came from Abstracts of Arkansas Reports.

Suppose you find an interesting case in Abstracts of Arkansas Reports. How do you pursue it? The case citation (example: 7 Ark. 241.) leads you to the opinion summary printed in Arkansas Reports, the multi-volume series. You may write Arkansas Supreme Court Library, Justice Building, Little Rock, AR 72201, and request photocopies of the pages on which the case summary and opinion are printed. The charge is twenty-five cents per page. How do you estimate the number of pages? Joan's books lists the cases in chronological order, the order they're listed in the law books. The second number in the case citation, '241' in the example above, is the page number. Look at the next case citation and subtract to estimate the number of pages. Most are less than ten pages. Law libraries in other states may have copies of the Arkansas Reports series. Check your local law library.

So far, so good. Now for the hard part. Primary document hounds won't stop with the published summary - they want to see the actual briefs filed by the attorneys in the case. What do briefs contain? Everything - statements to the Supreme Court about the point of law or reason the decision of the trial court wasn't satisfactory,

depositions, transcripts of relevant information, exhibits and more. If the case involves distribution of an estate, a copy of the will may be included. All sorts of papers are included in briefs. The briefs are a part of the Supreme Court records, so when the county courthouse burned, the information was not destroyed.

The briefs for the Supreme Court cases before 1927 have been transferred to the Arkansas History Commission. They are arranged by case file number - no relation to the case citation in the Arkansas Reports series. There are 807 boxes of these briefs. There is a finding aid of sorts to some of the material - a card file in semi-alpha order by the parties to the suit. It is incomplete and it ends with 1907! If the year of the case is known, there are some Records of Proceedings ledgers with case numbers. The card file and ledgers are stored at the Arkansas History Commission and an appointment can be made to examine them. The boxes of briefs are stored off the premises and a request must be made for a member of the staff to retrieve specific files. More bad news - even if a case file number is located and a search is made in the boxes of briefs, there is a significant chance the case file is missing. Why? Attorneys checked out material through the years and didn't return it, or it is just not there.

Sound interesting? It starts with Joan Thurman Taunton's book, Arkansas Genealogical Society's well-kept secret. Order your copy of the surname index to Abstracts of Arkansas Reports and good luck on your research.

ZELLA M. HARGROVE GAITHER

Oizella "Zella" M. Hargrove Gaither was born on April 5, 1854, in Covington County, Mississippi. She was the third of the seven children born to John L. and Mary Ann Hargrove. Soon after her birth the family settled on a plantation near Brandon in Rankin County. After the Civil War Mr. Hargrove moved his family into Brandon and began to practice law. Soon after 1870 they relocated to Shreveport, Louisiana.

Zella received her education at the Brandon Female College where she showed an early interest in literary matters. However, a family illness soon compelled her to begin what was to become a lifelong career. Late in 1874 she moved to the Texarkana, Arkansas-Texas area and began working as a governess and then as a school teacher.

It was here she met Eli Robert Gaither, a Confederate Veteran, who was connected with a local mercantile business. They were married in Shreveport on March 25, 1879. Soon after Mr. Gaither began a term as Texarkana City Clerk. However, an illness contracted during the War recurred, rendering him an invalid for the remainder of his life. To support her family, Mrs. Gaither returned to teaching, and later established the Texarkana Female Seminary. Her husband died on February 14, 1904.

Following his death, she resumed her literary career and devoted much of her time to "historic writing". At the time of her death, on April 11, 1940, at the Arkansas Confederate Home in Little Rock, she had compiled a number of articles and several book length manuscripts. However, only her histories of Hot Springs and of the Arkansas Confederate Home, as well as the pamphlet reproduced below on the Old Military Road, were all that were printed; these being published between 1920 and 1925.

Zella and Eli had no children. She was survived by a nephew, Tom H. Moores of Texarkana, who received all of her non-published works at her death.

THE HISTORY
OF THE
OLD MILITARY ROAD
and
INDIAN TRAILS IN
ARKANSAS

With many deprivations, many days of hard work, and at an uncomfortable expense, I have gathered data for the history of the Old Military Road across Arkansas, the Indian trails that preceded it, and the Confederate roads and mail routes that followed it.

This work is done for the History Commission of Arkansas, and under its auspices, and was begun when Dr. J. H. Reynolds was Secretary of the History Commission. There is no appropriation to meet this expense, and I have had to earn my expenses, from day to day, as I have gone from place to place to secure the data from the living men and women whose ancestors were associated with the work of surveying or blazing the road and the cutting of the trees to open the blazed route. Then the subsequent removal of the Indians from their ancestral homes to their new homes in the wilderness of the Reservation given them in exchange for their homes through the South.

The Old Military Road begins in Georgia and Florida, and extends across Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas. From Arkansas on the west it enters what is now Oklahoma. When the road was opened it entered the Indian Territory at Ultima Thule, at the State border line.

Fort Towson was established as a fort of supply as well as a fort of defense. Letters sent out from Fort Towson were postmarked "Arkansas" even as late as 1842.

Military roads from other States meet at Fort Towson, which seems to have been a central meeting place for emigrant Indians and troops.

The purpose of the establishment of the Old Military Road was to remove the Indians from the Southern States.

There are several branches of the Old Military Road. One enters Arkansas at Memphis, Tenn. This branch passes through Little Rock, and runs almost parallel with the Iron Mountain Railroad till it reaches near Arkadelphia. There it goes a little north of west and goes to Washington, Hempstead County, Arkansas, and thence to Ultima Thule and to Fort Towson.

The second branch enters Arkansas at or near Gaines' Landing, on the Mississippi River. It passes through Monticello, Warren and Camden, thence to Washington, Hempstead County.

Camden was, in the days of Indian emigration, a most important point on the Old Military Road, because, being at the head of navigation on the Ouachita River, many Indians came by boat and proceeded west in wagon trains.

The third branch enters Arkansas from Louisiana, at a point south of Magnolia, Columbia County. There was no resting-place on Arkansas land on this branch until the emigrants reached Washington, Hempstead County. Magnolia is a city of a later generation. The Old Military Road passes directly across from the present-day townsite; and, in one part of the city, is called "Jackson Street". Magnolia is now a very important place on the Old Military Road in the present-day developments. This branch of the Old Military Road extends through Louisiana north and south.

The information gathered indicates that this branch of the road enters Louisiana from Southern Mississippi, somewhere near New Orleans.

Between New Orleans and Baton Rouge the original road has been reclaimed and built into a drive, a distance of ninety miles. At

Natchitoches, La., another considerable strip has been reclaimed and made into a boulevard.

An effort is being made by the Sorosis Club of Magnolia, Columbia County, in co-operation with the County Judge of that county, to get in co-operation with the Louisiana people, so as to reclaim the entire length of the original road, and thus create an attractive drive from the gulf coast to Arkansas through Magnolia, thence to Washington, Hempstead County, then westward to Oklahoma, and possibly northward to Nashville, Murfreesboro, etc., etc., into the Arkansas Ozarks.

Judge McCall of Ouachita County, and the club ladies of Camden are endeavoring to get in co-operation with the club ladies and County Judges east of them, towards the Gaines' Landing, on the Mississippi River, in order to establish a connected county drive of the original Old Military Road.

Much of the original road through these counties has always been maintained, and is still kept up as a county road. The streams that need to be bridged are already supplied with steel bridges in most of these counties. The line extending through Camden and crossing the Mississippi River at Gaines Landing passes through the original LeFlore plantation in Mississippi.

Green LeFlore was one of the Indian chiefs who made the treaty for the removal of the Indians from the South. His plantation was crossed by the original road. The town of Greenwood is named for Green LeFlore. The splendid edifice erected in the western reservation, near the old Wheelock Academy, for Chief Green LeFlore, in exchange for his residence in Mississippi, is in a fine state of preservation. His daughter, Mrs. Garland, has occupied it. Chief LeFlore never moved west. His grandson, Judge John Garland now owns and occupies this Western home. A full description of it is embodied in the Complete History of the Old Military Road.

The Military Roads were established for the Confederacy in 1861-65. There are a number of these in different parts of the State. A road was opened between Little Rock and Fort Smith as a matter of expediency for troops and supplies.

In 1831-32 a military road was blazed and cut out by a military force between Fort Smith and Fort Towson, for the purpose of sending supplies or troops from Fort Smith in case of emergency. This old road from Fort Smith, Ark., to Fort Towson, Okla., is now used, much of the way, for rural mail routes.

Many Indians went west as the road was being located and opened. But the major portion went between 1830 and 1840. Sometimes they went in crowds of 5,000 or 10,000, or even more. Once a large body of them had cholera. When they reached Little Rock they were kept in detention east of the river until the disease abated. Many died. The others were not allowed to pass through Little Rock. They made a detour and proceeded west.

At Camden people are living who can remember the Indians, in squads of 5,000 and 10,000, passing. Some came up the Ouachita River and were carried in wagons to Washington, Hempstead County, and thence

to
Indian Territory. These teams were hired by the United States Government.

One man, of Columbus, Hempstead County, made a million dollars on his contract with the Federal Government to furnish supplies to the emigrating Indians and the escorting army when they stopped there to rest and replenish supplies. Another man made many thousand dollars boarding the militia while there. This same man and family maintained a relay station for the stage later.

In Hempstead County, at Washington and Columbus, a splendid class of white people followed the emigration of the Indians, and settled large plantations and erected palatial homes. Some residences erected in the 30's and 40's are still owned and occupied by descendants of the builders.

Along the line of the Old Military Road extensive plantations and palatial homes and factories were established. These places were centers of social gaieties and brilliant gatherings and trade interests.

The old Wheelock Academy was established in the 40's as a boarding school for Indian girls. It is still in use. Other boarding schools for Indian girls have been destroyed by fire. These schools were in Indian Territory.

In Hempstead County, Arkansas, at Washington and Spring Hill, splendid institutions of learning were conducted for the education of the white population. In the History a full account is given of these schools, plantations and homes and factories, and the distinguished guests entertained in these homes at different times.

The early immigration of the white settlers was mostly along the Old Military Road because it was the only road through the State. White immigration rapidly followed the Indian migration.

Many Indians went up Red River and disembarked on the Indian Territory side. Doubtless Indians came from Kentucky, Tennessee, Missouri and Kansas over other military roads, but we are dealing with the old Military across the South, from Georgia and Florida through Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas and Louisiana in to the Western Reservation, called Indian Territory.

A road was cut out from Columbus, Hempstead County, to a point on Red River called Fulton. But this was never a part of the Old Military Road. The Indians never went by Fulton overland to Indian Territory. They turned north of west, a mile east of Columbus, and proceeded to Paraclifta, Dog-town and Ultima Thule.

The History is full of thrilling incidents, social, political and commercial. It contains information valuable to the history of the State, and gives elements that have always maintained a high standard among the early settlers and their descendants. It tells you of the visit of Charles Dickens, the English novelist, of Audubon, the bird-lover; of how President U. S. Grant and our beloved Jefferson Davis, as cadets rode over this road together and inspected the new country. Sam Houston, Gus Garland, Governor Archibald Yell, the

Eakins, Stuarts, Albert Pike, the Roystons, the Johnsons, etc., etc., have added adds lustre to the story of the early life along, over and near the Old Military Road, across the South.

Great care has been used in getting data to furnish proof of the authenticity of the facts given.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION FOR THE COULTER BIBLE RECORDS

Celia Vaughan was born 1798 Grayson County, Virginia, the daughter of Archillus Vaughan and Frances Foley. Celia Vaughan married Joel Oliver 8 Aug 1815 in Roane County, Tennessee. The above 2 families moved to Washington County, Arkansas shortly before 1840, where Joel

Oliver remained and Archillus Vaughan came on almost immediately to present day Christian County, Missouri.

Jane Oliver was the daughter of Celia Vaughan and Joel Oliver. Jane was born 6 May 1821, Roane County Tennessee and married to Thomas Harris Coulter 17 June 1840 in Washington County, Arkansas. Celia Vaughan Oliver died in Washington Co. Arkansas in September 1850. Soon after this the families of Thomas Coulter and Joel Oliver came to present day Christian County. Joel Oliver died there in 1855. The Thomas Harris Coulter family were in the 1860 Christian County Census, and moved to Taney County Missouri by 1870 where they remained until their deaths.



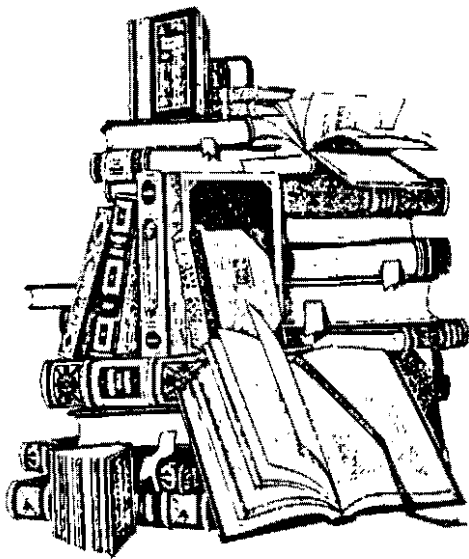

The following are reviews and/or announcements of book acquisitions for the Arkansas Genealogical Society. These books are permanently housed in the local History and Genealogy Room of the Little Rock Public Library. The Society expresses its appreciation to the authors and contributors.

CEMETERY RECORDS, PERRY COUNTY, ARKANSAS LIVING THE TIMES 1776-1976, A Bicentennial Tribute to Perry County, updated and reprinted by the Perry County Extension Homemakers, PO Box 300, Perryville, AR 72126. 306 pages, Softbound, \$20.00. The first 77 pages of this book contains a brief history of Perry County, highlighting its communities, with excellent picture reproduction. The balance includes tombstone inscriptions from 51 cemeteries in the county. The book is beautifully typed, well presented, and certainly will add to the available records for Perry County. On the negative side, however, there is no Index. Researchers seeking information on an ancestor in Perry County will, of necessity, have to search through the entire book, unless the burial site is known. Wonderful material with the work done by volunteers, but badly needs an index! - BJM

UNION COUNTY, ARKANSAS CEMETERY RECORDS, published by Union County Extension Homemakers Clubs (Order from Union County Cooperative Extension Service, PO Box 1626 % Mrs. Beula Mae Williams), El Dorado, AR 71730, 331 pages, Hardbound, \$15.00, plus \$2.50 for postage and handling. The information was obtained from the monuments in each of these 83 cemeteries up to 1969 by volunteers. "Since 1970, death records have been recorded in the Union County Courthouse." Also included in various cemeteries are records from Cemetery and Bible Records of Union Co., Arkansas - Hancock Vol. IV, 1812-1971, and Arkansas DAR, Cemetery Records, Union County. A full-name 81 page index is included. This very welcome addition to our Southern Arkansas records was donated to AGS by the Union County Cooperative Extension Council. - BJM

JOHNSON COUNTY, ARKANSAS 1870 UNITED STATES CENSUS, transcribed and published by Bill Hanks and Bobbie Jones McLane, surname index, soft-cover, 133 pages. This is a complete transcription, listing households in the order in which they were enumerated, giving names, ages, sex, birthplace and occupations. In 1870, for the first time, in this census, the recently freed negro slaves were listed by name and there was a tremendous influx of migrants from the war-torn states to the East. \$18.00 postpaid. Order from Arkansas Ancestors, 222 McMahan Drive, Hot Springs, AR 71913. - DWA

CHEROKEE BY BLOOD, Records of Eastern Cherokee Ancestry in the U. S. Court of Claims, 1906-1910. Volume 3. Compiled by Jerry Wright Jordan, published by Heritage Books, 1540E Pointer Ridge Place, Bowie, MD 20716. Soft-cover, 485 pages, indexed, \$25.00 plus \$2.50 postage. In 1904 the Eastern Cherokees won a million dollar judgment against the U. S. because of its violations of the treaties of 1835-36 and 1845. The payments were to go to all living persons who had been members of the Eastern Cherokee tribe at the time of the treaties, or to their descendants if they were deceased. Over 46,000 persons filed claims. Mr. Guion Miller, Special Commissioner to the U. S. Court of Claims, filed a summary of all the information concerning the claims, and this series of volumes presents detailed abstracts of those applications including numerous verbatim transcriptions of affidavits by the applicants, their families and friends. Since most of the applicants were descendants, and had to prove their descent, the quantity of genealogical information in these volumes is impressive. Mr. Miller and his assistants took testimony of people in 19 states. These testimonies give a great deal of information regarding family histories and migration. - BJM

BANNER OF PEACE AND CUMBERLAND PRESBYTERIAN ADVOCATE, Abstracts of Marriage, Death, and Other Notices 1843 - 1853 Compiled and published by Margaret B. Scoggins, PO Box 473, Poplar Bluff, MO 63901. Hardcover, 169 pages, acid free paper. \$22.50 postpaid. MO residents add 6.225% sales tax. This newspaper, published in Lebanon, Tennessee 1843-1853, covers all types of news not only items of interest to Cumberland Presbyterians, but national events, local notices and religious material. In the marriage and death notices all names and dates, plus other genealogical references, have been extracted. For the year 1843, almost all names and dates have been included, even those in a list of corresponding editors, quotes from a Cincinnati paper on a fire and explosion, lists of persons who took in stray livestock, property sold at Sheriff's sales, etc. The southern states, especially Tennessee, received the most coverage, but other states from New York to California were mentioned. Arkansas residents and/or locations are frequently mentioned, i. e. "Died in Pope Co., AR 9-29-1844 Eldridge Polk, son of David F. and Mary W. Williamson." "Died near Cane Hill in Washington Co., AR on 8-16 last, Mr. Jacob Pyeatt - 84 years old. Born in NC. Enlisted in service of his country. Left children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren." "Died in this place on Wed. the 8th inst., Mr. James T. White, a citizen of Johnson Co., AR. He fell from a horse. Clarksville, AR 10-10-1845" A full name index contains over 3500 names. - BJM

THE DALTON GANG FAMILY, A Genealogical Study of the Dalton Outlaws and Their Family Connections. By Nancy B. Samuelson, 129 Chaplin Rd., Eastford, CT 06242. 20 pages, \$5.00 (Orders of 10 or more - \$3.00) This small booklet contains research documented on the "Dalton Gang" and their family. Much of what has been written about the Daltons has been more fiction than fact and the author has obtained many source documents as well as numerous newspaper articles about the Daltons and their activities. Four pages of pictures, several of which have not been published before. An interesting history of a frontier family. - BJM

CARUTH FUNERAL HOME RECORDS, HOT SPRINGS, AR, 14 JUL 1909 to 31 DEC 1970 By Lewis C. Stephens, 113 Shady Lane, Hot Springs, AR 71901-9508, soft-cover, 174 pages, \$22.00. This compilation adds greatly to the volumes of City Death and Cemetery records already published for Hot Springs and Garland Co. Bentz & Buchanan Undertakers and Embalmers sold their business to Chris J. Ledwidge in 1908, and he operated the establishment until 1919, when Caruth Funeral Home opened. The funeral home on the records from 1909 to 1919 is not identified, however, the dates coincide with the beginning of Paul J. Caruth's association with Chris J. Ledwidge and the opening of The Caruth Funeral Home in 1919. These records, in alphabetical order of the deceased, also include some, if not all, of the records from the Paul Heady Funeral Home, which closed in 1944. Information given in most instances, includes the name of the deceased, death date, birth date, or age at death, spouse, father and mother, and the cemetery in which buried. As these records pre-date the filing of death certificates in Arkansas, records of death for some of these individuals (i.e. death of George Gray Latta, attorney, in 1911) exist in no other document. - BJM

CLARK COUNTY, ARKANSAS 1870 UNITED STATES CENSUS By Bobbie Jones McLane, ARKANSAS ANCESTORS, 222 McMahan Drive, Hot Springs, AR 71913, soft-cover, 408 pages, lists households in the order in which they were enumerated, giving names, ages, sex, birthplaces, and occupations. These records were transcribed some years ago by the compiler for her own use and are now shared with those persons interested in Clark Co. research. Surname index. \$25.00 postpaid. - DWA

SCOTT COUNTY, ARKANSAS 1860 UNITED STATES CENSUS Transcribed and Published by Bill Hanks and Bobbie Jones McLane, surname index, soft-cover, 150 pages. This is a complete transcription, listing households in the order in which they were enumerated, giving names, ages, sex, birthplace and occupations. The official court house records of this county burned in 1882, and these transcribed census records are a welcome addition for Scott Co. genealogical records. Persons interested in Scott Co., the south half of Logan Co., the southern part of Sebastian Co., and the western part of Yell Co. will find much of interest in this record, since Scott was the parent county of that area. This is a complete transcription, listing households in the order in which they were enumerated, giving names, ages, sex, birthplace, and occupations. (See note above on formation of counties from Scott.) \$22.00 postpaid. Order from Arkansas Ancestors, 222 McMahan Drive, Hot Springs, AR 71913. - DWA

PRAIRIE COUNTY, ARKANSAS, CEMETERY INSCRIPTIONS, by Marilyn Hambrick Sickel. Velo-bound, 245 pages, \$25.00 postpaid. Order from Grand Prairie Research, Route 1, Box 125-A, De Valls Bluff, AR 72041. This work of over 12,000 entries ("every readable marker in Prairie County" states the author) is arranged alphabetically by name of cemetery, and the names are alphabetical within each cemetery. There is no overall index. The maps are helpful and the author has

added other items to enhance the reader's research, such as listings from Garth Funeral Home records. -CEB

WARTENBE GENEALOGY: ANCESTORS AND DESCENDANTS OF WILLIAM AND CATHERINE (WHITE) WARTENBE OF NEW JERSEY, VIRGINIA AND OHIO, compiled by Mary Esther Ford, (Baltimore: Gateway Press, Inc., 1987.) Hardbound, 210 pages, full-name and place index, full bibliography and citation to sources, \$25.00 postpaid (California residents add \$1.50 sales tax.) Order from Mary Esther Ford, 2681 Cameron Park Drive #167, Shingle Springs, CA 95682. He explains the court system; the records in a courthouse, what they contain and where they're located; legal terms; the rectangular survey system; and how to find court cases. Maps and appendices enhance the text. -CEB

JOHN LEWIS CRAIG (1801-1864) AND WIFE MARGARET ANN HARDIN (1817-1910): ANCESTORS - DESCENDANTS, AND ALLIED FAMILIES by Marion Stark Craig, M.D., 300 Beckwood Road, Little Rock, AR 72205. Hardbound, 116 pages, maps, full-name index. This book is not for sale; copies have been given to relatives and a number of libraries and repositories, (including the AGS Library). Chock-full of fascinating family data, all beautifully documented and presented. This is an updated, combined supplement to previous books published by Dr. Craig. Many original documents are reproduced and others are abstracted. This book represents what every genealogist should be doing: documenting their family and making it available to others. -CEB

KERSCHNER KINFOLK, Volume 8 (1989), edited by W.E. Kershner, published by the Kershner Family Association, 1449 Fox Run Drive, Charlotte, NC 28212-7125. Softbound, 84 pages, indexed. No price given, but volumes for recent years (1986-1988) are \$14.00. Older back issues (1982-1985) are \$16.00 each. This annual book contains the four quarterly issues published by the Kershner Family Association. -CEB.

VIRGINIA GENEALOGIES AND FAMILY HISTORIES: A BIBLIOGRAPHY OF BOOKS ABOUT VIRGINIA FAMILIES, compiled and edited by Donald O. Virdin, 2111 Jefferson Davis Highway, Apt. 308-South, Arlington, VA 22202. Perfect-bound, 210 pages, \$42.50 postpaid. Mr. Virdin previously compiled similar books for Delaware, Maryland, and Pennsylvania. This book contains listings for 2,500 published genealogy books on Virginia families, arranged alphabetically in an easy-to-use format. A wonderful finding aid, although there is no cross-reference to genealogies published on more than one family name. -CEB.

INDEX TO CONWAY COUNTY, ARKANSAS, DEED BOOKS A & B, 1825-1843, compiled by Pat McFall, published by Arkansas Research, P.O. Box 303, Conway, AR 72032. Soft-bound, 49 pages, full-name index (including slaves), map, order form for copies of originals, \$12.00 postpaid. Early Conway County included the present-day counties of Conway and Perry, most of Faulkner, and parts of White, Cleburne, Van Buren and Pope. All types of instruments, including deeds, emancipations, powers of attorney, and ministers' credentials, from the two earliest deed books are abstracted, giving buyer, seller, witnesses, type of transaction, and year of signing and filing. Layout and print quality are superior. -CEB.

WOODRUFF COUNTY, ARKANSAS, LOOSE PROBATE PAPERS: 1862-1900, compiled by Arkansas History Commission volunteers: Marion Stark Craig, M.D. (text) and Beth Brownlee (index). This volume, the third of a series, contains listings from cemeteries in Camp, Franklin, Morris and Titus Counties, Texas. Arranged in order of burial within each cemetery. Supplemented with additional information from author and from newspaper obituaries. A simple map of the area would have been a valuable addition, although directions to each cemetery are given. Also available on video-cassette. Mr. Frazier is the author of similar volumes covering Claiborne Parish, LA, Northwest Louisiana, and Southwest Arkansas. -CEB.

SCREETON, SHELTON, BYRD and SANDERS FAMILIES - PAST AND PRESENT, (Revised edition, July 1989) by Mary Lou Screeton Lamb, published by Superior Office Services, Route 5, Box 919, Benton, AR 72015. THE OGDENS AND BLANKS OF UNION COUNTY, ARKANSAS, by Timothy D. Hudson, 2911-B Silver Spur Circle, Bryan, TX 77801. Velo-bind, 83 pages, no index, \$10.00. This collection of articles chronicle the lives of members of this family, among the earliest to settle in Union Co., Ark. Rev. Benjamin Ogden moved his family to this area about 1820, and his life, that of his son Isaac, grandson Isaac Nathaniel and great-grandson William Robert Ogden extend through 180 years. The book contains good documentation from deed, marriage and cemetery records of Union Co., Union Parish, LA, and from various U. S. Census. -BJM

PRAIRIE COUNTY, ARKANSAS, 1880 CENSUS, by Margaret Harrison Hubbard, 1207 Shady Grove Road, Hot Springs, AR 71901. Softbound, 231 pages, \$22.50. This is a transcription of the 1880 census done in original order. It includes township, dwelling and family numbers, full name, race, sex, age, relationship to the head of household, occupation, and reported place of birth for respondent and parents. A surname index provides easy access to information for each household. A map of Arkansas, with an inset for Prairie County is included. An excellent publication, providing needed genealogical data for this east-central county of Arkansas. - BJM

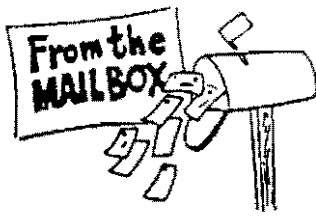
